#### THE CHAIRMAN'S STATEMENT

### YEAR ENDED 31<sup>ST</sup> MARCH 1999

We ended the financial year with our services much expanded and improved, as detailed in the Chief Executive's statement. For that I would like to thank the management and staff for their efforts, and the many organisations which make use of our services and give us valuable feedback.

Financially we have continued our efforts to improve our overall position. The result is that, after the Scottish Office grant, we achieved a small surplus and, added to the figure brought forward, we are able to carry forward a surplus of £26,910. In future however it is essential that we achieve surpluses on trading as we do not expect further grants from central government and we need to build up our reserves, which are inadequate for an organisation of our size.

The ISLA information service continues to be our most important source of income and our greatest future asset. It correlates closely in subject coverage to the policy areas of the Scottish Parliament and Welsh Assembly, the new regional development agencies and to all local authorities, and it is the most cost effective information service to which they can subscribe. We continue to market the service vigorously.

The management and staff of the Exchange have during the year continued their efforts to improve the contribution of our various journals, projects and events. These products are useful in increasing the awareness of what we do among both member and non-member organisations and we are looking for added synergy with our information services.

The Board has also encouraged the staff to build on their expertise in the electronic delivery of our various information services and we have continued to invest in these areas. We therefore start the new financial year in a stronger position to participate in the expanding world of web based services. While doing this we have maintained and improved the personal telephone based elements of our information services which our customers value highly, even when they have full access to Internet services.

Finally I should like to thank my fellow Directors for the valuable service and support they have given during the year.

## THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S STATEMENT

# YEAR ENDED 31<sup>ST</sup> MARCH 1999

The Planning Exchange assists those involved in economic, environmental and social development to learn from experience and research. The main way we do this is by providing a comprehensive and user friendly information service second to none in its field in the UK. This service, ISLA, abstracts some 500 journals and thousands of published and semi-published documents including our own case studies, journals and briefing papers. There are over 250 local authorities, local enterprise companies, training and enterprise councils, government agencies and departments, and consultants large and small using the service throughout the UK and Ireland.

The Isla Weekly Bulletin is the main way in which we inform members of the most interesting of the documents we abstract. An innovation this year has been our ability to send the bulletin to members electronically, which means that they get the information quicker and in a form they can distribute electronically. Over ten per cent of members now ask for bulletin to be sent in this way and the number is growing.

We have made the last five years of abstracts from the database available to members to search on the Web, giving an added benefit to members at no additional cost. Members are of course still able to use the telephone service to our information officers as before.

We have added more material on management and organisational development, as well as regional development, 'best value', the New Deal for Communities, life long learning, social inclusion partnerships, and social entrepreneurship.

In February we relaunched our electronic information exchange Regen.net. This service provides details of what's on, who's who, and what's new about urban regeneration as well as a forum for the exchange of know how and experience. By May over 2,700 organisations had registered to use this new free service which is paid for under a two year contract from the Department of the Environment, Transport and the Regions (DETR). The service is about to be extended to Northern Ireland under contract to the Department of the Environment in Belfast.

In November we launched a new monthly publication, *Economic Development Today*. This incorporates our case study service *LEDIS* on local economic development as well as abstracts of articles and publications on the subject. Our two other journals, *Journal of Lifelong Learning Initiatives* and *Scottish Planning & Environment Law* continue to grow in readership.

We have organised seminars and conferences throughout Britain to which over 1500 delegates attended. All our events are now advertised on our web site: <a href="www.planex.co.uk">www.planex.co.uk</a>.

In March we completed a two-year pilot programme to support with a tailor made information service community organisations involved in urban regeneration. This project, which was supported by DETR and Kellogg's, Marks & Spencer, and NatWest, proved to be so successful that DETR has agreed to part fund a three year development of the programme to many more groups.

#### PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY

The aim of The Planning Exchange is to promote good and innovative practice in economic, environmental and social development.

The principal activity in support of this aim is the provision of an information service to public, private and voluntary bodies throughout the UK and overseas. The Exchange provides information by way of current awareness, enquiry and document supply services, by organising seminars and by publishing a number of journals and briefing papers.

#### COMPANY STATUS

The Planning Exchange is a private company limited by guarantee without share capital. It is registered in Scotland (No.SCO 73119). It is also a registered charity (No. SC 010929).

#### DIRECTORS

The directors (Members of the Committee of Management) who served the Company during the period are shown on page 1. The directors are elected by the voting members of The Planning Exchange.

#### RESULTS

The accounts of the Company for the year to  $31^{st}$  March, 1999 appear on pages 8-16. The surplus for the year amounted to £4,911. The surplus carried forward is £26,910. A grant for core funding for the year amounted to £30,000 from the Scottish Office. Directors believe that there is a need to build up more substantial reserves.

