Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The charity's objects are that of the operation of a creative writing centre. The company runs a full programme of seminars and courses for writers. The programmes are assisted with grants from Creative Scotland, formerly the Scottish Arts Council.

New trustees to the board are elected by way of a general majority vote of the serving trustees.

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Objectives and activities

The primary purpose of Moniack Mhor is to provide excellence in furthering literature and language in Scotland. By providing residential courses at Moniack Mhor new literature is created, the skills of writers are enhanced, young people gain the opportunity to develop confidence in the creative process and writers benefit from space and time to write through retreats at the centre. Moniack Mhor is working to develop its full potential as the literature hub for writers nationally and locally, and to to attract international partnerships.

Achievements and performance

The key achievements of 2018-19, our 25th year, were delivering a programme of week-long residential courses, writing retreats and one-day workshops as part of an open programme of activity. Our occupancy was down on last year, mainly due to an unfortunate number of tutor cancellations, with a year end occupancy across the whole open programme of 79% (below our 82% target).

Genres of courses delivered included Fiction, Nature Writing, Flash Fiction, Memoir, Crime Writing, Historical Fiction, Young Adult S/F Fantasy, Narrative Non-Fiction, Comic Writing, Writing for Radio, Songwriting, Poetry, Journalism and From Page to Publication. Tutors and guests on the open programme included prominent Scottish writers who were among the first to tutor at Moniack Mhor when it first started: Alan Spence, Janice Galloway, A L Kennedy, Tom Pow, Douglas Dunn. Others included Val McDermid, Louise Welsh, Linda Cracknell, Helen Lederer, Gillian Slovo, Paul Magrs, Richard Beard, Graeme MacRae Burnet, Kit de Waal, Alan Bisset, Gail Honeyman, Paul Magrs, Leila Aboulela, Boo Hewerdine, Eddi Reader, journalists Peter Geoghan and Chitra Ramaswamy and BBC R4 Home Front writer and producer team, Katie Hims and Jessica Dromgoole.

During March 2019, we piloted a month of residencies. Eleven UK-based mid-career and established writers were resident for one or two weeks, alongside our Jessie Kesson Fellow, poet Stewart Sanderson, and our first ever international writers in residence, leading Nigerian poet Efe Paul Azino and runner-up Canadian poet-playwright-performer, Rodney DeCroo. Efe and Rodney's residencies were made possible by British Council funding. Efe delivered readings in three venues across Scotland, including at the StAnza Festival; he was joined in Ullapool and Skye by Rodney, and at our celebratory Words from the Hill ceilidh in Abriachan Hall by all our writers in residence and two traditional musicians.

Our Awards programme continued to nurture talented aspiring writers. The Bridge Awards for Emerging Writers had a record 200 applications and was shared between Hanna Randall and Liz Hyder. It provided a tailor-made package of support including retreats, courses and mentoring - Liz Hyder's book Bearmouth has since been published. Our Writing for Children awards winner, Hannah Sanguinette, received mentoring from Lindsey Fraser and Kathryn Ross of Fraser Ross Associates. We also awarded our inaugural Katharine Stewart award to Shona Macpherson, and the Travel

Writing Award to Neil Shaw. Finally, with a fee-donation from one of our tutors, we developed the Two Roads Award to enable two talented writers of low income to attend Moniack Mhor on a course in 2019.

We continued to facilitate the Highland Book Prize on behalf of the Highland Society of London. In this second year of the prize, we received 57 titles, and 87 avid readers were involved in the first round of judging. The longlist was released in November, and the winning title, Now We Shall Be Entirely Free, by Andrew Miller, was announced in spring 2019 (judged by Kevin MacNeil, Jenny Niven and Alex Ogilvie). It was agreed that future involvement with the Prize would require additional funding/sponsorship and fruitful discussions began with Alex Ogilvie (Highland Society of London) to allow the creation of a one-day-per-week post to help coordinate the Prize from 2019 onwards.

Following our successful application to The Life Changes Trust to run a programme of activity for care experienced young people during 2018-21, we were granted £129,470 over three years. This included the appointment of a part-time Project Coordinator to manage the activity, who took up post in June 2018 to manage this Creative and Active Lives programme.

During the first year of Creative and Active Lives, we worked with 43 care experienced young people. This work was in the form of residential workshops at Moniack Mhor, regular workshops at the Scottish Poetry Library in Edinburgh, one to one mentóring to young people who are not able to engage in group settings, and a group at Dingwall Academy. Activities included creative writing, song writing, street art and poetry. We also worked with the group to produce a CD of their own music compositions. Young people have attended from the Central Belt, Highland and the Western and Northern Islands. One residential workshop is being offered that is for females only. We have worked with young people who in addition to being care experienced are experiencing mental health challenges as well as gender identity issues.

