DIRECTORS REPORT for the year ended 30 June 2020

The Directors present their report and the unaudited financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2020.

Structure, Governance and Management

The Company is a Community Interest Company limited by guarantee and is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 9th June 2015

The Board of Directors are responsible for the management of company business for which purpose they may exercise all of the powers ascribed to them in the Company's Articles of Association. They have the power to admit any person or organisation to membership on receipt of their application. The members of the company agree to contribute a sum not exceeding £1 in the event of the company being wound up.

Risk Management

The Directors have undertaken a review of the major risks to which the company is exposed, and systems have been established to mitigate those risks. Periodic reviews are made to ensure that the company continues to identify and mitigate any major risk that may arise. The major financial risks facing the company arise in connection with:

- The short term nature of project funding as highlighted by the ongoing impact of the current COVID-19 pandemic
- The on-going uncertainty of the agreement arrangements for the Education Base at Hollingworth Lake and use of associated Council land from April 2017 onwards

The company may also face continuing organisational challenges in aligning its resources to meet the requirements of its customers, whilst maintaining its financial viability.

DIRECTORS REPORT for the year ended 30 June 2020

Objectives and Activities

The objectives of the Company are to carry out activities which benefit the community and in particular (without limitation) to support local communities to enjoy and benefit their local green spaces.

Achievement and Performance

The CIC has continued to deliver high quality environmental educational experiences to the local community, developing existing and new partnerships to expand the opportunities we offer. Whilst all site-based sessions were cancelled / postponed from 19th March in line with COVID-19 restrictions, we were able to provide some home-based activities for vulnerable and key worker children as ongoing support.

During the financial year 1st July 2019 – 30th June 2020, a total of 97 sessions were delivered with 1730 young people and 690 adults participating plus 15 home-based activities shared with 130 plus vulnerable children and their families during lockdown and a further 8 booked site-based sessions still to be delivered as/when restrictions lift. NatureEd CIC has a range of well qualified freelance facilitators to deliver sessions under a recognisable kite mark of quality at an affordable cost. A key achievement has been continuing to support our community by extending the range of our activities, and also adapting our delivery methods which has helped sustain and diversify participation. Prior to lockdown and having to work remotely, new outreach projects included running holiday events for families at libraries across the borough, providing activity days for Looked After Children at Oulder Hill and a public event at Bowlee Community Park. Also thanks to funding secured from the Pennines Township, we have worked with local Primary Schools developing bee-friendly areas in their own grounds whilst a further grant has helped us to continue our regular outdoor play sessions for under 5's at Ealees. Dig n Delve has proved to be a popular programme and we were delighted when the project was included in some filming for the Dippy on Tour exhibition. Other successes have been developing new "whole school" outdoor learning programmes and curriculum-linked workshops explaining natural flood management methods being implemented locally by Rochdale Council and the Environment Agency.

Whilst unfortunately the COVID-19 pandemic forced most of our work to be put on hold, we hope to have all NatureEd CIC activities up and running again soon so that we can get back to helping more people to enjoy learning about their green space, experiencing the health and well-being benefits of the outdoor environment and actively helping to conserve the wildlife of the area.

Feedback from the sessions were very positive with 100% of the total responses received rating good or better. Comments included:

DIRECTORS REPORT for the year ended 30 June 2020

Financial Review

The organisation operates on an income by making affordable charges to the schools and community groups who make use of the services the CIC offers. Charges cover the fees of qualified facilitators, the provision of all specialist equipment and resources as well as the necessary administration costs for ensuring a safe and rewarding experience for everyone involved (e.g. insurance, DBS checks, training, promotion, etc.). The CIC also accesses grant funding to help support the provision of services to target audiences who may struggle to meet these charges and also for the helping to fund the sustainable development of the CIC.

The suspension of all site-based activities due to COVID-19 restrictions and corresponding loss of income impacted severely on the final quarter of 2019~20. Whilst an emergency financial review by Directors was able to confirm that there was sufficient funds in the short term, it was noted that longer term the CIC may need to look at alternative ways of covering necessary administration costs and also, to meet some potential increased costs as a result from new COVID-19 control measures needed as/ when restrictions lift. The possible use of reserve and applying for additional funding were identified as options to consider.

