STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Aberdeen Forward Limited is a company limited by guarantee and governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. It is an environmental charity working in the field of sustainable development which was granted charitable status by HMRC on 29 August 2003.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Aberdeen Forward Limited was set up by Forward Scotland (now known as Future Balance), Aberdeen City Council and Shell UK Limited in 1999 to help reduce the amount of waste going to the city's landfill sites. It is administered by a Board of Directors. New directors are nominated at Board Meetings or by Aberdeen City Council and approved at Board Meetings.

Induction and training of new trustees

Induction and training of directors is viewed as an ongoing process. Directors have attended relevant seminars and received regular presentations. Training on our Zero Waste objectives and other operational issues is available on an ongoing basis.

Organisational structure

The Board of Directors meets every two months to administer and supervise the company's activities. The day to day running of the charity is the responsibility of the Chief Executive.

Risk management

The directors have reviewed the major risks to which the charity is exposed and systems are in place to manage those risks.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The company's stated objectives are to carry out, or to secure, promote or assist in the carrying out, of any or all of the Landfill Tax Regulations approved objects within the area of Aberdeen City Council and to secure, promote assist and support, by financial means and otherwise, the development and implementation of initiatives connected with the promotion of sustainability, provided those initiatives are likely to be of benefit to the people of Aberdeen. Originally focusing on developing sustainable environmental projects in Aberdeen City, Aberdeen Forward now works across the whole of Grampian region and has strong links with all three local authorities. Over the past eleven years the company has developed from a landfill tax charity into an emerging social enterprise with a considerable portfolio of completed and ongoing projects.

In the past Aberdeen Forward Limited used money from the Landfill Tax Credit Scheme (LTCS) to develop and support a number of innovative waste management projects. Money has gone direct to the community to help deliver a range of initiatives such as furniture recycling and development of community gardens. With changes in the LTCS in 2005 Aberdeen Forward Limited widened its remit to support so as to develop across the whole field of sustainable development with partner organisations from the private and public sector and the local community. Projects can cover any aspects of sustainable development and as such are likely to cover such aspects as sustainable reuse initiatives. The company's role in these projects will vary to include some or all of the following, project planning, fundraising and project management.

The company also considers Landfill Community Fund grant application under Object D from Community groups, which are sanctioned at Board Meetings every two months.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The Zero Waste Scotland Volunteer Programme

This Zero Waste programme was developed to help deliver the Scottish Government's Zero Waste Plan. The vision of the Zero Waste Volunteer Programme is to create a community based partnership of volunteers who work together across Scotland to help make local communities aware of their role to ensure that Scotland will become a genuine zero waste society where all resources are valued and used responsibly. Aberdeen Forward Limited is the organisation which recruits the volunteers and provides training and support to volunteers The Zero Waste Scotland Volunteer programme runs throughout Aberdeen City, Aberdeenshire and Moray. The main aim of the project is to recruit a team of volunteers who can provide information and advice to householders about food waste reduction. The programme is delivered by way of five campaigns;

- Recycle for Scotland;
- Love Food Hate Waste;
- Home Composting;
- Peat Free compost and
- Stop the Drop.

The volunteers promote awareness of the campaigns by attending events such at agricultural shows, farmers markets other events with information leaflets which are handed out to the public. The Project Officer liaised with Council officers throughout Aberdeenshire and Moray to identify suitable events to attend and to co-ordinate attendance so as to raise the profile of the programme and look to sign up volunteers at these events.

Shared Roots

The aim of this project is to recruit volunteer gardeners to work on the gardens of older and vulnerable adults who would be unable to attend to their gardens without assistance. This is seen as a way to enhance the visual amenity of an area and so improve the local environment. The project is funded by the Change Fund.

