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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 May 2019

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 May 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objects

The objects for which the company is established may be summarised as follows:

To promote sustainable development for the benefit of the public by:

- The preservation, conservation and the protection of the environment and the prudent use of resources.
- The relief of poverty and the improvement of the conditions of life in socially and economically disadvantaged communities.
- -The promotion of sustainable means of achieving economic growth and regeneration.

To advance the education of the public in subjects relating to sustainable development and the protection, enhancement and rehabilitation of the economy and the environment.

To advance the education of the public in the subject of history, art and architecture through the study of historic buildings and their surroundings, past economic conditions etc.

To promote for the benefit of the inhabitants of Birmingham and the Midlands the provision of facilities for recreation emphasising traditional hand-skills for individuals who have need of such facilities regardless of their age, infirmity or disablement or economic or social situation.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Means of attaining the above objects

At a heritage building in Balsall Heath, Birmingham, that we have named The Old Print Works, we provide equipped spaces and a programme of activities in which designer-makers and artists both volunteer and those generating an income from activities can demonstrate skills and run workshop sessions for adults, young people and children in making and repairing. This is an opportunity for artists to share their skills in the use of small industrial and hand tool processes as well as the selection and use of appropriate materials for the production of high-quality items. It provides an opportunity for disappearing skills to be shared and learned both in the production of the items and repairs to the old. This fosters sustainability. As such we mean to set up a number of shared spaces including a skills shed to promote the sharing of hand tool skills in woodworking.

We seek to protect, enhance and rehabilitate disappearing local industry and the environment through the provision and management of low-cost space which we are aiming to make low-carbon for local designer-makers and artists starting up in business and working in ways which demonstrate traditional workmanship and the development of those skills so that they are applicable in a contemporary context. We accommodate any bespoke light manual industries creating an alternative option to the currently available mass-produced, disposable and short-life items. As people start to choose local high-quality, durable, reusable, repairable items, we envisage demand increasing for the skills used to make them, which in time will help to revitalise the local economy in a way that can no longer be expected from the highly mechanised industries Birmingham hosted in the mid twentieth century.

We are preserving and restoring a heritage building (The Old Print Works in Moseley Road, Balsall Heath) primarily through the work of volunteers committed to its heritage value. We seek to use long-lasting repair methods and trade skills to achieve high quality results, according to ethos of transition. The activities here are linked to those described above in relation to the skills shed and provide an opportunity for the practical use of some of the skills learned. The methods of preserving and restoring the building provide a model of sustainable economic growth and development replicable in other contexts and which in time will build resilence to economically challenging events. These methods include the vital skill of appreciating the beauty and usability of the old, working it into new designs and systems; we are opposed to the contemporary widespread approach of gutting buildings to leave just a shell. We try many new materials with old approaches such as improving seals around glass in existing window frames, using modern materials to ensure repairs last 20 years or more. These methods may include innovative approaches to sustainable energy infrastructure including involving passive solar gain (e.g. conservatories) storage of heath in thermal mass low down in the building.

We will develop opportunities to explore the building's history, in particular demonstrating the historical development of printing and other skilled activities which have contributed to the building's history as well as impacting the history or production and the marketing in the UK.

We provide communal space in which community members can come together to learn, share, exhibit, tell their story, invite collaboration and comment, see alternative approaches, try new things, get input and new perspectives on ideas and proposals. We will organise and seek to encourage events and exhibits that challenge people's thinking and draw attention to urgent environmental matters, as well as displays that link the history of everything that goes on and has gone on at The Old Print Works to present approaches and future sustainable development needs.

We promote events spaces so that people who may not otherwise come to the building are attracted and are able to see what goes on. We encourage events also to bring together people from different backgrounds, traditions and giving opportunity for learning from each other.

In planning our activities for the year we kept in mind the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit in planning our activities.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES Achievements, Performance and Future Plans Review of the Year

This year has been a significantly more productive year than 2017/18.

- Whilst progress on purchasing the building stalled there has been significant progress towards obtaining a long lease and option to purchase. We managed to find a pro-bono solicitor who is helping us with the legal paperwork.
- Despite major unit partners moving on, revenue overall has increased. Revenue from The Transfer and sessional hire has risen significantly so the charity continues to become more economically sustainable.
- The café that was under utilized in the early months of the year closed in December 2018 but reopened after Easter 2019 re-energised; managed by The Gap Arts project.
- Progress towards incentivising unit partners to report on and maximize their social impact has advanced with a new approach to contracts being developed. 2 major new unit partners signed up to this approach.
- We significantly enhanced safety in the building with amongst other things an extension to the modern fire alarm system in the front building into the café and with work to protect the front staircase.
- We are increasingly a base for successful enterprises and socially engaged organisations.
- Joint work with partners in the area was disappointing as promised support didn't materialise but we continue to push for such activity and recently started joint meetings with Moseley Community Hub and Moseley Community Development Trust with a view to co-ordinating co-working marketing.

To promote sustainable development:

- As part of our commitment to sustainable development we switched to a sustainable electricity supplier saving roughly 20 tonnes of CO2 on a full year.
- We fitted double glazed secondary units to the Top Floor Studio windows, significantly reducing heat loss and reducing energy bills.
- We let a unit to a charity recycling bikes to give to refugees. We also let units to a furniture up-cycler, a clothes up-cycler and a screen printer who uses eco inks.
- We refurbished sympathetically our basement toilets reusing the heritage toilet cisterns.

