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## Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 July 2021

2020-21 is the second financial year when the COVID-19 pandemic has severely hampered the operations of what is, by definition, an organisation which depends on close group personal contact. No National Choir courses were possible, an entire year of Regional Choirs took place online and Creative Learning activities had to be significantly adapted.

And yet 2020-21 has been a success. NYCOS can take pride in the way it has faced these challenges. As can be seen from the detailed Trustees' Report, NYCOS has undertaken a remarkable and varied amount of work to keep the flame of singing burning.

These achievements and this level of activity have been driven by an unquenchable desire to continue to deliver the charity's mission in whatever way possible. The remarkable flowering of activity immediately it was permitted in May 2021 bears testament to this. This has all been buttressed by excellent administration which has kept the financial damage to a minimum. Christopher, Ed and the wider team have the Board of Trustees' sincere thanks for everything that they have achieved.

I would like to thank Creative Scotland for their continuing support through this challenging period. I would also like to thank the Trusts & Foundations, Sponsors, Donors and Friends who have maintained their support.

### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

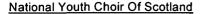
### Charitable activities

NYCOS occupies a unique place in Scotland's cultural landscape as a charity providing a national infrastructure for young people and music leaders to develop their singing. Founded in 1996, and directed by founding Artistic Director Christopher Bell, we are committed to supporting children and young people to realise their vocal and musical potential and provide opportunities for young people, teachers and choir directors to support and develop choral singing across Scotland. In 2019-20, we worked with over 2,800 children, young people and leaders who were born, resident or studying in Scotland or of Scottish descent.

We consist of 7 National Choirs, including the internationally-renowned National Youth Choir of Scotland, a network of 15 Regional Choirs across the country and a considerable Creative Learning programme that engages in a wide range of activity and training for children, young people and adults. We believe that inclusion and progression go hand-in-hand and we work to ensure that the greatest number of children and young people sing with NYCOS. Excellence is at the centre of all our work and we continue to increase opportunity for children and young people, whatever their circumstances.

As the pandemic has progressed, we have continued to adapt our strategic planning and delivery around restrictions. Our Board of Trustees and Finance Committee have met throughout the year and worked closely with the Artistic Director and Chief Executive Officer, and office administration. We have taken steps to lessen the impact of the pandemic on the organisation, including making use of the furlough scheme and applying for support grants, and have been quick to adapt our expenditure as the income has changed.

We are proud of what we have achieved this year in exceptional circumstances and thank our employees, leaders, funders, partners and trustees for their support.

In January 2021, we appointed James Waters as our new Chair of the Board of Trustees. James is Director of the Lammermuir Festival, Creative Director for Classical Music at Perth Concert Hall and classical programmer at the Bath Festival. James has a long association with NYCOS, having been a member of the working party in 1995, the inaugural NYCOS board as well as re-joining the board between 2013 and 2019.

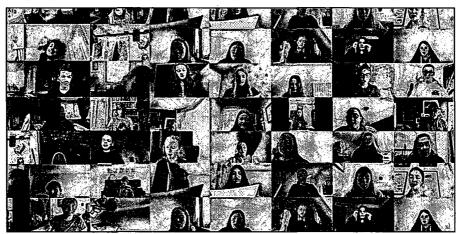

### **Activity and Delivery**

### **National Choirs**

In December 2020 and April 2021, we ran online weekend courses for our National Boys Choir and National Girls Choir. We followed the pattern of a day at a residential course with welcome meeting, sectional and tutti rehearsals finishing with social activities. 83 boys and 92 girls joined the courses and we invited boys from our Regional Choirs to join us.

Throughout the year, we carefully assessed the Scottish Government's COVID-19 guidance and its impact on singing and our activities. With a variety of restrictions in place, we worked with partners including Making Music and the Music Education Partnership Group to find clarity and encourage the use of research in decision-making.

As new guidance in Scotland allowed people to gather outside to sing, Artistic Director Christopher Bell and 29 members of the National Youth Choir of Scotland gathered on Calton Hill, Edinburgh at 6am on 17 May 2021 to be the first to sing again in Scotland and the UK. This return to singing was captured throughout the morning beginning with live broadcasts on BBC Breakfast and BBC Radio Scotland, and huge national and international media, including BBC News at Six (BBC One), BBC 3 Breakfast, BBC Radio 2 (Claudia Winkleman), all major Scotlish and UK press and international exposure. Millions of people saw the National Youth Choir of Scotland singing with thousands of retweets and likes on social media.



