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TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 29 JUNE 2021

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 29 June 2021.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019).

Objectives and activities

The objects of the charity are to:

- advance education including the promotion of the understanding of religion, religious diversity and the sacred and spiritual, and
- advance and preserve culture and heritage for the public benefit, including (but not limited to) the provision of a Christian heritage centre in or around Stonyhurst in Lancashire.

The Trustees have focused on making progress to "advance education including the promotion of the understanding of religion, religious diversity and the sacred and spiritual" by creating greater access to the collections of historic and religious artefacts of Stonyhurst College and have raised funds to do this further by creating accommodation and education space for visitors and eventually "the provision of a Christian heritage centre in or around Stonyhurst in Lancashire".

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 17 of the Charities Act 2011, to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission in exercising their powers and planning the activities of the charity, including the guidance "Public Benefit: running a charity (PB2)".

Achievements and performance

Following the outbreak of COVID-19 during the early months of 2020 and the ensuing lockdown, the charity had suspended all in-person activity in conformity with the Government's guidance and legislation. Planning for further in-person activities at the start of our financial year beginning 2020, with the ongoing uncertainties and hesitancy, did not seem a tenable way forward. At the same time, due to the needs of Stonyhurst College – our close neighbour and partner – our wholly owned subsidiary company The Christian Heritage Centre at Stonyhurst Trading Ltd provided hotel facilities to those requiring quarantine at Stonyhurst College, thereby continuing with a stream of income to the subsidiary, which in turn allowed the charity to continue taking its monthly rent from the subsidiary, and for it to continue its charitable activities.

Thus, the charity committed itself to maintaining an online activity for the 2020 financial year. In view of this, the charity did not renew the contract for its second member of staff – an Educational Assistant who had been hired for a year in August 2019, and who had spent much of the lockdown on furlough. The charity instead maintained its one employee, the full-time Director, on regular employment to develop and run its online activities and prepare for a return to in-person operation when the time should come.

Over the course of September 2020 to July 2021, the charity thus delivered a series of online talks during each academic term, and hosted a number of online conferences and webinars. The opportunity presented by this mode of operation was that of expanding its audience and reach in geographical terms. At the same time, the charity invested time and money in redeveloping its website to both bring this up-to-date and facilitate an online-oriented activity. Alongside this, further work was done on the charity's communications and marketing, with the assistance of an external consultant, in order to improve and develop its online reach and presence.

Besides fulfilling its objective of providing a Christian, religious and spiritual education through the online talks to an increased, general audience, the charity engaged with particular audiences that it wishes to support in their own professional career in relation to their faith. The charity therefore also offered online conferences and webinars to particular audiences such as academics, mental health professionals and clergy on topics of interest or relevance to their practice from a faith-perspective.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT) (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 29 JUNE 2021

This period of online activity presented a further opportunity insofar as providing time and opportunity to work on new programmes and in-person activities for the post-lockdown period. In anticipation of a resumption of in-person activity in the summer of 2021, the charity was thus able to launch its unique Christian Leadership Formation programme in January 2021. Amongst the charity's objectives is the provision of Christian leadership training, which resources to date had not permitted the further development of. The launch of this programme, which is offered to students in Sixth Form who are committed to bringing their faith into leadership and public roles, was thus an important step in fulfilling the charity's objectives.

With the phasing out of lockdown in the spring of 2021, the charity was able to confirm the reopening of Theodore House for the summer months, thereby also confirming the running of both the Christian Leadership Formation programme as well as of several other in-person retreats and courses over July and August 2021.

Financial review

The charity has total reserves of £3,734,275 (2020 - 3,799,971) and free reserves after excluding restricted funds and long term loans of £2,235,482 (2020 - £2,454,799). The charity had restricted funds of £261,253 (2020 - £134,219) comprising donations made for the capital development of the Stonyhurst Retreat Centre, and to support staff costs, loan capital repayments, purchase of books, legal and professional fees, and sponsorship of course expenses. The charity intends to hold excess funds for significant periods of time. As the charity continues to grow, it will develop a reserves policy appropriate to its responsibilities and operations.

The charity's total income for the year was £264,075 (2020 - £264,672), comprising donations of £218,506 (2020 - £207,530), rental income of £36,000 (2020 - £36,000), charitable events at Theodore House of £8,366 (2020 - £17,287) and other income of £1,203 (2020 - £3,855). The funds will be used to forward the aims and objectives as detailed in this report.

Total expenditure for the year was £329,771 (2020 - £326,722). The charity made a deficit for the year of £65,696 (2020 - £62,050).

Structure, governance and management

The Christian Heritage Centre at Stonyhurst is a charitable company limited by guarantee incorporated on 6 June 2012 and registered as a charity on 27 September 2012. The Christian Heritage Centre at Stonyhurst was established under a memorandum of association which established the objects and powers of the organisation and is governed under its articles of association dated 6 June 2012.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 29 JUNE 2021

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

The Christian Heritage Centre at Stonyhurst is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is Stonyhurst College, Stonyhurst, Clitheroe, Lancashire, BB7 9PZ.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest \mathfrak{L} .

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Rent has been charged to the charity's subsidiary of £3,000 per month, and is included in the financial statements.

Income from the use of Theodore House for charitable events has been included in the financial statements.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 29 JUNE 2021

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

 Leasehold improvements
 25 years

 Catering equipment
 20% straight line

 Furniture and equipment
 10% straight light

 Computer equipment
 33% straight line

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in the statement of financial activities.

1.7 Fixed asset investments

Fixed asset investments are initially measured at transaction price excluding transaction costs, and are subsequently measured at fair value at each reporting date. Changes in fair value are recognised in net income/(expenditure) for the year. Transaction costs are expensed as incurred.

A subsidiary is an entity controlled by the charity. Control is the power to govern the financial and operating policies of the entity so as to obtain benefits from its activities.

1.8 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

1.9 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 29 JUNE 2021

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

1.10 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.11 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

The charity entered into a loan agreement on the 25 April 2018 with Stonyhurst, a charitable company registered with charity number 1127929 incorporated and registered in England and Wales with company number 06632303, whose registered office is at Stonyhurst College, Clitheroe, Lancashire, BB7 9PZ. The loan is for £1,000,000 and interest is charged is at a rate of 1.75% per annum above Bank of England base rate. The loan is unsecured, per the signed agreement on the 25 April 2018 and the repayment date is the fifth anniversary of the date of the agreement, being the 25 April 2023. If interest is not paid in the specified period, the interest is capitalised and added to the principal of the loan.

The charity entered into a loan agreement on the 9 January 2019 with The Hintz Family Charitable Trust, a charity registered with charity number 1101842, whose registered office is 4th Floor, One Strand, London, WC2N 5HR. The loan is for £200,000 and interest is charged is at a rate of 3% per annum. The loan is unsecured, per the signed agreement on the 9 January 2019 and the repayment date is the fifth anniversary of the date of the agreement, being the 9 January 2024.
