Governors' Report for the Year Ended 31 August 2019

The Governors present their annual report together with the financial statements and auditors' report of the charitable company for the year ended 31 August 2019. The annual report serves the purposes of both a Trustees' report, and a Directors' report under company law.

Sir Robert Geffery's School was founded as the result of a bequest from Sir Robert Geffery, Master of the Worshipful Company of Ironmongers in 1703, and is still under the oversight of the Company which appoints the Academy Trustees and Foundation Governors.

The Academy Trust operates an Academy for pupils aged 4 to 11 serving a catchment area in Landrake and Tideford. It has a pupil capacity of 210 and had a roll of 224 in the school census in January 2019.

Structure, Governance and Management

Constitution

The Academy Trust was incorporated on 11 July 2011 and opened as an Academy on 1 August 2011 as a company limited by guarantee and an exempt charity. The charitable company's Memorandum and Articles of Association are the primary governing documents of the Academy Trust.

The Governors act as the Trustees for the charitable activities of Sir Robert Geffery's School, and are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law. The charitable company is known as Sir Robert Geffery's School.

Details of the Governors who served throughout the period, except as noted, are included in the Reference and Administration Details on page 1.

As a primary stand-alone academy, with a unique Trust Board related to the Worshipful Company of Ironmongers, there are additional levels of accountability in place. The Master of the Ironmongers' Company, in Board and Ironmongers' Court meetings, holds the Members to account. The Members are made up of Ironmongers who also attend the Governors' Board Meetings in school at least three times a year. Local governors oversee the day to day running of the school and drive improvement through the work of the Committees. The Ironmongers question and challenge through email and attendance at the Governors' Board Meetings, so they are fully informed when attending Ironmongers' Court Meetings.

Members' Liability

Each member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the company in the event of it being wound up while he/she is a member, or within one year after he/she ceases to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10 for the debts and liabilities contracted before he/she ceases to be a member.

Trustees' indemnities

The Academy Trust has opted into the Department for Education's Risk Protection Arrangement (RPA), an alternative to insurance where UK government funds cover losses that arise. This scheme protects Trustees and officers from claims arising from negligent acts, errors or omissions occurring whilst on academy business, and provides cover up to £10,000,000. It is not possible to quantify the Trustees and officers indemnity element from the overall cost of the RPA scheme.

Principal activities

The principal activity is to advance free education for the public benefit by establishing, maintaining, carrying on, managing and developing a primary school offering a broad and balanced curriculum.

Method of recruitment and appointment or election of Governors

On 1 August 2011 the Trustees appointed all those Governors that served the predecessor school to be Governors of the newly formed Academy. These Governors were appointed on a term of office that would end when their original term at the predecessor school would have ended, thus ensuring a staggered re-election or replacement process.

Governors are appointed for a four year period, except that this time limit does not apply to the Headteacher. Subject to remaining eligible to be a particular type of Governor, any Governor can be re-appointed or re-elected.

The Board of Governors shall have the following members as set out in its Articles of Association and funding agreement:

- Up to fifteen Governors who are appointed by the Members of the Academy Trust.
- Up to one LA Governor if appointed by the Local Authority.
- A minimum of two Parent Governors who are elected by parents of registered pupils at the Academy.
- Any staff Governors, appointed by the members of the Academy Trust, provided that the total number of Governors (including the Principal) who are employees of the Academy Trust does not exceed one third of the total number of Governors.
- The Representative appointed by Truro Diocese.
- The Headteacher who is treated for all purposes as being an ex officio Governor.
- Any additional Governors, if appointed by the Secretary of State where following an inspection by the Chief Inspector in accordance with the Education Act 2005 which amounts to a drop, either from inspection to the next inspection or between any two inspections carried out within a 5 year period.
- Any further Governors appointed by the Secretary of State as he thinks fit if a Special Measures Termination Event occurs in respect of the Academy.

When appointing new Governors, the Board will give consideration to the skills and experience mix of existing Governors in order to ensure that the Board has the necessary skills to contribute fully to the Academy's development.

