GROUP STRATEGIC REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 2021

The director presents his strategic report of the company and the group for the year ended 31st December 2021.

REVIEW OF BUSINESS

The group has 3 main trading subsidiaries. MSL is a specialist provider of legal expenses and general insurance products along with associated claims handling services. Dualdrive provides vehicle solutions for niche markets including driving instructors. Supportis provides employment law and health and safety solutions for small and medium sized businesses.

The group continued to operate within COVID government guidelines with a home working environment during the first half of the year before gravitating to a hybrid working model in the second half, with colleagues now working at least 50% of the time in the office.

The impact of the pandemic continued during the first half of the year due primarily to the significant reduction of traffic on the roads leading to fewer accidents, culminating in a fall of 7.4% in income to £6.4m (2020: £6.9m).

Administrative expenses reduced by 17.6% to £5.9m (2020: £7.2m), resulting in a profit before tax of the continuing operations of £381k (2020: Loss £107k), which is an increase in profit of £488k.

As anticipated, the implementation of the Civil Liability Act 2018 ("CLA") on 31 May 2021 (see Regulatory Risk section below for further information) resulted in a reduction in the volume and value of minor personal injury 'whiplash' claims with BTE legal expenses polices now including cover for these and the premiums being adjusted accordingly.

The consolidated balance sheet shareholders' funds have increased by 12.8% to £1.5m (2010: £1.35m).

Turning to the consolidated cash flow statement, the group generated £1.3m cash from operations during the year (2020: £1.6m).

Colleague levels within the continuing group are continually reviewed to ensure maximum efficiency whilst maintaining high levels of customer service and the average colleague numbers were 73 (2020; 87).

The group continues to focus on key areas of income generation and cost control. While, as detailed below, the COVID-19 pandemic and related factors have stalled growth plans for the early part of 2021, the group has resumed a pattern of growth in the business as market conditions allow in 2022.

Finally, we would like to thank our customers and colleagues for their ongoing support of the business and their contribution towards its success.

GROUP STRATEGIC REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 2021

PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES Reserving risk

The group's approach to reserving is based on regular evaluations of historical claims development by type of risk and by major business partner. Previous patterns are used to evaluate expected ultimate claims costs and account profitability with closer monitoring of newer products and partners or those where recent historical patterns give cause for concern. Reserving rates are reviewed regularly by the Board and adjusted as necessary to ensure reserve adequacy.

Credit risk

The risks considered are that a bank or other counterparty defaults on amounts held for or due to the group. The group's exposure to credit risk has been assessed in the context of the credit worthiness of the relevant counterparties and is controlled and managed accordingly. The group's debtor balances are analysed and reviewed on a monthly basis and the outstanding debt due has increased in line with management expectation.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity is not a significant risk to the group; and cash flow projections indicate an expectation that the group can continue to operate within its available banking facilities.

Regulatory risk

The government has introduced the Civil Liability Act, which was implemented on 31st May 2021 and is designed to disincentivise minor, potentially exaggerated and fraudulent Road Traffic Accident related whiplash claims by:

- 1. the introduction of a tariff of fixed compensation for pain, suffering and loss of amenity for claims with an injury duration of between 0 and 24 months;
- 2. providing the judiciary with the facility to both decrease the amount awarded under the tariff in cases where there may be contributory negligence or to increase the award (with increases capped at no more than 20%) in exceptional circumstances;
- 3. introducing a ban on both the offering, payment and requesting of offers to settle claims without medical evidence; and
- 4, increasing the small claims limit for Road Traffic Accident related personal injury claims to £5,000.

The changes will have a significant and material effect in relation to the group's Road Traffic Accident business. The group has been aware of and recognised, for some considerable time, this emerging risk and consequently, in line with its strategic direction, has implemented revised commercial terms with all relevant business partners, which are currently operating in line with forecasts and are continually monitored closely.

FINANCIAL KEY PERFORMANCE INDICATORS

The group income reduced for the year by 7.4% to £6.4m (2020: £6.9m). The group has not lost any major existing clients with the reduction in income being largely due to reduced volumes of road traffic accident claims because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The profit for the year after taxation but before dividends was £322k (2020: Loss £103k).

The shareholders' funds of the group were £1.5m at 31 December 2021 (2020: £1.3m).

The increase in cash in the year was £143k (2020: Reduced £388k).

OTHER KEY PERFORMANCE INDICATORS

There were 587 vehicles on fleet at 31 December 2021 (2020; 592).

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS & GOING CONCERN

The financial statements for the group are prepared on a going concern basis in accordance with UK Generally Accepted Accounting Standards.

The Board remain alive to further disruption arising from the COVID-19 pandemic but is cautiously optimistic we are now over the worst and is pleased that the group met its COVID adjusted budgeted profit target in the year.

As noted above The Civil Liability Act has now been implemented effective 31 May 2021. The group will continue to develop new products and strategies in order to ensure that it is well placed to overcome the challenges posed by the CLA. The group's most recent financial forecasts (including the budget for 2022) account for the impact of the CLA and the group is currently on track to deliver budgeted profit in 2022.

