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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES for the Year Ended 31 July 2022

The Trustees present their annual report and financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 July 2022.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), the Companies Act 2006 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK, effective 1 January 2019.

The legal and administrative information on page 14 forms part of this report.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

NYCOS is unique as a Scottish charity providing a national infrastructure for young people and music leaders to develop their singing. Founded in 1996 by Artistic Director Christopher Bell, we support children and young people to realise their vocal and musical potential and provide opportunities for thousands of young people, teachers and choir directors to develop choral singing across Scotland.

We deliver 8 National Choirs, including the internationally-renowned National Youth Choir of Scotland, a network of 14 Regional Choirs across the country, and a considerable Creative Learning programme which offers a wide range of activity and training for children, young people and adults. We believe that inclusion and progression go hand-in-hand. Excellence is at the centre of all our work and we continue to develop opportunities for children and young people, whatever their circumstances.

Following the COVID-19 pandemic, this year has been one of rebuilding youth singing delivery in Scotland. We have seen a real desire from people and communities to sing together again and have developed ensembles and programmes that encourage more children and young people to sing to the very highest standard. These activities have involved restarting our National Choir residential courses and concerts, recruiting new participants for our Regional Choirs and running projects that encourage singing in areas across Scotland.

NYCOS is an integral part of the music education and cultural infrastructure and is a member of various partnership bodies, including the Time to Shine working group (youth arts strategy), Music Education Partnership Group, Scottish Government Cross-Party Group for Music, Arts, in Education Emergency Recovery Group and the Classical Music Sustainability Group.

On 30 March 2022 we were awarded £224,434 from the Creative Scotland Recovery Fund for Cultural Organisations. These funds are to support activities including boys singing, workforce development and digital resources for schools, new Alumni capacity and activity, and the replenishment of reserves affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. This grant will allow us to plan with confidence during these challenging times, with all the grant designated for specific activity.

During the year, the Trustees agreed to renew the terms of Keith Bruce, Lindsay Law and Lindsay Thomson until 2024-2025. Norrie McKay, James Inglis and Nicky Pritchett-Brown came to the end of their extended terms and resigned as Trustees, and we welcomed Clare Castell, Catriona McDonald and Ann Monfries as new Trustees.

We are proud of what we have achieved this year in exceptional circumstances and thank our Trustees, employees, leaders, funders, individual donors and partners for their work and support. Thanks also to our Principal Supporters Creative Scotland and Glasgow Life and our Education Partner National Association of Schoolmasters Union of Women Teachers (NASUWT).

Activity and Delivery

National Choirs

Applications closed in Autumn 2021 for National Choirs with a total of 509 applications. Auditions were held in Edinburgh, Glasgow, Perth, Aberdeen, Inverness, Dundee and Dumfries, and online for those in remote locations and with accessibility needs. These were the first auditions we have held since the COVID-19 pandemic and significant impact on the confidence, vocal quality and musical ability of children and young people was apparent. Over the year we have worked to rebuild voices and confidence, especially for those who were new to NYCOS or were younger.

Chamber Choir (supported by the Leverhulme Trust's Arts Scholarships Programme)

It has long been our ambition to run a small choir of very experienced singers who could tackle challenging and interesting repertoire, tour to places that could not accommodate our larger choirs and perform at an exceptional standard. With the support of the Leverhulme Trust's Arts Scholarships Programme over four years, we created this new mixed-voice group. Singers performed pop-up performances outside venues across East Lothian as part of the Lammermuir Festival in September 2022 and were invited to provide a BBC broadcast recorded in Greyfriars Kirk, Edinburgh to celebrate its 400th anniversary. This was broadcast on Christmas Day 2021.

As well as attending the National Youth Choir of Scotland residential course, the Chamber Choir held a rehearsal weekend in July in St Andrews, with concerts in Holy Trinity Church and then at the Lammermuir Festival. The same choir prepared to perform Elgar's *Dream of Gerontius* with the Royal Scottish National Orchestra and Sir Andrew Davies, as part of the Edinburgh International Festival in August 2022.

