Report and accounts for the year ended 30 November 2017

The Directors and Trustees have pleasure in presenting the report and accounts of Music at Malling for the year ended 30 November 2017.

The Company and its aims

The Company was registered at Companies House on 26 April 2012 as a company limited by guarantee. On 4 January 2013 the company was entered on the Register of Charities, with the Registered Charity Number 1150337.

Music at Malling was established with the objective of establishing and promoting a festival of outstanding music in West Malling, Kent, and surrounding villages. The festival is centred on professional musicians and encourages in particular the involvement of local schools. Funds are raised through sponsorship and ticket sales. The programme is developed under the auspices of the festival's Artistic Director, Thomas Kemp.

Activity in 2017

The seventh Music at Malling Festival ran for the last ten days of September with twenty four events preceded by a series of outreach workshops in local schools.

Working with schools

The schools programme continues to be a core strength of the Festival. The Festival Committee strongly believes that the main portal into the world of classical music is early exposure-children need to opportunity to hear such music preformed with passion. Its provision in schools should be axiomatic and our efforts in this area are supported by Kent Music.

The outreach workshops and school concerts involved eight hundred and ninety one children in four concerts. Whole classes from thirteen primary schools composed pieces based on Roald Dahl's Revolting Rhymes and these were performed alongside professional musicians from Chamber Domaine. Three hundred and ninety children performed in these concerts which included performances of Paul Patterson's Little Red Riding Hood. As last year Discovery School on Kings Hill generously shared their hall for two of the concerts, the other two being at St Mary's church in West Malling

Go Compose! involved twelve young musicians between the ages of twelve and eighteen writing a piece of music in a day, mentored by four professional musicians and the composer Simon Speare. The day was run in conjunction with Sound and Music and took place in the new St Benedict's Centre at West Malling Abbey which provides to be an excellent venue for this sort of workshop.

The Festival this year offered side-by-side opportunities for outstanding young musicians in an orchestral concert given by Chamber Domaine, including Elgar's cello concerto and Vaughan Williams's Lark Ascending; and Alexander Goehr's Broken Lute with the composer present and providing a commentary on the piece

Other highlights

These included:

- *the Bach violin sonatas and partitas played by Tom Bowes in the Chapel of St Mary's Abbey by kind permission of the Mother Abbess
- *also at the Abbey the Reger cello suites played by Festival favourite Richard Harwood
- *Craig Ogden playing Bach, Dowland and others at All Saints' Birling
- *Sami Junnonen playing Bach, Sciarrino, and Berio in Trottiscliffe church
- *a performance of Messiaen's Quartet for the End of Time in Tudeley church with its wonderful windows by Chagall providing a link with the composer
- *a concert at the Control Tower at Kings Hill, featuring Kodaly

Activity in 2017 (continued)

- *an organ recital in the chapel of Tonbridge School by Kevin Bowyer
- *two jazz evenings took place in St Mary's with James Pearson and his friends and Callum Au's Big Band, and evenings at local hostelries with Lizzie Ball and others
- *our First World War theme continued at the Pilsdon Barn with music by Frank Bridge, Nielsen and others

We were also pleased to help raise funds(£432) for local charities, Pilsdon, Spadework and Dandelion Time by asking for donations in lieu of payment for interval refreshments.

Publicity and Feedback

There was again extensive coverage of the Festival in local media, including Downs Mail, Kent Messenger, Times of Tunbridge Wells; and more widely, The Quarterly Review, Artsdesk (for the third year) and Classic FM(Podcast).

Music at Malling is seeing continuing engagement with our activities online, through our website and through social media. For Twitter, two hundred and seventy five tweets generated 119,895 impression with 231 mentions, 6000 profile visits and 146 new followers, a 15% increase.11,361 people with 570 shares and 290 tweets had a significant response. Our new(2016) website <u>musicatmalling.com</u> enabled us to sell over 70% of our tickets online for the first time. The new site has greatly increased the visibility of the Festival.

