Strategic Report

The Directors present their strategic report along with the financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 December 2017.

Review of business

We aim to present a balanced and comprehensive review of the development and performance of our business during the year and its position at the year end. Our review is consistent with the size and complexity of our business and highlights the risks and uncertainties we face.

The business performed well during 2017 with turnover on continued operations increasing to £1,372,253 (2016: £585,995). The profit before tax totalled to £846,731 (2016 - £222,815).

Principal activities

The principal activity of the business is the provision of services in relation to estate planning, including lasting power of attorney and will writing services

Outlook

The Company extended its offering to include a Will Writing Service and is set to continue its strong growth on the back of growth in associated sales from other group companies and expansion of the Company's self-generated sales.

Principal risks and uncertainties

The principal risk to the business is the reliance on customers using funds released from equity release or pensions to fund the setting up of a lasting power of attorney. Whilst the company offers finance options to make its service more affordable, it is both a risk and opportunity that the turnover of the business is highly dependent on these two markets. The board closely monitor the trading performance of the Company but given the relatively low cost base the risk and uncertainties are relatively low.

The business is also exposed to fluctuations in the core markets of the other companies within the Age Partnership Group.

1 Accounting policies

Age Assist Limited (the "Company") is a company incorporated, domiciled and registered in England in the UK.

The Company is exempt by virtue of present information about the Company as an individual undertaking and not about its group.

The company financial statements have been prepared and approved by the directors in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards as adopted by the EU ("Adopted IFRSs").

The accounting policies set out below have, unless otherwise stated, been applied consistently to all periods presented in these financial statements.

1.1 Measurement convention

The financial statements are prepared on the historical cost basis.

1.2 Going concern

The Company's business activities, together with the factors likely to affect its future development, performance and position are set out in the Directors' Report. The Company's forecasts and projections, taking account of possible changes in trading performance, show that the Company is able to meet its liabilities as they fall due and to continue trading for the foreseeable future. Accordingly, the Directors consider it appropriate to prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis.

1.3 Revenue

Turnover represents net invoiced sales of services, excluding value added tax. Turnover incorporates administration fees relating to setting up of lasting power of attorney and wills and the collection of medical data for pension trustees and are recognised as part of revenue at the point of invoice or completion of works whichever is the latter.

1.4 Taxation

Tax on the profit or loss for the year comprises current and deferred tax. Tax is recognised in the income statement except to the extent that it relates to items recognised directly in equity, in which case it is recognised in equity.

Current tax is the expected tax payable or receivable on the taxable income or loss for the year, using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the balance sheet date, and any adjustment to tax payable in respect of previous years.

Deferred tax is provided on temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities for financial reporting purposes and the amounts used for taxation purposes. The following temporary differences are not provided for: the initial recognition of goodwill; the initial recognition of assets or liabilities that affect neither accounting nor taxable profit other than in a business combination, and differences relating to investments in subsidiaries to the extent that they will probably not reverse in the foreseeable future. The amount of deferred tax provided is based on the expected manner of realisation or settlement of the carrying amount of assets and liabilities, using tax rates enacted or substantively enacted at the balance sheet date.

A deferred tax asset is recognised only to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which the temporary difference can be utilised.

1.5 Financial instruments

Financial instruments comprise:

Trade and other receivables

Trade and other receivables are recognised initially at fair value. Subsequent to initial recognition they are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment losses.

Trade and other payables

Trade and other payables are recognised initially at fair value. Subsequent to initial recognition they are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Investments in subsidiaries are carried at cost less impairment.

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash balances and call deposits. Bank overdrafts that are repayable on demand and form an integral part of the Company's cash management are included as a component of cash and cash equivalents for the purpose only of the cash flow statement.

1.6 Adopted IFRS not yet applied

The following Adopted IFRSs have been issued but have not been applied in these financial statements. Their adoption is not expected to have a material effect on the financial statements unless otherwise indicated:

- IFRS 9 Financial Instruments (effective date 1 January 2018). This is not expected to impact the presentation of the accounts and it has been concluded that application of this standard will have no material effect to the measurement of the carrying amount of assets and liabilities
- IFRS 15 Revenue from Contract with Customers (effective date 1 January 2018). This is not expected to impact the presentation of the accounts and it has been concluded that application of this standard will have no material effect on the timing and measurement of reported revenue.
- Amendments to IFRS 2: Classification and Measurement of Share-based Payment Transactions (effective date to be confirmed). This will have no impact on the financial statements.
- IAS 12: Recognition of Deferred Tax Assets for Unrealised Losses (effective date to be confirmed). This is not expected to impact the presentation of the accounts however the impact is still to be fully assessed.
- Amendments to IAS 7: Disclosure Initiative (effective date to be confirmed). Impact still being assessed
- IFRS 16 Leases (effective date 1 January 2019). This is not expected to impact the presentation of the accounts however the impact is still to be fully assessed.

1.7 Accounting estimates and judgements

The Directors do not consider there to be any critical accounting judgements in applying the Company's accounting policies.

2 Expenses and auditors' remuneration

The Company's audit fee was £4,450 (2016: £3,500).

Amounts receivable by the Company's auditor and its associates in respect of services to the Company and its associates, other than the audit of the Company's financial statements, have not been disclosed as the information is required instead to be disclosed on a consolidated basis in the consolidated financial statements of the Company's parent, Age Partnership Group Limited.

The Group's credit risk is primarily derived from its trade receivables. This risk is managed daily by the Group's credit control function who monitor recovery and ensure that outstanding debts are identified when these become overdue and appropriate action is taken to recover the amounts outstanding.

Due to the wide range of customers, the Group has no substantial exposure to any individual third party in respect of trade receivables.

10 Ultimate parent company and parent company of larger group

The Company is a 100% subsidiary undertaking of Age Partnership Limited whose ultimate parent is Age Partnership Group Limited. The ultimate controlling party remains A R Thirkill who is chairman and majority shareholder of the Age Partnership Group Limited.

The only group in which the results of the Company are consolidated is that headed by Age Partnership Group Limited. No other group financial statements include the results of the Company.

11 Related parties

Identity of related parties with which the Company has transacted

During the year the Company was controlled by A R Thirkill as chairman and majority shareholder of the Company.

The Company had transactions in the year with parent company Age Partnership. The details of these transactions are disclosed below.

Group Companies

All the employees within the Age Partnership Group are employed by Age Partnership Limited and all central services are procured by Age Partnership Limited.

During the year, Age Partnership Limited provided wages, marketing and central services to Age Assist Limited totalling £315,332 (2016: £210,206). At 31 December 2017, the balance amount outstanding was £nil (2016: £226,904).

During the year a dividend was paid of £700,000 (2016: £200,000) to Age Partnership Limited.

ATP Advertising and Marketing Limited

During the year the Group received marketing, media buying and printing services from ATP. The total paid for these services during the year was £656 (2016: £nil). The balance outstanding at 31 December 2017 was £656 (2016: £nil)