National Youth Choir of Scotland and Training Choir

In August 2021, 73 members of the 2021 National Youth Choir of Scotland attended a residential course on the Isle of Cumbrae, the first since July 2019.

During the course, a film was made of the choir on the beach, with choir members standing on the rocks, performing *We Hold the Future* (composed by Jerry Kay) to be played as part of the Opening Ceremony of the Scottish Parliament on 2 October 2021. On 11 September 2021, 20 singers represented Scotland at the BBC Last Night at The Proms; filming took place at The Helix Park in Falkirk, home of the Kelpies, where the choir sang *The Island Spinning Song*, directed by Christopher Bell and accompanied by Jenn Butterworth, guitar, and Adam Sutherland, violin.



The National Youth Choir of Scotland residential course was held in July 2022 in Edinburgh. The Training Choir performed at Stirling Castle and in Edinburgh, and the main choir prepared for a tour of Scotland in August. On 27 June 2022 members of the choir appeared in a promotion for the Edinburgh International Festival at Murrayfield Stadium, in preparation for a performance in the MACRO event with the Australian acrobatic dance company Gravity and Other Myths.

National Boys Choir

85 members attended the National Boys Choir course in April 2022 and performed at the Queens Hall Edinburgh. The National Boys Choir met up again in early May for an overnight stay at Broomlee outdoor centre, where participants came together to rehearse and prepare for a concert the next day at the opening of the Melrose Music Festival. The concert took place at Holy Trinity Parish Church, Melrose to a full capacity audience.

National Girls Choir

110 young people attended the National Girls Choir course, with a performance at the RSNO New Auditorium, Glasgow. As well as their own concert, the National Girls Choir were preparing to sing in Orff's Carmina Burana, with the BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra, Edinburgh Festival Chorus and Sir Donald Runnicles, for the Opening Concert of the Edinburgh International Festival.

Alumni Choir

Our first NYCOS Alumni event was held in Edinburgh on 27 November 2021. A choir of 85 former National Youth Choir of Scotland members recorded six Christmas carols as part of the BBC Christmas Day broadcast. Many of the Alumni singers were excited at the prospect of future events, and suggestions ranged from one day events to 'recreating' a residential course over a weekend.



Regional Choirs

From August 2021, all of our Regional Choirs met again in person. In September, there were 650 members across Scotland, significantly lower than pre-pandemic numbers of 1,450. As there had been no recruitment for two years and older members had left, we instigated a recruitment drive through a combination of in-school workshops and 'try-out' sessions held within the choirs in November 2021 and May 2022. By the end of the academic year, the number of singers had increased to 1,100, many of whom were aged 8-9 years.

We appointed new Regional Choirs Directors and Associate Directors: Andrew McTaggart and Anna Ghazal (Renfrewshire), Mark Evans and Eileen Edgar (NYCOS Stirling), Karol Fitzpatrick and Moira Morrison (NYCOS Midlothian).

In August, BBC Alba broadcast the NYCOS Inverness Choir singing at Culloden and in September, STV News visited our choir in Aberdeen. NYCOS Midlothian Choir recorded a film of support for the 2021 United Nations Climate Change Conference (COP 26) and in December, the Regional Choirs held performances for the first time in two years. The feedback from the parents, staff, and members has been positive, with the general feeling that all concerned were delighted to return to in-person activity.

Bill Dove, the NYCOS Edinburgh Choir Coordinator, was awarded a British Empire Medal for services to music and young people. Bill has been involved with NYCOS Edinburgh Choir in various capacities since 1998; his long-standing service proving to be both invaluable and inspirational to NYCOS and its members. We completed Gold Testing for members of the Belfast Philharmonic Youth Choir and Falkirk Regional Choir, and we had 34 candidates across 10 of our choirs sitting the tests.