Reserves Policy

The CIC operates on a not-for-profit basis with charges set to fully recover the day to day costs of operation. However, the CIC does retain a small reserve to ensure adequate cash flow and longer term financial security. This has proved to be essential in light of the COVID-19 pandemic which has severely impacted the CIC's operation since March 2020 and is likely to continue affecting our provision. Also prior to the lockdown restrictions, some surplus was used to support projects which may not otherwise be able to run but that meet the objectives of the CIC. In 2019~20, this included part funding a Wreath making session for adults, providing subsidised sessions for Dig 'n' Delve Under 5's group, Holy Trinity CE Primary School Forest School programme and Ranger Service Forest Fun events. Some funds were also used to pay facilitators for collating the necessary evidence for supporting grant bids and also to cover some late cancellation fees for sessions booked when lockdown restrictions were initially imposed.

In order to maintain this reserve, the Directors continue to provide the main office overhead costs and their time and expertise on a voluntary basis including CIC administration, scoping grant applications, attending meetings, etc. Also, the agreement with RBC includes the education base overhead costs as in-kind support. Longer term, reserves will be built up where funding secured through grant aid helps contribute to the overhead and development costs of the CIC, and also where donations and / or in kind support such as volunteer time, resources, etc. free up actual cash income from projects.

At the year end, the company had free reserves of £3,286.

Plans for the future

NatureEd CIC is a well-established enterprise delivering high quality experiences in Rochdale and the surrounding areas. As well as directly benefiting the young people involved, we are helping the wider community of Rochdale as we inspire and nurture the next generation of eco-champions.

The overall aim for 2020~21 will be to review operations as/when restrictions lift and to re-establish our provision encouraging people to get involved in enjoying and learning about their local green space.

DIRECTORS REPORT for the year ended 30 June 2020

Objectives for 2020 ~ 21 include:

- Continue to monitor the business viability of the CIC during the current situation.
- Support existing customers and our freelance facilitators by working towards developing procedures and implementing appropriate COVID-19 control measures to allow a phased re-start of site-based activities in line with government guidance and / or to continue supporting schools and communities remotely as required.
- Focus our priorities on the most vulnerable sectors of the community both by working cooperatively with other organisations to provide funded projects as well as in kind and/or financial support from CIC reserves when available.
- Actively seek funding for maintaining and extending the range of activities and audience participation as/when available whilst ensuring we continue to protect the biodiversity value of the countryside and green spaces we are encouraging people to enjoy.
- Continue to liaise with Link4Life and RBC to explore the potential of new partnerships, with particular reference to the proposed changes of management at Hollingworth Lake and the establishment of an administration office alongside our educational base as part of the longer term strategy and business planning of the CIC.

PART 1 - GENERAL DESCRIPTION OF THE COMPANY'S ACTIVITIES AND IMPACT

The CIC has continued to deliver high quality environmental educational experiences to the local community, developing existing and new partnerships to expand the opportunities we can offer. Whilst all site-based sessions were cancelled / postponed from 19/03/20 in line with COVID-19 restrictions, we were able to provide some home-based activities for vulnerable and key worker children as ongoing support. We have also actively used CIC reserves to support projects that may not otherwise have happened.

During the financial year 01/07/19 - 30/06/20:

PART 2 - CONSULTATION WITH STAKEHOLDERS

NatureEd CIC's main stakeholders are the local schools, community groups and families who take part in our activities, together with the land managers and other organisations who are responsible for the green spaces and heritage in Rochdale that we help people to enjoy and benefit. These include Rochdale Council, Link4Life, Friends of Groups, private landowners, Touchstones, Bowlee Community Park, Pennine Prospects, etc.

The CIC has a good working relationship with local teachers, community leaders and other professionals who we are in regular contact with. We also liaise closely with land managers, often meeting on a daily basis on our main sites, to ensure that the activities we offer promote sustainable use and care of the biodiversity and heritage of the area.

The CIC has a website (www.NatureEd.co.uk), Facebook page (www.facebook.com/NatureEdcic) and other marketing material describing the activities we can offer. Group leaders are asked to complete a booking form identifying aims and the learning outcomes they would like NatureEd to help them achieve and we tailor our activities to suit. We then use a variety of different approaches to help get feedback from the young people and also the adults. During the sessions, children might take part in voting or use our chuff line, whilst at the end, group leaders and / or everyone will be asked to fill in an evaluation form helping us to review and improve our service. In particular, this feedback is used to decide what new activities to include in our Education Guide and events we deliver in partnership with other organisations

As well as curriculum-linked activities, we also run community events which actively engage local people in the practical care of their own environment. We use these events to listen and respond to people's interests and concerns, drawing on this information to direct future development and funding bids by the CIC.

We monitor attendance and feedback on a quarterly basis and include in a summary which is circulated to Rochdale Council as part of our agreement for working on council-owned land. We also attend regular meetings with the senior officers, rangers, Link4Life officers, friends of groups, etc. enabling the CIC to be an active partner in the long term care of the local environment.
