# TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2015

The Trustees (who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act) present their annual report together with the financial statements of The Shepway Sports Trust (the company) for the year ended 31 August 2015. The Trustees confirm that the Annual report and financial statements of the company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### a. Constitution

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

#### b. Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Trustees are appointed by the recommendation of the existing trustees. New trustees, when appointed will be provided with an information pack including the latest accounts and Memorandum and Articles of Association and will be afforded the opportunity to undertake visits to the premises of the Shepway Sports Trust.

Although no specific training programme exists, most trustees continue to have considerable exposure to educational and charitable matters either through their principal occupation and/or involvement in other charitable institutions.

#### c. Risk management

The trustees have examined the major risks which the charity faces and have put in place systems, policies, procedures and controls in order to manage and mitigate these risks. Appropriate insurances are in place.

The charity is organised with directors and members of the management committee meeting regularly to manage its affairs. There are three members of permanent staff who, together with the volunteers, apprentices and fixed term project staff, manage the charity. Where appropriate, the trustees will act only after taking appropriate professional advice.

### d. Members' liability

Each member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the charity in the event of it being wound up while he/she is a member, or within one year after he/she ceases to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £1, for the debts and liabilities contracted before he/she ceases to become a member.

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### a. Mission

Shepway Sports Trust is a charity based in South East Kent that promotes participation and excellence in sport by creating strong links between schools, clubs and community organisations. The charity aims to provide a holistic approach to sport, creating a foundation for individuals to reach the highest possible level, both personally and in organised competitive sport.

The organisation seeks to do this by:

- Engaging primary and secondary schools by providing access to qualified coaches and mentors and by promoting competitions and other activities
- · Encouraging more individuals to take up sport and recreation and become actively involved in clubs
- · Partnering with community groups to promote greater understanding of the value of recreational sport
- Supporting elite athletes and utilising their skills to inspire others to achieve sporting excellence

By promoting sport in the broader community, Shepway Sports Trust aims to make a significant impact on the health and well-being of people who live in the district. The Trust also aims to establish Shepway as a centre of sporting excellence, as measured by numbers of individuals representing their district, county or country in their chosen sport(s) or by the success of teams competing at regional or national level.

### b. Constitution and principle objectives

The object of the Charity is the promotion of community participation in healthy recreation for the benefit of the inhabitants of the district of Shepway by assisting in the provision of facilities and other services that will enable them to participate in amateur sports. These include, but are not limited to the following:

- · To significantly improve the number of local people, both adults and children, that regularly participate in sport.
- To encourage "not for profit" sports clubs to develop sports facilities that meet the needs of the local community.
- To encourage local schools and "not for profit" sports clubs to support their talented sportsmen and women.
- To create a partnership between Shepway's "not for profit" sports clubs and local primary and secondary schools in order that they share coaching, training, facilities and other resources.
- To have all Shepway primary and secondary schools committed to offering a full and regular programme of organised sport and committing school sports teams to compete in local inter-school matches.
- To encourage Shepway's "not for profit" sports clubs to better meet the needs of the local community and, as a result, increase club membership.
- To develop, over time, a model for the development of sport in Shepway that will appeal to the various agencies/bodies that fund sport.

By way of background, the plan which has been drawn up after a number of consultations with local schools and over 60 sports clubs and after discussions with Kent County Council and Shepway Council, is for the RDHCT to provide funding to act as a catalyst for the co-operation between schools and sports clubs.

To access RDHCT financial support, schools and sports clubs will have to enter into an agreement that will commit the schools to allow participating clubs use of their under-utilised sports facilities and minibuses.

To access RDHCT financial support, the clubs will have to allow participating schools access to their underutilised facilities and provide good quality coaching to support the schools' sports programmes.

Participating schools will have to commit to provide a full and regular programme of organised sport to their pupils and to regularly enter school teams in local inter-school matches.

Shepway's secondary schools have, amongst them, a good range of sports halls, pitches and equipment but they say they often lack the quality of coaching that their pupils require.

Some of Shepway's primary schools have sports grounds but most do not and they all lack the coaches required to provide their pupils a good quality sports programme. They also lack much of the equipment that will be needed or the means of transporting their pupils to and from the sports grounds.

Shepway has a wide range of sports clubs. Many are well run and have good facilities. Some, despite poor facilities, are remarkably successful. Most of them say they need more high quality coaching.

The Shepway Sports Trust acts as the facilitator between all the schools, sports clubs and community organisations.

