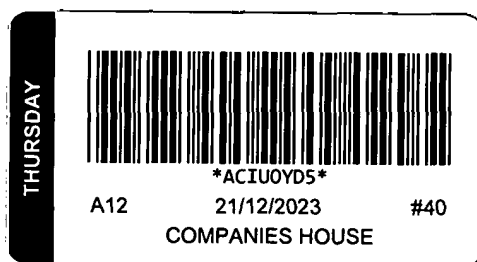

The Governors present their annual report together with the audited financial statements of Holyport College ('the Academy' or 'the charitable company') for the year to 31 August 2023. The charitable company operates as Holyport College.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Constitution

The Academy Trust, which was incorporated on 31 January 2012, opened as an Academy school on 1 September 2014 and is a company limited by guarantee and an exempt charity. The Memorandum and Articles of Association and the Funding Agreement are the primary governing documents of the Academy Trust.

The Governors are trustees for the purposes of charity law and are also directors for the purposes of company law.

Details of the Governors who served throughout the year, except as noted, are included in the Reference and Administrative Details on page 1.

The Academy Trust operates one secondary academy school known as Holyport College in Holyport, Berkshire for boarding and day pupils ('the Academy' or 'the College' or 'Holyport College'). It is a state boarding school opened under the Free Schools' Programme. The Academy had an actual pupil roll of 614 in the school census in October 2023 (576 in October 2022).

Members' Liability

Each member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the Academy Trust in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10, for the debts and liabilities contracted before they ceased to be a member.

Governors' Indemnities

The Governors benefit from indemnity insurance purchased by the Academy to cover the liability of the Governors arising from negligent acts, errors or omissions occurring whilst on Academy business. The limit of this indemnity is £5,000,000.

Principal Activities

The principal activity of the Academy Trust is to advance for the public benefit education in the UK by establishing, maintaining, carrying on, managing and developing a secondary school offering a broad and balanced curriculum for day and boarding students.

Method of Recruitment and Appointment or Election of Governors

The Academy shall have the following Governors as set out in its Articles of Association and Funding Agreement:

- up to 8 Governors who are appointed by the Members;
- a minimum of 2 Parent Governors who are elected by the parents of registered pupils at the Academy;
- Staff Governors appointed by the Members (provided that the total number of Staff Governors, including the Head Master, who are employees of the Academy, does not exceed one third of the total number of Governors);

- up to 4 Co-opted Governors who are appointed by the Governing Body; and
- the Head Master who is treated for all purposes as being an ex-officio Governor.

Governors are appointed for a 4 year period, except that this time limit does not apply to the Head Master. Subject to remaining eligible to be a particular type of Governor, any Governors can be re-appointed or re-elected

When appointing new Governors, the Governing Body gives consideration to the skills and experience mix of existing Governors in order to ensure the Governing Body has the necessary skills to contribute fully to the Academy's development.

Policies and Procedures Adopted for the Induction and Training of Governors

The training and induction provided for new Governors will depend upon their existing experience but would always include a tour of the Academy and a chance to meet staff and pupils. All Governors are provided with copies of policies, procedures, minutes, accounts, budgets, plans and other documents along with safeguarding and child protection training that they will need to undertake their role as Governors. As there are normally only two or three new Governors a year, induction tends to be done informally and is tailored specifically to the individual. Advantage is taken of specific courses offered by various other organisations, such as the National Governor Association and local authority, as appropriate.

Governors' training sessions are organised each year (usually to coincide with Governing Board meetings) which includes training to keep the Governors updated on relevant developments impacting on their roles and responsibilities.

Organisational Structure

The Governing Body normally meets at least 4 times per annum. The Governing Body establishes an overall framework for the governance of the Academy and determines membership, terms of reference and procedures of Committees of the Governing Body and other groups. It receives reports including policies from its Committees for ratification. It monitors the activities of the Committees through the minutes of their meetings. The Governing Body may from time to time establish working groups to perform specific tasks over a limited timescale.

There are 9 Committees of the Governing Body as follows:

- Governors' Audit and Risk Committee
- Bursaries Committee
- Foundation Committee
- Governors' Curriculum Committee
- Governors' Finance Committee (including Pay and Human Resources).
- Governors' Nominations and Successions Committee
- Head Master's Performance Management Committee
- Governors' Strategy Committee
- Governors' Welfare Committee

Each Committee has its own terms of reference detailing the responsibilities discharged to it. The following decisions are reserved to the full Governing Body:

- To consider any proposals for changes to the status or constitution of the Academy and its committee structure;
- To appoint or remove the Chair and / or Vice Chair;

- To appoint and / or consider the performance management of the Head Master; and
- To appoint the Company Secretary.

The Governors are responsible for setting general policy, adopting an annual development plan and budget, approving the annual statutory accounts, monitoring the Academy by the use of budgets and other data, and making the major decisions about the direction of the Academy, capital expenditure and senior leadership appointments.