Policies and procedures adopted for the induction and training of Governors

The training and induction provided for new Governors will depend upon their existing experience but would always include a tour of the Academy and a chance to meet staff and pupils. All Governors are provided with copies of policies, procedures, minutes, accounts, budgets, plans and other documents that they will need to undertake their role as Governors. As there are very few new Governors a year, induction tends to be done informally and is tailored specifically to the individual. Advantage is taken of specific courses offered by the Local Authority and other bodies. All Governors complete an annual skills audit and training is organised after the results have been analysed. The skill sets of the governing body are considered when new appointments arise.

Governors' Report for the Year Ended 31 August 2019 (continued)

Organisational structure

The Board of Governors normally meets once each term. The Board establishes an overall framework for the governance of the Academy and determines membership, terms of reference and procedures of Committees and other groups. It receives reports including policies from its Committees for ratification. It monitors the activities of the Committees through the minutes of their meetings. The Board may from time to time establish Working Groups to perform specific tasks over a limited timescale.

There are five committees as follows:

- Finance Committee this meets at least three times a year and is responsible for monitoring, evaluating and reviewing policy and performance in relation to financial management, compliance with reporting and regulatory requirements, receiving reports from the Responsible Officer and drafting the annual budget including setting staffing levels. It also incorporates the role of an audit committee.
- Curriculum Committee this meets at least once a term to monitor, evaluate and review the Academy School Improvement Plan, policy, practice and performance in relation to curriculum planning, communications, target setting and assessment, examinations and all pastoral issues.
- Pupils and Admissions Committee which meets three times a year to deal with all matters relating to pupils' welfare and admissions.
- Premises Committee meets at least termly and monitors health and safety as well as building updates and development.
- Personnel Committee meets half termly and also takes responsibility for recruitment and staff development.

The following decisions are reserved to the Board of Governors; to consider any proposals for changes to the status or constitution of the Academy and its committee structure, to appoint or remove the Chairman and/or Vice Chairman, to appoint the Headteacher and Clerk to the Governors, to approve the Annual Development Plan and budget.

The Governors are responsible for setting general policy, adopting an annual plan and budget, approving the statutory accounts, monitoring the Academy by the use of budgets and other data, and making major decisions about the direction of the Academy, capital expenditure and staff appointments.

The Trustees and Board of Governors have devolved responsibility for day to day management of the Academy to the Headteacher and Senior Leadership Team (SLT). The Academy has a leadership structure which consists of the Governors, the Senior Leadership Team and Team Leaders. The aim of the leadership structure is to devolve responsibility and encourage involvement in decision making at all levels. The Senior Leadership Team (SLT) consists of the Headteacher, one Assistant Headteacher and two teachers with management responsibilities. The SLT controls the Academy at an executive level, implementing the policies laid down by the Governors and reporting back to them. The Scheme of Delegation, discussed annually, lays out the responsibilities for authorising and overseeing the agreed budgets and expenditure.

The Headteacher is the Accounting Officer.

Arrangements for setting pay and remuneration of key management personnel

The pay policy is updated in line with the county and national guidance. Performance management reviews are held to ascertain whether targets have been met. Following this recommendations are made to the governing body to make the decisions. Due to the informal partnership between the school and The Federation of St Mellion and St Dominic guidance on Headteacher's pay was given by the County School Improvement Officer. The Governors Pay Committee meet to consider any information given before they recommend to the Finance Committee and Full Governing Body meetings.

Related Parties and other Connected Charities and Organisations

From 1 September 2015 the Headteacher of Sir Robert Geffery's became the Exécutive Headteacher of St Mellion and St Dominic Schools as the schools entered an informal management partnership. One fifth of the Headteacher's salary in total is paid by these other two schools.

Sir Robert Geffery's Pre-School runs independently on the school site and pays rent termly to the Academy Trust.

Sir Robert Geffery's School has been designated as a Teaching School and is working closely with Ermington School. Together they are known as the 'Bridging the Tamar Learning Alliance'.

The Academy has strong collaborative links with feeder primary schools which form part of the Saltash Learning Community.

The Academy works in collaboration with other local schools and as a Challenge Partner Triad with Burraton Primary School and St Stephen's Primary School.

There are no related parties which either control or significantly influence the decisions and operations of Sir Robert Geffery's School. There are no sponsors or formal Parent Teacher Associations associated with the Academy.