Clear steps are being taken to achieve this mission:

- Director and Coordinator were appointed to further develop the plan outlined in the strategy document.
- The director appointed a lead member of staff to coordinate the delivery of the primary and secondary school sport competitions and programmes, ensuring excellent communication between schools, clubs and the community.
- The director appointed a lead member of staff to liaise with the clubs to identify the resources necessary to deliver the programme. He will support the clubs to develop strong links with schools and the local community and also support facility development plans.
- The director appointed a Communications Officer to promote the project to the media and general public.
- The director appointed a member of staff to coordinate and deliver community based sports initiatives for young people and ensure there are clear pathways into local sports clubs.
- The director is responsible for overseeing and monitoring the programme's success and to make recommendations to the Sports Trust as to how the scheme should be developed.
- The director is responsible for securing long term financial sustainability for the Shepway Sports Trust and will aim to do so within the 10 year financial plan.

### c. Public benefit

The trustees have considered the impact of the public benefit requirement including the guidance issued by the Charity Commission. The charity aims to actively advance and increase the opportunity for healthy recreation, employment, volunteering and training for the inhabitants of the Shepway area.

### **ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

#### a. Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting Policies.

### TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2015

#### b. Review of activities

The charity incurred a surplus of £30,153 during the year and ended the year with a cash balance of £57,602. This reflects the start up period represented in these accounts and both expenditure and income are likely to increase over time.

The trustees of the charity would like to place on record appreciation of the Roger De Haan Charitable Trust who donated £167,500 to start the charity and cover the majority of its operating costs.

The trustees of the charity would also like to place on record appreciation of its supporters who provided the necessary funding for special projects and to enable the trust to operate. The following is a breakdown of grants received during the year totalling £27,069:

- The charity benefited from a grant from Streetgames UK Limited of £10,500 to support doorstep based sports projects. At the 31st August 2015, £11,238 was carried forward to be used in future periods.
- The charity also benefited from a grant from Shepway Council of £5,000 to support a talented athlete and coaching bursaries scheme. At the 31 August 2015, £1,400 of this grant was carried forward to be used in future periods.
- The charity also benefited from a grant from The Big Lottery of £9,728 to support sports coaching projects. At the 31 August 2015, £8,579 of this grant was carried forward to be used in future periods.
- The charity benefited from a grant from Kent Sport of £1,841, of which £1,376 is to support satellite club projects, this amount was carried forward to be used in future periods.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### a. Reserves policy

The policy of the trustees is to maintain a level of reserves that will be adequate to provide a stable base for the continuing operation of the charity whilst ensuring that excessive funds are not accumulated. In common with many other small charities, the Shepway Sports Trust is dependent on continuing donations from its supporters to enable it to continue its operations. The reserves as at 31 August 2015 amounted to £93,716. Of the reserves, £67,346 are unrestricted general reserves, and the balance of £26,370 are restricted funds.

#### PLANS FOR THE FUTURE

#### a. Future developments

During the coming year the charity will seek to further strengthen its links to the local community. As a new charity its work has continued to expand and be welcomed in schools, local sports clubs and the community. It has continued to exceed expectations of what might be achieved and trustees feel confident that it will become a recognised and appreciated local charity fulfilling its aims. Closer links and synergies are being discussed with major sports facilities and in delivering programmes for other organisations including National Governing Bodies.

In preparing this report, the Trustees have taken advantage of the small companies exemptions provided by section 415A of the Companies Act 2006.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2015

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### 1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are included at market value, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015). The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' published in March 2005, applicable accounting standards and the Companies Act 2006.

#### 1.2 Company status

The company is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the Trustees named on page 1. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the company.

#### 1.3 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the company for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

#### 1.4 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of financial activities when the company has entitlement to the funds, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Donated services or facilities, which comprise donated services, are included in income at a valuation which is an estimate of the financial cost borne by the donor where such a cost is quantifiable and measurable. No income is recognised where there is no financial cost borne by a third party.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Income tax recoverable in relation to investment income is recognised at the time the investment income is receivable.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2015

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

#### 1.5 Resources expended

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been included under expense categories that aggregate all costs for allocation to activities. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular activities they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

Support costs are those costs incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the company and include project management carried out at Headquarters. Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the company and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Grants payable are charged in the year when the offer is made except in those cases where the offer is conditional, such grants being recognised as expenditure when the conditions attaching are fulfilled. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end are noted as a commitment, but not accrued as expenditure.

### 1.6 Going concern

The going concern concept has been applied in the preparation of these financial statements. In common with many small charities, The Shepway Sports Trust is dependent on the continuing support of its donors. The trustees anticipate that the support will continue to be forthcoming over the coming year.

#### 1.7 Cash flow

The financial statements do not include a Cash flow statement because the charitable company, as a small reporting entity, is exempt from the requirement to prepare such a statement under the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015).

#### 1.8 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:

Plant and machinery - 25% on cost Fixtures and fittings - 20% on cost Office equipment - 25% on cost

#### 1.9 Taxation

The company is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the company is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.