Other than the implementation of the CLA, which the Board believes does not constitute an adjusting event, the Board is not aware of any other material post-balance sheet events.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 2021

The director presents his report with the financial statements of the company and the group for the year ended 31st December 2021.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The principal activity of the group is the provision of legal expenses insurance, claims handling, including first notification of loss, personal injury, medical reporting, rehabilitation, credit hire, credit repair and uninsured loss recovery. The group also provides vehicle solutions for driving instructors and employment law solutions for small and medium sized enterprises.

DIVIDENDS

The total distribution of dividends for the year ended 31st December 2021 will be £150,000.

EVENTS SINCE THE END OF THE YEAR

Information relating to events since the end of the year is given in the notes to the financial statements.

DIRECTOR

N D Garner held office during the whole of the period from 1st January 2021 to the date of this report.

The company has chosen in accordance with s.414C(11) Companies Act 2006 to set out in the group's strategic report information required by Schedule 7 of the Large and Medium-sized Companies and Groups (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 to be contained in the directors' report. It has done so in respect of future developments and financial risk management.

The director is responsible for preparing the Group Strategic Report, the Report of the Director and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Opinion

Extent to which the audit was considered capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud

Identifying and assessing potential risks related to irregularities

- the nature of the industry and sector, control environment and business performance including the design of the company's remuneration policies, key drivers for the directors' remuneration, bonus levels and performance targets;

- any matters we identified having obtained and reviewed the company's documentation of their policies and procedures relating to:
- identifying, evaluating and complying with laws and regulations and whether they were aware of any instances of non-compliance;
- detecting and responding to the risks of fraud and whether they have knowledge of any actual, suspected or alleged fraud;
- the internal controls established to mitigate risks of fraud or non-compliance with laws and regulations;
- the matters discussed among the audit engagement team regarding how and where fraud might occur in the financial statements and any potential indicators of fraud.

1. STATUTORY INFORMATION

Drive Further Limited is a private company, limited by shares, registered in England and Wales. The company's registered number and registered office address can be found on the General Information page.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Going concern

After reviewing the group's forecasts and projections, the director has a reasonable expectation that the group has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. The group therefore continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing its consolidated financial statements.

Basis of consolidation

The group consolidated financial statements include the financial statements of the company and all of its subsidiary undertakings made up to 31 December 2021.

A subsidiary is an entity controlled by the group. Control is the power to govern the financial and operating policies of an entity so as to obtain benefits from its activities.

Acquisitions of subsidiaries and businesses are accounted for using the acquisition method. The cost of the business combination is measured at the aggregate of the fair values (at the date of exchange) of assets given, liabilities incurred or assumed, and equity instruments issued by the group in exchange for control of the acquiree plus costs directly attributable to the business combination.

Any excess of the cost of the business combination over the acquirer's interest in the net fair value of the identifiable assets and liabilities is recognised as goodwill. If the net fair value of the identifiable assets and liabilities exceeds the cost of the business combination the excess is recognised separately on the face of the consolidated balance sheet immediately below goodwill.

All inter-group transactions, balances, income and expenses are eliminated in full on consolidation.

Investments in subsidiaries

Investments in subsidiaries are accounted for at cost less impairment in the individual financial statements.

Significant judgements and estimates

Preparation of the financial statements requires management to make significant judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported for assets and liabilities as at the balance sheet date and the amounts reported for revenues and expenses for the year. However, the nature of estimation means that actual outcomes could differ from those estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if revision only affects that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The following judgements have had the most significant effect on amounts recognised in the financial statements.

Claims

The group uses variety of techniques, both statistical and actuarial, to assess the likely run off of the policies on risk. Monthly management statistics include average claim costs, loss ratios and expected contribution to profit and expenses as well as a number of other parameters.

Bad and doubtful debts

A key area involving management judgement and estimate is in determining the provision for bad and doubtful debts for medical, rehabilitation and completed hire debts due.

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NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - continued FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 2021

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Income recognition

Turnover is measured at fair value of the consideration receivable and represents the total amount receivable for services provided in the normal course of business, excluding Value Added Tax and trade discounts.

Turnover from the rendering of services is recognised by reference to the stage of completion of the contract.

Goodwill

Goodwill arising on the acquisition of subsidiary undertakings and businesses, representing any excess of the fair value of the consideration given over the fair value of the identifiable net assets acquired, is capitalised and written off on a straight line basis over its estimated useful life of 5 years. Provision is made for any impairment.

Intangible assets

Intangible assets are initially measured at cost. After initial recognition, intangible assets are measured at cost less any accumulated amortisation and any accumulated impairment losses.

Software & licenses is being amortised evenly over its estimated useful life of ten years.