We received £10,000 funding from Bord na Gàidhlig to deliver a Gaelic programme throughout 2018-19, which started in November with a songwriting residency tutored by Mary Anne Kennedy and Griogair Laurie. The whole week was facilitated as an immersive Gaelic opportunity, providing a potent environment for development and creation of work. This was followed in early 2019 by two one-day workshops in storytelling (for Gaelic learners) and Tales of the Fianna (for fluent speakers), both led by Gaelic writer, Ruairidh Macilleathain. Partnerships that visited the Centre during 2018-19 once again included the Scottish Book Trust's New Writers Award winners, Carol Ann Duffy's retreat week, Manchester Metropolitan University/Writing School, the Society of Authors in Scotland, the Workers Educational Association and a songwriting retreat led by Boo Hewerdine. Youth partnerships included the Scottish Book Trust's 'What's Your Story' award winners, the last ever visit by the Pushkin Prize winners (the patron has retired), and tutored visits from Sir John Deane's College and George Watson's College.

We increased staff resource to managing our Friends Scheme with the aim of increasing membership and improving communications - our first Friends newsletter was produced in early 2019, and at December 2018 we had 65 Friends.

Our youth programme included positively received workshops with Inverness High School students, funded through the school's Pupil Equity Funding and tutored by Cynthia Rogerson, Karen Campbell and Alan Bissett. Writers Donald S. Murray and Linda Cracknell also undertook writing tuition with young people on a multi-arts project funded through Highland Youth Arts Hub in partnership with Historic Scotland, interpreting or responding to Urquhart Castle and the surrounding area. A screening of the participants' work was held in Eden Court Theatre in November. Numbers of young people (aged 13-26) attending the monthly writers' café held in Waterstones Inverness continued to rise to double figures at times, with a clear increase in levels of confidence in those attending. Funding from

Scottish Book Trust's Live Literature funding was successfully applied for to help continue this project during 2019. We also continue to support some students with 1:1 mentoring. A new writing club was set up by Cynthia Rogerson, who led monthly sharing sessions open to all at Moniack Mhor. The club has been well attended and much appreciated by the local writers

Restructuring

Following Board approval to restructure the staffing of the organisation, we made one redundancy and appointed two new part-time personnel to the new posts of General Manager (June 2018) and Centre Assistant (Oct 2018). Eilidh Smith was appointed to the new post of Programme Manager, taking on management of all our awards schemes as well as continuing as programmer for youth activity. We also appointed a Project Coordinator to our new Creative and Active Lives Project.

Financial review

The results for the year, and the charity's financial position at the end of the year are shown in the attached financial statements.

During the year the charity made a deficit of £243 (2018 - deficit £1,529). The amount of unrestricted reserves at 31 March 2019 amounted to £151,025 (2018 - £138,297) and restricted reserves amounted to £67,156 (2018 - £80,127).

The assets of the charity are held within restricted and unrestricted reserves. The unrestricted fund represents the accumulation of previous operating results.

The trustees have assessed that these assets are sufficient to meet the charity's ongoing obligations, and in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities whilst consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised.

Reserves Policy

In the trustees' view, the reserves should provide the charity with adequate financial stability and the means for it to meet its' charitable objectives for the foreseeable future. Reserves are required to bridge the gap between the spending and receiving of income and to cover unplanned emergency repairs and other expenditure. The level of free reserves is currently nil but the charity is working toward having 3 months of running costs in reserves.

Plans for future periods

In 2019-20, our open programme will continue in its current format, and again include several retreats to provide invaluable time and space for writers working at all levels. In partnership with Abriachan Forest Trust, we plan to pilot a short course with a childcare element attached, to further break down barriers to participation in creative writing activities both for established writers/tutors and aspiring writers. We also anticipate launching another short-term strand to our bursary scheme via a donation from two writers, which will support women writers who experience discrimination and inequality. Our Gaelic programme will continue throughout 2019, with a poetry residential week aimed at fluent speakers. In our youth programme, we plan to work with students from Glenurquhart High School on a series of workshops, and continue our writers' café for young people in Waterstones. In our Creative and Active Lives programme we will be working in another secondary school, and plan a photography workshop along with further residential writing and song writing opportunities. We will also be offering sessions on Shetland and the Western Isles to young people unable to travel. A new post will be created to administer The Highland Book Prize as it continues to grow in popularity.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ended 31 March 2019

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in Scotland and a registered charity in Scotland. The address of the registered office is 36 Huntly Street, Inverness, Scotland, IV3 5PR.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

The directors have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future due to secured funding from Creative Scotland for £116,333. The Directors will therefore continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the annual financial statements.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future project or commitment.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.
- income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.
- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking
 activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those
 support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable
 activities.
- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Tangible assets (continued)

An increase in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, unless it reverses a charge for impairment that has previously been recognised as expenditure within the statement of financial activities. A decrease in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, except to which it offsets any previous revaluation gain, in which case the loss is shown within other recognised gains and losses on the statement of financial activities.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Freehold property

- 2% straight line

Fixtures, fittings and equipment

- 15% reducing balance

Motor vehicles

- 25% straight line

Plant and machinery

- 15% reducing balance

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Defined contribution plans

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

When contributions are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the end of the reporting date in which the employees render the related service, the liability is measured on a discounted present value basis. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as an expense in the period in which it arises.

4. Limited by guarantee

Moniack Mhor Limited is a company limited by guarantee and accordingly does not have share capital.

Every member of the company undertakes to contribute such amount as may be required not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charitable company in the event of it being wound up while he or she is a member, or within one year after he or she ceases to be a member.
