1 Introduction and Statutory Information

- 1.1 I, J N Bleazard of XL Business Solutions Limited, Premier House, Bradford Road, Cleckheaton, BD19 3TT, was appointed as Liquidator of Robin Oliver Construction Limited (the Company) on 9 June 2021. This progress report covers the period from 9 June 2021 to 8 June 2022 (the Period) and should be read in conjunction with any previous progress reports which have been issued.
- 1.2 Information about the way that we will use, and store personal data on insolvency appointments can be found in the Privacy Notice at www.xlbs.co.uk. If you are unable to download this, please contact us and a hard copy will be provided to you.
- 1.3 The principal trading address of the Company was Unit 21 Grange Lane Ind Est, Stairfoot, Barnsley, S71 5AS.
- 1.4 The registered office of the Company has been changed to Premier House, Bradford Road, Cleckheaton, BD19 3TT and its registered number is 09505112.

2 Receipts and Payments

2.1 At Appendix A is my Receipts and Payments Account covering the Period of this report.

3 Progress of the Liquidation

3.1 This section of the report provides creditors with an update on the progress made in the liquidation during the Period and an explanation of the work done by the Liquidator and his staff.

Administration (including statutory compliance & reporting)

- 3.2 An office holder must comply with certain statutory obligations under the Insolvency Act 1986 and other related legislation. Details about the work I anticipated would need to be done in this area was outlined in my initial fees estimate/information which was previously agreed by creditors.
- 3.3 Where the costs of statutory compliance work or reporting to creditors exceeds the initial estimate, it will usually be because the duration of the case has taken longer than anticipated, possibly due to protracted asset realisations, which have in turn placed a further statutory reporting requirement on the Liquidator.
- As noted in my initial fees estimate/information, this work will not necessarily bring any financial benefit to creditors but is required on every case by statute.

Investigations

- 3.5 Some of the work Liquidators are required to undertake is to comply with legislation such as the Company Directors' Disqualification Act 1986 (CDDA 1986) and Statement of Insolvency Practice 2 Investigations by Office Holders in Administration and Insolvent Liquidations and may not necessarily bring any financial benefit to creditors, unless these investigations reveal potential asset recoveries that the Liquidator can pursue for the benefit of creditors.
- 3.6 I can confirm that I have submitted a report on the conduct of the Directors of the Company to the Department for Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy under the CDDA 1986. As this is a confidential report, I am unable to disclose the contents.

3.7 Shortly after appointment, I made an initial assessment of whether there could be any matters that might lead to recoveries for the estate and what further investigations may be appropriate. This assessment took into account any information provided by creditors. My investigations have not revealed any issues requiring further report or any further potential recoveries which could be pursued for the benefit of creditors.

Realisation of Assets

Cash In Hand

- 3.8 According to the director's statement of affairs the Company held cash in hand which had an estimated realisable value of £4,500. Following my appointment as liquidator requested the funds from the director and I can confirm that this sum has been realised in full.
- 3.9 It is not anticipated that the work the Liquidator has carried out to deal with the Company's assets will provide a financial benefit to creditors. This is because either the value of the assets was insufficient to produce a financial benefit after the associated costs of realisation were taken into consideration, or because there were no assets owned by the Company in accordance with the Company's statement of affairs that could be realised for the benefit of creditors.

Creditors (claims and distributions)

