## Report of the directors (incorporating the trustees' report) for the year ended 31 March 2015

The directors present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2015. The directors, who are also trustees of Argyll, Lomond and the Islands Energy Agency for the purposes of charity law and who served during the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1 - 2

### Structure, governance and management

Purposes and Aims

ALIenergy's purpose is to promote renewable energy and energy efficiency to households, businesses, communities and public sector bodies throughout Argyll, Lomond and the Islands, in order to combat fuel poverty and so that public knowledge of these issues is improved and more people take action in their lives to increase energy efficiency and support renewable energy.

Our aims are to

improve public knowledge and understanding of energy efficiency and renewable energy issues in Argyll

encourage more people to take action in their lives to combat fuel poverty, increase energy efficiency and support renewable energy proposals that benefit Argyll

support and develop renewable energy and energy efficiency projects and initiatives throughout Argyll

Our objectives are to

take a proactive and promotional role in securing renewable energy developments for Argyll - actively demonstrating renewable energy technologies where appropriate, whether owned by ALI energy or not

Provide a proactive educational service to all members of the Argyll & Bute community (through presenting at events and providing lessons to schools)

Actively stimulate projects to increase uptake of national support measures for energy efficiency and fuel poverty actions in Argyll

Deliver a reactive service to the public needing local advice and information on household energy efficiency and renewable energy

Provide an informed development resource for commercial and public sector organisations, making this available on a commercial basis

Generate income to support the organisation and its activities

Inform policy and strategy at an Argyll and Bute, regional and national level by engaging with government and non-government agencies and representatives and ensure that our local circumstances in Argyll and Bute are taken into account

## Report of the directors (incorporating the trustees' report) for the year ended 31 March 2015

### Governing Document

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 27/9/2000 and registered as a charity on 15/1/2001. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association, which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up, members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1

### Recruitment and appointment of Directors/Trustees

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law. All directors give their time voluntarily and receive no benefits from the charity.

#### Directors induction and training

Most new directors are already familiar with the work of the charity, having been involved in its work in some way before joining the Board. All new directors receive a one to one briefing from the Chairman followed by an induction session run by the management team on the responsibilities and obligations of directors; the main documents that set out the operational framework for the charity, including the Memorandum & Articles; resources and the current financial position; and the organisation's future plans and objectives. Directors are encouraged to participate in the City & Guilds 6176 Energy Awareness course and to gain certification - this provides a good grounding in energy issues.

#### Risk Management

It is the policy of the Board to minimise exposure by ensuring that the value of creditors does not exceed the value of debtors and funds at call or short notice. It is usual practice to ensure that funds in hand/overdraft limit are sufficient to pay the following 3 months payroll, tax, national insurance and direct debit payments.

The Directors have examined the major strategic, business and operational risks, which the charity faces and have implemented a risk management strategy; which comprises

- \* An annual review of the risks which the charity may face;
- \* The establishment of systems and procedures to mitigate those risks identified in the plan
- \* The implementation of procedures designed to minimise any potential impact on the charity should any of those risks materialise

As part of the Risk Review, the Aims and Objectives of the Company as outlined in its Business Plan are reviewed annually as part of the Chair's annual report

## Organisational structure

In the year to March 2015 the Board of Directors was made up of members from a variety of professional and community backgrounds relevant to the work of the charity, who meet quarterly and are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. The Manager, who is also the Company Secretary, sits on the board but has no voting rights.

A Finance Sub Group, which comprises the Chair, the Manager, one other Director and a financial advisor from Argyll and Bute Council meets approximately every 4-6 weeks and all Directors are invited to attend these meetings if they wish. Since January 2013, a Finance Officer has been in post, who also attends the Sub Group meetings.

A scheme of delegation is in place and day to day responsibility for the provision of the services rests with the Manager, who is responsible for ensuring that the charity delivers the services specified and that key performance indicators are met. The Manager also has responsibility for: managing the finances; the day to day operational management of the charity; individual supervision of the staff team; and ensuring that the team develop their skills and working practices in line with good practice

### Advisors to the Board of Directors

A number of representatives from the charity's partner organisations and funders sit on the Board as advisors, with no voting rights. The organisations that were represented in this way during the period to the end of March 2015 were: Argyll and Bute Council, Forestry Commission Scotland and Scottish Power.

