1 Community Project (1CP) in partnership with Lewish Youth Services has been delivering youth activities for young people aged between 8-19 years old, inlcuding up to 25 years old for those with Special Educational Needs (SEN) or disabilities. During the year the project attracted young people from across Lewisham. On average upto 40 young people from various backgrounds attended each weekly session. As a result 1CP has engaged with over 300 young people. The activities included educational, social and recreational programms 1CP provided opportunities for young people to volunteer in the programme, which has enabled young people to gain valuable knowledge, skills and experience. Our core programme is delivered over the weekend where there is a lack of universal youth provisions across Lewisham. This project has given young people a safe space to enjoy activities and has encouraged positive relationships. The project has provided facility for young people to engange in positive activities during the holiday period.

It also benefited the local community through greater community interaction between young people, their parents, carers and partner providers

The director's of the company are all professionals (youth worker, social worker, teacher) who have worked with young people in differents settings and have developed the business model for the project to benefit the wider community. 1CP has been running successfully for over a year and is continuing to grow as we attract on average forty young people per session. This is due to providing activities and provisions that have been requested by the young people, who wish to engage and participate in such activities. Through regular consultations with our young people, we discuss and negotiate the activities that we are able to provide. This empowers the young people to take ownership of the project and strengthens their involvement and participation.

# **Brief overview of 1CP work:**

1CP has been operating since 2011. It has been providing a range of exciting educational, social, recreational and challenging activities for young boys aged between 8-19 (up to 25 for those with SEN or disabilities) years old within a safe environment.

The social activities we deliver are fun days, BBQ, meal out, award ceremonies, events etc. The recreational activities are delivered through multi sports including skating and generic activities. Educational activities are delivered through a range of informal education methods which are both challenging and fun. These include day trips, weekend residential trips to help boost young people's self-confidence and self-esteem, workshops and seminars on tackling current issues and promoting healthy lifestyle and future prospects.

The issues we have identified through our young people include emotional and mental wellbeing, bullying, gang involvement, substance misuse, sexual exploitation, gun and knife crime, unemployment, housing, family breakdown and lack of male role models in young peoples' lives. As we are based in a high risk area, it is vital this project continues to provide provisions to the disadvantaged and deprived young people who are at risk of poor life outcomes.

1CP also has an excellent team of peer motivators who are a positive role model to the young people who attend. The peer motivator scheme for young people 17 and under enables them the chance to help run and contribute to the planning of activities and programmes. Peer motivators are also selected to go on training such as conflict resolution and emergency first aid. Furthermore, 1CP has been working closely with their parents and carers to deliver a range of diverse activities.



We work under the ethos of '1 community' and make best endeavours to ensure that the project allows all members of the community to benefit. As an example of this is, we currently have young people of Algerian, Moroccan, Somalian, Egyptians, Indian, Pakistani, Jamaican, English, etc. backgrounds. We plan to work towards involving other minority groups e.g. Bangladeshi, Tamil, Vietnamese and Afghani etc.

We also have ground rules and group rules developed to ensure young people feel part of the project regardless of their background. We promote equality and ensure our peer motivators and volunteers become ambassadors for our project and attract young people to our project.

Our work allows the above groups to interact better and understand each other's cultures, we expect this to be the case with the parents and carers too

# **Activities:**

## Regular programmes:

1CP holds regular programme every Saturday and Sunday all year round

# Weekly Activities for Boys:

This is run every Saturday from 6pm to 9pm (term time) and 3pm to 9pm (school holidays). The session includes workshops, discussions, indoor and outdoor activities (e.g. football, skating, badminton, table-tennis, basketball, PlayStation, X Box etc.)

