STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incoporated on 8 September 2010 and registered as a charity on 14 February 2011. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up, directors are required to contribute £1 per director and members of the charity £10 per member.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and under the company's Articles. In this report these are referred to as members of the Management Committee. The Chief Executive Officer sits on the Management Committee but has no voting rights.

Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association the trustees once elected are intended to be permanent. If trustees are to be disqualified or removed, the procedures laid out in the Memorandum and Articles of Association are to be adhered to.

The nature of the charity's work is based around people with 'multiple and complex needs'. The Management Committee seeks to ensure that the needs of this group are appropriately reflected through the diversity of the trustee body. All members of the Management Committee must be either directly involved with the delivery of the services that the charity offers or be able to demonstrate a unique understanding of the people group to be supported in order to add clear value to the charity's objectives.

Trustees Induction and Training

All trustees are already familiar with the practical work of the charity having been encouraged to visit the 'Regional Centre's where the core services are delivered.

Additionally, new trustees must all sign a declaration of eligibility as a security check for fraud. Trustees are expected to attend a short training and induction session in order to familiarise themselves with the charity and the context within which it operates. The training sessions are led by the Chief Executive of the charity and covers:

- The obligations of Management Committee members
- The main documents which set out the operational framework for the charity including the Memorandum and Articles Resourcing and the current financial position as set out in the latest published accounts, future plans and objectives

There have been two further appointments during 2013 each of which have been suitably inducted and trained. The two new aforementioned trustees are Mr G Bell and Mr M Turley.

Risk Management

The Management Committee continues to conduct a review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed. The established business continuity plan has been updated for the period 1 January 2014 to 31 December 2014.

Procedures are in place to ensure compliance with health and safety of staff, volunteers and clients at the Charity Head Quarters and Regional Centres. The annual registration and renewed award of FA Charter Standard status ensure a consistent quality of delivery for all operational aspects of the charity. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they continue to meet the needs of the charity. The internal quality management framework further complements existing standards as laid out by by the FA and AOA to which Street Soccer Academy is reportable

Organisational Structure

Street Soccer Academy's Management Committee meet quarterly and are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. The CEO sits on the committee but has no voting rights.

A scheme of delegation is in place and day-to-day responsibility for the provision of the services rest with the Chief Executive along with the Technical Director and General Manager. This group has been named the Senior Management Team. The Chief Executive is responsible for ensuring that the charity delivers the services specified and that key performance indicators are met. The Technical Director has responsibility for the day-to-day operational management of the Regional Centres, and the General Manager has responsibility for all administrative aspects of the charity. The Chief Executive is responsible for the individual supervision of the staff team and also ensuring that the team continues to develop their skills and working practices in line with good practice.

Related Parties

In so far as it is complimentary to the charity's objects, the charity works closely with experts in related fields who also provide services to the charity's beneficiary group. The charity works in close collaboration with locally and nationally recognised groups providing expert provision in areas of accommodation, finance, education, employment & training, physical & mental health, families & community support, drugs & alcohol, attitudes, thinking and behaviour.

The representation of local organisations has proved invaluable to the charity in establishing improved links within the community and identifying relevant policy developments and prospective funding. Street Soccer Academy has continued to forge strong links with nationally recognised organisations to complement the medium term growth strategy of increasing reach and impact in the immediate region and expanding towards a national model.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The company's objects and principal activities are:

- the advancement of education,
- to promote social inclusion, and
- the promotion of participation in healthy recreation through sport and in particular (but without limitation) the provision of football based activities.