### Objectives and activities

### Ensuring that our work delivers our aims

We review our aims, objectives and activities each year in order to assess our achievements over the past 12 months and the outcomes of our work. We look at the success of our main activities and how these benefit the community of Argyll, Lomond and the Islands and how they impact on our stakeholders and the organisations that we work with in partnership. The review helps us to ensure that our aims, objectives and activities are focused on our stated purposes; it also assists with our business planning process - in helping to identify and confirm our priorities for the following years. We have referred to the information contained in the OSCR and Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives; and in planning our future activities and ensuring that these planned activities will deliver our aims and objectives.

### How our activities deliver public benefit

Our main activities and who we provide services to, and work with, are described below. All our charitable activities focus on the promotion of energy saving and renewable energy; the prevention and mitigation of climate change and the reduction of fuel poverty - and they are undertaken to further our charitable purposes for the public benefit.

### Who used and benefited from our services

Communities in Argyll, Lomond and the Islands benefited from information, advice, education and training on energy issues, delivered via a number of projects. Argyll schools were offered education workshops and assistance with ongoing projects. Community groups were offered talks, presentations, advice and assistance with energy efficiency and renewable energy projects. Householders received insulation measures and energy advice; households experiencing fuel poverty received advice, support and mentoring. Groups and organisations that support vulnerable people benefited from training and mentoring to help people in fuel poverty.

Local renewable heat (including wood fuel) suppliers and installers received advice on improving the quality of their product. Households, businesses, public sector bodies, community groups and social enterprises received advice on planning and installing renewable heating and information on the value of wood fuel as a heating option.

Individual householders were given information and advice on energy efficiency and general renewables issues by phone and email and face to face at agricultural shows, highland games and other public events. 565 households received home energy advice visits and surveys, delivered through the Home Energy Efficiency Programme Scotland Area Based Scheme (HEEPSABS) and more than 2000 people were helped through our Affordable Warmth programmes.

### **Achievements and Performance**

## School Energy Education Programme

School visits and education activities on energy issues continued to be delivered by the Education and Development Officer

### Outreach energy education and awareness raising

ALIenergy staff continued to take ALIenergy displays to a number of shows, public events and community meetings, and we delivered presentations, workshops and talks covering energy efficiency; renewable energy, renewable heat, climate change and fuel poverty issues. The Science of Energy project reached a total audience of 6745 people including delivering short workshops to 5451 people at public events, with 852 people attending community events and 192 people attending in-depth workshops at cascade events, where groups learned how to use the education toolkits. The project team attended 32 public events (agricultural shows, highland games etc) and 13 community events, and delivered six training sessions for community leaders.

### General energy saving advice and support

ALIenergy offered information and advice on energy issues throughout the year, in response to requests by telephone and email and at public events.

### Affordable Warmth in Argyll Project

In 2014/15, the Affordable Warmth in Argyll (AWA) programme included the Affordable Warmth for Sustainable Rural Communities project (funded by Big Lottery) and the Warm Homes for Healthy Futures project (funded by Energy Action Scotland). The programme provides in-depth advice and targeted support to the most vulnerable low income households throughout Argyll.

## Home Energy Efficiency Programme Area Based Scheme (HEEPSABS)

ALIenergy worked in partnership with Argyll and Bute Council, BCA Insulation, SSE, Scottish Power, Energy With Ltd, Argyll Community Housing Association and Home Energy Scotland to deliver HEEPSABS in Mid Argyll and Kintyre, Dunoon, Helensburgh and Oban, which delivered home energy advice to 565 households and free loft, cavity and internal solid wall insulation and draught proofing to 187 households. The scheme year continues beyond the financial year end until the end of September 2015.

#### Renewable Energy Sources Co-operative (RESCoop)

ALIenergy participates in this Intelligent Energy Europe funded project involving 12 partners in seven countries. The project aims to promote citizen involvement in renewable energy and community renewable energy co-operatives through education, information and knowledge exchange. Through the project, ALIenergy organised a study trip to Ireland for a community group from South Kintyre, as well as REScoop meetings in Dublin and Waterford.

#### Argyll Woodfuel Forum

ALIenergy established and provides Secretariat for AWF, funded by Forestry Commission Scotland. Activity includes organisation of two AWF meetings per year; maintenance of a database of interested parties; marketing of the Forum and distribution of relevant information to interested parties; management of database of wood fuel projects in Argyll and being the key contact point for woodfuel related advice queries in Argyll.

### Renewable Energy Opportunities for Fishing Communities in Argyll

This project, funded by Axis 4 of the European Fisheries Fund, started in December 2013. It aims to assist fishermen to diversify their skills base in order to enable them to participate in renewable energy and other key sectors, such as tourism and aquaculture. Surveys of developers and fishermen and a skills gap analysis were completed; work undertaken with Argyll College to develop longer term courses and a number of short courses were delivered by external bodies.