### Weekly Activities for Girls:

The girls group takes place every Sunday from 11am to 2pm (term time) and 11am to 5pm (school holidays). The girls group has been set up recently due the demand from the parents and the local young girls who requested we develop a programme for them. We have a dedicated team of female staff and volunteers who are working with the young girls to develop a vibrant package of activities which will suit the needs of the young girls. The activities we are currently providing are multi-sports, arts and crafts, drama, issue based workshops etc. Our half term programme also includes daytrips and we also plan to go on residential during the summer holiday.

# Residential:

We have been on a number of residentials Firstly, we took only the young people away from their comfort zone to help boost their self-confidence and self-esteem Many of our young people have not been outside Lewisham before and this was a great opportunity for them which they enjoyed immensely

The young people are selected by the staff on the basis of their behaviour, timekeeping and attendance alongside with an update from parents and carers. This is where we select future leaders and train them up. It also helps staff to see how young people behave outside of their comfort zone. All our young people will receive in house certificates.



The residentials has enabled young people build trust with the staff team. It has also raised young people's self esteem and confidence. Young people have learnt about team work and working on their own initiative and problem solving. It also helps them to become independent and learn about life skills. The activities also has enabled them to learn about being patience and perseverant.





**Summer holiday scheme:** During the summer of 2014 we delivered a full time programme which included activities such as arts and crafts, issue based workshops, day trips, performing arts (poetry, role-play etc), indoor and outdoor sports activities

# 1CP tea party with parents:

This has been very good as we managed to get a good number of parents and carers to attend and air their views and opinion of what they will like to see 1CP doing, as a result we have adapted a number of activities to suit the needs of our young people, their parents and carers

Moreover, we always try to communicate and meet with the



parents so that we do not work in isolation. Now we invite parents to our major programmes (e.g. award ceremonies and fun days etc.) to come and support us and to share their concerns and good practices.

1CP staff takes the initiative to visit parents as and when required and has proven to be very useful. This helped in developing and strengthening links with parents, the local community and also engaging them with 1CP.

# 1CP regular workshop sessions:

This is done according to young people's age group. We cover different topics according to their understanding and also the time varies according to their maturity. We have covered topics such as identity, drugs misuse, peer pressure, choosing your friends, civic duties, waste management and recycling, etc.

# **Tool Kit:**

We have revised the 1CP toolkit and also updated all the policy and procedures. The following Policies, Procedures and Guidelines are bespoke to the 1 Community Project, Child Protection & Safeguarding policy, Health & Safety policy and Equality & Diversity policy, Anti-bullying policy & volunteer's policy etc.



All of our paper works are in line with the Lewisham Youth Services as we deliver activities in youth services premises These include Briefing, de-briefing, offsite, risk assessment, H&S Check list, CS2 etc

# Volunteers/peer motivator's programme:

We have a diverse age range of volunteers This year we have managed to attract a large number of young volunteers aged between 16-19 years old All our volunteers are DBS checked and have completed a volunteers' application form



# Training for Volunteers:

We have identified their training needs and started to look into training and development. This year we have trained all our volunteers on child protection training. To ensure they are all aware of how to work with young people all volunteers undertook a 'Introduction to Youth Work' training. To ensure they can deliver the workshops themselves we have organised training on delivering learning. Furthermore, 4 of our volunteers are now level 3 qualified in youth work.



## Monitoring information:

We have managed to meet our targets in accordance to our funders need Our average attendance is 40 young people per session at the moment. We also managed to complete 12 case studies and 15 capability wheels

# **Future Plans:**

1CP plans to ensure it retains all the activities that are delivered and also develop new initiatives. For the next financial year, 1CP plans to deliver its programmes term time and holiday periods including continuing its current sessions. We would also like to expand and include a mix session during the weekday.



We plan to continue similar activities for the girls group so that it will attract more young girls from across Lewisham to enjoy and achieve in a safe environment

All volunteers will be given the opportunity to develop their skills and understanding including attending essential training (e.g. First Aid, health and safety at work etc.) Furthermore, we will look into other resources and training for the volunteers

1CP plans to seek further funding to further develop our project into a mainstream youth project