Objectives and Activities

Objects and Aims

The principal object and activity of the charitable company is the operation of Sir Robert Geffery's School to provide free education with a broad and balanced curriculum and care for all pupils of different abilities between the ages of 4 and 11.

At Sir Robert Geffery's School our aim is to provide a living Christian school environment where we strive for each child to develop a passion for learning and a sense of excitement in their own achievement and that of others.

Our vision is that our school will provide its children and staff with:

- · Christian values and beliefs that are expressed through a loving, caring and safe environment.
- The ability to think critically, the courage to question injustice, a willingness to take the lead and to look out for others.
- A family atmosphere that encourages a sense of belonging and results in the whole school working as a team.
- A nurturing and growth of both self confidence and self esteem.
- Broad and balanced experiences that prepare for 21st century sustainable living.
- A sense of pride in the school and many opportunities to celebrate effort, success and achievement.
- The promotion of respect for oneself, others and the environment.
- An ability to strive for excellence.
- A lasting love, enthusiasm and zest for learning through experiencing an exciting curriculum.
- A fully inclusive school where each individual is highly valued and encouraged to reach their full potential.
- Opportunities that encourage independence, cooperation, self discipline and an active global perspective.

Objectives, Strategies and Activities

Key priorities for the year are contained in our Academy Development Plan which is available from the Academy Office. Improvement focuses identified for the academic year 2018-2019 were:

Priority 1: Learning of All Pupils

Improvements made will need to be embedded to make sure that this improvement is continued and maintained. The curriculum has been refined and as such the recording and collation so that it could be rolled out and shared will be a priority this year in addition to work that results in the high standards being maintained. The aim is for 87% to achieve expected standards and 30% to achieve greater depth in KS2 and 96% phonics pass score. We are looking for an improvement in writing and maths at KS1 over the next two years as writing is targeted from EYFS and Year 1 as well.

Curriculum planning results in an outstanding cross curricular provision so that excellent delivery is maintained and also recorded.

Planning is collated on the Server T drive and Subject Coordinators' folders kept up to date.

Basic skills and SMSC opportunities are planned for and cross curricular links made so learning in subject is outstanding.

Development of the teaching of Mastery in Maths across the school so that a higher percentage in each year achieve greater depth in assessment tasks.

All teachers use INSIGHT to analyse standards subjects and aspects of Maths and Literacy to inform future planning and target groups of children.

The teaching and learning of computing is embedded in all subjects and hardware and software are used for maximum effect by staff and pupils.

Outstanding standards of teaching and learning in all aspects of Literacy so that both progress levels and attainment for individuals is high.

Visits and visitors are used to enhance learning in topic subjects.

A way to maximise opportunities for all pupils in area to compete at level 2 and 3 in sporting events is put in place and sports premium used well.

Priority 2 - Learning of Groups

All groups of pupils will make at least good progress, but for those children needing to narrow the gap between their own attainment and national expectation then there will be evidence of the opportunities to make better than expected progress through supporting emotional needs. Targets for children will be set. Pupil Premium impact to be monitored so that 90% make good progress due to planned interventions.

Outstanding attendance aiming for 97% no child under 90% and less than 20% under 95% by the end of the year.

CPOMS is used efficiently and use extended to record first aid.

All pupils receiving Pupil Premium have interventions that support their emotional needs and interventions that result in academic progress.

Work of SENCO is effective and the right outside agencies are involved with each child.

EHC applied for when needed and review records available.

The mental health and well-being of children is prioritised and individuals are recognised and supported as needed throughout the year.

Children who are gifted and talented have opportunities to work with others and receive enrichment opportunities.

All those on record of need have interventions that are successful and progress measured is good.

Those needing further involvement are seen by psychologist when possible.

Priority 3 - Learning of Staff and Governors

In order to remain an outstanding school all staff and governors are equipped with the skills to support learners and to support others to be the best they can be.

Successful completion of training by student teachers and apprentices.

Governors have attended or completed online training and minutes reflect the challenge to hold leadership to account.

Governors look at the best way to achieve sustainable progression, planning and collaboration.

Apprentices are mentored and supported to complete their training successfully.

All support staff receive training to support the learning of pupils in the classrooms and also deliver successful intervention programmes throughout the year.