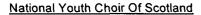
This was followed by a number of outside singing events for the National Youth Choir of Scotland, National Boys Choir and National Girls Choir in Bishopbriggs (East Dunbartonshire), Falcon Bowling and Tennis Club (Edinburgh), South St Nicholas Church (Aberdeen), The Tramway (Glasgow) and Holmehill (Dunblane). We also produced a short film celebrating our return to singing, called "Singing Together Again".

The National Youth Choir of Scotland released several recordings this year. 'Air Falalalo and Westering Home' were recorded by the National Youth Choir of Scotland with the Royal Scottish National Orchestra in 2017 and were released on St Andrews Day (30 November 2021).

We released a collection of Christmas Carols on Signum Classics, recorded originally in 2013. The album entitled 'Until We Meet Again' includes Paul Mealor's moving *I Pray* with soloist Jamie MacDougall and features recordings from the National Youth Choir of Scotland and National Children's Choir, (members of the National Boys and National Girls choirs) conducted by Artistic Director, Christopher Bell.

Some tracks featured on BBC Classics Unwrapped and were also included in BBC One Reflections from the Quay.

On Spotify, we rereleased John Gardner's Burns Sequence, settings of eight poems by Robert Burns, featuring the National Youth Choir of Scotland and the Royal Scottish National Orchestra for Burns Day on 25 January 2021.

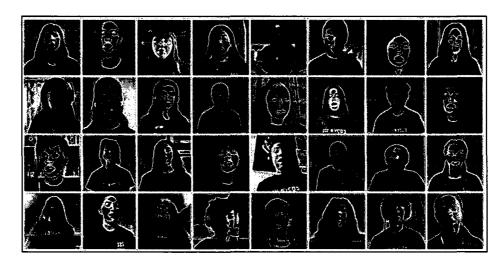
We were approached by the Franco Scottish Society in November 2020 to create a pre-recorded event for the society's Christmas meal. The film consisted of six members singing Christmas music alongside excerpts from the 2014 BBC Watchnight Service. We were also approached by an American folk-singer living in Scotland called Addie Brik looking for young singers to be part of her song "What is Inside". We offered NGC who rehearsed the track and then provided their own recordings to be built into a virtual backing.

### **Regional Choirs**

Over the 2020-21 academic year, all 15 of the Regional Choirs continued to meet online. NYCOS staff teaching from home found creative ways to continue musicianship games, which have always been an integral part of Regional Choir rehearsals. Young singers were encouraged to use household objects to aid their learning, such as wooden spoons for drumsticks or a rolled-up pair of socks as a ball.

In this time of isolation, NYCOS is a beacon of light. Bringing friends together to enjoy singing and continuing to learn and develop musicianship skills is bringing so much joy to not only the young people in our choir, but the staff. With our weekly scavenger hunts, quizzes and crazy challenges, we enjoy the lighter side of being together in isolation and with a renewed, shared focus on repertoire that we know is being enjoyed across Scotland in all the Regional Choirs. Our members are clinging to the hope that we will all be able to sing these wonderful songs together at some point in the future, in whatever form that may take. (Choir Director)

We were successful in an application to be one of the choirs chosen for the 2021 Friday Afternoons projects (Aldeburgh Music). Each year a new set of songs for primary-school-age children is published free and this year the songs are composed by Russell Hepplewhite, with lyrics by Michael Rosen. The NYCOS Edinburgh Senior Choir recorded the song Fire, which was released online in May 2021.



In June 2021, due to the easing of COVID-19 regulations, we were able to plan outdoor events for the Regional Choirs in almost all areas. The first choir to get together for the first time in 15 months was Isle of Lewis Choir on Coll Beach. Other choirs sang outside a nursing home in West Lothian, at Culloden battlefield and at Newbattle Abbey College.

NYCOS Gold written tests took place on 13 June 2021 in five centres with 35 candidates taking part. The practical part of the tests took place over four evenings with online assessments. Due to the pandemic, we were not able to recruit an entire year group of the youngest children and we discounted the autumn 2020 fees by 50% to encourage retention of members. We flexibly furloughed all Regional Choir music delivery staff. At the end of the academic year, 3 Regional Choir Directors left us voluntarily after long services.

### **Creative Learning**

### Mini Music Makers

Online classes for early years children started again in August 2020, attracting participants from across Scotland and internationally including from Shetland, Stornoway, France, The Netherlands, Abu Dhabi, Hong Kong and Singapore. The leaders ran a combined online Festive Party on 18 December 2021 attended by 56 people.

