FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2016

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 30 June 2016.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (FRSSE) effective 1 January 2015.

Structure, governance and management

Lea Rowing Club Limited is a company limited by guarantee governed by its Articles of Association dated 16 March 2014 as amended on 5 June 2014 and 23 October 2015. It is registered as a charity with the Charity Commission in England and Wales (Number: 1157563). Anyone may become a member of the charity, each of whom undertakes to contribute £10 to the assets of the charity in the event of its being wound up.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2016

Directors are appointed by the members of the charity in accordance with the Articles of Association, which provide that the minimum number of directors shall be not less than three and (unless otherwise determined by ordinary resolution) the maximum number of directors shall be ten, comprising:

- (1) the President, who shall be nominated by the directors and appointed for a three year term at the annual general meeting by a resolution passed by a two-thirds majority of the members present, in person or by proxy, and voting. The President shall be eligible for re-appointment;
- (2) the Secretary, who shall retire at the annual general meeting each year but shall be eligible for reappointment;
- (3) the Treasurer, who shall retire at the annual general meeting each year but shall be eligible for reappointment (note: no person was appointed Treasurer for the year ended June 2016 during which the duties of Treasurer were performed by S Lawrence);
- (4) the Captain, who shall retire at the annual general meeting each year but shall be eligible for reappointment;
- (5) the Facilities Director who shall retire at the annual general meeting each year but shall be eligible for re-appointment;
- (6) up to three additional directors who shall be nominated by the other directors and each of whom shall be elected by resolutions passed at the annual general meeting.
- (7) at the discretion of the directors, up to two co-opted individual members, who shall hold office only until the next annual general meeting, but shall be eligible for a further term or terms of co-option, at the discretion of the directors (note: the discretion to co-opt individual members was not used during the year ended June 2016).

No person may be appointed a director at any general meeting unless that person is a member of the charity and he or she:

- (1) is recommended for appointment or re-appointment by the directors; or
- (2) has been duly proposed and seconded by persons entitled to vote at the meeting for appointment or re-appointment of a person as a director.

In the event of there being more nominations than vacancies for a post, there shall be an election at the general meeting as directed by the President.

All significant decisions concerning the policy and operation of the charity, e.g. budgets, contracts, major purchases etc., are made by the directors acting in accordance with the Articles of Association. Over the year the directors met monthly because of the need for close oversight of the redevelopment work as it proceeded.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2016

Any director may call a meeting of the directors. Questions arising at a meeting shall be decided by a majority of votes. In the case of an equality of votes, the person who is chairing the meeting shall have a second or casting vote. No decision may be made by a meeting of the directors unless a quorum is present at the time the decision is purported to be made. 'Present' includes being present by suitable electronic means agreed by the directors in which a participant or participants may communicate with all the other participants. The quorum shall be two or the number nearest to one-third of the total number of directors, whichever is the greater. A director shall not be counted in the quorum present when any decision is made about a matter upon which that director is not entitled to vote.

Oversight of the day-to-day running of the club's rowing activities is delegated to a Rowing Committee chaired by the Captain which meets monthly.

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed and are satisfied that appropriate controls are in place to mitigate exposure to those risks.

None of the Trustees has any beneficial interest in the company.

Objectives and activities

The purposes of the charity are:

- (1) the promotion of community participation in healthy recreation in particular by the provision of facilities for rowing, sculling and other sports ("facilities" means land, buildings, equipment, and organising sporting activities);
- (2) providing and assisting in providing facilities for sport, recreation or other leisure time occupation of such persons who have need for such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disablement, poverty or social and economic circumstances or for the public at large in the interests of social welfare and with the object of improving their conditions of life.

In planning and carrying out the charity's activities for the year, the trustees have taken into account the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit, including the guidance 'public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'.

The charity provides a comprehensive range of rowing activities for participants of all ages and abilities. Membership is open to any individual regardless of their sex, age, disability, ethnicity, nationality, sexual orientation, religion or other beliefs. The charity's programmes are structured to enable any member to learn to row and develop at his or her own speed. Through these programmes, members may prepare for and progress through the various levels of competitive rowing up to elite level or join in rowing just for recreation and enjoyment. The membership includes all age-groups from junior under 14 through to 85 plus.

As part of its aim to enable all within the community, whatever their means, to take part in its activities, the charity offers reduced membership subscription rates for full-time students and unwaged members, and a reduction in the junior subscription rate for children who qualify for free school meals. The charity also offers a family membership at a reduction from individual rates.

All the necessary facilities, boats and equipment to support these programmes, including equipment for land-based training, as well as changing, shower and toilet facilities, are provided by the charity through its boathouse site.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2016

Achievements and performance

The charity is situated in Hackney and is the only rowing club in North East London, a densely-populated area. The evidence, for example the numbers of applicants for learn to row courses, is that there is an unmet need for participation in rowing in this area. The charity is therefore committed to a long-term plan to expand opportunities for the local community to take part in rowing. To accommodate the anticipated increase in membership the charity therefore embarked upon a programme of fund-raising to finance a project to redevelop and refurbish the club's boathouse.

