The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 April 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

The objects of the charity are specifically restricted to the following:

- (1) the prevention or relief of poverty by providing grants, items and services to individuals in need and / or charities, or other organisations working to prevent or relieve poverty;
- (2) for the public benefit to promote the education (including social and physical training) of people in such ways as the trustees think fit and in particular (but without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing) education relating to science, technology and culture; and
- (3) such other charitable purposes as the trustees in their absolute discretion decide.

#### Significant activities

The significant activities undertaken during the year are outlined in detail under the Charitable Activities heading.

#### **Public benefit**

The trustees believe they have complied with the duty in section 17(5) of the Charities Act 2011, to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission.

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

#### Charitable activities

FSTC UK has embarked upon a number of charitable and cultural activities that are project specific. Here is a summary of each project.

#### 1.Balanced Education

A major initiative was launched on enriching Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) courses in high schools and universities. The initiative builds on previous research conducted by Foundation Scholars and Associates and implemented in the UK with schools as part of a joint project sponsored by the National Curriculum Authority, England. The resources for teachers and lecturers were developed for Physics, Maths, Engineering, Chemistry and Biology. These resources contain anecdotes from the scientific contributions of early men and women from various cultures. The aim is to make these subjects culturally sensitive, as at present hardly any mention of names of scientists from non-European cultures. This is achieved by introducing anecdotes from various cultures through Teacher Training courses, development of university single optional modules, conferences and online dissipation.

Various activities took place in few countries such as:

#### Pakistan

Because of the high originally Pakistani population in the UK, it was decided to set up a project to introduce this scheme in Pakistan. A successful fund-raising event was organised on 21 April 2018 and the modest funds raised was dedicated to the promotion of Balanced Education in Pakistan by developing a course entitled "Science From All" for collaboration with educational institutions.

A delegation from FSTC (Prof. Salim Al-Hassani, Dr Zubair Bandukda visited Pakistan to give lectures, participate in seminars and workshops at educational institutions in Karachi, Lahore and Islamabad. The aims were to promote Balanced Education and inspire and empower young Pakistanis to learn about their scientific heritage and to participate in the development of Pakistani society through following exemplar models of men and women of science from Muslim civilisation.

#### Turkey

Continued collaboration with MEDIPOL with whom there is an MoU on the enrichment of courses with contributions from various civilisations. A new relationship is established with Istanbul Academy on developing educational resources in Turkish language. KIRIKALE University, Ankara organised a conference commemorating late Prof. Fuat Sezgin to Prof. Salim Al-Hassani and Prof. Talip Alp were invited as keynote lecturers.

A series of lectures were given by Prof. Talip Alp (Fellow of FSTC) to secondary schools and colleges across Turkey. Prof. Salim Al-Hassani joined Prof. Talip Alp in one of these lecture tours to South East Turkey, visiting Cizre the birthplace of the famous historical inventor, Al-Jazari. These lectures aimed to promote the objectives of FSTC Charity and in particular to inspire disadvantaged children to study sciences.

#### Africa

An MOU is agreed with Ilorin University, Nigeria to introduce Science Heritage in science courses

Dr Abdullah Jibril Oyekan Pro-Vice Chancellor have visited the Foundation in Manchester. Prof. Mukhtar Bunza of
Sokoto university continues to liaise with the Foundation on matters relating to enrichment of science courses in
Nigerian schools.

A close collaboration is established with Education Relief Foundation, on the promotion of Balanced and Inclusive Education. Dr Anne-Maria Brennan represents FSTC in a series of conferences around the world, she is nominated to participate at the next conference which will be held in Djibouti.

#### Morocco

Collaboration continues with the university of The Universite' Sidi Mohammed Ben Abdellah, Fez on:

- " joint conferences on the history of Medicine and Healthcare
- " carrying out research into historical the Bou Anania water clock of Fez
- " researching into the history of education at the ancient Al-Qarawiyin university. .

#### Indonesia

Through the activities of Dr Riza Wahono, Associate Fellow of FSTC, a number of events and activities were organised which aimed at inspiring young Indonesians to be innovative and participate positively in the development of Indonesian society. He had organised the translation of the book, 1001Awesome Facts into Indonesian language.

