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Directors' Report For the Period Ended 28 November 2019

The directors present their report and the financial statements for the 52 week period ended 28 November 2019.

Principal activities

The company's principal activity during the period was the operation of the Bailbrook House Hotel, an asset under operating lease from the company's immediate parent company.

Review of business, key performance indicators and future developments

The results for the period and financial position of the company are as shown in the annexed financial statements.

The hotel turnover has decreased by 5.3% to £3,786k (2018: £3,997k), operating loss was £611k compared to a loss of £441k in 2018.

Rooms performance showed a decrease of 1.0% in occupancy for the period and a decrease of £2.85 in revpar (revenue per available room).

Despite the challenging times as a result of COVID-19, and its negative impact on the economy especially within the hospitality industry, the directors still remain optimistic as to the future success of the company.

Results and dividends

The loss for the period, after taxation, amounted to £611k (2018 - loss 441k).

No dividends were paid during the period ended 28 November 2019 (2018: £nil).

Financial instruments

The company is exposed to the usual credit risk and cash flow movement involved with selling on credit andmanages this through the company credit policy. The policy is to finance working capital through retainedearnings and finance fixed assets through both earnings and short term, non-interest bearing loans from its ultimate parent undertaking.

The directors do not consider any other risks attaching to the use of financial instruments to be material to an assessment of the group or company's financial position or result.

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Bailbrook House Hotel (No 2) Limited (the 'company') for the period ended 28 November 2019 which comprise Statement of Comprehensive Income, the Statement of Financial Position, the Statement of Changes in Equity and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. These events indicate that a material uncertainty exists that may cast significant doubt over and company's ability to continue as a going concern. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

The other information comprises the information included in the report and financial statements, other than the financial statements and our Auditor's Report thereon. The directors are responsible for the other information. Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and, except to the extent otherwise explicitly stated in our report, we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Period Ended 28 November 2019

1. Accounting policies

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General information

Bailbrook House Hotel (No 2) Limited is a private limited company incorporated in England & Wales under the Companies Act. The address of the registered office is given on the Company Information page and the nature of the company's operations and its principal activities are set out in the Directors' Report.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with FRS 102, The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland and the Companies Act 2006.

The current period financial statements are prepared on a 52 week period (2018: 52 week period).

The preparation of financial statements in compliance with FRS 102 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise judgement in applying the company's accounting policies (see note 2).

The following principal accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the preceding and current periods.

Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by the FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland":

- the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows;
- the requirements of Section 3 Financial Statement Presentation paragraph 3.17(d);
- the requirements of Section 11 Financial Instruments paragraphs 11.39 to 11.48A;
- the requirements of Section 12 Other Financial Instruments paragraphs 12.26 to 12.29;
- the requirements of Section 33 Related Party Disclosures paragraph 33.7.

This information is included in the consolidated financial statements of Bailbrook House Hotel Limited as at 28 November 2019 and these financial statements may be obtained from Companies House.

Going concern

The company's business activities, together with the factors likely to affect its future development, performance and position are set out in the Directors' Report on pages 1 and 2 of these financial statements. The company meets its day-to-day working capital requirements through use of its cash and facilities provided by its wider related party group, most notably that headed by Hand Picked Hotels Holdings (Guernsey) Limited, for which the Board has requested and received confirmation of intended ongoing related party support.

As at 28 November 2019, the company reported net liabilities of £4,180k (2018: £3,569k). The company had no external non-related party borrowings (including overdraft facilities) and this remains the case. In assessing the appropriateness of the going concern assumption, the directors have prepared detailed cash flow forecasts for the company extending beyond 12 months from the date of approval of these financial statements, taking into account £1.5m of working capital funding received from Hand Picked Hotels Holdings (Guernsey) Limited since the year ended. These forecasts have been consolidated with those of the wider Hand Picked Hotels Holdings (Guernsey) Limited group. However, it is acknowledged that the global and UK outbreak of COVID-19 has had a profound impact on these forecasts.