Outstanding teaching and learning in classrooms because the coaching programme is successful and professional dialogue and observations across the partnership of schools has supported improvement of practice.

Outreach work with SLEs has been successful and all have had opportunity for deployment.

All staff have skills to deliver computing and programming and ICT is used well in lessons so that the progression of skills and attainment in computing is good.

Middle leaders are effective and responsible for the improvement of standards of teaching and learning in their subjects.

Applications have been made following projects related to Arts Mark, Right Respecting Schools, Healthy Schools Plus, International Schools.

Priority 4 - Learning Environment

To make sure that the learning environment is well maintained and fit for purpose.

To make sure that environment is used to maximise learning opportunities, with 40% of the EYFS curriculum delivered outside.

Plans to improve toilets drawn up and funding avenues explored.

Site security improved following discussions with stake holders and funding explored.

Grounds including farm used for maximum benefit and outside learning is outstanding in formal and informal situations.

The points highlighted in Health & Safety Audit are all addressed and regular maintenance plan in place.

The playground, shelter and equipment is repaired and good quality learning and play is observed.

To replace top corridor cloakroom with lockers to prevent issues with emergency evacuation.

Smaller work rooms used for group work with children have doors replaced with windowed doors so all can be seen, to improve working practice.

Public Benefit

The Governors confirm that they have complied with the duty in Section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to the Charity Commissioner's general guidance on public benefit in exercising their powers or duties. They have referred to this guidance when reviewing the Academy's aims and objectives and in planning its future activities.

The Academy aims to advance for the public benefit, education in Landrake and the surrounding area. In particular, but without prejudice to the generality of the forgoing by estimating, maintaining, managing, and developing of other schools and offering a broad curriculum.

The Academy provides facilities for recreational and other leisure time occupation for the community at large in the interests of social welfare and with the interest of improving the life of the said community.

Governors' Report for the Year Ended 31 August 2019 (continued) Strategic Report

Achievements and performance

The Academy has continued to exceed the forecast number of students. The total number of students in the year ended 31 August 2019 was 224. The Academy is full in all year groups and has a waiting list in operation on most classes.

The Year 6 cohort in 2018/2019 achieved particularly well in reading 94%, writing 97% and maths 97%. The number achieving expected levels in all three subjects was higher this year, in 2017 - 74%, in 2018 - 84% and in 2019 - 91%. The comparative data on compare schools shows the progress to be well above national in reading, and above in writing and maths.

Once again the targeted work on phonics in Year 1 resulted in 97% passing the phonics check.

Attendance data continued to show higher attendance than national data.

Although class sizes are high all classes have more than one teaching assistant in the mornings, which is a valuable addition to the classroom and the school is committed to providing interventions that ensure support is targeted to maximise progress. The Better Reading Project had a very positive impact on standards across the school this year. The targeted Year 6 intervention enabled good progress and attainment.

All teaching assistants have been trained in coaching and this is used to support pupils across key stage two. The THRIVE programme has been invaluable to support children with emotional needs and the impact of the sessions has been very positive,

This year the school has achieved the Platinum School Games award for Physical Education and holds the Basic Skill's Quality Mark. Sir Robert Geffery's also still holds the Green Eco Flag. It is applying for the reaccreditation of the Arts Mark Gold, and is working towards the Rights Respecting Schools Award.

To ensure that standards are continually assessed, the Academy operates a programme of lesson observations, which are undertaken by the Senior Leadership Team. Continuing professional development for staff has been very successful and this is reflected in the lesson observations made regularly.

The Academy was inspected by OFSTED in June 2012 and was judged to be Outstanding. The SIAMS inspection was also judged as Outstanding in September 2017.

Key financial performance indicators

The main financial performance indicator is the level of reserves held at the Balance Sheet date and in particular, the management of spending against General Annual Grant (GAG). In the year GAG expenditure including transfers exceeded GAG income by £54k, which used up the balance brought forward from the prior year.

Another key financial performance indicator is staffing costs as a percentage of GAG. For 2019 this was 95.7%, compared to 102.0% in 2018.

As funding is based on pupil numbers, this is also a key performance indicator. Pupil numbers for 2018-2019 finished at 224. It is anticipated that this number will remain similar because the school is over PAN in many of the key stage two classes due to appeals for places in KS2.

