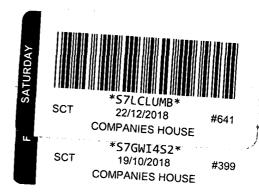

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2018

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2018. The financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard 102.

Chair's Report

I'm proud to present another years work of Connect Community Trust and our subsidiary Connect-IN Enterprises. This year has been a challenging one to ensure that we continue our work to support people in the local community and overcome the financial challenges of the previous year. That said, it has been a hugely exciting year with so much good work continuing and developing with local people as the driving force to changes in their lives and others in the area.

Highlights of the year include our work on DWP contracts to support people with their employability journey. Our approach to supporting people to increase skills, confidence and gain further qualifications continues to prove successful and the positive feedback from clients on their experiences, provides us with the evidence to continue developing the service. ReConnect, our furniture reuse and recycling operation, has continued to make huge changes in the reuse sector, saving 63.26 tonnes from going to landfill in Glasgow and supporting local people with affordable, quality household furniture. Youth services continue to provide a safe, friendly, supportive and fun environment for young people to meet and take part in exciting, fun and educational activities. Lunch clubs, family groups, sport sessions, social activities and allotments are all providing much-needed services in the area and support community empowerment and social cohesion with local people delivering in all aspects of our work, the commitment and enthusiasm is fabulous.

Connect-IN Enterprises (our trading subsidiary) is starting to take shape with the entertainment agency increasing the number of clients that it has and we hope that this will continue to grow over the next year with any surpluses being able to support our local activities.

In order for us to ensure that our focus remains on the local area within Greater Easterhouse, Connect is part of consortiums and co-operatives within the Glasgow area. *These partnerships have meant that we have been able to source additional finances which allow us to continue our work locally.

I would like to thank all of our funders, partners, staff and volunteers for your support in making our work a success.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Connect has been formed to benefit principally the community of Greater Easterhouse and surrounding areas within the city of Glasgow. The objectives of the charity are:

- The advancement of the community development (including the advancement of urban regeneration) principally within the community
- To provide, assist and develop a range of leisure and health-improvement services and activities in response to the community need
- To provide access to and deliver a range of training, health and other education services
- To promote community learning and delivery of youth services within the community
- To provide employment advice/support and volunteering opportunities
- To relieve poverty through the development of environmental, social and economic activity

In order to achieve these objectives Connect delivers on a wide range of services and the following provides an overview of just some of the highlights in the year.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Community Empowerment & Regeneration

Connect continually strives to listen to the views of the community to ensure that services and activities are in line with need. Meaningful dialogue takes place on a daily basis with clients through participation and discussion on what and how things could be improved or developed. In addition to the day to day conversations, evaluations and questionnaires are completed at Gala Days and after training sessions and events.

In response to the consultations we are taking forward an Asset Transfer request with City Property of our HubSports building, created a reflection garden within the hubsports park area, delivered to community clean-up activities and the allotments are engaging the local school children and the community with the growing of veg and the caring of chickens.

Delivery of Training

Delivery of training within the community and surrounding areas is a priority for Connect to support local people to increase their skills and continued learning. 130 people have completed training and gained qualifications in the past year.

As an SQA Accredited training centre, we are continuing to develop the range of accredited training that we deliver directly through Connect or in partnership with Glasgow Kelvin College.

Providing employment advice/support and volunteering opportunities.

The Peoples Gateway project provides the vehicle for Connect to support people through a range of employment related activity. Although certain funding streams have eligibility criteria and requirements as far as our clients are aware, if you want help then we will help you. Over the past year the Peoples Gateway project has helped 483 people with CV's, job search, interview skills, positive psychology workshops, training, volunteering/work experience, benefits advice and guidance (359 people from the Greater Easterhouse area).

Five weekly drop-in clubs are delivered throughout Greater Easterhouse with an open door policy but with also direct referrals from the job centre and partner housing associations.

In addition to work with housing, the Peoples Gateway project has delivered 10 contracts for the DWP to support clients through dedicated training and support programmes.