Going concern (continued)

In accordance with UK government requirements, all hotels in the group, including that operated by the company closed to public customers on 26 March 2020 and remained closed until 4 July 2020. At the time of signing the financial statements, it is not yet known how long a phased reintroduction of operating activities resulting from social distancing measures will be required. Accordingly, management have modelled various cash flow scenarios based on alternative rates of return to normalised occupancy rates and room rates. At present the board anticipates that changes to social distancing restrictions will enable the company to return to full trading during 2021.

The board acknowledge that 'full trading' may look very different post-COVID-19 than it did pre-COVID-19 and the management team have been planning for this with a restructuring of its operations in response to anticipated market demand, ultimately to profitably deliver enhanced quality of service at lower rates of occupancy.

The directors acknowledge however that the environment is continuously changing and, as such, projecting the rate at which the impacts of COVID-19 will ease, and when and how distancing restrictions will be lifted is challenging. In order to mitigate the associated impacts on revenue during this time, and in order to protect the longer term interests of the company and its employees, the company, and group, has taken measures to reduce its cost base.

The company is dependent on the wider group for ongoing financial support in the form of future operating funding and non-recall of existing intercompany loans, albeit is not part of the Hand Picked Hotels Limited banking sub-group, that, as at the year end, and the time of reporting, have outstanding facilities, subject to bank covenants, of £30m, that matures on 30 November 2020. As at the time of signing these accounts, the Group is in discussion with the existing lender to provide a further loan facility.

In light of the impacts of COVID-19 and the various potential scenarios, along with the expiry of current banking facilities at the end of November 2020, the directors, have identified a material uncertainty that may cast significant doubt over the company's ability to continue as a going concern for the foreseeable future.

Notwithstanding the above uncertainty, having considered current forecasts (including reasonably foreseeable scenarios) and the willingness and ability of the shareholders to continue to provide ongoing support, the board have concluded that it remains appropriate to prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis.

The financial statements do not include the adjustments that would result if the company were unable to continue as a going concern.

Turnover

Turnover represents amounts receivable for accommodation, food and beverage sales and ancillary hotel services provided in the normal course of business, net of trade discounts, VAT and other sales related taxes. Turnover is recognised at the point at which goods and services are delivered to the customer. Deposits which have been received at the statement of financial position date for which services have not yet been provided are shown as payments in advance within creditors. All turnover arose within the United Kingdom.

Notes to the Financial Statements For the Period Ended 28 November 2019

1. Accounting policies (continued)

Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value, being the estimated selling price less costs to complete and sell. Cost is based on the cost of purchase on a first in, first out basis.

At each reporting date, stocks are assessed for impairment. If stock is impaired, the carrying amount is reduced to its selling price less costs to complete and sell. The impairment loss is recognised immediately in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans and other financial assets are initially recognised at transaction price including any transaction costs and subsequently measured at amortised cost determined using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

Creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Loans and other financial liabilities are initially recognised at transaction price net of any transaction costs and subsequently measured at amortised cost determined using the effective interest method.

Holiday pay accrual

A liability is recognised to the extent of any unused holiday pay entitlement which has accrued at the statement of financial position date and carried forward to future periods. This is measured at the undiscounted salary cost of the future holiday entitlement so accrued at the statement of financial position date.

Current and deferred taxation

The tax expense for the period comprises current and deferred tax. Tax is recognised in profit or loss, except that a change attributable to an item of income or expense recognised as other comprehensive income or to an item recognised directly in equity is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively.

The current income tax charge is calculated on the basis of tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date in the country where the company operates and generates taxable income.

Deferred tax balances are recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed by the statement of financial position date, except:

- The recognition of deferred tax assets is limited to the extent that it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits; and
- Any deferred tax balances are reversed if and when all conditions for retaining associated tax allowances have been met.