The Governors have devolved the day-to-day management of the Academy to the Head Master and the Senior Leadership Team ('SLT'). The SLT comprises the Head Master, the Founding Head Master, the Bursar, the Deputy Head – Academic, the Deputy Head – Boarding, the Assistant Head – Sixth Form, the Assistant Head – Data and Assessment and the Assistant Head – Curriculum Support. The SLT implements the policies laid down by the Governors and reports back to them on performance.

The pay and remuneration of the Academy's key management personnel is set by the Governing Board and relates to the Head Master and the SLT as set out above. Reference (including benchmarking) is made to the wider secondary schools' sector with particular reference to the specific requirements of the Academy, such as its extensive boarding operation.

Trade Union Facility Time

The Academy Trust has considered its obligations under the provisions of the Trade Union (Facility Time Publication Requirements) Regulations 2017, and there is nothing to report.

Relevant Union Officials

The Academy Trust did not employ any individuals who were union officials during the relevant period.

Related Parties and other Connected Charities and Organisations

The Academy has Eton College as its sole educational sponsor; the relationship between the two institutions is designed to be mutually beneficial and details of the initiatives undertaken during 2022/23 are available from the websites of each institution. There are no other related parties which either control or significantly influence the decisions and operations of the Academy Trust. Further details can be found in Note 26.

Public Benefit

The Governors confirm that they have complied with the requirement in the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission general guidance on public benefit in exercising their powers or duties. They have referred to this guidance when reviewing the Academy's aims and objectives and in planning its future activities.

The Academy aims to advance for the public benefit education in Holyport and the surrounding area, offering a broad curriculum.

The Academy has fulfilled its duties of public benefit through the direct education of its pupils, the use of its facilities by other groups within the local community and through making boarding education accessible to more pupils through awarding and facilitating bursaries and scholarships, which totalled £101k in 2022/23 (£101k 2021/22).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objects, Aims, Priorities

The principal objects of the Academy Trust, as set out in its Articles of Association, are to:

- Advance for the public benefit education in the United Kingdom, in particular but without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing by establishing, maintaining, carrying on, managing and developing a school, offering a broad and balanced curriculum; and
- Promote for the benefit of the inhabitants of Holyport and the surrounding area the provision of facilities for recreation or other leisure time occupation of individuals who have need of such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity, disablement, financial hardship or social and economic circumstances for the public at large in the interests of social welfare and with the object of improving the condition of life of the said inhabitants.

The key high level areas of development of the Academy during the year ended 31 August 2023 are summarised below:

1. To improve the quality of the professional development of staff at the College by establishing and resourcing a Centre for Innovation in Research and Learning in partnership with Eton College
2. To develop the College's approach to assessment so that students are always aware of what they need to do to improve in each subject area
3. To expand and improve our co-curricular provision and monitor its impact on our students
4. To promote sustainability in all areas of policy, curriculum and operations and to better educate our students on how to live a more sustainable life
5. To enhance our engagement with our families and ensure that they feel fully involved in College life
6. To improve the quality of our music provision and ensure that music is a central part of life and learning at the College

The main activities of the Academy for the year ended 31 August 2023 are detailed in the Head Master's Strategic Report, which is approved by Governors.

Head Master's Strategic Report

This academic year started with a lower than expected number of boarders on the Academy's roll (196). This led to a challenging start to the year due to reduced revenues and required the budget for the year to be reforecast. As a result of this, and with the support of external consultancy, the Academy reviewed its admissions structures and processes. The Admissions Department was restructured and a new Admissions Policy was approved which increased the number of day students in Years 7 and 8 and balanced the boarder number across Years 7 through to 11. As a direct result of these changes, the number of boarders on roll increased throughout the year and applications for September 2023 were strong leading to a much more optimistic outlook in the medium term.

Despite the early challenges, the Academy made strong progress towards its strategic objectives for the year. The internal appointment of the Deputy Head: Academic, accompanied by the opening and resourcing of the Centre for Innovation in Research and Learning, significantly increased the Academy's capacity to provide high quality continuing professional development to its staff. The innovations also contributed significantly to the development of the Academy's middle leadership team and to its strategic planning for the future.

The College's Assessment and Progress Policy was reviewed and updated with each department producing detailed assessment plans for all year groups which support students' learning by making explicit the skills and knowledge they are required to demonstrate to progress to the next level. Sustainability was also a core focus across the Academy this year with the introduction of a number of initiatives: a more sustainable approach to the use of local suppliers and ingredients in the College's refectory; the introduction of a biodigester to sustainably process food waste (and other green waste); the expansion of the College's facilities for outdoor learning to incorporate livestock and enhance the education programme around this and a full audit of all curriculum areas to identify opportunities to enhance teaching in relation to sustainability.