Creative Learning

Mini Music Makers

Able to return to indoor singing after the pandemic, we started in-person weekly early years sessions in 3 locations as well as online. In partnership with the Dollar Community Development Trust, we started new activity in Dollar in March 2022 and during the summer holidays, we ran a series of pop-up sessions at local toddler groups and nurseries in partnership with West Lothian Council.

Schools

With funding from the Creative Scotland Youth Arts Fund and The Robertson Trust, we delivered the 'Loving Learning Through Music' project in Aberdeen, Dingwall and Fort William. The project addressed the need for positive intervention to achieve better learning outcomes for children in 8 primary schools in areas of multiple deprivation, using an interdisciplinary approach by combining music with numeracy and literacy to enthuse and build the learning of children, including those who are deaf or hearing impaired. Signed-singing leader Dr. Paul Whittaker described his most worthwhile moment on the project:

"It's that moment when someone discovers music and a light has been switched on for them. That feeling of allowing it to happen, encouraging it and developing it, is so rewarding and worthwhile. You're giving someone a skill and a pleasure that can last them a lifetime. We're privileged in the way we can change and touch lives. It happens when you have a whole class, or even whole school, signing something together, but also happens in the tiny moments of noticing someone make eye contact with you and they smile; of someone genuinely being able to communicate for the first time; in someone being able to play 2 bars of rhythm perfectly on a drum. There have been quite a few of these moments."

NYCOS has continued to deliver music activity in primary schools with Local Authorities, supported by Creative Scotland Youth Music Initiative funding. Partnerships this year have included direct delivery in primary schools in East Lothian, Edinburgh, Renfrewshire and West Lothian, with new training in the Western Isles. As part of our West Lothian Local Authority contract, we delivered sessions at Pinewood School, a school for primary and secondary children with additional support needs.

We were awarded Erasmus+ funding to take part in a project to support the continuation of online music education from 2021-23. The project entitled *Presto: Practices and Resources for Equipping Schools to Teach Music Online* is funded by the European Union to develop flexible and adaptable solutions for remote or restricted musical activity by schools. Project partners include Liszt Academy of Music (Hungary), Caprice Oy (Finland), Dublin City University (Ireland), and Sing Ireland. The new resources designed by all partners will be published online on a Presto website by April 2023.

In August 2021 we began a 2-year relationship with the Diocese of Leeds Singing Programme to create music notation resources for use in primary schools.

Open Access

In 2022 we completed the Wee Sing project, supported by a Creative Scotland YMI Access to Music-Making grant. This project involved in-school workshops and after-school singing clubs in areas of socio-economic deprivation across the country. We worked with Local Authorities to identify areas to deliver in and built partnerships in communities. With West Lothian Council, we ran a free 5-day Summer Wee Sing during the holidays for P3-P7 children.

Training

Our Creative Learning Director, Lucinda Geoghegan, remains in constant demand for training worldwide and NYCOS was engaged to deliver training to Local Authorities, NASUWT, Scottish Book Trust, Scottish Association of Music Education and Big Noise.

We have continued to run our year-round 10-week online musicianship and methodology courses, which can count towards the new British Kodály Certificate, in partnership with the British Kodály Academy and accredited by CPD UK.

On 2-6 August 2021, we held our second online Kodály At Home online Summer School. 150 delegates attended sessions with leaders from around the world and the event was kindly sponsored by NASUWT. We are planning for the 2022 Summer School to be delivered in person.

Publications and Resources

In response to the Black Lives Matter movement, we continued to analyse our resources so that they are appropriate for children of primary school age to sing. We have been updating and publishing new editions of our publications and creating digital versions for sale through our website.

Information Management

In August 2021, Head of National Choirs Ruth Townsend and Head of Creative Learning Carole Allen both retired, having worked for 21 years and 17 years respectively. We thank them both for their commitment to NYCOS over the years and everything they have done to benefit children and young people. We appointed 3 new Producer roles in their place — Regional Choirs, Natalie Brayshaw; National Choirs, Kenny Boyd; and Creative Learning, Anna Ghazal. Eilidh McNaughton was also appointed as General Manager.