Deferred tax balances are not recognised in respect of permanent differences except in respect of business combinations, when deferred tax is recognised on the differences between the fair values of assets acquired and the future tax deductions available for them and the differences between the fair values of liabilities acquired and the amount that will be assessed for tax. Deferred income tax is determined using tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without penalty on notice of not more than 24 hours. Cash equivalents includes amounts held on call deposits with an initial term of less than 3 months.

Related party transactions

The company has taken advantage of the exemption under paragraph 33.1A of the Financial Reporting Standard 102 not to disclose transactions with other wholly owned members of the group.

Operating leases

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Comprehensive Income on a straight line basis over the period of the lease. Lease incentives received are recognised in profit and loss over the term of the lease as an integral part of the total lease expense.

Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution plan for its employees. A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which the company pays fixed contributions into a separate entity. Once the contributions have been paid the company has no further payment obligations.

The contributions are recognised as an expense in the Statement of Comprehensive Income when they fall due. Amounts not paid are shown in accruals as a liability in the statement of financial position. The assets of the plan are held separately from the company in independently administered funds.

Financial Instruments

Debt instruments (other than those wholly repayable or receivable within one year), including loans and other accounts receivable and payable, are initially measured at present value of the future cash flows and subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Debt instruments that are payable or receivable within one year, typically trade payables or receivables, are measured, initially and subsequently, at the undiscounted amount of the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received. However if the arrangements of a short-term instrument constitute a financing transaction, like the payment of a trade debt deferred beyond normal business terms or financed at a rate of interest that is not a market rate or in case of an out-right short-term loan not at market rate, the financial asset or liability is measured, initially, at the present value of the future cash flow discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument and subsequently at amortised cost.

Financial assets that are measured at cost and amortised cost are assessed at the end of each reporting period for objective evidence of impairment. If objective evidence of impairment is found, an impairment loss is recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

For financial assets measured at amortised cost, the impairment loss is measured as the difference between an asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate.

For financial assets measured at cost less impairment, the impairment loss is measured as the difference between an asset's carrying amount and best estimate of the recoverable amount, which is an approximation of the amount that the group would receive for the asset if it were to be sold at the reporting date.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount reported in the statement of financial position when there is an enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

13. Related party transactions

Within creditors is included an amount of £224,039 (2018: £104,999) which is due to Hand Picked Hotels Limited and its subsidiaries, entities under common control. This arises from management charges and service fees for the period ended 28 November 2019 of £498,066 (2018: £525,507). The amount due to the parent company of Bailbrook House Hotel Limited is £1,700,000 (2018: £1,700,000).

14. Ultimate parent company and controlling party

The company's immediate parent undertaking is Bailbrook House Hotel Limited. The largest and smallest group in whose financial statements the results of the company will be consolidated is Bailbrook House Hotel Limited. The consolidated financial statements of Bailbrook House Hotel Limited will be available to the public and will be obtainable in due course from the Registrar of Companies, Companies House, Crown Way, Cardiff.

The ultimate parent company is Julian Holdings Limited, and the ultimate controlling party is Mr G Hands.

Julian Holdings Limited is a company incorporated in Guernsey, whose registered office address is PO Box 286, Floor 2 Trafalgar Court, Les Banques, St Peter Port, Guernsey, GY1 4LY.

15. Subsequent events

Subsequent to the year end, and as discussed in note 1 to these financial statements: Basis of preparation – Going concern, the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic has had a profound impact on the company, group and wider UK economy. In accordance with FRS102, this is considered to be a non-adjusting event after the end of the reporting period that is not indicative of conditions that existed at the end of the reporting period.

The board has considered the existence of material impacts on assets and liabilities of the business as reported as at the balance sheet date. In general, whilst hotel values may have been impacted by COVID-19, the location of the hotel and the expected return to normal trading in the medium term lead the directors to conclude that the long term viability of the hotel is preserved. However, as at the time of reporting, it has not been practicable to obtain an unqualified valuation of the asset that may have been subject to a material impairment.

Since the year end the company received a loan of £1.5m from Hand Picked Hotels Holdings (Guernsey) Limited. This loan is interest free and repayable on demand.
