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## Directors' Report For the Year Ended 31 December 2022

The directors present their report and the audited financial statements of OHF 1 Limited ("the Company") for the year ended 31 December 2022.

#### **Principal activity**

The Company's principal activity is to fund the development of secondary healthcare properties in the United Kingdom.

#### Results and dividends

The loss for the year, after taxation amounted to £1,445,967 (2021 - £382,858).

At 31 December 2022, the Company had net liabilities of £2,382,296 (2021 - £936,329).

The directors do not recommend the payment of a final dividend (2021 - £Nil).

The directors have carefully considered the most appropriate basis for preparing these statutory financial statements and consider it appropriate to adopt a going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. The Company is wholly owned by Octopus Healthcare Fund which has agreed to support the Company over at least the next twelve months. Given this undertaking the directors consider it appropriate to adopt a going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

## Notes to the Financial Statements For the Year Ended 31 December 2022

#### 1. General information

OHF 1 Limited is a private company, limited by shares, incorporated in England and Wales under the Companies Act 2006. The address of the registered office is stated on the company information page and the nature of the Company's operations and its principal activity are set out in the directors' report on page 1.

#### 2. Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

#### 2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention unless otherwise specified within these accounting policies and in accordance with Section 1A of Financial Reporting Standard 102, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland and the Companies Act 2006.

The preparation of financial statements in compliance with FRS 102 requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise judgement in applying the Company's accounting policies (see note 3).

These financial statements are presented in Pound Sterling ("£"), the Company's functional currency. The amounts presented are rounded to the nearest Pound Sterling.

#### 2.2 Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis, notwithstanding net current liabilities of £2,382,296 (2021 - £936,329), which the directors believe to be appropriate for the following reason.

The Company is dependent for its working capital on funds provided to it by Octopus Healthcare Fund, the Company's ultimate parent undertaking. Octopus Healthcare Fund has confirmed that it will continue to provide such financial support for at least 12 months from the date of approval of these financial statements. This financial support includes the confirmation that the parent undertaking will not recall the amounts due to it unless the Company is in a position to repay the loans. The directors consider that this should enable the Company to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future by meeting its liabilities as they fall due for payment.

As with any company placing reliance on other group entities for financial support, the directors acknowledge that there can be no certainty that this support will continue, although, at the date of approval of these financial statements, they have no reason to believe that it will not do so.

#### 2.3 Interest income

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest rate method.

#### 2.4 Expenses

All expenses are accounted for on an accruals basis.

#### 2. Accounting policies (continued)

#### 2.5 Finance costs

Finance costs are charged to the statement of comprehensive income over the term of the debt using the effective interest method so that the amount charged is at a constant rate on the carrying amount. Issue costs are initially recognised as a reduction in the proceeds of the associated capital instrument.

#### 2.6 Taxation

Tax is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income except that a charge attributable to an item of income and expense recognised as other comprehensive income or to an item recognised directly in equity is also recognised in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively.

The current income tax charge is calculated on the basis of tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date in the countries where the Company operates and generates income.

#### 2.7 Debtors

Short term debtors are measured at transaction price, less any impairment. Loans receivable are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

#### 2.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash is represented by cash in hand and deposits with financial institutions repayable without penalty on notice of not more than 24 hours.

#### 2.9 Creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other financial liabilities, including bank loans, are measured initially at fair value, net of transaction costs, and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

#### 2.10 Financial instruments

The Company only enters into basic financial instrument transactions that result in the recognition of financial assets and liabilities like cash and other bank balances, trade and other debtors and creditors, loans from banks and other third parties, loans to related parties and investments in non-puttable ordinary shares.

Debt instruments (other than those wholly repayable or receivable within one year), including loans and other trade debtors and creditors, are initially measured at present value of the future cash flows and subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Debt instruments that are payable or receivable within one year or on demand, typically trade debtors and creditors, are measured, initially and subsequently, at the undiscounted amount of the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received. However, if the arrangements of a short-term instrument constitute a financing transaction, like the payment of a trade debt deferred beyond normal business terms or financed at a rate of interest that is not a market rate or in the case of an out-right short-term loan not at market rate, the financial asset or liability is measured, initially, at the present value of the future cash flow discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument and subsequently at amortised cost.

#### 2. Accounting policies (continued)

#### 2.10 Financial instruments (continued)

Financial assets that are measured at cost and amortised cost are assessed at the end of each reporting year for objective evidence of impairment. If objective evidence of impairment is found and it can be reliably estimated, an impairment loss is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

For financial assets measured at amortised cost, the impairment loss is measured as the difference between an asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated cash flows discounted at the asset's original effective interest rate. If a financial asset has a variable interest rate, the discount rate for measuring any impairment loss is the current effective interest rate determined under the contract.

For financial assets measured at cost less impairment, the impairment loss is measured as the difference between an asset's carrying amount and best estimate of the recoverable amount, which is an approximation of the amount that the Company would receive for the asset if it were to be sold at the reporting date.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset and the net amount reported in the statement of financial position when there is an enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

#### Derecognition policy

Financial assets are derecognised when (a) the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire or are settled, or (b) substantially all the risks and rewards of the ownership of the asset are transferred to another party or (c) control of the asset has been transferred to another party who has the practical ability to unilaterally sell the asset to an unrelated third party without imposing additional restrictions. Financial liabilities are derecognised when the liability is extinguished, that is when the contractual obligation is discharged, cancelled or expires.

#### 3. Judgements in applying accounting policies and key sources of estimation uncertainty

There are no estimates or judgements that have a significant risk of causing material adjustment to the carrying amount of the assets and liabilities within the financial year.
