TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

The Trustees (who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act) present their annual report together with the financial statements of West London Zone (WLZ, the charity) for the year ended 31 March 2018. The Trustees confirm that the annual report and financial statements of the charity comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the charity's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

Since the company qualifies as small under section 383, the strategic report required of medium and large companies under The Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Director's Report) Regulations 2013 is not required.

Objectives and Activities

Mission

WLZ serves children with a number of related, unmet needs, who are at risk of negative outcomes in their lives. We provide long-term, preventative support tailored to each individual child through our partnership of Link Workers, charities, schools, families and other community organisations, so that these children get on-track to flourish in adulthood.

"The Zone"

Our Zone is three square miles around the Harrow Road in north Hammersmith, north Kensington, north Westminster, south Brent. It is home to 340,000 people, of which approx. 100,000 are 0-25 years, with a school population of 48,820 children age 5-19 years (1).

It is one of the most unequal areas in the country with entrenched and often hidden poverty. The national borough average for child poverty is 30%, but it is higher than that in all four of our boroughs and on closer inspection, at ward level it is up in the 40%s and 50%s in some areas (2).

Our research on our community and on the impacts of poverty on children in urban areas indicates that up to 12,000 children in our Zone are likely to be 'off-track' with multiple and inter-related needs and therefore at risk of poor outcomes later in life (3). This is 25% of the 5-19 year old population.

Our work

We aim for every child in our area to be on track to flourish in adulthood. We do this by providing an Individual Support Package tailored to the unique strengths and needs of each child and family – because no one child is the same.

Children and young people with a number of related, unmet needs are proactively identified with schools and nurseries via our innovative data- and relationship-driven approach.

With their WLZ Link Worker, each child/family co-designs a package of support from our wide-ranging partnership of over 25 local charities, lasting for two years (or longer if necessary).

The WLZ Link Worker manages their support package with them, their family and the school, to ensure that every child get the right support at the right time in the right way, so that they get the most out of it.

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TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

After two years, if a child has made sufficient progress on all four of our outcome areas (wellbeing, relationships, confidence and progress in school), they complete the programme but we will continue to monitor their development closely to ensure they stay on track – with the option to support them again in the future if need be.

Our long-term; place-based vision is to transform one child's life at a time until we have changed the life chances of a whole generation in our Zone and raised the bar for the next.

Public benefit statement

As required by the Charities Act 2011, the trustees confirm that they have taken into account the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit, where applicable.

The trustees believe there is clear public benefit derived from the activities of the charity and this is demonstrated by our achievements during 2017/18.

Achievements and performance

In the year ended 31 March 2018, WLZ has:

- Continued to deliver its contract according to its terms and targets with the London Borough of Hammersmith & Fulham under a 'Collective Impact Bond' (CIB);
- Signed a new contract with the Royal Borough of Kensington & Chelsea under a CIB and started to deliver it;
- Commenced the rollout our of Early Years pilot programme supported by funding from Trusts and Foundations;
- · Undertaken a range of work to improve our programme design; and
- Developed our growth plan and submission of our bid to the Life Chances Fund to support our scale-up and extend our reach across our whole Zone due on 30 April 2018.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

Improvements to our Programme Design

We worked to improve our delivery model so as to ensure we deliver sustained impact. For example, we tightened our identification criteria, refined our outcomes framework and put more structure into the Link Worker role as well as into the management of each child's Individual Support Plan.

London Borough of Hammersmith & Fulham (LBHF) CIB

The existing LBHF contract is for 3 cohorts of 540-660 children over 4 years from academic year 2016/17 – 2019/20. During the year we continued to work with the remainder of the cohort 1 intake of 132 children who commenced in September 2016. We achieved an impressive 85% engagement rate for our second and third engagement payment milestones in 2017/18 – an even higher achievement than our high case predictions. Final outcomes data for the LBHF cohort 1 is being collected and evaluated this Autumn.

In addition, our identification process has successfully generated a cohort 2 total of 256 children who we commenced support with in September 2017. We worked in 12 school settings.

Royal Borough of Kensington & Chelsea (RBKC) CIB

We signed a new contract with RBKC on 23 November 2017 to support 160 children over 2 cohorts commencing in academic years 2017/18 and 2018/19 respectively. Our identification process successfully generated a total of 90 children in 3 school settings for the first of these cohorts in academic year 2017/18.