The school continues to be recognized as outstanding and the achievement of pupils continues to be good. The school is a successful teaching school specialising in ITT.

Going Concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the Board of Governors has a reasonable expectation that the Academy Trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason it continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Statement of Accounting Policies.

Financial review

Most of the Academy's income is obtained from the Department for Education (DfE) via the Education and Skills Funding Agency in the form of recurrent grants, the use of which is restricted to particular purposes. The grants received from the DfE during the year ended 31 August 2019 and the associated expenditure are shown as Restricted Funds in the Statement of Financial Activities.

The Academy also receives grants for fixed assets from the DfE and are shown in the Statement of Financial Activities as restricted income in the Fixed Asset Fund. The Restricted Fixed Asset Fund balance is reduced by annual depreciation charges over the useful life of the assets concerned, as defined in the Academy's accounting policies.

During the year ended 31 August 2019, total expenditure of £1,041k was covered by recurrent grant funding from the DfE, together with other incoming resources of £1,052k. The excess of income over expenditure for the year (excluding restricted fixed asset funds) was £11k.

At 31 August 2019 the net book value of fixed assets was £2,509k and movements in tangible fixed assets are shown in note 11 to the financial statements. The assets were used exclusively for providing education and the associated support services to the pupils of the Academy.

Financial and risk management objectives and policies

Whilst the Academy is over-subscribed, risks to revenue funding from a falling roll are small. However, the freeze on the Government's overall education budget, changes in funding arrangements for special educational needs and increasing employment and premises costs mean that budgets will be increasingly tight in coming years.

The Governors examine the financial health formally every term, reviewing performance against budgets and overall expenditure by means of regular update reports at all full Governors' and Finance Committee meetings. The Governors also regularly review cash flow forecasts and ensure sufficient funds are held to cover all known and anticipated commitments.

At the year end, the Academy had no significant liabilities arising from trade creditors or debtors where there would be a significant effect on liquidity.

The Board of Governors recognises that the defined benefit pension scheme deficit (Local Government Pension Scheme), which is set out in Note 21 to the financial statements, represents a significant potential liability. However as the Governors consider that the Academy is able to meet its known annual contribution commitments for the foreseeable future, this risk from this liability is minimised.

Reserves Policy

The Governors review the reserve levels of the Academy annually. This review encompasses the nature of income and expenditure streams, the need to match income with commitments and the nature of reserves. The Governors take into consideration the future plans of the Academy, the uncertainty over future income streams and other key risks identified during the risk review.

Free reserves at year end stood at £230k, plus a restricted revenue reserve of £38k and a fixed asset reserve of £2,509k.

The Governors have reviewed the future plans of the Academy and have set aside reserves as follows:

- 1) To continue to meet the costs of the work highlighted in the condition survey undertaken in June 17 and those highlighted during regular premises walks
- 2) To fund the lease of the mini bus over the next five years in order to extend collaboration work with other schools and opportunities for pupils at Sir Robert Geffery's
- 3) In line with the rolling programme for 2019/2020 make sure all resources are available to deliver the exciting creative curriculum
- 4) To ensure that despite a decrease in GAG funding the level of staffing can be maintained so that it will ensure accelerated progress can be maintained
- 5) To explore options for separating bells and updating systems
- 6) To replace and provide additional external storage
- 7) To update website
- 8) To provide additional training opportunities for staff

Investment Policy

Governors are committed to ensuring that all funds under their control are managed in such a way as to maximise return whilst minimising risk. Reserves are held in a reputable interest bearing British bank. Any cash not required for operating expenses is placed on deposit at the most favourable rate available from providers covered by the Financial Services Compensation Scheme. Day to day management of the surplus funds is delegated to the Headteacher and the Finance Director within strict guidelines approved by the Board of Governors.

Principal Risks and Uncertainties

The principal risks and uncertainties facing the Academy are as follows:

Financial - the Academy has considerable reliance on continued Government funding through the ESFA. In the last year the vast majority of the Academy's incoming resources were ultimately Government funded and whilst this level is expected to continue, there is no assurance that Government policy or practice will remain the same or that public funding will continue at the same levels or on the same terms.