- The Project Officer held workshops funded by the Change Fund from January to March 2104. The workshops ran for around two hours per session and resulted in recruitment of four volunteer gardeners.
- The volunteers have been matched up with three private residence gardens.
- The Project Officer engaged with three Sheltered Housing Schemes for vulnerable adults with disabilities to provide gardening sessions for staff and residents.
- The Project Officer has scoped a further five gardens which will be incorporated in the Project.
- The Project Officer's role as well as to recruit the volunteers, is to ensure that references are checked and PVG checks are carried out to enable the volunteers to work with vulnerable adults.
- The Project Officer has been certificated as a Trainer for Adult Security and Protection training which the volunteers have to undergo prior to being assigned to a homeowner/garden of a vulnerable adult.

This project is gaining momentum and many other private gardens and Housing projects have shown interest in the Scheme which is expected to go from strength to strength in the coming year 2014/15.

Roots and Shoots

The Roots and Shoots project recognises that there is a need in society to deal with short term offending and the cycle of behaviour associated with the prison system. This project looks to break the revolving door of offending. Groups of up to six prisoners are recruited to the project while they are serving their sentence with HMP Aberdeen. They follow a flexible work based training programme which is designed to prepare them for working with Aberdeen Forward Limited on release. Once released from prison the ex-offenders come to work for Aberdeen Forward for a period of six months. The work was originally designed to be gardening focussed but the scope has widened and also covers recycling work giving practical transferable skills in warehousing, collections and deliveries and visual merchandising as well as landscaping and gardening. The project continues to evolve and adapt as opportunities become available. The aim is to work directly with seventy ex-offenders throughout the duration of the project which has funding from December 2011 for three and a half years. After the initial intake of ten prisoners the aim was to move to twenty participants in each of the following years i.e. ten persons for every six month session. Between the months of April 2013 - March 2014 the project has taken on many different projects. Recycling business furniture and the Creative Waste Exchange were the main workload for the team during this period which included a major clear-out of a workshop at Total HQ in Altens. The team also helped to maintain and restore allotments at Easter Anguston Farm and Methlick Community Gardens. Work continued on the development of St Fitticks Community Garden in Torry. With the closure of HMP Aberdeen in late 2013 there has been a drop in the number of participants as inmates were shipped out to other locations for about four months until the new HMP Grampian at Peterhead is scheduled to be opened in Spring/Summer 2014.

The participants have also attended a number of external training courses in addition to their normal training with Aberdeen Forward Limited. These included:-

- Banksman / Slinger
- Forklift Truck Driving Skills
- Driving Lessons
- Manual Handling Skills
- First Aid

Smaller training opportunities were given throughout the year including:

- CV preparation
- Interviewing skills
- Budgeting
- Confidence to Cook
- Merchandising training
- Horticultural skills

Creative Waste Exchange

This project aims to reuse materials collected from the commercial sector and to pass them on to the community sector. Now firmly established in our Sustainable Communities Centre based at Poynernook Road there have been several changes to the way the Exchange operates. In particular the decision was taken to change from a membership only club to one where members of the public can purchase items directly. Membership still exists and carries with it the benefit of 20% discount on all goods and classes. There have been up to 130 community members and numerous businesses have donated unwanted materials helping us divert many tonnes of waste from landfill. Stock included office stationery, second - hand office furniture, arts and craft materials and other miscellaneous items.

Workshops and Events

Aberdeen Forward set up the Sustainable Communities Centre in 2009 at its premises in Poynernook Road, Aberdeen and the Centre is a one stop shop for the communities of Aberdeen and Aberdeenshire providing information and advice on a whole range of environmental and social issues. Aberdeen Forward Limited runs a range of classes from upholstery, knitting sewing and Hobby Clubs and composting, The Sustainable Communities Centre also serves as a base for our range of events including our Big Give Away Days, Swishing Events (a clothes swop-shop event), and festive themed craft events. Outside of the Sustainable Communities Centre, Aberdeen Forward hosts community days around existing projects, primarily the Roots and Shoots community garden project. The Sustainable Communities Centre offers low cost office rentals to charities social enterprises and business start-ups. In addition we offer new businesses the benefit of a business address and a mail box service.

