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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31 MAY 2022

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the period ended 31 May 2022.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objects of the charity

The aim of the charity is to advance education for the public benefit in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). It delivers this through promoting interest in STEM at all levels from primary school to higher education and apprenticeships; providing a programme of educational activities that stimulate an interest in those subjects by virtue of links to real engineering projects including Bloodhound LSR. These on-line projects, workshops, after school clubs, family experiences and STEM camps give young people from all backgrounds the opportunity to learn from engineers and technical specialists from industry, putting their learning into practice and making the link between the classroom and potential STEM careers. They also encourage the development of life skills required for the world of work. The charity increases the reach and impact of its activities through collaborating with like-minded organisations drawn from the private, public and similarly motivated organisations.

Public benefit

The Trustees are confident that the activities of the charity fully meet the requirements of the Charity Commission on delivery of public benefit. The trustees have received feedback from students, teachers, parents, local authorities and our education partners which show that the project and its workshops has created a sustained interest in STEM subjects. Universities such as Swansea continue to record the influence that real projects like Bloodhound provides.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Constitution

Bloodhound Education Ltd is a company limited by guarantee, number 10191545 and a registered charity, number 1167382, governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. The charity was incorporated in May 2016 and modified its name to Bloodhound Education Ltd in 2019.

Organisational structure

The affairs of the charity are supervised by a board of Trustees. The Memorandum and Articles of Association provide for a minimum of four and a maximum of eighteen Trustees. The members have each guaranteed to contribute up to £10 to the assets of the Trust in the event of its liquidation whilst they are a member and for one year after ceasing to be a member.

Recruitment and appointment of New Trustees

The Board may appoint new Directors as it so wishes. Potential new Directors are initially interviewed by the Chair and a small delegation of existing Directors.

Changes to Trustees

Mr M Robinson has joined the Board of Trustees as financial director. Mr Robinson is a qualified accountant who has been specialising in the management of charity accounts since his retirement.

Induction and training of new Trustees

New trustees receive a copy of the company's Memorandum and Articles, appropriate Charity Commission booklets, the latest set of Trustees' minutes and the last set of financial statements. They are introduced to key staff and the organisation. Structure and programming of activities are explained to them, and they are invited to visit the team at events both in schools and at the Education centre to experience the activities in person.

Management

As a result of the Covid pandemic it has been necessary to continue to operate with the reduction in the core team as the activity has not yet fully recovered. The CEO is not only responsible for strategy, operations and fund raising but is also actively involved in the delivery of projects and reporting back to the grant funders. This is carried out within the plans and financial budgets agreed with the Trustees.

The Chief Executive regularly consults with and takes advice from the Chair of the Trustees and other Trustees where necessary.

Management continued

The Chief Executive also consults with specialists and members of the team developing and delivering the STEM educational activities and programmes.

Operation

As part of the ongoing Covid recovery plan we have developed and delivered new workshops and activities to match the requirements of local authorities in supporting the local community including families, home educators, special educational needs and other disadvantaged groups. These have been provided from our education base.

Alongside this the charity continued to develop virtual and remote activities initiated during the previous year which can be used in school and at home to provide support for both teachers and parents.

The charity continues to review and update policies and procedures including scheme of delegation, risk management, safe-guarding, equality and diversity, health and safety, Covid compliance and management of volunteers. The risk assessments have all been updated as part of our annual review process.

Risk and uncertainties

The Board of trustees have reviewed the strategy risk analysis and the systems in place. We have prepared a plan defining the closure requirements should it be necessary and ring-fenced funds to support it.

Our contact with schools confirms there is a continued interest in the activities provided by the charity. However, schools are finding it extremely difficult to allocate the necessary funds for workshops. We continue to focus on raising funds from alternative sources which can subsidise the school activities. We have also been encouraging our ambassadors to support the team in the delivery and so enable us to run workshops without increasing our costs.

Fund raising

During the period, we have secured grants from a variety of new sources including local government, The Millennium Point Trust, IET, Royal Academy of Engineering, National Lottery Community Fund and Active Building Centre Ltd. We continue to be supported by The Aluminium Federation and Arthur Spriggs & Sons. We maintain our contact with previous sponsors discussing opportunities to partner on future projects.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Education Activities

Whilst much of the year required engagement through use of our free e-resources, presentations and social media channels, the charity was able to start to build face to face engagement again. Some of the group numbers had to be small to ensure the students were fully supported and enable us to build their confidence during these sessions. The charity measured the success of its strategies by monitoring the number of students participating, the number from special educational needs and underrepresented groups and analysis of student, teacher and parent feedback.

The first quarter was busy with revitalised interest from schools as many were able to invite external providers in to run face to face activities again. Although interest continued, the number of school bookings reduced from the autumn onwards as schools faced a growing problem of reduced budgets and staff shortages. School visits increased to the centre from local schools who utilised parent support to assist with transport costs where buses were too expensive.

The education centre has enabled the charity to extend its activities with new programmes, holiday and after school workshops as part of its collaboration with local authorities and thanks to the continued support from South Gloucestershire and Stroud Academy Trust.