The main objectives and activities for the year focused upon increasing participation numbers involved in healthy recreation through our regional centres. The strategies employed to assist the charity to meet these objectives included the following:

- The development of a franchise model enabling the empowerment of other organisations to deliver Street Soccer Academy Regional Centre activities.
- Training and equipping individuals in local communities to deliver core activities as delivery partners

Two franchise models have been in operation during 2013. One partnership was developed with Community Solutions North West and the other with FC United of Manchester.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

The charity has continued to excel in its partnership with HMP Forest Bank prison and reintegration of ex-offenders back into communities. The delivery of the Coach Education and Personal Development programme has seen an improved attrition rate of 23% on average, which has fallen from 25% in 2012. External engagement rates remain at 89%, the same figure as in 2012 and reoffending rates have fallen to 6% from 8% in 2012. By 31 December 2013, 112 inmates had been released into the community and chose to to engage with Street Soccer Academy. A total of 87% of those entered into employment, education or further training (including further education and training directly with Street Soccer Academy community based programmes).

Other outputs include:

- A contribution of over 120 volunteer hours per week during the stated period in local communities.
- An average of 83 service users benefiting from 'regional centres' each week
- 79% of service users progressing through the internal system from education programme (level 1) to Street Soccer Academy practical experience (level 2) and skills development programme (level 3)
- 242 individuals received support from the Street Soccer Academy infrastructure during 2013 (either via a regional centre or from the floating support team)

Advancement of Education

During 2013 the charity delivered three Coach Education and Personal Development programmes in conjunction with Accrington & Rossendale College, based on their site. The target group was individuals who were unemployed and the aim for them to reconsider mainstream education at the college. A total of 18 individuals participated, 16 successfully completed the programme and 6 signed up to college courses.

During 2013 the charity completed the development of 'streetfit', a sustainable fitness programme to be delivered as part of a health and wellbeing programme. The programme is also accredited and incorporates healthy living units of discussion to help participants improve their physical and general health. The new service is flexible in its delivery enabling the programme to be run in a variety of locations and environments, such as prisons, housing associations, hospitals and outdoor spaces such as as gardens and parks. The programme empowers participants to take control of their physical health and apply the skills learned in their 'home' environments without the need for a gym membership or technical equipment.

A variety of topics are covered through all of the education programmes which lead to progressions such as mainstream education and further training with Street Soccer Academy on accredited practical experience and work skills programmes. A major success this year has been an ex-homeless man beginning a Mechanical Engineering degree.

The charity's programmes are accredited through the Assessments and Qualification Alliance (AQA) and provide certification upon successful completion of units. Typical progressions include advancement onto industry-recognised qualifications, work placements, voluntary work and employment. Practical experience and work skills opportunities exist within the charity itself and with partner organisations.

Coach Educators and teams of volunteers assist in the delivery and administration of the Street Soccer Academy Education Programmes.

Promotion of Social Inclusion

The charity exists to deliver excellence, generate hope, provide dignity and fuel ambition of people who have multiple and complex needs. The tagline of Street Soccer Academy is 'Supporting people with multiple and complex needs'. The charity positions itself to enable it to offer its services to 'hard-to-reach' groups such as those with homeless related issues, the unemployed, NEETs, ex-offenders, recovering drug addicts, ex-armed servicemen, mental health and disability groups and those who previously have not succeeded academically.

We receive service users into our environments of all ethnicities and backgrounds, and ensure that our equal opportunities policy is understood and administered by all staff, volunteers and service users. Our volunteers are sourced from the local communities within which our Regional Centres operate and seek to build positive relationships with the service users. Through volunteer led involvement and peer mentoring our service users are actively encouraged to participate in regular activities that are available in their local areas in order to reintegrate them back into local their communities. Many with their newfound qualifications and experience get involved in football based coaching activities for people from their local communities to attend as they seek to help and educate others.

Street Soccer Academy firmly believes in inclusivity. During 2013 we have experienced a significant number of service users reintegrated back into their communities through housing initiatives, formal education, reconciliation of families, work experience, voluntary work and employment.

