## WHALE, The Arts Agency Report of the Board of Directors

The directors present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 March 2004.

### Legal Status

WHALE, The Arts Agency is a company limited by guarantee having no share capital, and is governed by a Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 13 December 1999. The service is registered as a charity by the Inland Revenue, in Scotland, charity number SC020305.

The manager has day-to-day control of the charity and reports to the Board of Directors. In addition she manages full-time and part-time staff members with sessionally paid workers. The company is also supported in our work by the assistance of volunteers.

#### **Objectives**

WHALE, The Arts Agency aims to advance education and knowledge among the people of Wester Hailes and the surrounding area, by delivering life long learning and inclusive routes into education and by becoming a best practice model of service delivery.

#### Review of the year

A detailed description of the work undertaken by the charity during the year is contained within the Annual Report.

### Reserves policy

The directors have acknowledged the recommendation of the Charity Commission that the charity needs to hold 3 months' operating expenditure in reserves. The directors consider this to be a challenging target for the charity to achieve but are committed to working towards this.

## Risk review

The Board of Directors have conducted their own review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate those risks.

#### Members of the Board of Directors

Members of the Board of Directors are directors for the purpose of company law and trustees for the purpose of charity law. Those members who served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1.

Members of the charitable company guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charitable company in the event of winding up.

#### Responsibilities of the Board of Directors

Company law requires the directors to prepare accounts for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the profit or loss for that period. In preparing those accounts, the directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the accounts on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in business.

The directors are responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the Companies Act 1985. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

### **Auditors**

Owen & Co have expressed their willingness to continue as the charitable company's auditors.

### 1 Accounting policies

#### Basis of preparation of accounts

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective June 2002), the Companies Act 1985 and follow the recommendations in Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice, issued in October 2000.

## Voluntary income

Voluntary income is received by way of donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

#### Grants

Grants including grants for the purpose of fixed assets are recognised in full in the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which they are receivable.

### Charitable expenditure

All expenditure is included on an accruals basis and is recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation to pay for expenditure. All costs have been directly attributed to one of the financial categories of resources expended in the Statement of Financial Activities in full. The charity is not registered for VAT and accordingly costs are shown gross of irrecoverable VAT.

#### **Depreciation**

No depreciation has been provided during the year.

## Unrestricted funds

Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity without further specified purpose and are receivable as general funds.

### Restricted funds

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure, which meets these criteria, is charged to the fund, together with a fair allocation of management and support costs.

## Pensions

WHALE, The Arts Agency participates in the Pension Trust SCVO Final Salary Pension Scheme for one employee. The scheme is a multi employer defined benefit scheme. The scheme is funded and is contracted out of the state scheme. Pension costs are assessed in accordance with actuarial advice and based on the most recent valuation of the scheme. These costs are accounted for on the basis of charging the cost of providing the pensions over the period during which the charity benefits from the employee's services.

All other employees organise their own pension scheme, which WHALE contributes towards.