We worked with the Scottish Refugee Council to explore how we could offer free music activities for those families who are waiting on confirmed status after arriving in Scotland. During the Easter holidays we provided a short online Mini Music Makers session as part of the Scottish Refugee Council Easter Activities week, where families could join in via Zoom link. We were delighted to be able to offer free places to 12 children and hope that this will encourage more families to join in for the final block before the summer.

At the end of the summer 2021, we ran outdoor events in Rutherglen on 17 July and in the Hidden Gardens at Tramway on 24 July.

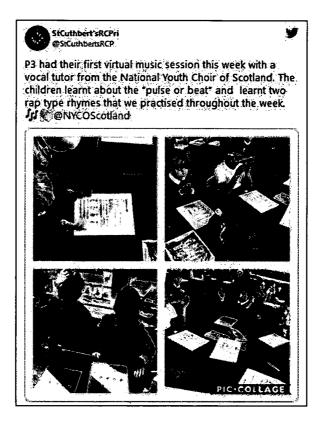

### **YMI Local Authority Partnerships**

We have continued to deliver active music lessons for primary schools over the past year through the *Sounds Musical* project. Each year NYCOS staff visit schools to teach music classes to Primary 3 and 4 children through Youth Music Initiative programmes with partner authorities funded by Creative Scotland. During the pandemic, leaders have provided resources and training videos to schools in Edinburgh, Renfrewshire, West Lothian and Western Isles. The sessions introduce children to musical concepts, rhythm and beat through fun singing games and each lesson is tailored to use in the classroom and at home.

### **Open Access**

### YMI Access to Music Making Grant - Wee Sing

This open-access project was broadened to account for restrictions. Instead of running taster sessions for primary school-age children in the summer term, we produced online Wee Summer Sing and Wee Winter Sing resources aimed at P1-P3 children in home settings. Two of the videos were included in an online events series produced by the Music Education Partnership Group and all the videos have been added to a new Video Library on our website.

### **Training**

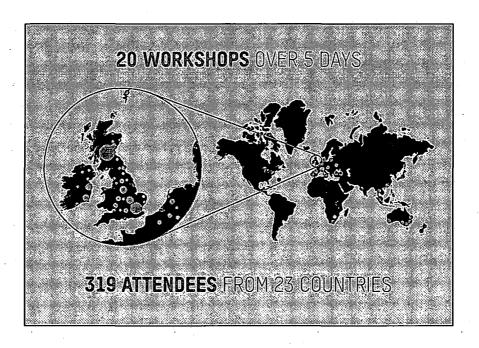
Our Director of Creative Learning, Lucinda Geoghegan, remains in constant demand for training worldwide, including Hong Kong, Doha, Australia and Singapore. Nearer to home, Lucinda delivered a training session for Opera North's *In Harmony* team and a series of training workshops for Sistema Scotland. Following their initial success, we have continued to run our year-round 10-week online musicianship and methodology courses, which can count towards the new British Kodály Certificate, accredited by CPD UK.

For the first time, we offered a series of conducting classes tailored to suit the needs of people working at different levels led by Artistic Director Christopher Bell.

Every year we run a Kodály musicianship training course during the summer at Merchiston Castle School with around 90 attendees. In 2020 we moved the course online, giving primary school teachers, class music teachers, instrumental teachers, nursery practitioners and freelance musicians the chance to learn, network and sing together from the comfort of their own homes. Session topics included Kodály teaching methodology, Colourstrings courses, choral and singing technique and songs from across the British Isles and South East Asia. 350 participants joined the course and three of the sessions were so oversubscribed that we ran them again two weeks later with 253 attendees. Kodály At Home is supported by NASUWT, our education supporter.

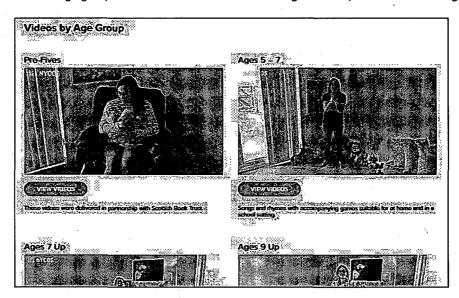

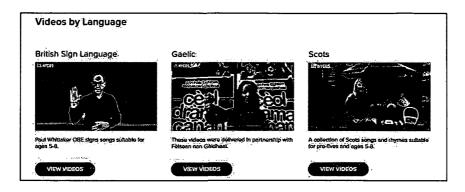
### **Resources and Publications**

Making use of all the resources we created throughout the pandemic, we created a free bank of videos resources on our website. These have been organised into age-groups and there are also sections of songs in Gaelic, Scots and British Sign Language.