An Associate Assistant Head with responsibility for co-curriculum was appointed to give greater capacity to this important area of the Academy's work. This resulted in a significant increase in the range of activities on offer (especially student-led activities), an increase in the frequency by which students could choose new activities (previously three times per year, now six) and a significant increase in the operational effectiveness of the co-curriculum programme with improved reliability of registers and subsequent improvements in student attendance. A new Director of Music took up post in January 2023 and had an immediate impact on the Academy's Music provision in a number of ways: stabilising GCSE classes and ensuring good outcomes for students; reviewing and rewriting the entire KS3 curriculum to ensure that National Curriculum objectives were met and exceeded; tidying and decluttering the Music Department; introducing Music A Level for the first time and creating a dedicated digital Music Room for use by A Level musicians; significantly increasing the range and popularity of Music within the Academy's co-curriculum and improving students' perceptions of Music in general.

The Academy was also subject to a Section 8 Inspection by OFSTED in May 2023. Whilst the headline judgement changed from Outstanding to Good (the Academy does not currently have facilities to offer Design and Technology subjects and the new OFSTED framework limits judgements on this basis), the inspectorate noted that Leadership, Personal Development and the Academy's Sixth Form were all Outstanding. The final report also made favourable comment on the "joyous" nature of the education the Academy provides.

This year has also seen the continuation of a programme of capital investment in the Academy's buildings and furnishings.

The College is especially proud of the creation of the Centre for Innovation, Research and Learning ('CIRL') which opened in the Summer term, this has been developed with the support of the 'CIRL' team at Eton. This is a space which supports the professional development and learning of our teaching staff and also supports teaching and learning of pupils, especially our sixth formers through their Extended Professional Qualification.

The College has reconfigured the ground floor of Winton to create a new medical centre, intervention rooms, offices and freed up space to create a library. This is the first time the College has had a dedicated library space which can accommodate up to 5,000 books and is a relaxed and calm space seating up to 30.

The College also refurbished the junior house boys' accommodation in May 2023 half term with new study beds, carpeting and painting. The junior house girls' accommodation was similarly upgraded during October 2023 half term.

A number of smaller projects also took place including: lighting and sound for the Westbrook Theatre, new bag racks outside the Sports Hall and furniture for Winton ground floor.

The start of the year marked the beginning of the new relationship with our newly appointed caterers

Thomas Franks. The servery and counters were all replaced to create a more modern and attractive dining room.

There is now a Horse Box just outside the dining room which is used for events and the outdoor canopy includes new planting and tables and chairs. An additional seating and planted area has also been created at the main entrance for day pupils adjacent to the dining room and this has enhanced the outdoor space.

In addition to this, the Academy continues to work with a team of local architects to develop the estates masterplan in order to maximise the facilities available for our students and enhance the overall environment.

Achievements and Performance

The Academy has completed its ninth year of operation having opened to its first intake of pupils on 1 September 2014 and has now published its third set of A Level results.

This was the first year that grade boundaries and distributions had returned to pre-pandemic levels. The particular achievements and performance of the Academy during the year ended 31 August 2023 were as follows:

The GCSE results achieved in 2023 demonstrate that students at the Academy are achieving excellent academic outcomes. We set out below the key achievements with comparator figures for 2022 in brackets:

- Standard pass in English and Maths: 73% (83%)
- Strong pass in English and Maths: 60% (58%)
- Students entering the EBacc: 87% (80%)
- EBacc Average Points Score: 5.26 (5.13)
- All Grades 7-9: 27.5% (35%)
- Progress 8 Score: +0.31 (+0.24)
- Progress 8 Score for disadvantaged students: -0.29 (-0.3)

The A Level results achieved in 2023 demonstrate that the Academy's Sixth Form continues to perform strongly:

- A Level APS per entry: 39.54 (43.83)
- Average grade per entry: B= (B+)
- L3VA: Not being calculated this year as no national performance tables however internal estimates assume this to be in region of +0.2 (+0.2)
- Proportion of all grades awarded A*-C: 86.2% (94%)
- Proportion of all grades awarded A*/A: 40.8% (55%)
- 70% (75%) of all students awarded places at Russell Group or other Top Tier universities

Financial performance is tracked throughout the year against an approved budget by way of monthly management accounts and more detailed review at each Finance Committee meeting.

Although the Academy Trust's Funding Agreement is not subject to a specific carry forward limit on the amount of General Annual Grant ('GAG') funding, an important financial performance indicator is the level of general reserves held at the balance sheet date and, in particular, the amount of GAG funding carried forward at the balance sheet date. At 31 August 2023, the balance of the general reserves was £454k (2022: £369k).

As the majority of the Academy Trust's funding is based on pupil numbers, these constitute a key performance indicator. Pupil numbers at the October 2022 census were 576 which is a decrease of 3.2% from the previous census. (2021: 595). The number of boarders was 203 at the end of the year (2022: 208). Pupil numbers at the October 2023 census are 614 representing an increase in the year 7 intake with one additional class along with an increase in boarders taking the College close to capacity for boarding in 23/24.

The ratio of GAG funding per pupil was £6,185 for the year, an increase year on year of 8%. (2022: £5,712).

