TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

The directors/trustees present their annual report and audited financial statements of The Mitie Foundation ("the Foundation") for the year ended 31 March 2020. This report and the financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the provisions applicable to small companies entitled to the small companies' exemption and in accordance with the accounting policies set out on pages 12 and 13.

The legal and administrative details set out on page 7 form part of this report. The financial statements comply with the current statutory requirements, the Foundation's memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice FRS102. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, in accordance with applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006.

Structure, governance and management

The Foundation is a company limited by guarantee and its directors, for the purposes of company law are also trustees for the purposes of charity law and those who served during the year and to date are shown on page 7. For the purposes of this report they will be referred to as trustees.

The Foundation was incorporated on 15 June 2012, registered as a charity on 6 September 2012 and began its activities on 1 April 2013.

On appointment, new trustees sign a model trustee declaration statement, confirming their eligibility and committing them to giving their time and expertise. New trustees are fully briefed on the objectives of the Foundation and their role as trustees. They are also provided with a copy of the Charity Commission Guidance for trustees and a copy of the Foundation's memorandum and articles of association.

Trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no remuneration or other benefits. Trustees are required to disclose all relevant interests and withdraw from decisions where a conflict of interest arises.

There must be a minimum of two trustees but no more than nine. Up to three trustees may be appointed by Mitie Group plc ("Mitie") by way of written notice to the Foundation. All current trustees have been appointed by the decision of trustees.

The trustees are responsible for determining the overall strategy of the Foundation, however they delegated day to day management responsibilities to Tony Brogden-Ward, up to January 2020 and then Jasmine Hudson from then on. Key management personnel are determined to be the trustees and the Head of the Mitie Foundation. As all Foundation staff are seconded to The Mitie Foundation from Mitie Group plc; no staff, including key management personnel are directly paid by The Mitie Foundation. Employment benefits for the seconded Head of The Mitie Foundation, as key management, are determined through internal Mitie Group plc pay review processes.

The trustees have considered the major risks to which the Foundation is exposed. These have been reviewed and systems and procedures have been established to manage those risks.

Objectives and activities

The Foundation's vision is to raise aspirations and unlock people's true potential. The objects of the Foundation, as set out in its articles of association, are broad, allowing the charity to carry on any charitable activity within the law.

Currently the Foundation has three main objectives:

- > To enhance employability
- > To encourage enterprise
- To inspire young people

Enhancing employability

Helping people with barriers to employment and social mobility is the core aim of the Foundation. The Foundation works in partnership with JobCentre Plus ("JCP") and others, to deliver employability programmes (Ready2Work and Bridge the Gap) which give people a chance to demonstrate their skills, primarily through on the job work experience.

The Foundation uses its relationship with Mitie businesses, clients and suppliers, as well as other organisations to secure appropriate work placements for candidates and helps them seek employment at the end of the course. On all work programmes, candidates receive coaching and support from the Foundation team, specifically focussing on identifying transferable employability skills and making sure their CVs reflect these. The candidates on the Ready2Work programme also benefit from a pre-employment training week, run by the Foundation team, which is designed to clarify workplace expectations and encourage participants to step outside their comfort zone and to develop confidence and communication skills.

Ready2Work programmes improve social mobility in local communities by supporting people with disabilities, refugees, people with convictions and other groups with specific barriers to employment, and is also available to support Mitie employees' friends and family who may have barriers to employment.

Bridge the Gap is our name for work programmes which are run in collaboration with a client or contract team, but broadly follow the Ready2Work format in delivery style.

Encouraging enterprise

In line with the ethos of Mitie, the Foundation also aims to encourage enterprise. The Foundation's employer engagement events, run inside 36 prisons throughout the UK, have been recognised by the MOJ as a useful way to improve employment skills and encourage enterprise amongst serving offenders. Following funding for eight 'Business Challenge Days' in prisons, funded by the MOJ, the Foundation joined a collaboration of like-minded organisations and formed a loose association called Mind the Gap, which sought to support offenders into construction-related employment. Mind the Gap was successful in gaining CITB funding for a three-year project, which involves the Foundation delivering 20 'Business Challenge Days' over the three years. These events are designed to introduce prisoners approaching release to potential local employers, or to support entrepreneurial self-employment aspirations.

This model has been adapted to create 'Employer Engagement Days' which support people with learning and physical disabilities, mental health issues and other disadvantaged groups, into employment or self-employed enterprise.