A loan was agreed with Bridges Fund Management of £200,000 to support the delivery of this second outcomes contract and was formalised in April 2018.

Early Years pilot programme

We have continued the design our Early Years programme and we rolled out provision in two Early Years settings for children aged between 0-5 years, with programmes designed to benefit the whole class and with 19 children having Individual Support Plans.

During the year we have been successful in securing funding of over £500,000 over the next three years towards the delivery of supporting in excess of 225 children.

Life Chances Fund (LCF) bid submission

We were successful in securing a Development Grant from LCF in 2017 to support us to design our scale-up CIB and make a full application to the LCF with a deadline of 30 April 2018.

During the year we developed a growth plan across four boroughs – including our two existing boroughs of LBHF & RBKC and two new boroughs, Westminster & Brent. Our work to develop our submission to the LCF included a detailed analysis of need across the four boroughs and financial modelling around the delivery of key impacts to significantly improve the life chances of over 2,200 children across these boroughs. Rollout is planned across four (2 year) cohorts commencing in September 2019 until August 2024.

We were informed in August that our bid was successful in securing up to £4.2m in LCF funding which could leverage a further £10m in funding across the local authorities, schools and philanthropy.

Financial review

The Statement of Financial Activities for the year ended 31 March 2018 shows a total income of £1,402,783 total expenditure of £1,072,328 and a surplus for the year of £330,455.

As described in the 'Achievements & Performance' section, WLZ have been successful in operating a 'Collective Impact Bond' (CIB) and income directly attributable to this is shown under charitable activities; associated philanthropic income is recorded in donations.

Income for the year was 16.8% higher than the previous year. Income from donations amounted £811,405 and income from CIB more than doubled from £246,024 to £591,329. Expenditure rose by £399,177 (59.2%).

The net increase in the cash held by the charity was £265,395. The cash balance of £1,227,820 includes a loan from Bridges Fund Management of £350,000 with respect to the LBHF contract and £150,000 held as security against the Bridges loan.

Reserves policy

In the trustees' view, the reserves should provide the charity with adequate financial stability and the means for it to meet its charitable objectives for the foreseeable future. The trustees propose to target the charity's reserves at a level that is at least equivalent to six months operational expenditure and will do so having regards to its manner of operation of likely funding streams. The current unrestricted reserves are adequate for this purpose.

As stated above the designated fund of £150,000 is held as security against the Bridges loan.

Structure, governance and management

Members' liability

The Members of the charity guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charity in the event of winding up.

Constitution

WLZ is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association on 10 April 2014 and amended 15 October 2015.

The charity is constituted under a Memorandum of Association dated 10 April 2014 and amended 15 October 2015 and is a registered charity, number 1160947.

The principal object of the charity is to promote the care and upbringing of every child and young person at risk of poor outcomes in later life who lives in or has a close connection to the West London Zone, by supporting positive family relationships, advancing education, promoting health and otherwise making the most of each such child and young person's potential.

There have been no changes in the objectives since the last annual report.

Method of appointment or election of Trustees

The management of the charity and the fulfilment of its charitable objects is the responsibility of the trustees, who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Articles of Association.

The charity's trustees are also its members and appoint new members.

TRUSTEES' REPORT (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

Organisational structure and decision making

The Trustees met as a Board four times during the year. With the appointment of a new Chair, Sir Harvey McGrath on 24 April 2018 it has been resolved for the Board to meet six times per annum. Other changes in the Board are set out on page 1.

Louisa Mitchell is the Chief Executive Officer (CEO) and she leads the Senior Management Team (SMT) comprising the Chief Operating Officer, a Development Director and an external Finance Director. The SMT has been and is gradually being strengthened according to the growth and development of WLZ.

The Trustees have delegated the day to day management of WLZ to the SMT. The CEO and the SMT attend Board meetings.

All Trustees give of their time freely and no Trustee remuneration was paid during the year. Details of Trustees expenses and Related Party transactions are set out in notes 2, 11 and 27 of the financial statements.

Risk management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the charity, and are satisfied that systems and procedures are in place to mitigate our exposure to the major risks.

