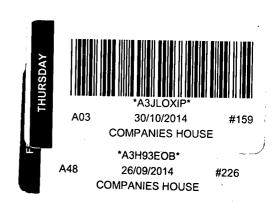

Report of the Trustees for the period 6 February 2013 to 31 December 2013

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the period 6 February 2013 to 31 December 2013. The trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in March 2005.

The charity registered with the Charity Commission on 5 March 2013, Charity Number: 1151075.

INCORPORATION

The charitable company was incorporated on 6 February 2013 and commenced trading on the same date.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

At December 2013, the charity has 4 trustees but a process has commenced to add further trustees in 2013/14. No trustees received any remuneration. The charity is grateful to all the Trustees for the time and financial contributions they give and their overall generous contributions.

The post of Director is filled by Kirstie Sant on a part time contract basis who is supported by employee Programme Manager Sophie Conway and there has been both volunteer and some temporary administrative support in the year.

Induction and training of new trustees

All new trustees are given, in the view of the Board, sufficient training, which, although of an informal nature provides adequate knowledge of their specific field to understand the nature of the charity and fully comply with its objectives and aims.

Organisational structure

Access Aspiration (referred to as 'the charity' in the remainder of this report) is registered with the Charity Commission. Our Memorandum and Articles of Association originally provided for a minimum of two trustees.

The Board of Trustees is required to monitor the affairs and the general business of the charity and meets as required.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charitycharity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

The trustees are aware of the risks faced by the charity and endeavour to deal with those risks appropriately.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Access aims to engage with non-selective state schools in England to deliver interview and employability training, together with aspirational work placements. Access focuses on schools where there is limited existing provision and will work with every student in the sixth form to find a meaningful work experience.

Our objectives are to:

Improve employability of 16-18 year olds.

Increase social mobility

Remove barriers to access to both higher education and employment

Broaden young people's understanding of the workplace

To work with academy and non-selective schools in areas of deprivation

To work with academy and non-selective schools who are improving but not yet at national standards for GCSE or A level.

Public benefit

When reviewing the charity's aims we have referred to the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit.

Volunteers

Access has had a variety of volunteers over the year but has a longer term policy of engaging a cohort of business volunteers to help with the delivery of training in schools, particularly for mock interview training.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

In the charity's first year it has:

- participated at, and provided speakers for, a mass Careers evening at the London Academy for over 1,000 students
- organised a careers talk at the Hertswood Academy for 30 students
- provided interview training for 48 students
- employability and confidence workshops for 116 students and
- arranged work placements for 138 students.

Access has directly and closely worked with 168 students in its first year of operation.

The charity spent the first half of the year engaging businesses and schools to support our programme, developing relationships with a broad range of companies who would be prepared to take work placements.

Access commissioned an active actor led workshop programme to deliver key employability skills with the aid of Helen Temple, a teacher who has worked extensively in using acting to deliver key curricula and two senior actor educators from the National Youth Theatre, Kane Husbands and Cathy Owen. This template was used in schools with young members of the National Youth Theatre to illustrate and develop skills.

Training took place in four schools in the Summer term - schools received either the workshop and the interview training or just the workshop depending on when the schools joined the scheme. Harefield Academy did not take part in the training as they only had three students that they wished to put forward to work placements and Highbury Grove did not take place in the training because they joined the scheme at the end of the Summer Term.

84 young people were placed into business during the Summer Holidays and the October half term and an evaluation was conducted, using on the New Philanthropy Capital templates for work experience, before and after this process. Of the 138 placements offered, 54 were not taken up either because the students did not see them as valuable opportunities or because the students accepted the placements and then did not turn up for a variety of reasons.

The evaluation was broadly positive and the Charity learnt key lessons about programme delivery during the process itself which has made the growth of the charity possible.

Key lessons learnt:

- Training should be available to the entire sixth form whether students intend to do work placements or not. The training makes a difference between a student having the confidence to attend a work placement or not.
- The charity cannot individually match students to businesses but can more broadly target students with broadly relevant interests for opportunities and then put forward committed students to those opportunities.
- The charity will use the workshops in the future to encourage students to take work placements that may not immediately appear directly relevant to their future career or studies as it can also be these opportunities that develop broader social capital, confidence and team skills.
- The charity will develop closer relationships with teachers to also encourage young people to take placements that may not immediately seem relevant.

In November of 2013, Access hosted a roundtable event at the Royal Society of Arts, Commerce and Manufacture (RSA) for some key charities working in this area to try and learn lessons and develop collaborations as part of a funding obligation from the RSA. It was attended by the Sutton Trust, the Ideas Foundation, the Education and Employers Taskforce, The Brightside Trust, Business in the Community, Future First, The Brilliant Club, ARK, Meller Educational Trust, Omnifolio, Plotr, Flip Yourself, U-Explore.com, The Access Project, Royal Society of Arts, Speakers for Schools, Barclays Life Skills, Greater London Authority and NESTA. This was very successful for the Charity and has brokered relationships and partnerships which will prove useful for the future.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Access Aspiration

I report on the accounts for the period 6 February 2013 to 31 December 2013 set out on pages seven to ten.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees (who are also the directors for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this period (under Section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act)) and that an independent examination is required.

Having satisfied myself that the charity is not subject to audit under company law and is eligible for independent examination, it is my responsibility to:

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Companies Act 2006 and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities.

Exemption from preparing a cash flow statement

Exemption has been taken from preparing a cash flow statement on the grounds that the charitable company qualifies as a small charitable company.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