- 3.10 Liquidators are not only required to deal with correspondence and claims from unsecured creditors (which may include retention of title claims), but also those of any secured and preferential creditors of the Company. This may involve separate reporting to any secured creditor and dealing with distributions from asset realisations caught under their security, most typically a debenture.
- 3.11 Since 1 December 2020, claims from preferential creditors now fall into one of two categories, either ordinary (typically involving employee claims and payments made on behalf of the Company by the Redundancy Payments Service following dismissal, which rank equally among themselves), or secondary (which are claims by HMRC for VAT or other relevant tax deductions such as PAYE and employee NIC deductions, together with student loans and CIS deductions, which also rank equally among themselves). Ordinary preferential claims rank ahead of secondary preferential claims and all preferential creditors must be paid in full before any distribution can be made to the unsecured creditors of a company.
- 3.12 Work undertaken by a Liquidator in dealing with a company's creditors may only therefore bring a financial benefit to certain classes of creditor such as a secured creditor or the preferential creditors, however a Liquidator is required by statute to undertake this work. Similarly, if a distribution is to be paid to any class of creditor, work will be required to agree those claims and process the dividend payments to each relevant class of creditor. The more creditors a company has, the more time and cost will be involved by the Liquidator in dealing with those claims.
- 3.13 More information on the anticipated outcome for all classes of creditor in this case can be found in Section 4 below.
- 3.14 At this stage, I consider the following matters worth bringing to the attention of creditors:
 - There are approximately three unsecured creditors in this case with a value per the director(s) statement of affairs of £55,600

Matters still to be dealt with

3.15 I am in the process of finalising my administration in this matter and will shortly be in a position to discharge the costs of the liquidation.

- 3.16 In addition, once the final VAT has been received I will discharge the remaining costs of the liquidation, complete the final tax return and request vat and tax clearance.
- 3.17 Once clearance has been granted I will write to creditors with my final progress report in order to vacate office and obtain my release as liquidator of the Company.

4 Creditors

Unsecured Creditors

- 4.1 The Company's statement of affairs indicated there were three creditors whose debts totalled £55,600. To date, I have received one claim totalling £5,000.
- 4.2 I would confirm that it is anticipated there will be insufficient funds realised after defraying the expenses of the liquidation to pay a dividend to unsecured creditors.

5 Liquidator's Remuneration

- The Creditors approved that the basis of the Liquidator's remuneration be fixed by reference to the time properly spent by him and his staff in managing the Liquidation. My fees estimate/information was originally provided to creditors, when the basis of my remuneration was approved and was based on information available to me at that time.
- 5.2 A copy of my approved fees estimate for the liquidation is reproduced below:

- My time costs for the Period are £3,334. This represents 21.60 hours at an average rate of £154.35 per hour. Attached as Appendix B is a Time Analysis which provides details of the activity costs incurred by staff grade during the Period in respect of the costs fixed by reference to time properly spent in managing the liquidation. To date, £1,515 plus expenses shown in the enclosed Receipts and Payments Account has been drawn on account.
- 5.4 At the date of this report, I would confirm that my fees estimate for the liquidation remains unchanged and I currently anticipate that the total amount that will be paid to my firm in respect of the time costs incurred will be £2,260. Where this amount is less than my overall fees estimate, it may be that my fee recoveries will be restricted as a result of the funds available in the liquidation, which will prevent my time costs being recovered in full.
- In accordance with a resolution passed by correspondence, creditors authorised the sum of £1,500 plus disbursements plus VAT to be drawn in respect of the preparation of the statement of affairs and seeking a decision of creditors on the nomination of a liquidator. I can advise that this amount has been drawn in full.
- 5.2 In addition, creditors authorised the sum of £500 plus VAT to be paid to Brearley Accountants for their assistance in the preparation of the statement of affairs. This amount has been paid in full.

6 Creditors' Rights

- 6.1 Within 21 days of the receipt of this report, a secured creditor, or an unsecured creditor (with the concurrence of at least 5% in value of the unsecured creditors) may request in writing that the Liquidator provide further information about his remuneration or expenses which have been itemised in this progress report.
- Any secured creditor, or an unsecured creditor (with the concurrence of at least 10% in value of the unsecured creditors) may within 8 weeks of receipt of this progress report make an application to court on the grounds that, in all the circumstances, the basis fixed for the Liquidator's remuneration is inappropriate and/or the remuneration charged or the expenses incurred by the Liquidator, as set out in this progress report, are excessive.

7 Next Report

- 7.1 I am required to provide a further report on the progress of the liquidation within two months of the next anniversary of the liquidation, unless I have concluded matters prior to this, in which case I will write to all creditors with my final account.