The Promotion of Participation in Healthy Recreation through Sport

Street Soccer Academy has a capacity of 170 spaces for people to engage with sport and recreation every week throughout Greater Manchester, Lancashire and Cheshire. Various interpersonal and leadership skills are developed along with access to a minimum of two hours per week of physical exercise for each participant. A main exit strategy continues to be local football clubs for competitive and regular football activity. Life skills resulting in improved attitudes towards authority, punctuality, commitment, leadership skills, conflict resolution skills, and responsibilities are learned and result in real and tangible progressive routes in sport and leisure industries.

During 2013 we have continued to receive large amounts of referrals from 'homeless' agencies, such as hostels and drop-in centres but the fastest growing area for referrals to Street Soccer Academy has been the ministry of justice. The promotion and availability of healthy recreation and sport has been a major factor in the extremely low reoffending rates we have experienced during 2013. The focused attention given at our regional centres has enabled us to positively influence the participants and channel their attitudes, thinking and behavior.

A significant number of our participants have become trained and qualified football coaches during 2013 and are now delivering coaching sessions on behalf of local clubs and community groups for children and adults alike.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Principal Funding Sources

In addition to the income generated by donations and fundraising events, other principal funding sources for the charity are currently by way of contract income and grants. Street Soccer Academy has four forms of contract income, three in partnership with a prison and one with a college.

The charity has been successful in obtaining grants during 2013 from The Football Foundation, Comic Relief, The Bridging Fund Charitable Trust, The Hedley Foundation, Lloyds TSB Foundation for England & Wales and The Wakeham Trust.

Investment Policy

Aside from retaining a prudent amount in reserves each year most of the charity's funds are to be spent in the short term and so there are currently no funds available for long-term investment.

Reserves Policy

Due to unforeseen circumstances beyond its control the charity failed to achieve its target of having a minimum of £33,000 in unrestricted reserves by the end of 2013. This target was set to meet the working capital requirements in order for the charity to continue the current activities in the event of a significant drop in funding.

During the first half of 2013 Street Soccer Academy utilised the services of a registered charity 'The Dove Trust' who operated an on-line giving portal www.charitygiving.co.uk set up to receive and administer online fundraising donations on behalf of charities. In June 2013 the Charity Commission opened a statutory enquiry into the Dove Trust and appointed an Interim Manager. On 12th July 2013 the online giving portal was suspended and full control of the charity was handed to the interim manager.

At the end of July 2013 the Dove Trust Interim Manager confirmed that the total balance owing to Street Soccer Academy as at 12th July 2013 was £13,066.

Unfortunately as at 31st December 2013 the full amount of £13,066 owed to the charity remained outstanding and the charity was awaiting further details as to whether they would be receiving any of the money owed. Had the charity received the £13,066 raised via www.charitygiving.co.uk it would have achieved its 2013 reserves target.

TRUSTEES ANNUAL REPORT (continued)

In light of this unfortunate circumstance the charity now use 'BT Mydonate' for online fundraising.

The Management Committee continues to examine the charity's requirements for reserves in light of the main risks to the organisation. It is therefore maintaining the established policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets held by the charity should be between 3 and 6 months of the expenditure. Budgeted expenditure for the 2014 financial year is £170,000 however in view of the situation noted above, whilst ideally the charity would have been looking to have £36,500 in reserves by the end of 2014 it has been decided that it will aim to reach a minimum of £33,000 in reserves by the end of 2014.

Income from contracts and regular donations has risen from the previous year and it is the intention of the charity to continue to pursue new contract income, funding via grant applications and holding regular fundraising events in order to exceed our budgeted expenditure.

The Short Term Guaranteed Investment Account was closed in February 2013 and replaced by a Charity Deposit account providing a better rate of interest.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

The charity plans continuing the activities outlined above in the forthcoming years subject to satisfactory funding arrangements. Plans are being developed to increase the scale of the delivery of Street Soccer Academy services locally and nationally. Greater Manchester continues to be an area of priority along with Lancashire. Plans to export the working model into the North East are being finalised during 2014.

We will continue to seek partnerships with well respected and industry recognised groups in order to provide a mutual aid network of support to those with multiple and complex needs in the geographical areas stated.