Over the year, the charity has continued to work towards its redevelopment goals. A key development during the period was the extension of the charity's lease of the boathouse site, which was due to expire in 2023. Previously, this did not provide sufficient security of tenure to enable the charity to access the investment in the site that was needed. The charity has secured an agreement with the London Borough of Hackney to grant a new 99-year lease subject to meeting certain conditions, including obtaining planning consent for a complete redevelopment of the buildings on the site and providing written evidence that all the necessary funding was in place. By the start of the year, the charity had just secured planning permission for the redevelopment (granted in June 2015) and had raised more than £200,000 from club members and more than £700,000 in grants, including grants from YES (Youth Experience in Sport), Sport England, British Rowing, the London Marathon Trust and Mayor of London Sports Facilities Fund. With that sum in place, the charity was able to demonstrate to the London Borough of Hackney that all their preconditions for the grant of a new lease had been met and the new 99-year lease was granted in August 2015.

With the new lease in place, work on the redevelopment could start. When it did in September 2015, the initial plan was to:

- build a new 2-story extension to the main boathouse on the site of an old single-story shed that was used to store boats and equipment mainly for junior rowers which would be demolished
- spend the remaining available funding on refurbishing the main boathouse to upgrade the men's and women's changing facilities and increase accessibility across the site.

The charity was aware that further work was needed on the main boathouse and planned to do this piecemeal as funds became available, with a target to finish by 2020. However during the year the charity was able to bring forward some of this work — most notably installing a new roof on the main boathouse and air conditioning in the new gym areas on the upper floors of the main boathouse and new extension. Doing so while the construction of the new extension was going on has enabled this work to be done more economically and minimised the disruption to the charity's operations.

By the year-end, the construction work on the new extension and re-roofing of the main boathouse was largely complete and work on fitting out the internal spaces of both buildings had begun. This work provides substantially increased indoor-training facilities as well as much improved changing facilities, including an increase in the area of the women's changing room to equal that of the men's. The changes also include the installation of a lift to make the first floor of the building accessible, as well as provision of accessible toilet facilities on the first floor and accessible changing/shower/toilet facilities on the ground floor, in order to facilitate the development of 'adaptive' rowing for people with a disability. The expanded facility will also create space that can potentially be shared with other sports clubs with similar objectives, or for other community use.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2016

Despite the disruption caused by the construction work, club membership remained at over 300 during the year (327 in 2016, compared with 321 in 2015 and 300 in 2014). In addition, the club ran a number of "learn to row" events during the year with a total of 126 participants, with females outnumbering males by nearly two to one

June 2016 saw the launch of Junior Club Squad (JCS), a community junior squad for all juniors from the age of 11-17 wanting to row once a week. The subscription of £50 for the first six months is heavily subsidised by the club with the aim that cost would not be a prohibitive factor in taking exercise. Juniors may join from a variety of pathways and do not have to be 'sporty' or competitive. JCS bursaries are available from the Club to allow participants from disadvantaged backgrounds an equal opportunity to participate. In May 2016 a generous donation from YES provided six new boats for the Schools' Programme to replace the 40 year old former Inner London Education Authority playboats. The new boats were chosen by the coaches and school children after trialling a number of boats.

The Schools' Programme, launched in September 2014, increased its participation from 140 in its first year to 179 this year with schools from the boroughs of Hackney, Haringey and Waltham Forest. Participants were 50% female, 50% male from a very diverse range of ethnicities including Asian, Caribbean, Chinese, Cuban, Iranian, Lithuanian, Somali, Turkish and White British. The Programme includes a school whose pupils have autism spectrum disorders and other complex needs such as Down's syndrome. Feedback from this school has been extremely positive but funding for future sessions has not been secured.

The Club has been successful in gaining funding for 'Waltham Forest Schools Learn to Row' (Sportivate), for a term of JCS sessions (Sportivate) and for Hackney schools to row (London Borough of Hackney). With cuts in funding to schools, boroughs and sports organisations, additional funding will be required for the charity to continue to offer this range of activities.

Financial review

Membership subscriptions, income from school coaching and rental income fund the ongoing activities of the charity. In addition, a substantial part of the charity's rental income, specifically income from the café and flats located at "Riverside Cottage" on the club's site is being used towards the funding of the development. The charity has also been fortunate this year to receive donations and grants which have allowed major capital investment in the new building

The Trustees, who are also the directors of Lea Rowing Club Limited for the purposes of company law, are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. 1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in July 2014, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective 2015) and the Companies Act 2006.

There have been no changes to the accounts as a result of the new FRSSE.

1.2 Incoming resources

Income from all funding sources is included in incoming resources on an accruals basis. The charity receives money mainly through membership subscriptions, rental income, grants and donations.

Items of income are recognised and included in the accounts when all of the following criteria are met:

- 1. the charity has entitlement to the funds;
- 2. any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met or are fully within the control of the charity;
- 3. there is sufficient certainty that receipt of the income is considered probable; and
- 4. the amount can be easily measurable.

1.3 Resources expended

Direct charitable expenditure includes the direct costs in furtherance of the charities objectives and these are accounted for when they are incurred.

1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets other than freehold land are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

No depreciation is charged in respect of assets under the course of construction.

1.7 Funds

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of the charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are donations and grants which the donor has specified to are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.