#### 2.1001Cures

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

#### Charitable activities

After the launch of the 1001 cures book at the Royal Society, a copyright agreement was established with the University of Manchester to enable the university to use the 1001 Cures book as a textbook in a new distant learning CPD course on Muslim Medical Heritage. The course leader is Prof. Peter Pormann. The principles items of this agreement is agreed and the course will eventually commence in the next academic year. A new website was developed to promote the project, see 1001 cures.net.

A close collaboration is established with the British Islamic Medical Association on the promotion of Islamic medical heritage. The 1001cures project is led by Dr Sharif Kaf al-Ghazal and Dr Anne-Maria Brenan.

#### 3. Managing and Editing the MuslimHeritage. Com Web Site

A new website platform had to be developed to upgrade the present one, especially that it became vulnerable to repeated virus attacks. A new web-development company was chosen, and the work has commenced for design and migration of the content. The management team, led by Dr Savas Konur, have been actively engaged with numerous reputable science historians who agreed to support the website by writing articles and assisting in refereeing papers submitted to the website.

Alongside this website the Foundation established presence in social media

#### 4.Books

The Foundation commissioned the writing of a Book on Women of Science, Medicine and Management, by Prof. Salim Al-Hassani, who is authoring it When the book is published its revenue will go to the Foundation. voluntarily. There is revenue coming from the sale of the eBook version of the 4th edition of the 1001 inventions book.

Books distribution and sale continued. Of particular mention is a large order for 1001 inventions books came from Bangladesh and for 1001 cures from Saudi Arabia.

#### **5.1001Sports**

A new initiative is being developed on sports in heritage of various cultures. The aim is to promote inter-cultural understanding through the history of sport games. Research into the history of sports in Muslim civilisation is under way. A project is developed for producing a stream of Interviews with Sports Celebrities. These interviews will be posted in MuslimHeritage.com website and through social media. The is being led by Bryan Burgess and Kaleem Husain (both associates of FSTC) assisted by David Artingstal and Yassir Salem.

#### 6.Parliamentary and Scientific Committee

The Foundation participated as a member of the Parliamentary and Scientific meetings. The delegate representing the Foundation is Dr Anna-Maria Brenan, member of the Board of Trustees who attended regular meetings and events.

#### **Fundraising activities**

No public fund raising events were organised but various approaches were made to supporters and sympathisers. A number of volunteers joined giving their support in kind and laying out their own time and not claiming expenses. It is intended to utilise the newly updated muslimheirtage.com website for raising funds.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### Financial position

The bank balance at the Year End was £39,858 (2018 - £54,833)

This has been received from donations and grant from companies and individuals. This will help towards the running of the charity to enable it to deliver its mission.

#### Reserves policy

Reserves at this stage are all general funds and are held in the bank current account. As at the reporting date the general reserves amounted to £44,284 (2018 - £61,906)

#### **FUTURE PLANS**

- The charity propose to carry on with the projects that began in 2019 and to spread more awareness of their campaign, provide education to the poor, refugees and all walks of life internationally.
- Will collaborate with Education Partnerships UK to develop a new course entitled "Science from All"
- Will hold two consecutive talks on the notion of "Scholarship, Science & Technology in Sub Saharan Africa.
- Will participate at the Cheltenham Festival.
- Will complete the website and create online social media based fund raising strategies including crowdfunding.
- Will carry out workshops at FSTC House and externally in schools, universities in the UK and Internationally.
- Hold Charity Dinners and awareness events and gain sponsors at such events.
- Create heritage products to be sold alongside sales of publications.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

#### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Trustees when complete consist of 3 individuals over the age of 18, all of whom must support the charities objectives.

If there is a vacancy in the number of Trustees, the Trustees may only act to appoint additional Trustees in accordance with the Articles.

#### Organisational structure

There are five Trustees, one of which Mr Eric Peter Fell, who is Chair.

#### **Decision making**

All decision making is undertaken by the Trustees.

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### **Presentational Currency**

The presentational currency of the financial statements is Pound Sterling  $(\pounds)$ .

#### Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charity has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemption in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

- the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Computer equipment

- 33% on cost

#### Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

#### Foreign currencies

Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rate of exchange ruling at the date of transaction. Exchange differences are taken into account in arriving at the operating result.

#### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