We submitted a successful application to the Digital Boost grant scheme for the expenditure anticipated in necessary IT Infrastructure upgrades this year, including preparing for a CRM upgrade later in 2022.

To increase accessibility, we have adapted our Financial Assistance system to be less formal and bureaucratic. Instead of needing to submit an application form for support with evidence of income, we have designed a more responsive model which requires families to select a percentage fee reduction at the point of membership renewal. We test the process by requesting evidence from 10% of recipients and have seen a small increase in the need for fee reduction.

Sustainability

We appointed our Regional Choirs Producer, Natalie Brayshaw, as our Green Champion. Natalie attended climate events such as the Cultural Climate Leadership in a Net Zero Landscape webinar led by Creative Carbon Scotland, the Springboard local assembly for creative climate action, is a member of the Scottish Classical Music Sustainability Group and reports to Creative Scotland on our Sustainability Plan. We were a partner in the publication of the Scottish Classical Music Green Guide July 2021 and are planning our journey to net-zero by 2045. This involves plans to reduce our annual carbon budget, including through reduction in travel, recycling and landfill waste:

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial Position

The Financial results of the charitable company are as set out in the attached financial statements. The charitable company's incoming resources for the year ended 31 July 2022 totalled £1,407,169 (2021: £705,208). There was an overall increase in the funds of the charitable company of £238,079 (2021: £24,974 decrease). There is a general fund balance of £79,472. In addition there are designated fund of £348,334 and restricted funds of £30,919.

In regard to this position, the trustees would refer to the reserves policy below and Note 19 in the notes to the financial statements.

Principal funding sources

NYCOS receives revenue funding from Creative Scotland, which makes up 14% of our budget. In addition, NYCOS received support from the following Trusts and Foundations for which we are most grateful:

Investment policy and objectives

The charity does not hold any investments. Any surplus cash flow during the year is deposited in suitable bank accounts.

Reserves policy

The trustees have endeavoured to build up sufficient reserves to support the ongoing activities of the charity and like many other charitable bodies would aim to have free unrestricted funds equal to three months of anticipated unrestricted expenditure. Based on review of historic expenditure and projections, this equates to £140,917. The actual free unrestricted funds at 31 July 2022 were £79,472 (2021: £87,327) and are reviewed on an annual basis. Through regular ongoing review of financial performance, open and transparent dialogue with key stakeholders and seeking to ensure additional funding, the Trustees will seek to correct this position in order to provide for any unanticipated costs or a significant decline in income.

Going concern

The charity has cash resources and has no requirement for external borrowings. The charity's financial performance is continually monitored through management accounts and budgets and projections are prepared to provide assurance regarding its financial plans and its ability to meet expected financial commitments as they fall due.

The trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no known material uncertainties regarding the charity's ability to continue as a going concern. The trustees therefore continue to believe the going concern basis of accounting appropriate in preparing the annual financial statements.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The National Youth Choir Of Scotland (NYCOS) is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Recruitment and appointment of new Trustees

As set out in the Articles of Association the Trustees may be appointed and removed by the members of the charity. The minimum number of directors as set out in the Articles of Association is eight and the maximum is eleven.

Organisational structure

The charity, being limited by guarantee, does not have an issued share capital in which the trustees can hold an interest

The Board of Trustees meets four times per annum and there is a sub-committee covering financial and personnel matters which meets 3 times per annum.

New Trustees are briefed by the Chairman, Chief Executive and Artistic Director in advance of their appointment.

Trustees are encouraged to attend concerts and other events being organised by the charity and to generally promote the charity through their professional and personal networks.

The Chief Executive (Edward Milner) and Artistic Director (Christopher Bell) have delegated authority for operational and artistic matters within terms approved by the Trustees.