Examples of feedback and reaction to the Festival are given below. Feedback was almost universally favourable:

- -[Ogden] presented so well and interfaced with the audience
- -variety of programme, quality of playing
- -[Thomas Bowes] unbelievable music; fantastic playing
- -[James Pearson] the man's a genius
- -[Callum Au] some amazing arrangements
- -[Tudeley] virtuosic playing, lovely venue, the artistry of the players
- -[Pilsdon] very imaginative programme

Sponsorship, funding and going concern

The quality of the programme offered by the Festival is again confirmed by the increased financial support this year from Arts Council England (the third year for which they have supported us), The Princes Charities (the second time that they have given us their important support) The Foyle Foundation, the Whitehouse Monckton Charitable Trust, the RVW Trust, the Cleary foundation, the D'Oyly Carte Foundation and the Ernest Cook Trust.

The continuing level of local support is again demonstrated by the generous sponsorship in cash and kind received from a number of sources. We are delighted that Liberty Property Trust have have continued their involvement for a third year, including our second concert in the Kings Hill Control Tower. We are also most grateful to Tonbridge & Malling Borough Council for their continuing financial and logistical support; to KCC; the Kent Community Foundation; Kent Music/Soundhub Kent; to the Malling Memorial Institute, The Farm House(Elite Pubs) for hosting Classical Kicks; and to West Malling Parish Council, and the Parish Councils at Kings Hill and Mereworth; and to the Malling Lions and Town Malling Club who have all given valuable support. Brookline Coaches have continued their very generous support in providing transport for schoolchildren to St Mary's Church. Other local businesses have given support by way of advertising in the Festival programme and, in the case of West Malling Flowers, also providing beautiful bouquets for presentation to performing artists; and the Bull Inn at Wrotham generously provided accommodation for some of artists.

At this level of funding and support, Music at Malling is a going concern as shown by the attached accounts. The Chairman stands ready to make good any shortfall in funding as has been the case in past years, to ensure that the company can meet its liabilities as they fall due.

Future plans

Planning for the 2018 festival is under way. The schools programme will again be a main focus; we hope to returning to the wonderful acoustics of the Abbey Chapel and the Pilsdon Barn; James Pearson returns by popular demand; the BART churches will again host performances of Mozart and others; and we are planning new ventures and new initiatives. Sponsorship is already being sought and the eventual shape of the programme will reflect our success in raising appropriate funds.

Public Benefit

The Company's stated aims are the advancement of the arts for the public benefit by staging in particular but not exclusively, a festival in West Malling and the surrounding area to promote appreciation of music of the highest standard, and to advance the education of the public in the arts.

The participation of people of all ages in the programme described in outline in this report, supported by our concessionary pricing policy, demonstrates the achievement of these aims; and we will be building further on this in future festivals.

Risk management

The Directors and Trustees confirm that they have carried out a review of the major risks that Music at Malling presently faces, and have considered the necessary procedures to minimise any potential impact should those risks materialise. These include the identification and mitigation of all perceived risk of physical accident to audiences and performers. Financial risks are dealt with elsewhere in this report.

Directors' and Trustees' responsibilities in relation to the financial statements

Company law requires the Directors and Trustees to prepare financial statements that give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Company and Charity at the end of the financial period and

of its surplus or deficit for the financial period. In so doing, the Directors and Trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- Make sound judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- Prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is appropriate to presume that the Company will not continue in business.

Notes to the accounts for the year ending 30 November 2017

1. Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the preceding year.

(a) Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Companies Act 2006 the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities issued in March 2005 and the Charities SORP (FRS 102).

(b) Fund accounting

- unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general activities of the charity.
- restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor.

A large majority of restricted funds is for the schools and outreach programme and for clarity of presentation, only these funds are included in the restricted funds column of the Statement of Financial Activities. See note 2 for further explanation.

(c) incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to, and virtually certain to receive, the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- Voluntary income is received by way of grants and donations and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable
- Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.
- Incoming resources from concerts, music workshops and programme advertising are accounted for when earned.

(d) Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability when incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

- Costs of generating funds comprises costs associated with delivering the Festival and associated workshops. These costs include those which can be allocated directly, principally musicians, and those indirect costs necessary to support them.
- Governance costs Include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity.

2. Donations and grants

Restricted donations in both years relate primarily to the schools/music education programme which includes the composition workshop and the side-by-side concert.

In 2016 unrestricted donations included £4,500 from the Chairman of the Festival.