Inspiring young people

The Foundation's objective to inspire young people is supported by the wider Mitie business; the Foundation coordinates volunteering activity in schools, academies and colleges, helping to inspire the next generation to choose a rewarding career. Activities include Business Challenge Days, World of Work, mock interviews, CV advice, careers fairs; many of which are organised by local Education Business Partnerships, Inspiring the Future and Working Knowledge. The events are often linked to the Foundation's enterprise objectives and the Mitie business is encouraged to consider these events as a future-talent spotting opportunity. The Foundation continued to support Mitie Skills Centres, located at six UK schools, which were established by Mitie as a legacy to the late David Telling, by providing materials and other resources.

The Foundation encourages all Mitie staff to sign up to Inspiring the Future, an organisation who broker links between schools and business employees to give career talks, mock interviews and to become school governors.

Foundation Ambassadors

A network of over 40 Foundation Ambassadors across all Mitie business divisions has been established to help to communicate the Foundation's activities. Many of these ambassadors are also involved in supporting Mitie forums designed to support diversity and inclusion, and have been organised into local networks and effectively act as the Foundation's voice within the businesses, encouraging their work colleagues and in some cases their clients to take part in organised volunteering events.

Public benefit

The trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Foundation's aims and objectives and in planning future activities. In particular the trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the Foundation's aims and the objectives they have set and have therefore complied with the duty in section 17 of the Charities Act 2011.

Taking into account the Foundation's achievements and beneficiaries as described below, the trustees confirm that due regard has been paid to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission.

Achievements and performance

Following a restructure of the Foundation, the team were working towards a new Strategy and focus to become more aligned to the Mitie business and its Social Value commitments. This included working closely with Tony Brogden-Ward supporting with the wider Social Value strategy.

Below are examples of activities during FY20, within the Foundation's Core Pillars.

Enhancing employability

Ready2Work

During FY20, 6 Ready2work programmes were delivered in Essex, Huntingdon, Leeds, London, and Manchester. The team are responsible for the development, management, delivery, data collection and analysis of programmes on a day to day basis. In addition to programme delivery, R2W candidates are offered 1-2-1 support from the team with CV and interview techniques as and when required.

Encouraging enterprise

Foston Hall - Supporting gender equality and STEM

HMP Foston Hall is a women's prison in Derbyshire, aiming to reduce re-offending by encouraging rehabilitation. The concept behind this project began when the Mitie Foundation delivered a "Business Challenge Day" to 36 women with convictions and 18 business volunteers. The Governor Andrea Black was so impressed with the women's business plans that she agreed to turn their ideas into reality and create a mini retail park "built by the women for the women".

The long-term aim of the project was to build a mini retail park in the prison to help rehabilitate these women, and to equip them with employment skills that they can use when they are released.

During Foston Halls 'Big Build' week in March 2019 we had over 30 Volunteers from various parts of the Mitie business, as well as companies that we partner with such as Rolls Royce, Wilmott Dixon and Census Group. Volunteers all came along and rolled their sleeves up to take part in this project. Completing the project in July, It was deemed a success with six retail outlets being constructed and safely secured.

Community

Business Challenge Days were delivered for The Foyer Group residents in Kent. Along with volunteers from the Mitie business, residents were given the opportunity to engage with local businesses, to help increase their employability skills.

Following this, a further 10 days were agreed to be delivered in London and surrounding areas in March 20. Due to COVID-19 this was postponed.

Volunteering

The Foundation manage the volunteering opportunity for Mitie Employees. These opportunities are procured, promoted and managed by The Mitie Foundation. During FY20, 204 days of volunteering were gifted by Mitie Employees to a range of activities across the UK. In March to May the Foundation supported with the essential recruitment on NHS contracts and the temporary hospitals such as Dragon Heart & Headley Court. The team supported with the end to end process, including interview, vetting & onboarding.

We have also developed the Employee Volunteering programme and secured a number of corporate charity partners that we will be supporting.

Financial review

The Foundation received income of £322,288 from Mitie and £9,602 from external sources. This has enabled it to deliver its activities as outlined in the achievements and performance section below and resulted in a deficit of £8,287 (2019: surplus of £1,076). The trustees consider the results of the Foundation to be satisfactory.