Recycling Collections from Business

During 2012/13 Aberdeen Forward developed a recycling project in conjunction with Alloa Community Enterprise (ACE). It was well received by the customers in the North East, but in early 2013 ACE pulled out of the project as the profitability was not seen to be sufficient to continue from their point of view. Aberdeen Forward then continued with this project on its own during 2013/14. The labour force for this project was the participants in the Roots and Shoots ex offenders work project. They were used to collect, repair warehouse and re-market these items to charities and social enterprises. Latterly these items were marketed directly to members of the public via social media etc.

Quality Accreditation

Through Revolve the national reuse quality standard, Aberdeen Forward worked towards EFQM accreditation with Quality Scotland and achieved this accreditation in 2013.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the company to maintain within general funds a level of uncommitted funds which would meet one year's operating costs.

Funds

General funds represent the free funds of the charity which are not designated for particular purposes. These include Creative Waste Exchange, Community Composting - Aberdeenshire and Nappy sale transactions.

Restricted funds comprise the funds of the current projects, including: Landfill Tax, Zero Waste Volunteer Programme, Third Sector, Composting at Schools, Change Fund, and Kingswells Primary Playground Improvements.

Review

The surplus for the year amounted to £91,796 (2013: £59,837) resulting in total charity funds at the year-end of £1,000,040 (2013: £908,244).

Principal funding sources

The principal funding sources for the charity this year have been SITA UK, The Big Lottery, Zero Waste Scotland and the Change Fund. The charity has also received income from its office accommodation rentals. Expenditure in the year has continued to support the key objectives of the charity.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2014

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable United Kingdom accounting standards and the requirements of the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005).

Cash flow statement

The trustees have taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 (revised) from including a cash flow statement in the financial statements on the grounds that the charity is small.

Incoming resources

Income is included in incoming resources when receivable, except as follows:

When donors specify that donations ad grants given to charity must be used in future accounting periods, the income is deferred until those periods;

When donors impose conditions which have to be fulfilled before the charity becomes entitled to use such income, the income is deferred and not included in incoming resources until the pre-conditions for use have been met;

Gifts in kind are included in donations at the charity's best estimate of value;

Management fee income is deducted from the funding received from the various providers and reallocated to general funds income.

Voluntary income includes grants and sponsorship which provide the core funding for the company.

Incoming resources from charitable activities which include income from service level agreements.

Activities for generating funds represents the income received from selling donated and bought in goods.

Fund accounting

Funds held by the charity are either:

Unrestricted general funds - these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the directors.

Unrestricted designated funds - these are funds which are set aside from unrestricted funds for specific purposes.

Restricted funds - these are funds of the individual projects being administered by the charity and can only be used for the particular restricted purposes of these projects. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Resources expended

Resources expended are included on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered.

Grants payable are included when approved by the directors. The value of such grants unpaid at the year end is accrued. Grants where the beneficiary has to meet certain conditions before the grant is released are not accrued, but are noted as financial commitments.

The financial records of the company are now maintained in such a way that expenditure on the individual projects is readily identifiable and is separately recorded. This results in little or no need for reallocation or reapportionment of costs between projects.

Costs of generating funds include cost of nappies for resale and advertising costs for Give & Take days. There are no such costs for the Creative Waste Exchange Project as goods are donated.

Charitable activities include all costs relating to activities where the primary aim is part of the objects of the company, together with the support costs of the company and grants paid.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include audit fees. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end are noted as commitments but are not accrued as expenditure.

Fixed assets

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost. All assets costing more than £150 are capitalised.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Computer equipment - 25% straight line
Plant and equipment - 25% straight line
Motor vehicles - 25% reducing balance
Fixtures and fittings - 25% straight line

Leasehold improvements - 33% straight line

Leasehold property over the period of the lease - 141 years

Stocks

Bought in goods are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Unsold donated items are not included in closing stock since their cost is nil and their value is uncertain until sold.

Operating lease agreements

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the SOFA as incurred.

Pension costs

The charity operates an employee stakeholder pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the charity. Pension costs charged in the SOFA represent the contributions payable by the charity.