Staffing costs constitute another key performance indicator for the Academy Trust and the percentage of total staff costs to total funding for the period was 66% (2022: 64%), while the percentage of staff costs to total costs was 68% (2022: 68%).

FINANCIAL REVIEW

A large part of the Academy Trust's income is received from the DfE via the Education Skills and Funding Agency ('ESFA') in the form of recurrent grants, the use of which is restricted to particular purposes. The grants received from the DfE during the year ended 31 August 2023 and the associated expenditure of these grants are shown as Restricted Funds in the Statement of Financial Activities. These grants were greater than previous years, largely driven by the increase in pupil numbers.

The Academy Trust also receives very significant income from its boarding provision, which increased by 2% in income despite a decrease of 2% in numbers of boarding pupils compared to the previous year.

In addition, the Academy receives grants for fixed assets from the DfE and other organisations and these are shown as Restricted Fixed Asset Funds in the Statement of Financial Activities. The balance of the Restricted Fixed Asset fund is reduced by the depreciation charges on the assets acquired using these funds.

The general reserves position improved in the year due to tight budgetary control with strong debtor management. General reserves closed at £454k, excluding pension actuarial adjustments, an improvement year on year of +£85k.

During the year ended 31 August 2023, the Academy generated an operating surplus of £175k (before non cash pension charges and buildings depreciation).

There was a pension actuarial gain of £227k (2022 gain: £2.607m) in the year due to the increase in the discount rate on pension scheme liabilities from 4.2% to 5.3% (in the previous year it increased from 1.7% to 4.2%). This increase in discount rate has continued to rise as gilt yields have risen in line with interest rates which have reduced the valuation of pension scheme liabilities.

The cash position for the Academy has improved from an opening balance of £1.972m to £2.400m at 31 August 2023.

The fixed assets held by the Academy are used for providing education, boarding and associated support services to the pupils of the Academy and at 31 August 2023 the net book value stood at £17.826m. This includes the value of land and buildings transferred on opening, subsequent fixed asset additions and is stated after total depreciation charges for the year of £430k.

The balance of total funds held at 31 August 2023 was £17.935m which comprised the following:

The key financial policies reviewed and adopted during the period included the Financial Management Manual, which lays out the framework for the Academy's financial management, including financial responsibilities of the Governing Body, Head Master, managers, budget holders and other staff, as well as the delegated authorities for spending. The other financial policies reviewed and adopted during the period included Bad debts and Charging and Remissions.

Reserves Policy

The Governors review the reserve levels of the Academy Trust annually. This review encompasses the nature of the income and expenditure streams, the need to match income with commitments and the nature of reserves. The Governors also take into consideration the future plans of the Academy, the uncertainty over future income streams and other key risks identified during the risk review.

The Governors have determined that the appropriate level of general reserves should be approximately 5-10% of total incoming resources. The reason for this is to provide sufficient working capital to cover delays between spending and receipts of grants, to provide a cushion to deal with unexpected emergencies such as loss of boarding revenues or urgent maintenance and to support a capital improvement programme.

The Academy's current level of reserves (defined as restricted general funds, excluding pension reserve, plus the balance on unrestricted funds) is £18.279m of which £0.454m is general reserves (that is, total funds less the amount held in fixed assets and pension funds).

The current level of general reserves is now close to our minimum target level but, given our exciting development plans, requires further bolstering. We also aim to continue to keep net current assets above £500k to retain liquidity. To achieve this, the Academy plans to:

- Retain day and boarding pupils at near or full capacity.
- Hold the resilience in the boarding numbers with experienced admissions and boarding teams.
- Ensure the boarding experience excels in safeguarding, managing behaviour and pupil needs.
- Continue to ensure the Academy is run efficiently and that expenditure stays within budget.
- Increase external lettings revenue.

Investment Policy

All bank account funds surplus to immediate requirements are invested by the Academy Trust with the objective of ensuring a return on assets invested but with minimal risk.

New deposits are invested in a savings account with the Academy Trust's principal bankers and as needed funds are transferred from our savings account to our current account. Where cash flow allows, sums in excess of £400,000 have been invested on deposit for more extended periods with the Academy Trust's principal bankers.

Principal Risks and Uncertainties

The principal risks and uncertainties facing the Academy Trust are as follows:

Financial

The Academy Trust has considerable reliance on continued Government funding through the ESFA. In 22/23, 54% of the Academy Trust's incoming resources were Government funded and whilst this level is expected to continue, there is no assurance that Government funding will remain at the same level.

There is a further risk to the Academy's boarding income, should places not be filled for the year or parents find it increasingly difficult to meet the financial commitment. This is mitigated by ongoing monitoring, proactive marketing and the delivery of a high-quality boarding experience backed up by the Academy's "Outstanding" Boarding OFSTED report received in 2021.

The Academy Trust is developing other revenue streams including lettings to mitigate against these risks.

