## Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2020

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2020. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

The Charity's objectives are specifically restricted to the following:

- 1. To advance in life and help young people through:
- (a) The provision of recreational and leisure time activities provided in the interest of social welfare, designed to improve their conditions of life.
- (b) Providing support and activities which develop their skills, capacities and capabilities to enable them to participate in society as mature and responsible individuals.
- 2. To advance the education of young people in all aspects of the dramatic arts.
- 3. To advance the education of the public in all aspects of the dramatic arts and the development of public appreciation of such art by the putting on of performances.

#### Significant activities

In deciding what activities to undertake the trustees have had due regard to the guidance published by the Charities Commission regarding public benefit. Thus, Zest exists to bring inspiration and innovation to a new generation of theatre audiences.

Established in 2007, we tour to theatres, festivals, outdoor spaces and schools with award winning work described as 'unpretentious' (The Stage) and 'invigorating' (The British Theatre Guide). Our interactive, immersive and site-specific productions actively place the audience right at the heart of the story. Each production is inspired by the needs, lives and imaginations of those aged 25 and under. Every year Zest Theatre produces a range of dynamic productions suitable for theatres, schools, festivals and community venues supported by exciting participation projects.

This period saw Zest deliver an extensive programme of work that included:

- The twelfth year of touring schools with Until It's Gone
- The third year of national touring of First Person
- Further innovations in the development new work for Lost Village Festival
- The final stages of R&D and national tour of Youthquake
- The initial stages of R&D for a new outdoor production, Ready Steady, Disco

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

All of the projects listed below worked collectively to allow Zest to fulfill its Charitable objectives in this period:

#### First Person

Made especially for public spaces and influenced by video games; First Person is a quirky fusion of fast paced narrative, physical theatre and silent disco technology. Two players enter the labyrinth of a virtual world and compete for the ultimate prize: happiness. The First Person to complete the game and find happiness is the winner! Grab your headphones, predict your winner and cheer them on to the finish line. The production was created in 2017 and has continued touring ever since. To date, the show has been performed 104 times. This period the production visited a wider range of festivals and events, as well as Primary Schools for the first time. The development of young audiences is central to the purpose of this touring work; taking art directly into communities and creating first time experiences of theatre as part of their everyday.

### **Lost Village Festival 2019**

In a world of twee, happy-go-lucky music festivals, Lost Village is a unique and immersive experience. Taking place in an abandoned woodland in the heart of the Lincolnshire countryside, Lost Village immediately evokes feelings of intrigue and curiosity, a real-life choose-your-own-adventure with its ever evolving narrative. The festival is an entirely new proposition on the festival circuit; an immersive arts experience that plays host to some of the biggest names in Electronic music. Zest has been the lead artists for theatre at Lost Village since its inception in 2015, responsible for the artistic direction of the entire theatre and performance proposition at the festival. In this period the festival attracted a capacity crowd of 15,000 people with the vast majority falling into the 18-25 demographic. With a huge creative team of 35 working for Zest, we were able to engage unsuspecting audiences from our target age range in a wide range of arts delivery and performance genres. With performances placed around every corner, audiences came face to face with engaging art at every turn.

Total Audience: 15,000

#### Until It's Gone 2020

Until It's Gone is a hard-hitting production for Key Stage 3 and 4 based on the true-life stories of homeless young people from across Lincolnshire. The original script was written at the end of 2008 through consultation with young people who were facing homelessness at the time. The show and accompanying workshop highlight the key issues causing young people to become homeless and how to practically prevent this through sign posting local services. During this period the production was refreshed for 2020 to ensure all content was up to date. We also toured to schools across Lincolnshire, Rutland, Leicestershire, Poole, Bournemouth and Christchurch. We were also due to tour across Wychavon and Malvern Hills, but these performances were cancelled due to the COVID-19 outbreak. The project was funded by Local Authorities in each of these areas and provided to schools for free

## OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES Youthquake R&D & National Tour

Youthquake was another exciting 360• theatre experience from Zest that embarked on a national between October 2019 and February 2020. A Youthquake is defined as a significant cultural, political or social change arising from the actions or influence of young people. The research and development for this production began in the February of the previous period. The R&D process ran from February - June 2019 and saw the Zest creative team running 53 workshops, over 8 weeks, across 11 different cities with 800 young people. Performed inside a large, visually stunning set, the audience will delved into the lives and minds of Teen Britain. Inspired by the voices of young people from around the country and featuring a mix of professional and local young performers, each performance becomes a metaphor for the cultural shift a Youthquake brings. We also fundraised to buy free tickets for underrepresented young people to see the production. 102 young people attended Youthquake free of charge.

It is the trustees view that the requirement to demonstrate public benefit is met by its charitable objectives and by the means of delivery and provision of opportunity for engagement and participation. Specific examples of relevant modes of operation include the range of performances in schools, youth settings and arts venues across the country. In addition to this we've also maximised opportunities for young people to take part in our programmes through low cost ticket prices, free performances and free workshops.

## **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### Reserves policy

The charity had free reserves of £36,000 in order to cover six months overheads. The free reserves are calculated by taking the unrestricted reserves balance at the end of the year, less any fixed asset funds. To reach our free reserves target we will expand income on our unrestricted, sales based projects. We will therefore increase the target performances for our outdoor touring and schools based productions over the next 2 years to achieve this.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### Going concern

The COVID-19 crisis has presented a real challenge to the organisation and the wider arts sector. Due to COVID related cancellations on our 2020 Until It's Gone tour, we have closed 2019/20 around £15,000 down on where we had planned. We commence the new financial year carrying this loss.

