Comments from Founder and Trustee David Duke MBE

Over the past year we have seen real growth in our offer of support and services to socially disadvantaged adults and young people. The diversity of what we offer, and the additional programmes have been welcomed by the communities we serve.

Our youth sessions in Lambeth and Nine Elms continue to attract players who now see the organisation as part of their community. Young Players are now seeing the Street Soccer offer as 'more than football' often turning up early for additional support and relationships. The 'Bootroom' (a personal development programme) is now active after football sessions and very well attended and engaged. Our work in schools is growing too.

Our Adult programmes are also expanding with sites in Shoreditch and Lambeth offering support to Men affected by Homelessness, Mental Health and displacement.

It is clear that our work has never been more needed.

As the programmes continue to grow, we are actively trying to secure a range of new income streams to allow sustainability. This will be a priority in the coming year with a series of fundraising events, partnerships and new funders being actively pursued.

We will also be actively recruiting new trustee/board members to ensure we have the experience, governance and diversity to allow the charity to flourish and its mission to be carried out to the highest standard and effectiveness.

Overall, we are happy with our progress thus far and are committed to furthering our impact into the next year.

Trustees Report for the year ended 30 June 2022

The trustees are pleased to present their report and financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2022. The charitable company was incorporated on 27 April 2021.

Objectives and Activities

The Charitable Objects of the organisation, as set out in the Articles of Association, are as follows:

To advance in life and relieve needs of young people in London through:

A/ the provision of recreational sporting or leisure time activities provided in the interest of social welfare, designed to improve their conditions of life

B/ Providing support and activities which develop their skills, capacities and capabilities to enable them to participate in society as mature and responsible individuals

To promote social inclusion for the public benefit by preventing people from becoming socially excluded, relieving the needs of those people who are socially excluded and assisting them to integrate into society by the provisions of:

A/ Football themed events and activities to create positive change in, and to motivate, inspire and develop people affected by social issues

B/ Raising public awareness of the issues affecting people with these types of social issues and delivering social change resulting in more positive outcomes and building hope and positivity to change their lives.

C/ Social and recreational facilities and events involving the local community

D/ Educational and personal development programs which help those who are socially excluded to gain life skills which help to connect and integrate them back into society

[For the purposes of this paragraph 'Socially Excluded' means being excluded from society, or parts of society, as a result of one or more of the following factors; Homelessness, Alcohol and Substance Abuse, Mental Health Issues and long term unemployment or refugees]

To provide or assist in the provision of facilities in the interest of social welfare or recreation or other leisure time occupation of individuals who have need of such facilities by reason of the social circumstances with the object of improving their conditions of life.

The Street Soccer London vision is:


At Street Soccer London, our vision is for young people living in tough areas to recognise and reach their potential, and to feel safe in and proud of their communities.

We play our part in this vision through football: by providing safe spaces, coaching and encouragement to play together at times when they might otherwise be at risk of getting drawn into local gang activity.


To do this, we embed ourselves in the local community. We base ourselves in community hubs and work with other community organisations focused on health and wellbeing.

We provide a series of activities, in local hubs, at partner sites and in the local community.



We do this in a number of ways:



Our initial KPI's agreed with funders at the start of 2020 (i.e. pre pandemic) were:

- Launch regular football drop in sessions across 3 sites (initially youth only)
- Deliver 3 regional Street Soccer Festivals
- Create a Women's Programme (street 45)
- Deliver a series of education and development courses
- Create a volunteering based academy and pathway for players to become street soccer coaches (street soccer fc)

Achievements and Performance

Street Soccer London's core values start with a "Players always come first" approach. As we set out in 2020, our aim was to improve the life choices of our young players through connection, purpose, and opportunity. July 2021 – June 2022 has seen us build on the excellent progress made during the previous year as we emerged from the pandemic and were able to broaden our programmes.

- An average of 5 sessions taking place across 2 locations
- 128 new players during the year taking our total number of players to 398
- 163 Adult male players
- 215 Youth players
- 20 Female players (mix of youth and adult)
- Schools delivery
- Tender workshops

In 2020 we identified that our core youth (15 to 19 year olds) focus could be additionally impacted by supporting the family unit. We therefore set about planning and delivering our programmes within schools, alternative provisions, and the community, resulting in the delivery of sports days and football-focused festivals, enrichment activities and off pitch workshops.

During the year we continued to build on this work and have seen many new players join our sessions and helped older players to move on, including by providing volunteering and sessional work opportunities.

During the year we also began our work with adult players in the lead up to 2021 4 Nations Cup in Edinburgh. We partnered with a local charity organisation Renaissance FC and some local womens programmes to take 2 teams to represent England.

We have also been able to provide opportunities and experiences to our players throughout the year including:

32 Borough Cup and Summer Cup in July

ACN Lambeth – celebrating young people in Lambeth – young people delivering activities to youth in the Kennington Park area

Coaching workshops and interview with England star Mason Mount in September Author of 'Footballs Black Pioneers', Bill Hearn spent time with players talking about his book

Community football tournament in partnership with MET Police in October 40 Young People over 6 weeks wrote poetry and discussed and creative writing activities as part of a CALM initiative in November

3 teams entered a tournament at the Crystal Palace training ground in December 1 player invited to Nike/Chelsea Kit Launch 3rd kit (including watching team at Cobham and photo shoot)

50 young people taken to watch England v Ivory Coast at Wembley in March Volunteer Ambassador Launch & Tournament with NIKE in April



The Boot Room

We continue to develop The Boot Room, a space within Black Prince Trust which is serving as an office for staff as well as a player zone. Through sponsorship from 'Sure' we are able to occupy this space permanently, creating a safe space with the players off pitch before and after sessions, with the aim of understanding what part SSL plays in their lives and providing the most effective support possible.