#### FIXED ASSETS

The movement in fixed assets is recorded in the notes to the financial statements.

## YEAR 2000 AND THE POTENTIAL IMPACT ON OPERATIONS

Year 2000 compliance issues are being addressed including issues connected with suppliers and customers, and steps are being taken to ensure timely compliance. The estimated costs of compliance are not considered material to the Company and will be treated as normal revenue expenditure.

#### **EMPLOYMENT**

The Company's employment policies are designed to be competitive so as to attract and retain high quality staff whilst ensuring that the costs remain at an appropriate level. Remuneration policy is decided by the non-executive directors.

The Company policy is one of equal opportunity in the selection, training, career development and promotion of employees. Managers have a continuing responsibility to keep their colleagues fully informed of developments and to communicate financial results and other matters of interest in a timely manner. During the year the Company achieved the UK standard for Investors in People.

## CHARITABLE AND COMMUNITY SUPPORT

No political or charitable donations were made during the period.

## DIRECTORS' RESPONSIBILITIES

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Company at the end of the year and of the surplus or deficiency for the year then ended.

In preparing those financial statements, the directors are required to select suitable accounting policies as described on page 10, and then apply them on a consistent basis, making judgements and estimates that are prudent and reasonable, and state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements. The directors must also prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Company will continue in business.

The directors are responsible for keeping proper account records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985. The directors are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

### **AUDITORS**

A resolution to re-appoint KPMG as auditors for the ensuing year will be proposed at the Annual General Meeting in accordance with section 385 of the Companies Act 1985.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

## YEAR ENDED 31<sup>ST</sup> MARCH 1999

#### 1. COMPANY LIMITED BY GUARANTEE

The Company is limited by guarantee to the extent of £1 for each member in terms of the Companies Act 1985 and does not have a share capital. In the event of a winding up or dissolution of the Company, in terms of Article 71 of the Articles of Association, any surplus assets shall be transferred to some other institution recognised as a charity in law and having objects similar to the objects of the Company.

#### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of accounting.

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis which assumes that the Company will continue to trade. The validity of this assumption is dependent on the support of the subscribers to the Company's services, the Company's bankers and the receipt of adequate grant and loan income. If the Company were unable to continue to trade, adjustments would have to be made to reduce the value of the assets to their recoverable amounts, to provide for any further liabilities which might arise and to reclassify fixed assets and long term liabilities as current assets and liabilities.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards and Statement of Recommended Practice No 2 – Accounting by Charities and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 1992.

#### Income.

The income shown in the income and expenditure account represents amounts invoiced during the year, exclusive of Value Added Tax. Subscription income represents invoices for subscriptions which commence in the financial year. Subscriptions invoiced for periods commencing after the end of the financial year are treated as deferred income and included in creditors.

#### Depreciation.

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Library 3 years
Fixtures & Fittings 6 years
Computer Equipment and software 3-5 years

Library purchases are capitalised in the year of purchase and depreciated over three years.

#### Hire purchase agreements.

Assets held under hire purchase agreements are capitalised and disclosed under tangible fixed assets at their fair value. The capital element of the future payments is treated as a liability and the interest is charged to the income and expenditure account.

#### 2. (Cont'd)

#### Finance Lease Agreements.

Where the Company enters into a lease which entails taking substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of an asset, the lease is treated as a finance lease. The asset is recorded in the balance sheet as a tangible fixed asset and is depreciated in accordance with the above depreciation policies. Future instalments under such leases, net of finance charges, are included with creditors. Rentals payable are apportioned between the finance element, which is charged to the income and expenditure account and the capital element which reduces the outstanding obligation for future instalments.

#### Operating leases.

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the income and expenditure account in the year in which they are incurred.

#### Grants

Revenue grants are credited to the income and expenditure account in the year in which they are received.

#### Pension costs.

The employees of the Company have an option to be members of the Strathclyde Pension Fund. The pension scheme is a defined benefit scheme with employee contributions fixed by statute. Employer's contributions are assessed every three years by a Consulting Actuary and are calculated to ensure the actuarial solvency of the fund. An acturial valuation of the fund as at March 1998 confirmed that the scheme was not fully funded and that the employers contributions from 1<sup>st</sup> April, 1999 would increase by 2.1% to cover the value of the past service liabilities based on completed pensionable service and final pensionable earnings, projected through to each member's normal retirement age or assumed date of withdrawal. Contributions by The Planning Exchange to the scheme during the year amounted to £39,153 (£20,541 – 1998).

#### Cash Flow Statement.

Under Financial Reporting Standard 1, the Company is exempt from the requirements to prepare a cash flow statement on the grounds that it qualifies as a small company.