Plans for future periods

During the forthcoming year we intend to:

- Continue to work successfully within our current LBHF & RBKC contracts meeting delivery and progress milestones targets to generate revenue;
- · Raise sufficient amounts of philanthropy to fund our delivery and ensure reserves are adequate;
- Continue to make improvements & refinements on the partnership work to ensure it provides the necessary range and quality of support for WLZ children and young people;
- Procure and implement a new data system and analysis tools for monitoring performance and driving improved outcomes; and
- · Complete successful contract negotiations to expand our reach across the Zone.

Trustees' responsibilities statement

The Trustees (who are also directors of West London Zone for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

1. Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

West London Zone meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

1.2 Company status

The company is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the trustees named on page 1. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the company.

1.3 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Investment income, gains and losses are allocated to the appropriate fund.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

1. Accounting policies (continued)

1.4 Income

All incoming resources are recognised in the statement of financial activities, before deduction of the associated expenditure, when the charity has entitlement to the income, any performance conditions attached to the income have been met, receipt of the income is probable and the amount of income receivable can be measured with sufficient reliability.

For grants that are related to performance and specific deliverables, income is recognised as the charity earns the entitlement to the funds by its performance, in accordance with contractual agreements. Income received in advance of performance of service is deferred until the criteria for income recognition are met. Grants that do not impose specified future performance-related conditions on the charity are recognised in income when the resources are received or receivable. Grants from governments, agencies and foundations, corporates and trusts are recorded as 'Income from charitable activities' where these grants specifically outline the services to be provided to beneficiaries. Grants from institutions, corporates and major donors that provide core funding, or are of a general nature, are included in 'Income from donations and legacies'.

Donated services or facilities are recognised when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use of the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Other income is recognised in the period in which it is receivable and to the extent the goods have been provided or on completion of the service.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2018

1. Accounting policies (continued)

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Costs of generating funds are costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, and those incurred in trading activities that raise funds.

Charitable activities and Governance costs are costs incurred on the company's operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the company apportioned to charitable activities.

Grants payable are charged in the year when the offer is made except in those cases where the offer is conditional, such grants being recognised as expenditure when the conditions attaching are fulfilled. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end are noted as a commitment, but not accrued as expenditure.

All expenditure is inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

1.6 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of financial activities incorporating income and expenditure account.

Tangible fixed assets are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:

1.7 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the company; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

1.8 Operating leases

Rentals under operating leases are charged to the Statement of financial activities incorporating income and expenditure account on a straight line basis over the lease term.

1.9 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

1.10 Cash at Bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

1.11 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the charity anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within interest payable and similar charges.

1.12 Financial instruments

The company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

1.13 Government grants

Government grants relating to West London Zone's Collective Impact Bond project are credited to the Statement of financial activities incorporating income and expenditure account as the related expenditure is incurred.

1.14 Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the company to the fund in respect of the year.

As stated in previous year's annual trustees' report a loan of £350,000 was taken out to support West London Zone's Collective Impact Bond (CIB). This loan is secured by a fixed charge over its Security Bank Account. The amount held in this account is £150,000, which represents the amount of grant income received from Stepping Stones funding from City Bridge Trust, the City of London Corporations charity.

The loan is split into an A Loan and B Loan.

The A Loan totals £262,500. No interest is charged on this amount and it is repayable on the earlier of 31 March 2022 and the termination date.

The B Loan totals £87,500 and is repayable on the termination date. The repayment of this loan is wholly based on a revenue share and below certain revenues no payment would be due. There are three methods of computing the revenue share:

- a share based on certain targets not being achieved within a defined time-period;
- a share based on West London Zone repaying the loan early; and
- a share based on the cumulative revenue achieved over the lifetime of the projects being financed.

This year, incorporating some programme changes into the LBHF contract, the charity is on track to achieve the targets within the defined time period.

The performance linked payment, representing the amount payable in excess of the loan advanced, is computed based on the cumulative revenue expected to be achieved over the lifetime of the projects (see Note 19).

Termination date is defined as the date on which the lender has confirmed no further payments are required to be made in respect of Milestones achieved under any of the Outcomes Contract, the School Agreements, the Philanthropist Agreements and the CBOF (Commissioning Better Outcomes Fund) Grant. Under the terms of these contracts the earliest termination date will be between 2 - 5 years from 31 March 2018.