To advance the education of the public:

- Our community textiles space has had 525 attendances over the year. It offers low-cost access to a range of textile equipment. One of our volunteers ran a textiles project jointly with Moseley Road Baths which engaged with a wide range of local people in embroidering 'swimmers' for a seat area. We also held a textile session with a theatre group working with the baths.
- We hosted an undergraduate placement student from Birmingham City University who assisted in the community textiles space, her placement culminating in her running a weaving workshop.
- We let a unit to a new Community Interest Company, preparing the space to run a range of sewing classes.
- The GAP Arts project ran a range of different classes/workshops for young people; some were in the space refurbished by Make It Sustainable.
- Sundragon Pottery continued to run a wide range of classes for local people as well as having over 50 members.
- Other unit holders continued to provide CDT for kids classes and Darkroom courses including some sessions for refugees.
- We hosted a couple of University of Birmingham students who over a period of six weeks filmed and edited a 4-minute film on The Transfer co-working space.
- Birmingham City University drama students used our spaces for over a month for rehearsals and performances, which were free to the general public.
- We hosted a theatre company, Happenchance, who used our facilities for rehearsals, going on to perform at the Nottingham Playhouse and the Edinburgh Fringe.

The relief of unemployment:

- The Old Print Works is having more of an economic impact as we managed to rent out more units. We brought into service two new units (3G4 and 2F9) which are both let. We are having more impact as The Transfer co-working space has become much better used (up by 95%). One new Unit Partner directly engages with Refugees and Asylum seekers providing them with free bikes.
- We have sometimes supported our unit holders financially by using their skills to help maintain and improve the building. This has been the case with one person in particular who helps with repairs and improvements in the building.

- For new and emerging businesses we often give a reduced rental package for a few months to help them in their start-up phase.
- We have had start-up businesses located in the co-working space.
- We have added a number of Unit Partners and co-workers to our website to help promote their work. We also encourage joint working which is increasingly happening between Unit Partners.
- We have also grown volunteering with help gratefully received on social media / PR and textiles.

We have much still to do and need to step up the activity around skill share and workshop provision to have a marked effect on unemployment and aim to improve this is the next 4 years. We started implementing a new strategic plan during this year and one of the emerging strategic directions is on how to measure and maximise our impact.

To promote engagement in the arts:

- We hosted three exhibitions in the Upper Gallery of The Old Print Works; one with support from Ort Gallery.
- The Old Print Works hosted some Open Studios on two weekends, co-ordinated by one of our Unit Partners.
- The Birmingham Rep chose us as one of the venues to show their touring production that tries to reach new audiences. We charged low admission fees in order to attract the local community and there was good attendance on the night.
- Our Unit Partners did much to contribute to our impact, often facilitated by lower-cost rent or hire of spaces, where we can see a contribution to our charitable aims. Ort Gallery and GAP Arts continued to engage in a vigorous way with the local community. Unfortunately Ort Gallery moved offsite halfway through the year.
- We endeavoured to offer affordable rates for local artists and makers and are still very popular with a number of artists choosing OPW for short-term and longer-term stays.
- We have continued to provide quirky locations at affordable prices for filming and photo-shoots throughout this year. We have had a number of bands film promo videos at OPW.
- Local music promoters Muzikstan held their summer music festival in the courtyard.

To provide facilities for recreation and community use:

All of the above is supported by The Old Print Works being an easily accessible and versatile space at the heart of the community. We improve our facilities gradually as we are able to afford to, including improving fire safety. We aim in the future to make spaces more appealing for sessional use.

We hope to improve the quality of reporting of our social impact next year with the new Unit Partner contracts in place.

Future Plans

Key to our future plans is the need to establish greater security of tenure for the charity. Emphasis in this year switched from trying to purchase the building to starting to negotiate a long lease with an option to buy. This process is ongoing but has the agreement in principle from the owners.

Establishing greater security of tenure will enable us to apply for capital grants for improvements which are impossible with our current rental position. Our building is very versatile in its layout and we have plans in place to make improvements and changes to increase activity in fulfilment of our charitable objects once we can source grant income.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

We have continued to make good economic progress with the company's main income streams having grown in the last year. Overall revenue rose by 5.1% despite a decline in revenue income from unit rentals of -4.4% over the last year due to some major payers moving on. There was significant growth in income from The Transfer/Daily Thread of 59.5% and 101.4% in Sessional/Event hire which made up for the decline in unit rental income.

Looking at our progress since 2014/15 we have almost doubled overall revenue with rental from units having doubled.

Enquiries for space, co-working and sessional hire have been very healthy. This we believe is down to word of mouth and social media combined with better external signage. Total Facebook follows are up by 11.5% in the year and Twitter follows up by 19.6%.

The accounts show an overall excess of income over expenditure for the year under review of £452 resulting in a reduction in the negative reserve position from £171,499 as at 31st May 2018 to £171,047 as at 31st May 2019.

Reserves policy

We hold in the restricted account funds needed to repay all deposits held by MIS from unit partners. We also continued to pay down debts owing to one utility company. These payments we take to be finished now. We started accruing reserves initially to help meet seasonal energy bills.

Going concern

Having reviewed the funding to the charity together with the expected future donations and the charity's future projected cash flows, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue its activities for the foreseeable future and have faith there are no material uncertainties over its financial viability. Accordingly, the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Improvements to property - 2% on cost Fixtures and fittings - 25% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Going concern

The charity had negative funds at the balance sheet date of £171,047 (£171,499 : 2018).

It is noted that without the ongoing financial support of the trustees the charity could not function. Further information relating to loans received from the trustees is given in note 14 to the accounts.
