Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ended 31st August 2022

1. General information

The company is a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is Aspire House, Rear of Front Street, Chester le street, DH3 3RD, County Durham.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with Section 1A of FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland'.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

Revenue recognition

Turnover is recognised on contracts and grants for educational support etc services which have been commenced but have not been completed at the balance sheet date as the work processes.

Income tax

The taxation expense represents the aggregate amount of current tax recognised in the reporting period. Tax is recognised in profit or loss, except to the extent that it relates to items recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity. In this case, tax is recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, respectively.

Current tax is recognised on taxable profit for the current and past periods. Current tax is measured at the amounts of tax expected to pay or recover using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the reporting date.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that are largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

Government grants

Government grants are recognised using the accrual model.

Under the accrual model, government grants relating to revenue are recognised on a systematic basis over the periods in which the company recognises the related costs for which the grant is intended to compensate. Grants that are receivable as compensation for expenses or losses already incurred or for the purpose of giving immediate financial support to the entity with no future related costs are recognised in income in the period in which it becomes receivable.

Grants relating to assets are recognised in income on a systematic basis over the expected useful life of the asset. Where part of a grant relating to an asset is deferred, it is recognised as deferred income and not deducted from the carrying amount of the asset.

Defined contribution plans

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

When contributions are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the end of the reporting date in which the employees render the related service, the liability is measured on a discounted present value basis. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as a finance cost in profit or loss in the period in which it arises.

4. Company limited by guarantee

The company is limited by guarantee. The potential liability of the members is set out in the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the relevant clause is reproduced below:-

"The liability of each member is limited to £1 being the amount each member undertakes to contribute to the assets of the Company in the event of its being wound up while he or she is a member or within one year after he ceases to be a member for: a) payment of the Company's debts and liabilities contracted before he ceases to be a member; b) payment of the costs, charges and expenses of winding up, and; c) adjustments of the rights of the contributories among themselves."

PART 1 - GENERAL DESCRIPTION OF THE COMPANY'S ACTIVITIES AND IMPACT

In this period, we have seen significant growth and development not only in our service delivery, the impact the service has on the lives of women but also the added value we bring to the local community and partner organisations.

At the heart of all we offer within this programme is the Supporting Sister volunteers who are women with lived experience who train to co-produce and deliver peer led services supporting other women. Individual women have benefited from this approach through a variety of person centred, holistic interventions supporting them through difficulties, addressing issue of trauma and the impact of poverty and isolation.

The services include a one-to-one listening service where women can talk in confidence without feeling judged and without a time constraint on how long they can access the services. This enables women to form and build trusting relationships with their supporting sister listener.

93 women have accessed one to one support via the listening service, covering issues of relationship difficulties, mental health, Domestic abuse and sexual violence, issues with alcohol and other form of self-harm. Telephone befriending and financial guidance, access to safe loans, build their credit scoring and save even the smallest amount when they can afford to has also been available. "Aspire is a life saver for me, I don't think I can stress how important it is"

86 women have engaged in various weekly group support sessions to maintain and support their mental health and wellbeing. Specific groups respond to women dealing with trauma as a result of difficult relationships issues, domestic abuse, cohesive control and thoughts of self-harm and suicide. Specific support is also available to older women who are experiencing or are at risk of isolation and loneliness. "It's been invaluable especially connecting and interacting with different people"

Aspire provides a safe space for all women, many who access a number of services and structured, subject specific groups. This informs and enables them to access the support they need to feel more in control of their lives, realising their goals and aspirations.

At the heart of all the delivery is the Support Sister volunteers who undergo an intensive training programme before being able to provide one to one or group support. This covers specific training such as Domestic abuse, dealing with trauma etc but also challenges attitudes and embeds reflective sessions for personal growth and development.

We currently have 24 active supporting sister volunteers. "The sense of purpose, the mutual support, the community, the knowledge that you helping other women improve their lives while improving your own"

Our women's wellness service continues to promote the importance of self-care and is very popular with women saying they value the time for themselves and the attention on their own wellbeing "The wellness sessions has made a massive difference to me and my well-being." Weekly sessions of podiatry and massage promote good mental health, reducing stress and anxiety and promotes and maintains good mobility. 67 women have benefitted from this service in the last year.

We also provide wellness packs for women with financial difficulties, experiencing domestic abuse or at risk. These packs have provided a life line for many women with food, toiletries and household essentials, an individual quoted "Thank you so much the kids wouldn't have had any food or Xmas treats for xmas without this help"

Now firmly embedded in our service development and delivery is regular consultation for women accessing services and volunteers delivering. This has brought out the strengths and skills of the women and creates the sense of "we" are doing and "our services". Focus groups and supporting sister volunteer meetings provide the platforms alongside regular evaluation of

sessions, groups and services. Confidence building is also key to encourage women to share their thoughts and feelings and recognising their views and opinions matter.

The last year has also seen our partnerships develop. This has not only provided funding to part sustain elements of the programme but has also seen recognition for our peer led coproduced approach 2025 from the Police and Crime commission through Ministry of Justice funding for the work we doing around Domestic abuse and sexual violence. We are active partners on the voluntary sector domestic abuse forum for Durham.

Our main successes are always the women themselves who take control of their lives step by step, dare to aspire and reach their goals. Other key successes this year has been our partnership development and securing funding to support elements of the programme.

Our biggest challenge is sustaining the volunteering element as it is recognised there is now a national shortage of volunteers. We do run volunteer recruitment campaigns regularly and generally we run at capacity or near capacity. As there continues to be demand for service we may have to consider increasing staffing to cope with demand. Longer term funding is also an on-going challenge

The company's stakeholders include the individuals accessing our groups and support services. Our volunteers and Supporting Sisters give important and timely feedback from their frontline work in our support groups. We continue to have several methods of consultation including individual evaluation of services, suggestions box, talking board and regular user forums.

The stakeholders are involved with the planning of the Aspire offer and their feedback is used to improve the services and provide new opportunities.

Our Supporting Sisters programme continues to be informed by the volunteers through the structure of a monthly meetings to review and influence planning. We respond to their training needs and develop the provision using their input. We continue to promote our work through social media platforms, our website and attending local partnerships giving presentations. We have also engaged with our local MP recently who very much recognises the impact we make and is support we to find more suitable premises.

Other stakeholders include organisations both statutory and voluntary that refer individuals to the group and support provision at Aspire. Their feedback is gathered through a variety of forums and meetings attended by the staff team. This continues to be used to inform the development of our provision and include local council authorities (including local Area Action Partnerships), Mental Health Alliance Board, Mental Health Provider's Forum, Health and Wellbeing Board, Public Health, North East Women's Network, End Violence Against Women and Girls, Police Crime Commissioner, Ministry of Justice amongst others.