Education

Over the past year, Connect has successfully developed new community education activities including:

- Allotments; young people and adults learning about the environment, growing fresh veg and fruit and caring for animals. Local school children regularly visit the plots which supports their education within school.
- Family Club; whilst young people are supported with homework or take part in sports the adults/parents/guardians take part in a cookery class. Learning how to cook on a budget, healthy eating, cookery skills and then all sit down to enjoy a meal together
- Youth Activities; although youth clubs are about having fun, it provides an opportunity for young people to be supported with their homework and activities are structured so that learning continues including youth achievement awards, community achievement awards, dynamic youth awards, heartstart training, cookery and bushcraft skills

Over the year 291 people (young people and adults) have been supported with an educational activity.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Relieve Poverty

With many of our clients on low incomes and often suffering from isolation or health issues, we continue to develop new services that can support people. Our support is varied due to the diverse needs of our clients and over the past year includes: provision of free food giveaways (foodshare/Morrisons donations), access to benefits advice, access to ReConnect discount vouchers and furniture through our ReConnect operations. Over the past year an average of 1,322 individuals have been helped through this support.

Leisure Services

By operating 4 community facilities leisure activities are operated to support clients in many ways such as social interaction, community cohesion, reducing isolation, improve health and wellbeing and not to forget the element of having fun. Throughout the facilities lunch clubs, family cookery clubs, bingo nights, knitting and sewing clubs, walking clubs and social nights are operating. 180 people have been supported through these activities.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial review

The Group had net outgoing resources of £26,504 (2017: net outgoing resources of £81,608) for the year and has accumulated funds of £594,255 (2017: £620,759) at the balance sheet date. The Charity had net outgoing resources of £26,526 (2017: net outgoing resources of £76,796) for the year and has accumulated funds of £604,629 (2017: £631,155) at the balance sheet date.

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds at a level to provide sufficient funds to cover 3 months management and administration costs.

FUTURE PLANS

The Year Ahead

The year ahead is looking bright, we are aiming to complete the HubSports Asset Transfer which will see HubSports and surrounding land be in the ownership of Connect and the community as a whole.

ReConnect has been successful in securing investment from Zero Waste Scotland and will launch a new service for void house clearance and cleans.

A new income advice service is being launched as part of a contract with 3 local housing providers and will support people in particular with welfare reform and income/benefits issues which is of particular importance with the full Universal Credit roll out.

We will continue to develop our Peoples Gateway, Youth Services and elderly activities in line with community need.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is incorporated as a company limited by guarantee without a share capital and is recognised as a Scottish charity. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. Under those Articles, the board of directors are elected by the company in general meeting, and directors shall retire by rotation.

Appointment of Trustees

Trustees are appointed at the discretion of the board.

Group Structure

Connect Community Trust Limited has a wholly owned subsidiary, Connect-In Enterprises Limited. The activities of this company are consolidated with those of Connect Community Trust Limited.

Report of the Independent Auditors to the Trustees and Members of Connect Community Trust Limited

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Connect Community Trust Limited (the 'parent company') and its subsidiary (the 'group') for the year ended 31 March 2018 which comprise the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activities, Consolidated Balance Sheet, Company Balance Sheet, Consolidated Cash Flow Statement and Notes to the Consolidated Cash Flow Statement and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice), including Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland'.

In our opinion the financial statements:

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are included at market value.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Support costs have been allocated between governance costs and other support costs. Governance costs will include costs related to statutory audit and other direct costs related to public accountability.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Long leasehold- over the lease termPlant and machinery- 25% on costMotor vehicles- 25% on costComputer equipment- 33% on cost

It is the policy of the charity to capitalise items of expenditure over £1,500.

Stocks

Funds expended in bringing certain donated goods to a saleable condition are recognised as a cost of stock on the Balance Sheet until sold.

Taxation

The Charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Activity based reporting

The Trustees are of the opinion that the charity's activities are interlinked and there is no merit in providing further analysis within the notes to the accounts.

Donated goods

The nature of the donated goods are predominantly high volume and low value items and on that basis these donated goods are not recognised on receipt, rather the value to the charity of the donated goods for resale is recognised as income when sold. Funds expended in bringing certain donated goods to a saleable condition are recognised as a cost of stock on the Balance Sheet until sold. On sale of the donated goods the value of the related stock cost is charged against the related income under the heading 'other trading activities'.