Failures in governance and/or management - the risk in this area arises from potential failure to manage effectively the Academy's finances, internal controls, compliance with regulations and legislation, statutory returns, etc. The Governors will review and ensure that appropriate measures are in place to mitigate these risks.

Reputational - the continuing success of the Academy is dependent on continuing to attract applicants in sufficient numbers by maintaining the highest educational standards. To mitigate this risk Governors ensure that student success and achievement are closely monitored and reviewed.

Safeguarding and child protection - the Governors continue to ensure that the highest standards are maintained in the areas of selection and monitoring of staff, the operation of child protection policies and procedures, health & safety and discipline.

Staffing - the success of the Academy is reliant on the quality of its staff and so the Governors monitor and review policies and procedures to ensure continued development and training of staff as well as ensuring there is clear succession planning.

Fraud and mismanagement of funds – All finance staff receive training to keep them up to date with financial practice requirements and develop their skills in this area.

The Academy has continued to strengthen its risk management process throughout the year by improving the process and ensuring staff awareness. A risk register is maintained and reviewed and updated on a regular basis.

Fundraising

The academy trust participate in limited fundraising involving students, families and the local community. No professional fundraising agencies are used and the academy trust has received no complaints during the financial year.

Governance reviews

As a primary stand-alone academy, the Governing Body meet three times a year. However, the governing body are kept fully Binformed by email between meetings, receiving monthly financial statements, ESFA guidance and regular reports from the Headteacher, which are questioned through email correspondence, governor visits or telephone conversation, ensuring a robust oversight and management of the academy's funds. The Committees meet at least three times a year, with some meeting often more. The Governing Body is very self-evaluative and the Chairs of the Committees are all very experienced in their roles. All members are fully committed and benefit from the additional expertise of the Worshipful Company of Ironmongers that sit on the Governing Body as well as the local governors who are very active and appointed because of their skills and expertise. The Committees are set up annually to maximise the skills set of the members available. During the year areas for development or training needs were discussed and training organised to meet the need. This year training and local authority updates were attended by members of the Governing Body. Following the skills audit the school has arranged online training modules that bespoke individual's needs. These are through The National Governor Association. Additional Governors have also been appointed with skills to further strengthen the board.

Governance Statement (continued)

Review of Value for Money

As Accounting Officer the Headteacher has responsibility for ensuring that the Academy Trust delivers good value in the use of public resources. The Accounting Officer understands that value for money refers to the educational and wider societal outcomes achieved in return for the taxpayer resources received.

The Accounting Officer considers how the Academy Trust's use of its resources has provided good value for money during each academic year, and reports to the Board of Governors where value for money can be improved, including the use of benchmarking data where available. The Accounting Officer for the Academy Trust has delivered improved value for money during the year by:

(1) Academy Structure

As a single stand-alone Academy the Governors have continued to explore options to formalise collaboration and share expertise. Governors attended workshops and meetings with MATS and also met with the Diocese representatives and the local authority to discuss possible partnerships. Decisions taken at all levels to ensure that any partnership agreed would be of benefit to the learning for the children at Sir Robert Geffery's School.

(2) Shared Staff Training

The school works as part of a Challenge Partnership with other local schools to ensure the impact school improvement planning. Instead of paying large amounts of money the triad of heads are effective in ensuring standards are developed and CPD is available for all staff by sharing expertise. Staff training is shared with local schools through a cross schools peer coaching programme and school visits. Joint INSET days held provide value for money as the cost is shared.

(3) Salix Interest Free Loan

This year the school applied for the interest-free Government funded loan made available to schools through Salix for reducing energy costs. The application was successful and the funding was used to replace all lighting with LED lighting to improve energy efficiency, reduce carbon emissions and lower energy bills with no upfront cost.

(4) Procurement of Computer Hardware

The school followed the DfE's Buying for Schools guidance, as recommended in the Academies Financial Handbook 2018, when purchasing a substantial amount of Chromebooks this year.

The purchasing framework recommended by the DfE for the procurement of desktop hardware was used. This was found to be an efficient process, giving best value for money in time management as well as purchase price.