### **Training - continued**



We publish 6 books of children's songs, games and rhymes with probably well over 400 songs. In response to the Black Lives Matter movement, we have been exploring our resources to ensure that they are appropriate for children of primary-school age to sing. We connected with an American professor, Susan Brumfield, and in late July we hosted a session where she addressed Unconscious Racism/Bias, Appropriation, Blackface etc with particular focus on children's folk songs/games within our books. We have been analysing all our resources and we have published our first new edition of existing material in digital and physical format.

### Partnership working and Advocacy

NYCOS remains an integral part of the nation's music education and culture infrastructure and is part of various partnership bodies, including the Time to Shine working group (youth arts strategy), Music Education Partnership Group, Scottish Government Cross-Party Group for Music, Arts in Education Emergency Recovery Group (a new group of arts and cultural organisations working together and with Creative Scotland) and the Classical Music Sustainability Group.

### **Administration**

In response to the coronavirus pandemic and government support, we flexibly furloughed all of our music delivery staff and members of our office staff where appropriate.

We contracted David Walker to review our Safeguarding Policy (including a new Digital Safeguarding Policy), protocols and training.

### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

### **Financial Position**

The Financial results of the charitable company are as set out in the attached financial statements. The charitable company's incoming resources for the year ended 31.07.2021 totalled £705,208 (2020: £1,061,289). There was an overall decrease in the funds of the charitable company of £24,974 (2020: £42,946 decrease). There is a general fund balance of £87,327 In addition to a designated fund of £105,900 and restricted funds of £27,419.

In regard to this position, the trustees would refer to the reserves policy below and Note 19 in the notes to the financial statements.

### Principal funding sources

NYCOS receives revenue funding from Creative Scotland, which makes up 17% of our budget. In addition, NYCOS received support from the following Trusts and Foundations for which we are most grateful:

The Jennie S Gordon Memorial Foundation, The Turtleton Charitable Trust, The John Mather Trust, Mary Andrew Trust, D'Oyly Carte Trust, The William Syson Foundation, MV Millhouse Trust Dalziel Trust, MEB Charitable Trust, Nancie Massey Charitable Trust, Murdoch Forrest Charitable Trust, Stevenston Charitable Trust, and Cruden Foundation.

### Investment policy and objectives

The charity does not hold any investments. Any surplus cash flow during the year is deposited in suitable bank accounts.

### **Reserves policy**

The trustees have endeavoured to build up sufficient reserves to support the ongoing activities of the charity and like many other charitable bodies would aim to have free unrestricted funds equal to three months of anticipated unrestricted expenditure. Based on review of historic expenditure and projections, this equates to £140,917. The actual free unrestricted funds at 31 July 2021 were £87,327 (2020: £117,288) and are reviewed on an annual basis.

Through regular ongoing review of financial performance, open and transparent dialogue with key stakeholders and seeking to ensure additional funding, the Trustees will seek to correct this position in order to provide for any unanticipated costs or a significant decline in income.

### Going concern

The charity has cash resources and has no requirement for external borrowings. The charity's financial performance is continually monitored through management accounts and budgets and projections are prepared to provide assurance as to its financial well-being going forward.

The trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no known material uncertainties regarding the charity's ability to continue as a going concern. The trustees therefore continue to believe the going concern basis of accounting appropriate in preparing the annual financial statements.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### **Governing document**

The National Youth Choir Of Scotland (NYCOS) is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

### Recruitment and appointment of new Trustees

As set out in the Articles of Association the Trustees may be appointed and removed by the members of the charity. The minimum number of directors as set out in the Articles of Association is eight and the maximum is eleven.

#### Organisational structure

The charity, being limited by guarantee, does not have an issued share capital in which the trustees can hold an interest.

The Board of Trustees meets four times per annum and there is a sub-committee covering financial and personnel matters which meets 3 times per annum.

New Trustees are briefed by the Chairman, Chief Executive and Artistic Director in advance of their appointment.

Trustees are encouraged to attend concerts and other events being organised by the charity and to generally promote the charity through their professional and personal networks.

The Chief Executive (Edward Milner) and Artistic Director (Christopher Bell) have delegated authority for operational and artistic matters within terms approved by the Trustees.

Glasgow City Council provides the NYCOS office premises.