New workshops have been developed to raise awareness and showcase renewable energy technologies. They encourage students to develop their own ideas to reducing their carbon footprint and devise technologies as alternatives to fossil fuels.

Education Activities continued

The charity has direct access to these alternative technologies. The heating systems in the buildings have been upgraded to renewable technologies and through our partnership with ABC we are able to provide students with direct experience of these technologies in operation.

Having the centre has enabled us to operate workshops out of school hours both in the evening, weekends and during the holidays. There is a regular after school and Saturday engineering club alongside family workshops during the holidays.

We attended 4 large education events which saw the Show Car being dusted off after nearly 2 years in storage. Arthur Spriggs & Sons provided invaluable support.

Ambassador engagement has grown over the year to 43, who were invaluable in supporting education activities, and providing opportunities for students to meet real engineers.

Overall engagement for this year was 56,000 of which: -

- 1. On-line approximately 50,000
 - 10 virtual events
 - 3.500 accessed free on-line resources
 - · 600 Bloodhound video views
 - 3500 through facebook and Instagram
 - 13,000 through twitter
- 2. Face to Face -6,000
 - 55 days of school visits
 - 70 events at the education centre

Attendees were requested to complete a feedback form - Of those attending: -

- 40% were female
- 70% more likely to consider engineering
- 90% would like to attend another Bloodhound event
- 80% of parents and teachers agreed the content of the activities was excellent

Feedback: -

Parent quotes: "I really enjoyed spending time with the family away from computers." "The pace and mix of activities were extremely good. I would certainly recommend to friends."

Child quotes: "I loved building the space rocket and racing the car." "I want to come back again".

Teacher – "Linking the activities to real projects made it much more purposeful for the children and they really enjoyed constructing and testing their own prototype ideas."

We communicate regularly with our education contacts and partners. Newsletters promoting our workshops, hire of the Show Car & modular car for events, teacher training, and on-line resources and toolkits go out to our database of 25,000 and shared with our 13,300 twitter followers and facebook members.

Targeted mailings and flyers go to the local schools, community and education partners database, promoting after school, Saturday engineering clubs and holiday activities at our centre.

Oundle School has become an education partner and 10 of their staff have been trained to deliver rocket car workshops from July 2022 as part of their own outreach programme. This will extend the reach of the charity and could provide further collaboration opportunities.

BLOODHOUND EDUCATION LTD REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31 MAY 2022

Financial Review and Reserves

During the period ended 31 May 2022 income was £ 121,944 and expenditure was £134,433. As at 31 May 2022 total free reserves of the charity were £48,669.

We expect recovery to be gradual with ongoing Covid disruption in schools and limited opportunities for fund raising events. We will continue to seek grants to fund teacher CPD, on-line resources and projects and activities for disadvantaged groups which we can host from our centre outside of school hours and in the holidays.

In the event that Covid recovery is too slow to maintain a viable level of operation, the charity has continued to ring fence funds to ensure all booked activities where a commitment has been made and a deposit paid, can be delivered. In addition, £16,000.00 has been set aside to cover any additional costs that could be incurred were it necessary to prepare the organisation for a closure.

CURRENT SITUATION & FUTURE PLANS

The Board of trustees are actively involved in monitoring the spending in the charity and recognising that our activities have not recovered from the influence of Covid.

The changes we have made to our funding and the services we provide has enabled us to continue to operate but with much reduced staffing levels. Local authorities continue to show interest in funding our activities, but it requires a renewed interest from schools, event organizers and some of our traditional funders for us to feel confident about the future.

The CEO is in regular contact with all the Trustees to keep them informed of the financial situation and take advice when needed.

The new workshops and projects developed this year give the charity exciting opportunities to grow its reach and so increase the long-term impact of its education work. It intends to continue this development of its programmes, for children and young people aged 7 upwards. It will continue to focus on providing hands-on experience which develops their knowledge and skills and puts learning into practice while maintaining the link between the classroom and potential career paths.

It will continue to gather feedback, which will be monitored and evaluated it to inform on future development and improvement.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE PERIOD ENDED 31 MAY 2022

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (issued in October 2019) and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Going concern

The Trustees have considered the impact of the global Covid-19 pandemic on the ability of the charitable company to continue operating for the foreseeable future. This review has included considering the impact of the pandemic to the date of signing the financial statements and based on this review the trustees believe that the financial statements have been prepared appropriately on the going concern basis.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount can be measured reliably. No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by volunteers.

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred. In respect of the furlough grant; all conditions, with respect to the eligible costs being claimed, have been met.

Donations

Donations are assumed to be unrestricted in their application unless otherwise prescribed.

On receipt, donated assets are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised as fixed asset in the period of receipt.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Allocation of support costs

Support costs are allocated between fundraising trading and charitable activities.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation.

Tax status

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Financial instruments

The Charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments, including trade and other debtors and creditors are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees

Designated funds are set aside by the directors out of the unrestricted income funds for specific purposes or projects.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.