Glasgow City Council provides the NYCOS office premises.

Induction and training of new Trustees

Trustees receive personal induction prior to, and on, appointment.

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of National Youth Choir of Scotland (the 'charitable company') for the year ended 31 July 2022 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities (including an income and expenditure account), the Balance Sheet, the Cash Flow Statement and the notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the Year Ended 31 July 2022

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

The charity is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated and registered in Scotland, under company number SC165149 and has no share capital. The liability of each member in the event of winding up the charitable company is limited to £1.

The charity's registered number is SC024899.

The registered office is The Mitchell, North Street, Glasgow, G3 7DN.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity's presentation currency is Sterling and amounts in the financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Going Concern

The charity has cash resources and has no requirement for external borrowings. The charity's financial performance is continually monitored through management accounts and budgets and projections are prepared to provide assurance as to its financial well-being going forward. The trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no known material uncertainties regarding the charity's ability to continue as a going concern. The trustees therefore continue to believe the going concern basis of accounting appropriate in preparing the annual financial statements

Income

All income from donations, subscriptions, course fees, concert receipts and bank interest is accounted for on a receivable basis.

Trading activity income is the income generated from the sale of CDs, books and educational resources. All income from these activities is accounted for on a receivable basis.

Revenue grants receivable by the charity are credited to the Income and Expenditure Account in the period to which they relate.

Expenditure

Costs relating to raising funds, charitable activities expenditure and support costs are charged to income and expenditure on an accruals basis. Expenditure is recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation to pay for expenditure. Irrecoverable VAT is charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as an expense.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the Year Ended 31 July 2022

Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Raising funds costs are the costs attributable to trading activities of the charity. Direct costs of charitable activities are the costs attributable to the activities in meeting the charitable objects of the charity. Support costs are costs attributable to the management of the charity and its financial affairs.

Governance costs, a category within support costs, are costs attributable to compliance with statutory requirements.

Tangible fixed assets

All expenditure on tangible fixed assets is capitalised at cost. Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Equipment -

33% straight line

Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement amount.

Debtors

Trade debtors and accrued income are recognised at the settlement amount due with appropriate allowances for any irrecoverable amounts when there is objective evidence that the asset is impaired.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents in the balance sheet comprise cash on hand and cash at bank with a short term of maturity, being twelve months or less, from the opening of the deposit or similar account.

Creditors

Trade creditors, accrued expenses and other creditors are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event and are recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Operating leases

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risk of ownership remain with the lessor are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Pensions

The charitable company contributes to defined contribution schemes and contributions are charged through the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the Year Ended 31 July 2022

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Fund accounting

Funds held by the charity are either:-

Unrestricted general funds – these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees.

Unrestricted designated funds – these are funds set aside by the trustees for future purposes or projects as identified by the trustees.

Restricted funds – these are funds that can only be used for the particular restricted purpose as specified by the donor or when the funds are raised for particular purposes.

Employee benefits policy

The cost of short term employee benefits are recognised as a liability and an expense, unless these costs are required to be recognised as part of the cost of stock of fixed assets.

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are terminated.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are not considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods. Key sources of estimation have been applied as follows:

Bad debt provision - the charity makes an estimate of the recoverable value of trade and other debtors. When assessing impairment of debtors, management considers factors including credit rating of the customer, previous payment patterns and ageing of the debt.

Depreciation - management assess the depreciation rate by giving consideration to the useful life of each asset class and of its use within the charity.

The charity contributes to defined contribution schemes. The assets of the schemes are held separately from those of the charitable company. The pension costs are as shown above. Pension contributions payable at 31 July 2022 totalled £2,003 (2021: £1,617)

The Trustees and the Chief Executive are the key management personnel of the charity. The total employee benefits of key management, including employer's pension contributions and employer's national insurance and excluding expenses, for the year ended 31 July 2022 were £65,847 (2021: £65,018).