## Energy Education and Skills Development

ALIenergy commenced a programme funded by Scottish Power, to promote careers and skills development opportunities in renewable energy to secondary school pupils in Argyll, as well as delivering energy education.

### Publicity and external relations

ALIenergy was featured in articles in various local papers and ran adverts for the new projects and to promote events held on renewable heat, affordable warmth and energy awareness. Staff represented ALIenergy at various energy conferences, workshops and events held across the country.

#### Who did we work with?

Our key partners continue to be Argyll and Bute Council, who support ALIenergy's work financially and practically, and who provide in-kind support in terms of office accommodation and assistance with financial management. Other important partners are the Forestry Commission Scotland, who worked with, and funded, ALIenergy to deliver the woodfuel support and the Argyll Woodfuel Forum and Scottish Power. We also worked with Bute Advice Centre, Argyll and Bute CAB, West Highland Housing Association, Argyll Community Housing Association, BCA Insulation, SSE, Scottish Power, Energy With Limited, Home Energy Scotland, NHS Highlands/Argyll CHP, LORN and a wide range of other community groups and charities.

### Forward Planning and Short Term Priorities

Our main priorities are to generate sufficient income in order to secure ongoing financial security for the organisation and to develop its resources in terms of staff complement and skills base. We continue to develop new projects and programmes on fuel poverty, energy education, energy efficiency and renewable energy issues and we are putting in place new funding streams when our current grant awards come to an end. Over the next year, delivery of area based energy efficiency schemes and development and support to local supply chains and markets will also be important.

### Financial review

### Principal funding sources

ALIenergy continues to receive a small amount of funding from Argyll and Bute Council's Private Sector Housing. A small amount of income was received from the Argyll Wind Farm Trust, for the SSE Tangy 2 development.

Key funding included Scottish Government and energy supplier funds for HEEPSABS; Big Lottery funding for Affordable Warmth work and EU funding for RESCoop and the Renewable Energy Opportunities for Fishing Communities projects.

As in previous years, ALIenergy needs to secure a substantial and sustainable income stream, as a priority. In the long term, substantial income could be received from community benefits funds - the Wind Farm Trust (provided that all the planned wind farms go ahead and become fully operational) and from new marine developments. Funding needs to be identified in the short to medium term and opportunities for generating income are being investigated.

Argyll & Bute Council has given an implicit guarantee to ALIenergy's short term cash flow requirements.

### Reserves policy

The current policy is to retain sufficient funds to meet the cost of salaries, redundancy payments and sickness cover and other regular commitments for a minimum period of three months. It is proposed that this equates to £96,000, plus a further small contingency of £4,000 and this is held in unrestricted funds. In addition, it is the policy of the Directors to retain sufficient funds to allow for the development of the company and, in particular, to allow the company to pursue potential new income streams and develop new projects and programmes, which will ensure future financial security.

### Plans for future periods

ALIenergy plans to continue the activities outlined above in the forthcoming years, subject to satisfactory funding arrangements. We want to expand our fuel poverty advice, support and advocacy and our education activity - and there are opportunities to tap into national funding streams for these. Other plans are to develop the charity's renewable energy expertise further, to consolidate our expertise and track record on renewable heat, particularly wood fuel and to offer advice/support services on a wider range of technologies.

We aim to continue to deliver Government funded area based insulation schemes and to develop new local schemes with partners, as well as developing action research projects focused on the impacts of changing Government policies on fuel poverty and finding innovative ways of funding projects that help low income people. We will also develop projects that promote local energy economies, community empowerment and resilience and deliver education on climate change. ALIenergy will seek more opportunities to tender for contracts and to identify and pursue other income generating activities that can support our charitable purposes and activities.

### Statement of directors' responsibilities

The directors (who are also trustees of Argyll, Lomond the Islands Energy Agency under charity law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

Company law requires the directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

The directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), and the provisions of the trust deed. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

## Notes to financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2015

### 1. Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year and the preceding year.

### 1.1. Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008), the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005) and the Companies Act 2006.

### 1.2. Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Directors in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Directors for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor.

### 1.3. Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable. Grants where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.

Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified. The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

Gifts donated for resale are included as incoming resources within activities for generating funds when they are sold.

Incoming resources from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance. Grants for the purchase of fixed assets are recognised in full in the statement of financial activities in the year in which they are receivable.

## Notes to financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2015

### 1.4. Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

### 1.5. Defined contribution pension schemes

The pension costs charged in the financial statements represent the contribution payable by the charity during the year.
