Ordinary Resolution to determine the annual membership fee as referred to in Article 13 of the Articles of Association

The current membership fee structure as follows:

1. Voluntary organisations with an annual turnover of less than £15,000	£20
2. Voluntary organisations with an annual turnover of between £15,000- £30,000	£40
3. Voluntary organisations with an annual turnover of between £ 30,000- £100,000	£60
4. Voluntary organisations with an annual turnover of more than £100,000	£80
5. Statutory sector organisations	£120
6. Private companies and organisations	£200
7. Individuals	£20
8. Newsletter subscriptions only	£15
9. Branch membership (for organisations with HQ)	£7.50

That the membership fee structure be amended and consolidated as follows:

Effective from the 4th December 2003 for new members and applying to existing members on date of renewal.

Full membership (with voting rights, membership benefits and magazine)

1.	Organisations with an annual turnover of less than £30,000, Individual membership and branch membership	£25
2.	Organisations with an annual turnover of more than £30,000	£80
3.	Spectrum Magazine Subscription only	£15

Note:

Branch memberships are only available to Parent organisations that are full members (i.e. with voting rights) and operate a network of branches.