The Purpose of the System of Internal Control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives; it can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an ongoing process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of Academy Trust policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically. The system of internal control has been in place in Sir Robert Geffery's School for the year ended 31 August 2019 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements.

Governance Statement (continued)

Capacity to Handle Risk

The Board of Governors has reviewed the key risks to which the Academy Trust is exposed together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The Board of Governors is of the view that there is a formal ongoing process for identifying, evaluating and managing the Academy Trust's significant risks that has been in place for the year ended 31 August 2019 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements. This process is regularly reviewed by the Board of Governors.

The Board of Governors monitor closely the financial position and reserves, and consider this position in advance of the purchasing plans for the year ahead. This has ensured that spending is within budget and forward plans are agreed and implemented when there has been any variance. Health and Safety reviews and inspections are carried out annually with recommendations forming an action plan that is implemented immediately. The Academy Trust has comprehensive insurance cover for pupils, staff, Governors, property and assets to ensure the continuation of education provision in any unforeseen circumstances.

The Risk and Control Framework

The Academy Trust's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

- comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the Board of Governors;
- regular reviews by the Finance Committee of reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes;
- · setting targets to measure financial and other performance;
- · clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines;
- · delegation of authority and segregation of duties;
- · identification and management of risks.

The Board of Governors has considered the need for a specific internal audit function and has decided not to appoint an internal auditor. However they have appointed Mr D Landers, a Trustee, to carry out a programme of internal checks.

The reviewer's role includes giving advice on financial matters and performing a range of checks on the Academy Trust's financial systems. In particular the checks carried out in the current period included:

- (1) testing of payroll systems.
- (2) testing of purchase systems.
- (3) testing of income systems.
- (4) testing of bank reconciliations.

On a termly basis the reviewer reports to the Board of Trustees, through the finance committee, on the operation of the systems of control and on the discharge of the Board of Trustees' financial responsibilities. Three reports were received during the financial year and no material control issues were identified.

Review of Effectiveness

As Accounting Officer, Mrs J E Curtis has responsibility for reviewing the effectiveness of the system of internal control. During the year in question the review has been informed by:

- · the work of the external auditor and internal Trustee review;
- the financial management and governance self assessment process;
- the work of the executive managers within the Academy Trust who have responsibility for the development and maintenance of the internal control framework.

The Accounting Officer has been advised of the implications of the result of their review of the system of internal control by the Finance Committee and a plan to address weaknesses and ensure continuous improvement of the system is in place.

1 Accounting policies

A summary of the principal accounting policies adopted (which have been applied consistently, except where noted), judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty, is set out below.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the Academy Trust, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared under the historical cost convention in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard Applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Academies Accounts Direction 2018 to 2019 issued by ESFA, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

Sir Robert Geffery's School meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Going concern

The Governors assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the company to continue as a going concern. The Governors make this assessment in respect of a period of one year from the date of approval of the financial statements. The Governors have concluded that the Academy Trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no material uncertainties about the Academy Trust's ability to continue as a going concern, thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

Income

All incoming resources are recognised when the Academy Trust has entitlement to the funds, the receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably.

Grants

Grants are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the balance sheet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year for which it is receivable and any abatement in respect of the period is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the balance sheet in the restricted fixed asset fund. Capital grants are spent on capital projects in line with the terms and conditions of the grant. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Sponsorship income

Sponsorship income provided to the Academy Trust which amounts to a donation is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which it is receivable, where the receipt is probable and it can be measured reliably.

Donations

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance-related conditions) where the receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

Other income

Other income, including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the period it is receivable and to the extent the academy trust has provided the goods or services.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

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Expenditure on raising funds

This includes all expenditure incurred by the Academy Trust to raise funds for its charitable purposes and includes costs of all fundraising activities events and non-charitable trading.

Charitable activities

These are costs incurred on the Academy Trust's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the academy trust apportioned to charitable activities.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 August 2019 (continued)

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Tangible fixed assets

Assets costing £500 or more are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment. Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the Balance Sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. Where there are specific conditions attached to the funding requiring the continued use of the asset, the related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities and carried forward in the Balance Sheet. Depreciation on the relevant assets is charged directly to the restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities. Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with unrestricted funds, depreciation on such assets is charged to the unrestricted fund.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful lives, per the table below.