Principal Risks and Uncertainties (continued)

Failures in governance and / or management

The risk in this area arises from the potential failure to manage effectively the Academy Trust's finances, internal controls, compliance with regulations and legislation, or statutory returns. The Governors continue to review and ensure appropriate measures are in place to mitigate these risks.

Reputational

The continuing success of the Academy is dependent on its ability to attract applicants in sufficient numbers by maintaining the highest educational and boarding standards. To mitigate this risk, the Governors ensure that pupil progress, achievement and welfare are closely monitored and reviewed.

Safeguarding and child protection

The Governors continue to ensure that the highest standards are maintained in the areas of selection and monitoring of staff, the operation of child protection policies and procedures, health & safety and discipline.

Staffing

The success of the Academy is reliant on the quality of its staff. The Governors monitor and review policies and procedures to ensure continued professional development, regular appraisal and training of staff in order to help recruit and retain staff. Succession planning, especially for middle and senior leadership positions, is also a priority.

Fraud and mismanagement of funds

The Academy has engaged internal auditors to perform a programme of work aimed at checking and reviewing the financial systems and records as required by the Academies Financial Handbook. All finance staff receive training to keep them up to date with financial practice requirements and to develop their skills in this area. In accordance with the changes in the Academies Financial Handbook the Academy Trust ensures it manages its internal scrutiny and external audit separately.

Cyber crime

The Academy recognises the risks that arise from cyber fraud. The College has multi factor authentication for staff to help mitigate these risks and provides training during the year. The College has a Cyber Security Policy and has taken out cyber insurance.

Estates

The Governors take their responsibilities seriously for ensuring the College's estate is safe, well maintained and complies with relevant legislation. These risks are considered in detail in the Audit and Risk Committee whose Chair conducts an annual inspection walk round the site. The College has a Planned Preventative Maintenance schedule including asbestos, legionella, electrical fixed wire, boilers, emergency lighting, fire extinguishers and PAT testing. There is also a termly health and safety meeting which is chaired by the Bursar. The minutes and its actions are shared with the Audit and Risk Committee. The Department for Education also commissioned a Reinforced Autoclaved Aerated Concrete ('RAAC') survey at the College in August 2023. This survey confirmed that the College has no RAAC present on our site.

Risk Management

The Governors have established an Audit and Risk Committee.

The Risk Register is regularly reviewed in light of any new information, presented to the Audit and Risk Committee termly and formally reviewed annually by the Full Governing Board.

The Academy has an effective system of internal financial control and this is explained in more detail in the Statement of Internal Control.

Financial and Risk Management Objectives and Policies

The Governors have assessed the major risks to which the Academy Trust is exposed, in particular those relating to its finances, teaching, facilities and other operational areas. The Governors have implemented a number of systems to assess and minimise those risks, including internal controls. Where significant financial risk still remains and insurance cover is available on reasonable commercial terms, the Governors have ensured the Academy Trust has adequate insurance cover.

Whilst the Academy is currently over-subscribed, there are risks to falling revenue funding arising from a decrease in boarding numbers in the current challenging economic climate.

The Governors examine the financial health of the Academy Trust formally every term, reviewing performance against budgets and overall income and expenditure by means of regular update reports at all full Governors and Finance Committee meetings. In addition, management accounts are sent to the Head Master and Chair of Governors/Finance monthly and the Finance Committee every 2 months.

At the balance sheet date, the Academy Trust had no significant liabilities arising from trade creditors or debtors where there would be a significant adverse effect on the Academy's liquidity.

The Governors recognise that the Local Government Pension Scheme deficit represents a significant potential liability to the Academy Trust. However, as the Governors consider the Academy is able to meet its known annual contribution commitments for the foreseeable future, the risk from this liability is minimised. In addition, the Government underwrites the LGPS liabilities. See Note 24 for more detail.

Fundraising

The Academy Trust does not use any external fundraisers. All fundraising undertaken during the year was monitored by the Governors. The majority of the fundraising for the Academy Trust is carried out by Friends of Holyport College and the Dads' Club. The second hand uniform shop also generates a small income each year.

Going Concern

After making appropriate enquiries the Board of Governors has a reasonable expectation that the Academy Trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, it continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting Policies note of the Financial Statements.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

The Academy strives to continually improve levels of progress and attainment for all pupils, equipping them with the qualifications, skills and character to follow their chosen pathway, whether it be into further and higher education or employment, as well as promoting the continued professional development of its staff. The Academy's plans for the short term include:

1. To harness the capacity of our middle leadership team to lead Impact projects in collaboration with CIRL
2. To research and implement classroom strategies which encourage academic independence and support teachers in identifying and addressing misconceptions
3. To broaden and enrich the current KS3 curriculum with more practical and risky opportunities through Sport, D&T and Music
4. To ensure that disadvantaged students receive all the support they require to overcome barriers to successful learning independence
5. To review best practice for creative and innovative KS3 curriculums nationally and making recommendations to Governors' Curriculum Committee on possible future directions

The Academy's longer term objectives include:

- To maintain and enhance standards of excellence across all areas of the College
- To continuously improve the quality of education at the College, ensuring it remains ambitious, broad and relevant
- To continue to promote social mobility and to benefit the most disadvantaged
- To achieve longer term financial sustainability
- To maintain and enhance the College's facilities



Scope of responsibility

As Governors, we acknowledge we have overall responsibility for ensuring that the Academy Trust has an effective and appropriate system of control, financial and otherwise. The Audit and Risk Committee is a standalone committee with its own Terms of Reference. It meets four times a year and its purpose is to advise the Full Governing Body and the Finance Committee on the Academy Trust's financial, governance, risk management and internal control systems. This includes a thorough review of the Risk Register at least annually.

