

Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and was formed on 14 March 2012 (as amended by special resolution on 30 May 2012). It is governed by a memorandum and articles of association. The liability of the members in the event of the company being wound up is limited to a sum not exceeding

Method of recruitment and appointment of trustees

The trustees of the charity are also the directors for the purposes of company law and are appointed by the members at the AGM.

The charity's objects

- (1) To promote any charitable purposes for the benefit of the public in England and Wales (hereinafter called the "area of benefit") and, in particular, to build the capacity of Third sector organisations to enable them to access charitable support from Government, local authorities and from private "for profit" organisations to enable them to pursue or contribute to any charitable purpose.
- (2) The promotion of the efficiency and effectiveness of charities and the effective use of resources for charitable purposes by charitable and non-charitable bodies for the benefit of the public.
- (3) To advance the education of pupils in the area of benefit by providing and assisting in the provision of facilities (not required to be provided by the local education authority) for education purposes at their schools.
- (4) The prevention or relief of poverty in the area of benefit by providing services and support to charities, or other organisations working to prevent or relieve poverty.
- (5) To promote the conservation, protection and improvement of the physical and natural environment for the public benefit.
- (6) To develop the capacity and skills of the members of socially disadvantaged communities in the area of benefit.

The charity's objects (continued)

- (7) To relieve unemployment for the public benefit; and
- (8) To promote social inclusion for the public benefit by preventing people from becoming socially excluded, relieving the needs of those people who are socially excluded and assisting them to integrate into society "social excluded" means "being excluded from society, or part of society, as a result of being a member of a socially and economically deprived community by undertaking charitable activities which assist those whose ability to access the internet and other digital technologies for social, economic and cultural benefit is limited by reason of their age, ill-health, disability, financial hardship or other disadvantage.

Public benefit statement

In setting our objectives and planning our activities our Trustees have given serious consideration to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit.

Achievements and performance

Participate has continued to work with a wide range of community projects and ventures over the past year. The people and organisations we support are linked by their common passion to create social change and the great ideas they have to improve the lives of people in the communities in which they work.

We work hard to help each organisation develop their capacity to deliver, to understand their unique contribution and to create the environment in which they can achieve their potential and meet their goals. We do this through our unique blend of direct support, services and volunteering brokered from the private sector and support from our wide range of partners. Over the past year we have developed new and exciting programmes of work that take deliver our core service alongside larger funding organisations to maximise the impact of our support.

Highlights:

- Supported 30 team volunteering days of action in the community helping community organisations, charities, social enterprises and schools all based in deprived areas or who are working with a specific client group such as disability or homeless
- Brokered 632 business volunteers to work on community projects
- Supported the distribution of over £12,000 of start-up funding from UnLtd to new start social enterprises
- Supported 12 Social Entrepreneurs to sustainably start and grow their social business
- Supported fundraising and in kind donations that have raised over £220,000 for community projects We have worked on a number of specific projects during the year:

Specific projects

Locally Grown

We completed work on our ERDF funded programme in 2015. Locally Grown is a project to boost enterprise in deprived areas and social housing. Focusing on West and South Yorkshire it offers a package of free support to help people set up their own businesses, develop social enterprises and encourage small businesses growth. Locally Grown is a partnership between Yorkshire Housing, Accent Foundation, Connect Housing, In-Communities, Places for People, and Participate Projects. As part of the Locally Grown project, Participate are the specialist support service for social venture support. We provided one-to-one support for people and organisations who are set up specifically with a social focus. Over the course of the project:

- We engaged 141 organisations as part of the programme. 50 existing enterprises were provided with 12 hours of specialist support from Participate. In addition to the 50 supported, 7 new enterprises were started.
- 905 business volunteers contributed a day of their time for free to locally grown clients
- £287,266 was raised for Locally grown clients through private sector donations and fundraising

Achievements and performance (continued)

Social Venture Partnership

Social Venture Partnership is our model for finding and supporting Social Entrepreneurs. We have been working on two projects - 'Lead the Change' and 'Do it for Real'.

What is Lead the Change?

Lead the Change' is funded by the Esmee Fairburn Foundation via Unltd. Over two years we will implement a programme of support that provides people with start-up funding and development support for social venture creation. Grants given to start-up organisations are between £500 and £2,500 each. We have £25,000 to give out in total.

What is Do it for Real?

Do it For Real' is a national youth programme funded through Spirit of 2012, Comic Relief and UnLtd to mobilise young social entrepreneurs through sharing knowledge, volunteering and enabling young people to start, grow and build sustainable social action projects. Participates 'Do it for Real' programme is supported by Natwest's Skills and Opportunities Fund. The programme is specifically for people aged between 16 and 30 years old. Grants given to start-up organisations will be up to £500. We have £10,000 to give out in total.

As well as specialist enterprise support from Participate, successful candidates are provided with a range of business support skills workshops, Social Venture School, Social Venture Sustainability School and Mentoring.

In this financial year we have given out over £12,000 to 12 of the Lead the Change entrepreneurs.

Provident Good Neighbour Sustainability Partnership

In partnership with The Provident Financial Good Neighbour Programme, Participate has created an innovative approach to supporting smaller community organisations in deprived neighbourhoods. Since 2009 Provident Financial has been supporting community projects by distributing one percent of their profits through their Good Neighbour Programme. Participate has begun to deliver their our unique brand of support alongside this funding programme to build on the work of Good Neighbour whilst ensuring that existing and future funding is developmental. We are working with a number of the charities and community organisations supported by Good Neighbour to deliver regional workshops, a national conference and one-to-one support on structure, governance, fundraising, business planning, sustainability and growth. The programme seeks to maximise the impact of our work by working alongside other organisations that distribute funding to community projects.

Financial review

The net income for the year was £3,971, including net expenditure of £15,713 on unrestricted funds and net income of £19,684 on restricted funds.

Reserves policy

The charity's free reserves at the year end were £48,310.

The charity's policy is to hold at least 3 months of reserves.

Statement of trustees' responsibilities

The trustees (who are also the directors for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees report and the financial statements in accordance with the applicable law and UK Accounting Standards.

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial accounts for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for the year. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;

observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;

make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;

state whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;

prepare the accounts on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial accounts comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

1 Accounting policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities (Charities SORP (FRSSE)) the Companies Act 2006 and Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015).

There has been no change to the accounting policies since last year. No changes have been made to the accounts for previous years.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when the charity becomes entitled to the resources, the trustees are virtually certain they will receive the resources and the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Grants and donations

Grants and donations are only included in the SOFA when the charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

Where grants are related to performance and specific deliverables, they are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.

Donated goods for resale are valued at the amount actually realised upon their sale.

Donated assets, facilities or services are valued at their estimated value to the charity. This is the price that the charity estimates it would pay in the open market for equivalent items; or services and facilities of equivalent utility to the charity.

Expenditure and liabilities

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out the resources.

Taxation

As a charity the organisation benefits from rates relief and is generally exempt from income tax and capital gains tax but not from VAT. Irrecoverable VAT is included in the cost of those items to which it relates.

Pensions

The charity operates a defined contribution scheme for the benefit of its employees. The costs of contributions are recognised in the year they are payable.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the accounts.