Assets in the course of construction are included at cost. Depreciation on these assets is not charged until they are brought into use.

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the Academy Trust anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Academy Trust has an obligation at the reporting date as a result of a past event which it is probable will result in the transfer of economic benefits and the obligation can be estimated reliably.

Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within interest payable and similar charges.

Leased assets

Rentals under operating leases are charged on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Financial Instruments

The academy trust only holds basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the academy trust and their measurement basis are as follows:

Financial assets - trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 12.

Cash at bank - is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Financial liabilities - trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 13. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition. Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

Taxation

The Academy Trust is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

Accordingly, the Academy Trust is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 August 2019 (continued)

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Pension benefits

Retirement benefits to employees of the Academy Trust are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ('TPS') and the Local Government Pension Scheme ('LGPS'). These are defined benefit schemes and the assets are held separately from those of the Academy Trust. The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the Academy Trust in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary on the basis of quadrennial valuations using a prospective unit credit method. As stated in the notes to the financial statements, the TPS is a multi-employer scheme and there is insufficient information available to use defined benefit accounting. The TPS is therefore treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions recognised in the period to which they relate.

The LGPS is a funded scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the Academy Trust in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each balance sheet date. The amounts charged to operating surplus are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses.

Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted income funds represent those resources which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objects of the Academy Trust at the discretion of the Governors.

Restricted fixed asset funds are resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes imposed by the funders where the asset acquired or created is held for a specific purpose.

Restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received with restrictions imposed by the funder/donor and include grants from the Education and Skills Funding Agency/Department for Education.

Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 August 2019 (continued)

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions

The Academy Trust makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost (income) for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 21, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2016 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at 31 August 2019. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability.

The Academy Trust's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teachers' Pension Scheme England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff; and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by Cornwall Council. Both are multi-employer defined benefit schemes.

The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2012 and of the LGPS 31 March 2016.

There were no outstanding or prepaid contributions at either the beginning or the end of the financial year.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

Introduction

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for full-time teachers in academies and, from 1 January 2007, automatic for teachers in part-time employment following appointment or a change of contract, although they are able to opt out.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and members contribute on a 'pay as you go' basis - these contributions along with those made by employers are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Valuation of the Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury. The aim of the review is to specify the level of future contributions. Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2012 and in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 9 June 2014.

The key elements of the valuation and subsequent consultation are:

- employer contribution rates set at 16.48% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% employer administration charge)
- total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £191,500 million, and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £176,600 million giving a notional past service deficit of £14,900 million
- · an employer cost cap of 10.9% of pensionable pay will be applied to future valuations
- the assumed real rate of return is 3.0% in excess of prices and 2% in excess of earnings. The rate of real earnings growth is assumed to be 2.75%. The assumed nominal rate of return is 5.06%.

The TPS valuation for 2012 determined an employer rate of 16.4%, which was payable from September 2015. The next valuation of the TPS is currently underway based on April 2016 data, whereupon the employer contribution rate is expected to be reassessed and will be payable from 1 September 2019.

The employer's pension costs paid to TPS in the period amounted to £53,237 (2018: £50,909).

A copy of the valuation report and supporting documentation is on the Teachers' Pensions website.

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The Academy Trust has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The Academy Trust has set out above the information available on the scheme.

Local government pension scheme

The LGPS is a funded defined-benefit scheme, with the assets held in separate trustee-administered funds. The total contribution made for the year ended 31 August 2019 was £65,000 (2018 - £56,000), of which employer's contributions totalled £52,000 (2018 - £45,000) and employees' contributions totalled £13,000 (2018 - £11,000). The agreed contribution rates for future years are 14-18 per cent for employers and 5.5-12.5 per cent for employees.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of an academy trust closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013.

On 27 June 2019 the Supreme Court upheld the Court of Appeal's ruling that government reform's made in 2015 to the pensions of judges and firefighters were unlawful on the grounds of age discrimination. This case has become known as the 'McCloud judgement' and the ruling will have wider implications for all public service schemes affected by the reforms. Accordingly, the valuation provided by the actuary at 31 August 2019 includes the expected impact of compensation payments arising from this judgement.