Partnerships - Black Prince Trust

We identified BPT as our base knowing the potential from pre-existing relationships. As lead football provider at BPT we are set up to impact across the family unit by introducing football across most age groups and demographics.

The strategic focus has been developed into a new framework that aims to capture all existing football provision - and sets the aspirations for future strategic initiatives and fundraising priorities with these partners.

The focus covers five areas which overlap. These five areas provide the opportunity to position SSL & BPT across a range of crosscutting agendas where sport and physical activity are well placed to contribute.

These areas are:

- 1. Inclusion
- 2. Health and Wellbeing
- 3. Education, Training and Lifelong Learning
- 4. Equality and Diversity
- 5. Participation/Engagement.

We believe Participation/Engagement is a social impact strand that straddles and is embedded in the other four specific social impact themes.

Financial Review

The Financial Year performance to June 2022 has provided Street Soccer London with a great deal of satisfaction in an incredibly challenging Financial and Economic environment especially within the Charity sector.

Street Soccer London's total incoming resources in the year were £230,232 (2021: £236,316) and total resources expended were £227,501 (2021: £218,648).

Within this Financial Year Street Soccer London has posted a surplus of £2,731 and our reserves have increased to £20,399.

This provides a balance of funds to meet all short-term working capital requirements. It is our intention to improve this balance over the next few years to assist in minimising the impact and risks associated with our cost base and future working capital requirements.

The main operational improvements this year have seen the organisation prepare Monthly Management Accounts and the preparation of an Annual Budget which has been integrated on to our XERO Platform and allows Income and expenditure analysis against individual budget headings.

A robust budget was in operation throughout the year and assisted regarding the control and monitoring of income/expenditures. This year's budget has been devolved to increase participation of our local staff and to maximise accountability and ownership.

A designated Bank Account was opened for the London operation with Barclays PLC and has been functioning from the beginning of the financial year.

It is our intention this year to improve and develop our short-term cash flow monitoring coupled with regular interaction with our Fundraising team regarding a longer-term forecast of future income streams. This will function as a tool to assimilate our future financial wellbeing and will also assist in our going concern evaluation.

We have now completed a full cycle of Annual Accounting with our new examiners Chiene and Tait and we are confident that this partnership will improve and develop the scrutiny of our financial data/reports and will add to the checks and controls of any potential risks within our business.

Reserves:

A Reserves Policy for the organisation has been prepared and the aim is to hold sufficient free reserves to safeguard the organisation against funding reductions and provide sufficient funds to meet liabilities.

The Board aims to maintain reserves equal to at least three months operating costs. The Board strategy is to build these reserves over the next few years.

The reserves that we set aside provide financial stability and the means to develop our principal activities. The ratio of reserves to Operating costs is calculated each month, and this is monitored by the London Operations Committee on a monthly basis and our Board on a quarterly basis.

Trustees Report for the year ended 30 June 2022 (continued)

The Trustees will review the level of unrestricted reserves that are required to ensure an adequate balance exists to fulfil our continuing obligations.

The restricted funds balance of Street Soccer London as of 30th June 2022 is £33,279.

Our unrestricted balance for the same date is £(12,880).

Future Plans

We will continue to work to our charitable objects, maintaining our successful youth programmes while building further on our Adult Programmes, Womens Programmes and Prison Programmes in the coming year.

Structure Governance and Management


Governing Document

New trustees are appointed by existing members and selected based on skills and experience that new trustees can bring to the organisation.


Organisational Structure

Affiliations

Street Soccer London continue to benefit from significant support provided by the team at Street Soccer Scotland.

To ensure this support is focussed, productive and timely a fortnightly check in has been put in place. This is chaired by the COO and attended by all SSS staff providing any form of support for London, the session concentrates on ensuring that actions are carried out and followed up, and that a coordinated approach is taken to all of this work.

Trustees responsibilities statement

- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

In so far as the trustees are aware:

- there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's auditor is unaware; and
- the trustees have taken all steps that they ought to have taken to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the auditor is aware of that information.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

NOTES to the FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

For the year ended 30 June 2022

1. General Information

The charity is a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and it constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The address of the registered office is 5 Beaufoy Walk, London, SE11 6AA. The charity was incorporated on 27 April 2020. It was registered with the Charity Commission on 15 April 2021.

2. Statement of Compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (issued in October 2019), the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006 and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

Street Soccer (London) Limited meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

3. Accounting Policies Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. The Trustees have reviewed and considered relevant information, including the annual budget and future cash flows in making their assessment. In particular, the Trustees have tested their cash flow analysis to take into account the effect of possible scenarios brought on by the impact of the pandemic, alongside the measures that they can take to mitigate the impact. Based on these assessments, given the measures that could be undertaken to mitigate the current adverse conditions, and the current resources available, the Trustees have concluded that, while there is an element of uncertainty due to unconfirmed future income streams, they can continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the annual report and financial statements.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Funds structure

- Unrestricted funds comprise of accumulated net movement in general funds. They are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general charitable objectives.
- Restricted funds are funds subject to specific restricted conditions imposed by the donors.

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable, and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable, and entitlement is established.

3. Accounting Policies Basis of preparation (continued)

- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to
 measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated
 resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the
 value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

All expenditure is included on an accruals basis and is recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation to pay for expenditure. All costs have been directly attributed to one of the functional categories of resources expended in the Statement of Financial Activities. Street Soccer London Limited is not registered for VAT. All items of expenditure are accordingly shown inclusive of VAT.

Pension costs

The charity operates a defined contribution scheme for the benefit of its employees. Contribution's payable are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities.