Conflict of interest

The Academy Trust manages conflicts of interest by maintaining an up-to-date and complete register of interests. The information on this register is used in the day-to-day management and governance of the academy trust for example when selecting suppliers.

Governance reviews

The Academy routinely checks skills when recruiting new Governors and reviewing Committee appointments. A Governance Review has been carried out this year by Mrs G Monk as Chair of the Nominations and Successions Committee.

Review of value for money

As Accounting Officer, the Head Master has responsibility for ensuring that the Academy delivers good value in the use of public resources. The Accounting Officer understands that value for money refers to the educational and wider societal outcomes, as well as estates safety and management, achieved in return for the taxpayer resources received.

The Accounting Officer considers how the Academy's use of its resources has provided good value for money during each academic year, and reports to the Board of Governors where value for money can be improved, including the use of benchmarking data where appropriate. 1. Developed an estates master plan to ensure that we concentrate on projects which will enhance facilities and add value to the overall site;
2. Commissioned an independent review of the catering contract at the end of year 1 to ensure quality and value for money;
3. Started the process of re-tendering all of our estates' maintenance contracts;
4. Developed a rolling programme of refurbishing our classrooms and boarding accommodation;
5. Continuing to manage energy consumption during term time and holidays through the BMS control system and solar panels on site.

The purpose of the system of internal control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives; it can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an ongoing process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of Academy Trust's policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically. The system of internal control has been in place in the Academy for the period ended 31 August 2023 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements.

Capacity to handle risk

The Board of Governors has reviewed the key risks to which the Academy is exposed together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The Board of Governors is of the view that there is a formal on-going process for identifying, evaluating and managing the Academy's significant risks that has been in place for the period from incorporation to 31 August 2023 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements. This process is regularly reviewed by the Board of Governor as part of the review of the Risk Register.

The risk and control framework

The Academy Trust's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

1. comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the Governors;
2. regular reviews by the Finance Committee of reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes;
3. regular review of the Risk Register and Top 10 Risks by the Audit and Risk Committee;
4. setting targets to measure financial and other performance;
5. clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines;
6. delegation of authority and segregation of duties;
7. identification and management of risks. The Board of Governors buys in an internal assurance service from Critchleys.

The Board of Governors has reviewed its internal scrutiny arrangements and will consider future areas of focus to ensure financial probity. The internal assurance service includes giving advice on financial matters and performing a range of checks on the Academy Trust's financial and other systems. In particular, the checks carried out in the year in May 2023 included review of the Academy Trust's Financial Processes in accordance with the Academy Trust Handbook to ensure compliance in the following areas: 1. Credit cards. 2. Employee expenses. 3. Debtor collections.

On an annual basis, Critchleys reports to the Board of Governors through the Audit and Risk Committee on the operation of the systems of control and on the discharge of the Governors' financial responsibilities and prepares an annual summary report to the committee outlining the areas reviewed, key findings, recommendations and conclusions to help the committee consider actions and assess year on year progress. The internal scrutiny report was carried out remotely during the Summer term and the Academy is pleased to report that there were no adverse findings or control issues identified.

Review of effectiveness

As Accounting Officer, the Head Master has responsibility for reviewing the effectiveness of the system of internal control. During the year in question the review has been informed by:

- the work of the external reviewer;
- the work of the external auditor;
- the financial management and governance self-assessment process;
- the work of the executive managers within the Academy who have responsibility for the development and maintenance of the internal control framework.

The Accounting Officer has been advised of the implications of the result of their review of the system of internal control by the Audit and Risk Committee and Finance Committee and a plan to address weaknesses and ensure continuous improvement of the system is in place.





Opinion

We have audited the Financial Statements of Holyport College (the 'Academy Trust') for the year ended 31 August 2023 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet, the Statement of Cash Flows and the related notes, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The risk is also greater regarding irregularities occurring due to fraud rather than error, as fraud involves intentional concealment, forgery, collusion, omission or misrepresentation.



The accounting officer is responsible, under the requirements of Holyport College's funding agreement with the Secretary of State for Education dated 19 June 2013 and the Academy Trust Handbook, extant from 1 September 2022, for ensuring that expenditure disbursed and income received is applied for the purposes intended by Parliament and the financial transactions conform to the authorities which govern them.