### Key management remuneration

The Trustees consider that the Trustees and the Chief Executive comprise the key management personnel. The Trustees are responsible for the overall direction of the charity, however responsibility for its day to day management and operations are delegated to the Chief Executive.

Key management remuneration is benchmarked at the time of appointment against comparable roles in peer organisations in the UK. These benchmarks are reviewed against the same criteria as required (last review Jan 2020). NYCOS does not operate a system of performance related pay or automatic increments above CPI inflation

### **Related parties**

The charity has a close relationship with a range of artistic and educational organisations throughout Scotland and beyond. Because of its national focus in promoting vocal opportunities for young people, the charity is also closely associated with local and national government and agencies within the public and private sectors.

### Risk management

It is recognised that risk management is the responsibility of the Trustees. The Trustees have examined the major areas of the Charity's operations, considered the major risks which may arise in these areas and are of the opinion that systems are in place to mitigate those risks to an acceptable level. The Chief Executive and senior staff constantly monitor major risks associated with the organisation's activities, based on the risk register, and report to the Trustees on a regular basis.

The COVID-19 pandemic impacted on strategic delivery and finances of the organisation and we responded diligently and appropriately.

The effect of COVID-19 will continue into the future and we are continuing to respond to the government advice and work closely with our funders to ensure we retain financial resilience.

## INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES AND MEMBERS OF NATIONAL YOURH CHOIR OF SCOTLAND FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2021

### **Opinion**

We have audited the financial statements of National Youth Choir of Scotland (the 'charitable company') for the year ended 31 July 2021 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities (including an income and expenditure account), the Balance Sheet, the Cash Flow Statement and the notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

## INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES AND MEMBERS OF NATIONAL YOURH CHOIR OF SCOTLAND FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2021

#### Matters on which we are required to report by exception

In the light of the knowledge and understanding of the charitable company and its environment obtained in the course of the audit, we have not identified material misstatements in the directors' report contained within the Report of the Trustees.

We have nothing to report in respect of the following matters in relation to which the Companies Act 2006 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 requires us to report to you if, in our opinion:

- adequate accounting records have not been kept, or returns adequate for our audit have not been received from branches not
  visited by us; or
- the financial statements are not in agreement with the accounting records and returns; or
- · certain disclosures of directors' remuneration specified by law are not made; or
- we have not received all the information and explanations we require for our audit; or
- the trustees were not entitled to prepare the financial statements in accordance with the small companies' regime and take advantage of the small companies' exemptions in preparing the trustees report and from the requirement to prepare a strategic report.

### **Responsibilities of trustees**

As explained more fully in the trustees' responsibilities statement set out on page 13, the trustees (who are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view, and for such internal control as the trustees determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, the trustees are responsible for assessing the charitable company's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the trustees either intend to liquidate the charitable company or to cease operations, or have no realistic alternative but to do so.

#### Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

We have been appointed as auditor under section 44(1)(c) of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and under the Companies Act 2006 and report in accordance with regulations made under those Acts.

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (UK) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

Irregularities, including fraud, are instances of non-compliance with laws and regulations. We design procedures in line with our responsibilities, outlined above, to detect material misstatements in respect of irregularities, including fraud. The extent to which our procedures are capable of detecting irregularities, including fraud is detailed below:

### Extent to which the audit was considered capable of detecting irregularities including fraud

We identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and then design and perform audit procedures response to those risks, including obtaining audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

In identifying and assessing the risks or material misstatements in respect of irregularities, including fraud and non-compliance with laws and regulations we considered the following:

- The nature of the charity, the environment in which it operates, and the control procedures implemented by management and the trustees; and
- Our enquiries of management and trustees about their identification and assessment of the risks of irregularities.

Based on our understanding of the charity and the sector we identified that the principal risks of non-compliance with laws and regulations related to, but were not limited to;

- Regulations and legislation pertinent to the charity's operations; and
- Compliance with the Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme.

We considered the extent to which non-compliance might have a material impact on the financial statements. We also considered those laws and regulations which have a direct impact on the preparation of the financial statements, such as the Companies Act 2006, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. We evaluated management and trustees' incentives and opportunities for fraudulent manipulation of the financial statements (including the risk of management override of controls), and determined that the principal risks were related to:

• Posting inappropriate journal entries.