The Foundation's policy is to hold no reserves as the operating costs of the Foundation are budgeted within and paid by Mitie. Funding sources are predominately from Mitie, either in the form of company gift or through donations raised through staff initiatives.

As at 31 March 2020, the unrestricted funds held that also described the free reserves of the charity were £38,200 (2019: £46,487).

Statement about fundraising activity

Whilst the majority of the funding for the Foundation is provided by Mitie Group plc, some fundraising activity does provide additional financial benefit.

No professional organisation or individual was used to raise funds, and therefore the Foundation has not felt obligated to subscribe to any fundraising standards, schemes or regulations.

We have received no complaints relating to any fundraising activity, and all transactions have passed through our finance team and we do not approach the general public or place undue pressure on people to give money to the Foundation.

Future Plans

Should we go back to some form of normality, the Foundation will be looking to deliver the following:

- 3 x Ready2Work programmes from September to March Cornwall, Essex and Manchester
- 10 Business Challenge Days for The Foyer group

This is all dependent on restrictions being lifted due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

COVID-19

The COVID-19 pandemic had an impact on our programmes and delivery for the last month of Q4. Due to lock down restrictions our Ready2Work London placements were either ended two weeks early, or for those willing and able, were completed whilst working from home. COVID-19 also had an impact on opportunities for those candidates to apply and gain employment within Mitie, due to recruitment being frozen.

The Foyer BCD's planned to be delivered in March were also postponed and are yet to be rearranged due to the pandemic.

All face to face delivery was put on hold including planned activity for Q1 in FY21.

Going concern

The Mitie Foundation is almost entirely financially supported by contributions from Mitie Group plc. Mitie has maintained a strong set of results during COVID-19, so no impact on current or future contributions is anticipated.

The Foundation may benefit from small amounts of Government funding, launched as a result of the impact of COVID-19 on young people, should the Ready2Work programme be deployed within the time period that this funding is available.

The Foundation has an outstanding debt with The Big Issue and repayment has been delayed as a result of the negative financial impact that COVID-19 has had on the social enterprises responsible for repaying this loan. After the year end a payment of £4,000 has been received and this has been reflected in note 8 of the accounts.

Trustees' responsibilities statement

In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgments and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company [and the group] and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

In so far as the trustees are aware:

- there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's auditors are unaware; and
- the trustees have taken all steps that they ought to make themselves aware of that information.

Pursuant to Section 487 of the Companies Act 2006, the auditor will be deemed to be reappointed and Burton Sweet will therefore continue in office.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the charitable company have been prepared under the historical cost convention, Financial Reporting Standard 102 (FRS102) and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP FRS102), applicable United Kingdom accounting standards and law.

As more fully detailed in the trustees' report, there are no material uncertainties affecting the ability of the charity to continue as a going concern and the financial statements have therefore been prepared on the going concern basis. The charity is a public benefit entity as defined under FRS102.

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. They have been applied consistently throughout the year and the preceding year.

Income

Income is included when receivable. Income from tax that can be reclaimed on donations is included at the same time as the gift to which it relates. Income comprises of:

Donations

Donations are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income, when the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy and receipt is probable.

Donated services and facilities represents the estimated financial cost borne by Mitie in providing seconded staff and other management and administrative services. This value represents the amount that the trustees would pay on the open market for the services and facilities that would

Expenditure

Expenditure is included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis when incurred and includes attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.

Expenditure comprise of the following:

Charitable expenditure - being those costs incurred by the charitable company in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries.

Grant funding of activities - included within charitable expenditure, these are awarded to further the purposes of the charity.

Grants awarded are treated as expenditure and a liability in the accounts as soon as they become legal or constructive obligations. In the case of multi-year grant awards, the funding for all years is immediately recognised unless there are conditions which need to be met by the recipient to enable the release of subsequent years' funding.

Support costs - being costs of an indirect nature necessary to support the activities of the charitable company. These have been apportioned to the Foundation's charitable activities on the basis of direct costs incurred.

Governance costs - being costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity. These costs have been included within support costs.

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Programme related investments

Programme related investments are initially included on the balance sheet at cost. The carrying value is reviewed for impairment on an annual basis.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are expendable at the discretion of the Trustees, in the furtherance of the

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by the donor. Any donations received by the Mitie Foundation which have specified a charitable cause have been treated as restricted and may only be paid to the charities specified.

Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid after taking account of any discounts due.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any discounts due.