Our responsibilities for this engagement are established in the United Kingdom by our profession's ethical guidance and are to obtain limited assurance and report in accordance with our engagement letter and the requirements of the Academies Accounts Direction 2022 to 2023. We report to you whether anything has come to our attention in carrying out our work which suggests that in all material respects, expenditure disbursed and income received during the year 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023 have not been applied to purposes intended by Parliament or that the financial transactions do not conform to the authorities which govern them.

Approach

We conducted our engagement in accordance with the Academies Accounts Direction 2021 to 2022 issued by ESFA. We performed a limited assurance engagement as defined in our engagement letter.

The objective of a limited assurance engagement is to perform such procedures as to obtain information and explanations in order to provide us with sufficient appropriate evidence to express a negative conclusion on regularity.

A limited assurance engagement is more limited in scope than a reasonable assurance engagement and consequently does not enable us to obtain assurance that we would become aware of all significant matters that might be identified in a reasonable assurance engagement. Accordingly, we do not express a positive opinion.

Our engagement includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the regularity and propriety of the Academy's income and expenditure.

Our work on regularity included a review of the internal controls, policies and procedures that have been implemented and an assessment of their design and effectiveness to understand how the Academy Trust complied with the framework of authorities. We also reviewed the reports commissioned by the governors to assess the internal controls throughout the year.

Approach (continued)

Specific work undertaken to draw to our conclusion includes:

- reviewing the minutes of the meetings of the Board of Governors and other evidence made available to us, relevant to our consideration of regularity;
- a review of the objectives and activities of the academy, with reference to the income streams and other information available to us as auditors of the academy;
- testing of a sample of payroll payments to staff;
- testing of a sample of payments to suppliers and other third parties;
- testing of a sample of grants received and other income streams.

We performed detailed testing based on our assessment of the risk of material irregularity, impropriety and noncompliance. This work was integrated with our audit on the financial statements where appropriate and included analytical review and detailed substantive testing of transactions.

Conclusion

In the course of our work, nothing has come to our attention which suggests in all material respects the expenditure disbursed and income received during the year 1 September 2022 to 31 August 2023 have not been applied to purposes intended by Parliament and the financial transactions do not conform to the authorities which govern them.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For the Year ended 31 August 2023

1 Accounting Policies

The principal activity of Holyport College is to provide education for pupils aged 11 to 19. The Trust is an exempt charity and a company limited by guarantee (company number: 07930340). It is incorporated and domiciled in the UK. The address of the registered office is Holyport College, Ascot Road, Holyport, Maidenhead, SL6 3LE.

A summary of the principal accounting policies adopted (which have been applied consistently, except where noted), judgments and key sources of estimation uncertainty, is set out below.

1.1 Basis of Preparation

The financial statements of the Academy, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared under the historic cost convention in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard Applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Academies Accounts Direction 2022 to 2023 issued by ESFA, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

Holyport College meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

1.2 Company Status

The Academy is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the individuals named on page 1. In the event of the academy being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £10 per member of the Academy.

1.3 Fund Accounting

Unrestricted income funds represent those resources which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objects of the Academy at the discretion of the Governors.

Restricted fixed asset funds are resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes imposed by the funders where the asset acquired or created is held for a specific purpose.

Restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received with restrictions imposed by the funder/donor and include grants from the Department for Education Group.

1.4 Income

All incoming resources are recognised when the Academy has entitlement to the funds, the receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably.

Grants

Grants are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the Balance Sheet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year for which it is receivable and any abatement in respect of the year is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the Balance Sheet in the restricted fixed asset funds. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

1.4 Income (continued)

Donations

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance-related conditions) where the receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

Other income

Other income, including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the year it is receivable and to the extent the Academy has provided the goods or services.

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Expenditure on charitable activities are costs incurred on the academy's educational operations, including support costs and those costs relating to the governance of the academy appointed to charitable activities.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

1.6 Going concern

The Governors assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the Academy to continue as a going concern. The Governors make this assessment in respect of a period of at least one year from the date of authorisation for issue of the financial statements and have concluded that the Academy has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no material uncertainties about the Academy's ability to continue as a going concern, thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.7 Tangible fixed assets

Assets costing £1,000 or more are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment.

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the Balance Sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. Where there are specific conditions attached to the funding requiring the continued use of the asset, the related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities and carried forward in the Balance Sheet. Depreciation on the relevant assets is charged directly to the restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of Financial Activities. Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with unrestricted funds, depreciation on such assets is charged to the unrestricted fund.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (continued)

1.7 Tangible fixed assets (continued)

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land, at rates calculated to write off the cost of these assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:

Buildings	- 2% Straight line
Leasehold land	- over the life of the lease
Furniture and fixtures	- 10% Straight line
Computer equipment	- 25% Straight line
Motor vehicles	- 20% Straight line

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities.

1.8 Operating leases

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the lease term.