Intangible assets - software & licences

Costs associated with maintaining computer software are recognised as an expense as incurred. Development costs that are directly attributable to the design and testing of identifiable and unique software products controlled by the company are recognised as intangible assets when the following criteria are met:

- it is technically feasible to complete the software so that it will be available for use;
- management intends to complete the software and use it;
- there is an ability to use the software;
- it can be demonstrated how the software will generate future economic benefits;
- adequate technical, financial and other resources to complete the development and to use the software are available; and
- the expenditure attributable to the software during its development can be reliably measured.

Other development expenditures that do not meet these criteria are recognised as an expense as incurred. Development costs previously recognised as an expense are not recognised as an asset in a subsequent period.

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NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - continued FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 2021

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life or, if held under a finance lease, over the lease term, whichever is the shorter.

Plant & machinery - 25% on reducing balance and to bring asset in line with market value

Fixtures & fittings - 33% on cost, 20% on cost and 10% on reducing balance

Motor vehicles - straight line to its residual value
Computer hardware & software - 33% on cost and 20% on cost

Tangible fixed assets are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

At each reporting date fixed assets are reviewed to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If there is an indication of possible impairment, the recoverable amount of any affected asset is estimated and compared with its carrying amount. If estimated recoverable amount is lower, the carrying amount is reduced to its estimated recoverable amount, and an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

If an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but not in excess of the amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in profit or loss.

Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans receivable are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method, less any impairment.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and on hand, demand deposits with banks and other short term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less and bank overdrafts. In the statement of financial position, bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings or current liabilities.

Creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other financial liabilities, including bank loans, are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Interest bearing borrowings

Interest bearing borrowings are recognised initially at fair value less attributable transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition, interest bearing borrowings are stated at amortised cost with any difference between the amount initially recognised and redemption value being recognised in the statement of comprehensive income over the period of the borrowings, together with any interest and fees payable, using the effective interest method.

Government grants

Government grants are recognised on the accrual model and are measured at fair value of the asset receivable. Grants are classified as relating either to income or to assets. Grants related to other income are recognised in profit or loss over the period in which related costs are recognised. Grants relating to assets are recognised over the expected useful life of the asset. Where part of a grant relating to an asset is deferred, it is recognised as deferred.

Financial instruments

Financial instruments are classified and accounted for according to the substance of the contractual arrangement, as either financial assets, financial liabilities or equity instruments. An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the Group after deducting all of its liabilities.

The group enters into basic financial instrument transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and liabilities like trade and other accounts receivable and payable, loans from banks and other third parties, together with loans to and from related parties.

Debt instruments (other than those wholly repayable or receivable in one year), including loans and other accounts receivable and payable, are initially measured at present value of future cash flows and subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Debt instruments that are payable or receivable in one year, typically trade payables or receivables, are measured, initially and subsequently, at the undiscounted amount of cash or other consideration, expected to be paid or received.

Financial assets that are measured at cost and amortised cost are assessed at the end of each reporting period for objective evidence of impairment. If objective evidence if impairment is found, an impairment loss is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

Taxation

Taxation for the year comprises current and deferred tax. Tax is recognised in the Consolidated Statement of Comprehensive Income, except to the extent that it relates to items recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity.

Current or deferred taxation assets and liabilities are not discounted.

Current tax is recognised at the amount of tax payable using the tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the balance sheet date.

Deferred taxation

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of all timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the balance sheet date.

Timing differences arise from the inclusion of income and expenses in tax assessments in periods different from those in which they are recognised in financial statements. Deferred tax is measured using tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the year end and that are expected to apply to the reversal of the timing difference.

Unrelieved tax losses and other deferred tax assets are recognised only to the extent that it is probable that they will be recovered against the reversal of deferred tax liabilities or other future taxable profits.

Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Assets obtained under hire purchase contracts or finance leases are capitalised in the balance sheet. Those held under hire purchase contracts are depreciated over their estimated useful lives. Those held under finance leases are depreciated over their estimated useful lives or the lease term, whichever is the shorter.

The interest element of these obligations is charged to profit or loss over the relevant period. The capital element of the future payments is treated as a liability.

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to profit or loss on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The group operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the group's pension scheme are charged to profit or loss in the period to which they relate.

Claims

Claims consist of claims paid to policyholders, changes in the valuation of liabilities arising on policyholder contracts, net of subrogation recoveries.

Provision is made for outstanding claims and settlement expenses incurred at the balance sheet date including an estimate for the cost of claims incurred but not reported (IBNR) at that date. Included in the provision is an estimate of the internal and external costs of handling the claims. Reinsurance recoveries are presented as assets. The methods used and estimates made are continually reviewed and any resulting adjustments are reported in the statement of income in the year in which claims are settled or re-appraised.

Although provisions for claims are based upon the information currently available, subsequent information and events may show the ultimate liability to be greater, or less, than the amount provided. The methods used and estimates made are continually reviewed and any resulting adjustments will be reported in the year of settlement or re-appraisal.

Dividends

Dividends and other distributions to the company's shareholders are recognised as a liability in the financial statements in the period in which the dividends and other distributions are approved by the shareholders. These amounts are recognised in the statement of changes in equity.