### Audit response to the risks identified;

Our procedures to respond to the risks identified included the following;

- Gaining an understanding of the legal and regulatory framework applicable to the charity and the sector in which it operates;
- Reviewing financial statement disclosures and testing to supporting documentation to assess compliance with provisions of relevant laws and regulations described as having a direct effect on the financial statements;
- · Enquiring of management, trustees and legal advisors concerning actual and potential litigation and claims;
- · Reading minutes of meetings of those charged with governance;
- In addressing the risk of fraud as a result of management override of controls, testing the appropriateness of journal entries and
  other adjustments; evaluating rationale of any significant transactions that are unusual or outside the normal course of business;
- · Substantive testing of Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme claims.

Because of the inherent limitations of an audit, there is a risk that we will not detect all irregularities, including those leading to a material misstatement in the financial statements or non-compliance with regulation. This risk increases the more that compliance with a law or regulation is removed from the events and transactions reflected in the financial statements, as we will be less likely to become aware of instances of non-compliance. The risk is also greater regarding irregularities occurring due to fraud rather than error, as fraud involves intentional concealment, forgery, collusion, omission or misrepresentation.

## NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the Year Ended 31 July 2021

### 1. GENERAL INFORMATION

The charity is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated and registered in Scotland, under company number SC165149 and has no share capital. The liability of each member in the event of winding up the charitable company is limited to £1.

The charity's registered number is SC024899.

The registered office is The Mitchell, North Street, Glasgow, G3 7DN.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity's presentation currency is Sterling and amounts in the financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

### **Going Concern**

The charity has cash resources and has no requirement for external borrowings. The charity's financial performance is continually monitored through management accounts and budgets and projections are prepared to provide assurance as to its financial well-being going forward. The trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no known material uncertainties regarding the charity's ability to continue as a going concern. The trustees therefore continue to believe the going concern basis of accounting appropriate in preparing the annual financial statements

### Income

All income from donations, subscriptions, course fees, concert receipts and bank interest is accounted for on a receivable basis.

Trading activity income is the income generated from the sale of CDs, books and educational resources. All income from these activities is accounted for on a receivable basis.

Revenue grants receivable by the charity are credited to the Income and Expenditure Account in the period to which they relate.

### **Expenditure**

Costs relating to raising funds, charitable activities expenditure and support costs are charged to income and expenditure on an accruals basis. Expenditure is recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation to pay for expenditure. Irrecoverable VAT is charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as an expense.

Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Raising funds costs are the costs attributable to trading activities of the charity.

## Notes to the Financial Statements – continued for the Year Ended 31 July 2021

### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Direct costs of charitable activities are the costs attributable to the activities in meeting the charitable objects of the charity.

Support costs are costs attributable to the management of the charity and its financial affairs.

Governance costs, a category within support costs, are costs attributable to compliance with statutory requirements.

#### Tangible fixed assets

All expenditure on tangible fixed assets is capitalised at cost. Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings

33% straight line and 33% reducing balance

#### Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement amount.

### **Debtors**

Trade debtors and accrued income are recognised at the settlement amount due with appropriate allowances for any irrecoverable amounts when there is objective evidence that the asset is impaired.

### Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents in the balance sheet comprise cash on hand and cash at bank with a short term of maturity, being twelve months or less, from the opening of the deposit or similar account.

### Creditors

Trade creditors, accrued expenses and other creditors are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event and are recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due

### Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

### **Operating leases**

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all of the benefits and risk of ownership remain with the lessor are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

### **Pensions**

The charitable company contributes to defined contribution schemes and contributions are charged through the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

### Fund accounting

Funds held by the charity are either:-

Unrestricted general funds – these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees.

Notes to the Financial Statements – continued for the Year Ended 31 July 2021

### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Unrestricted designated funds – these are funds set aside by the trustees for future purposes or projects as identified by the trustees.

Unrestricted designated 15<sup>th</sup> Anniversary funds – these are funds which the charity is raising from donors to assist in securing its long term future by providing a growing reserve as security against future financial difficulties.

Restricted funds – these are funds that can only be used for the particular restricted purpose as specified by the donor or when the funds are raised for particular purposes.

### **Employee benefits policy**

The cost of short term employee benefits are recognised as a liability and an expense, unless these costs are required to be recognised as part of the cost of stock of fixed assets.

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are terminated.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

### Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are not considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods. Key sources of estimation have been applied as follows:

**Bad debt provision** - the charity makes an estimate of the recoverable value of trade and other debtors. When assessing impairment of debtors, management considers factors including credit rating of the customer, previous payment patterns and ageing of the debt.

**Depreciation** - management assess the depreciation rate by giving consideration to the useful life of each asset class and of its use within the charity.
