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# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2020

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2020. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

The Bursledon Brickworks Museum Trust is a Company Limited by Guarantee and was registered as a charity by the Charity Commission on 4 November 2016. A lease with the owners of the site The Hampshire Buildings Preservation Trust ("HBPT") was signed on 18 January 2017, effective from 1 April 2016.

The Trust continues to engage in the conservation of the buildings and promotion of the Brickworks Museum as a visitor attraction.

The Museum had a very challenging year in 2020 with the Covid-19 pandemic restrictions in the UK being introduced in March at the time for normal seasonal opening of our heritage attraction to the general public. These restrictions of course continued throughout the remainder of the year in various forms allowing just occasional short periods when access to the public was permitted in small numbers. As well as the general public the Covid-19 restrictions also impacted severely on the staff and significant volunteer workforce who were unable to access the site and perform much needed projects and tasks.

Visitor numbers were consequentially low in the year but social media played a very significant part in continuing to raise the profile of the Museum and in providing education and events for the public.

When access was permitted for volunteers some smaller projects were progressed which had grant funding and these included: improvements to the shop and main entrance, adding two more rooms to the workers' cottages display, a WW1 project and it's influence on the working men and women in the area, interpretation of the growing display of bricks, the reconstruction of part of the Pycroft Brickworks, and the development of a new miniature railway which will offer rides to visitors. Costumed interpretation also took place in 2020 which proved to be popular with visitors and the intention is to repeat this for 2021.

The New Foundations Project continued during the year with support from consultant help with building design, business planning and fundraising and culminated in a round 2 application to the National Lottery Heritage Fund in November 2020. Unfortunately we were advised in March 2021 that we were unsuccessful in receiving a grant award at this time, and therefore have put in motion plans for a revised scheme for the project for which we will seek grant funding in 2021 and 2022.

The Museum Forward Plan (an essential part of being accredited) was clearly delayed in 2020 due to the impact of Covid-19. This plan will be revisited in 2021, which process includes the trust, staff, volunteers and visitors, and revised from the outcomes of the pandemic in particular reviewing potential opportunities for new commercial income sources.

In late 2019 there was a visioning exercise held with external facilitators with the view to becoming The Museum of Bricks and Brickmaking. Those taking part included the trust, in-house consultants and key volunteers. This is an ongoing project which it was hoped to progress during 2020 but was delayed by the pandemic and thus further sessions will be held during 2021.

Finally, looking forward, the Museum re-opened in May 2021 and is seeking to extend its opening and event activities as further relaxation of the lockdown measures in the UK permits. Financially the extended closures in 2020 and into 2021 has drastically reduced the normal income budgeted for the period but mitigating measures have taken place in order to underpin the cash situation and reserves. In particular emergency funding and recovery funding has been applied for since the start of the pandemic and we have been successful in grant awards totalling £141k up to June 2021. This is sufficient funding to see us through to the end of 2021 and into 2022. Overall expenditure has been closely monitored and cut back where necessary and the whole financial situation will be regularly examined and reviewed as we move forward in these still uncertain times with the continuing effect of the pandemic.

# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2020

## **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

### **Public benefit**

The Trustees of the Bursledon Brickworks Museum Trust are aware of the published Guidance of the Charity Commission on Public Benefit and take that into account in encouraging the public to engage with this significant heritage asset. Visitors experience the history of the site and the history of brick making generally. Activities are included for all ages to help with engagement. School visits are encouraged as are specialist interest groups such as the University of the Third Age (U3A) and local history societies.

In particular the Brickworks Museum has continued to be successful in offering opportunities to people of all ages who have a disability or disadvantage to become involved in learning and creative activity. During 2020 the museum had five volunteers with varying disabilities. Most of them are younger than the average age for volunteering, two have suffered brain injuries, one has a physical disability and the others have learning difficulties. They work in teams alongside the regular volunteers.

In commenting on proposals of change to historic buildings the Trust considers that public access should be afforded, where possible, to experience and learn of heritage significance.

## **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

## **Financial position**

The financial result of the Trust for the year ended 31 December 2020 was a Net Income of £32,874 (2019: Net Income £10,336). The £22,538 improvement in the result has primarily arisen from £56,291 income from Covid-19 emergency and recovery grants, approximately £20,000 savings on consultants fees and overheads and £5,500 reduced spend on events as only one took place, partly offset by £37,000 lower admission income (impact of Covid-19) and £22,000 reduced commercial income (also due to Covid-19). The Net Assets position at 31 December 2020 was £86,751 (2019: £53,877), which fully relates to Unrestricted Funds and none to Restricted Funds at both year ends.

Looking ahead to the year 2021 and beyond the key emphasis of the Board is to generate moderate annual profit surpluses. These can then be reinvested in improvements to the infrastructure of the site to ensure the long term viability of the buildings and museum sustainability and to enhance the overall visitor experience. The significant New Foundations Project to fully restore two derelict drying sheds utilising forecast grant monies and other major donations is a key element of this plan as it would generate a regular income from office lettings and exhibition space well into the future. Fundraising campaigns, a range of interesting Covid-safe events and new commercial income sources are planned this year to complement the regular sources of income.

### Reserves policy

The policy was reviewed and revised in 2020, and reserves are now held for:

- Restricted Funds, grants to the Brickworks Museum from funding bodies for museum project expenditure.
- A contingency of one years annual income of the Trust.
- Match funding for future projects of the Trust.

### Going concern

The Trustees at each Board meeting are briefed in detail on the progress of the transactions, the current balances, the levels of reserves, and any future liabilities. On that basis, the Treasurer alerts the Trustees to anything that might indicate that the charity is not likely to become a going concern. The Trust's adoption and implementation of its Business Plan gives increased confidence that Bursledon Brickworks Museum Trust is likely to remain solvent and there are limited uncertainties of this charity's ability to continue.

# STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

## **Governing document**

The Company is limited by guarantee (company number 09649512) as defined by the Companies Act 2006 and governed by a memorandum and articles of association and does not have any share capital. It is registered by the Charity Commission as charity number 1170043.

Overall responsibility is in the hands of the trustees.

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

## Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

## Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings

- 25% on cost

Computer equipment

- 33% on cost

### Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

### Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

### Investments

Fixed asset investments are recognised at cost less impairment.

During the 2019 year Mrs M P Johnston, a trustee of Bursledon Brickworks Museum Trust, made a loan to the charity of £2,000. This balance was outstanding as at 31 December 2020.