1.9 Taxation

The Academy is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

Accordingly, the Academy is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Part 11, chapter 3 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

1.10 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

1.11 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short-term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of six months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

1.12 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance Sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the academy anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within interest payable and similar charges.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (continued)

1 Accounting policies (continued)

1.13 Financial instruments

The Academy only holds basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the Academy and their measurement bases are as follows:

Financial assets - trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 15. Prepayments are not financial instruments. Cash at bank is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Financial liabilities - trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost as detailed in notes 16 and 17. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition. Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

1.14 Pensions

Retirement benefits to employees of the Academy are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ("TPS") and the Local Government Pension Scheme ("LGPS"). These are defined benefit schemes.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the Academy in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary on the basis of quadrennial valuations using a prospective unit credit method. TPS is an unfunded multi-employer scheme with no underlying assets to assign between employers. Consequently, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions recognised in the period to which they relate.

The LGPS is a funded multi-employer scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the Academy in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each Balance Sheet date. The amounts charged to operating surplus are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses.

Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (continued)

2 Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgment

Estimates and judgments are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions:

The Academy trust makes estimates and assumptions concerning the future. The resulting accounting estimates and assumptions will, by definition, seldom equal the related actual results. The estimates and assumptions that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below.

Local Government Pension Scheme

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost or income for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 24, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2022 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at 31 August 2023. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability.

Depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are depreciated over their useful lives taking into account residual values where appropriate. The actual lives of the assets and residual values are assessed annually and may vary depending on a number of factors. Residual value assessments consider issues such as the remaining life of the asset and projected disposal values.

24 Pension commitments

The Academy's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teachers' Pension Scheme in England and Wales ('TPS') for academic and related staff and the Local Government Pension Scheme ('LGPS') for non teaching staff which is managed by The Royal County of Berkshire Pension Fund. Both are multi employer defined benefit schemes.

The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS is 31 March 2016 and of the LGPS is 31 March 2022.

There were no outstanding or prepaid contributions at the beginning or the end of the year.

TPS

The TPS is a statutory, contributory defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for full time teachers in academies. All teachers have the opportunity to opt out of the TPS after enrolment.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer make contributions, as a percentage of salary, these contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Valuation of the TPS

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuation and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury every 4 years. The aim of the review is to specify the level of future contributions. Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The 31 March 2016 TPS actuarial valuation results were implemented from 1 September 2019. The key elements of the valuation and subsequent consultation are:

- employer contribution rates set at 23.68% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% administration levy.
- total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated costs of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £218,100 million and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £196,100 million, giving a notional past service deficit of £22,000 million.
- the SCAPE rate, set by HMT, is used to determine the notional investment return. The current SCAPE rate is 2.4% above the rate of CPI, assumed real rate of return is 2.4% in excess of prices and 2% in excess of earnings. The rate of real earnings growth is assumed to be 2.2%. The assumed nominal rate of return including earnings growth is 4.45%.

The latest actuarial TPS valuation results, as at 31 March 2020, were released in October 2023. The revised employer contribution rate, arising from this valuation, is due to be implemented from 1 April 2024. The employer's pension costs paid to the TPS in the year amounted to £588,000 (2022: £561,000).

Under the definitions set out in FRS102, the TPS is an unfunded multi employer pension scheme. The Academy has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The Academy has set out above the information available on the scheme.

LGPS

The LGPS is a defined benefit pension scheme, with the assets held in separate trustee administered funds. The total contributions made for the year ended 31 August 2023 were £282,000 (2022: £233,000) of which employer's contributions totalled £215,000 (2022: £180,000) and employees' contributions totalled £67,000 (2022: £53,000). The agreed contribution rates from April 2023 are 22.6% for employers and 5.5% to 12.5% for employees.

Parliament has agreed at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of academy closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013.

Owing to the nature of the Academy trust and the composition of the Board of Trustees being drawn from local public and private sector organisations, transactions may take place with organisations in which Governors have an interest. All transactions involving such organisations are conducted in accordance with the requirements of the Academies Trust Handbook and with the trust's financial regulations and normal procurement procedures relating to connected and related party transactions.

Eton College is sole educational sponsor of the Academy and details of the sponsorship relationship and support are outlined in the Heads of Terms document available on both College websites. The sponsorship is designed to be mutually beneficial and initiatives undertaken in 2022-23 in addition to sharing facilities included links between numerous departments, attendance at evening lectures, consultancy on fundraising, technology enrichment, educational leadership advice, pupil mentoring and ongoing cooperation among pupils through the Investment Society and a combined choir. A number of Academy Governors are also members of Eton College staff. Holyport College received financial benefit of £14,000 (2022: £11,000), donations totalling £nil (2022: £60,000) from Eton College and paid costs totalling £8,000 (2022: £14,000).

Holyport College also received £15,000 from Future Academies for the Latin Excellence Programme (2022 £nil) and £2,200 from Furze Platt for Teacher Training (2022 £nil).

27 Capital commitments