Looking ahead, our touring and festivals programme for April - September has been cancelled. Programming beyond this currently looks uncertain as we await news of when social distancing can be eased.

We have forecast for several different eventualities and will be utilising all support available to us, including the Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme, Theatre Tax Relief and Local Authority Discretionary Grants. This means our salaried staff will be furloughed during the April - October period. We have been successful in receiving funding through Arts Council England's Emergency Relief Fund, which will support our core costs and a small programme of work over the May - October period. Any planned work over the coming 6 months with move online to allow for social distancing measures.

Beyond this, we've moved the programming of any other substantial touring work back to at least April 2021, when we hope schools, venues and festivals will be getting back to normal.

With these contingency plans in place we have ran cashflow forecasts and are confident Zest Theatre will remain a going concern for the coming financial year as we adjust to the new, post pandemic landscape.

#### **Financial Review**

Zest closes this accounting period with a deficit of £62,504 (2019: surplus of £39,596). Zest continues to develop its national reputation, financial monitoring and income streams despite the challenges of the financial climate.

At the time of writing this report Zest Theatre remains a going concern through careful financial management and further development of the company's income.

### **FUTURE PLANS**

We are using this challenging time to take stock and evaluate our work. As a new landscape emerges, we are keen to adapt and develop new work that needs the demands and needs of young people after the pandemic. Consultation with young people begins remotely with young people this August, supported by funding from Arts Council England.

With theatre venues likely to be the last to reopen, we plan to focus on our outdoor and digital work in Spring and summer 2021. When theatre eventually open again, we plan to return to making a greater impact by touring work into the mid scale sector by remounting Youthquake for larger venues - this is unlikely until at least Spring 2022.

## STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Zest Theatre is both a company limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006, and a registered charity. Its governing document is the Memorandum and Articles of Association adopted on 19 August 2011, as last amended by special resolution dated 1 February 2016. In the event of the company being wound up, members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

#### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The Directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and throughout this report are collectively known as the trustees. The existing board of trustees were individually appointed on the strength of their respective background and an obvious enthusiasm and commitment to support the company on an ongoing basis. As set out in the Articles of Association, the board may from time to time and at any time appoint a new trustee to join. The decision to elect new trustees to the board is based upon the availability of suitable candidates with a requisite skills base together with an acknowledgement by the board that additional support would be beneficial in order to assist in the company's development.

#### Organisational structure

The Board of Trustees administers the charity. The Artistic Director is responsible for the day-to-day operations of the company. To facilitate effective operation, the Artistic Director has delegated authority, within terms of delegation approved by the Trustees, for operational matters including finance, employment and artistic performance related activity.

#### Induction and training of new trustees

New trustees are provided with:

- information on their legal obligations under charity law,
- the Memorandum and Articles of Association,
- the committee and decision making process,
- the business plan and recent financial performance of the company.

During this induction they meet key employees and other trustees. Trustees are also encouraged to attend projects and view work delivered by Zest Theatre employees.

#### **Establishment and history of Zest Theatre**

Zest is a national touring theatre company creating innovative, interactive work for, by and with young people. Zest Theatre was established in 2007. We tour to theatres, outdoor spaces and schools with a variety of immersive, site specific or promenade productions. Our work places the audience right at the centre of the action and creative process. Each year we engage around 20,000 people across the country as audience members or participants with productions that have been described as 'inclusive' (The Northern Echo) and 'invigorating' (The British Theatre Guide).

Zest Theatre is proudly based in Lincoln and works closely with local partners such as Lincolnshire One Venues to support the development of Lincolnshire's arts and culture sector. Each of our productions will start their life in the Lincolnshire community in some way.

## Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2020

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

At the period end the balance sheet shows a net current asset of £3,057 and there is a deficit for the period of £62,504. There is a creditors balance which is due after one year of £5,000, however this consists of related party loans, of which written confirmation has been received to state that the loans are open ended.

After reviewing the position after the balance sheet date, Zest remains a going concern, therefore the accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### Donated services and facilities:

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### Goodwill

Goodwill, being the amount paid in connection with the acquisition of a business in 2012, is being amortised evenly over its estimated useful life of ten years.

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Drama and stage equipment - 25% on reducing balance Fixtures and fittings - 25% on reducing balance

Computer and sound equipment - 33% on cost

#### Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

#### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objectives of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

#### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

#### **Financial instruments**

Only basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102 are held. Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised in the accounts only when the entity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument and their measurement basis is as follows:

Financial assets - trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost. Prepayments are not financial instruments.

Cash at bank is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at transaction price.

Financial liabilities - trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are basic financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost. Where a financial liability constitutes a financing transaction it is initially and subsequently measured at the present value of future payments, discounted at a market rate of interest.

## Value added tax

The Charity is VAT registered. All figures shown are exclusive of VAT.

#### Ready, Steady, Disco

This period was due to see a range of R&D activity to develop a new outdoor production. Initial work has begun, but the bulk of the creative process has now been postponed into 2020/21 due to COVID-19.

#### **Fundraising**

Wherever possible, Zest fundraises to buy free tickets for under represented young people to attend our productions.

#### Transfers between funds

Included within transfer of funds is a transfer of donations received of £1021 that were allocated to a restricted fund.
