Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2022

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2022. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The principal activity of the Trust is to deliver a wide range of environmental projects and services across the west of Glasgow.

Glasgow Eco Trust is a company limited by guarantee and governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. Company registration number SC273114. It is recognised as a charity for tax purposes by HMRC and by the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator [OSCR] (Charity Number SC035954).

The Trust changed its name on the 1st November 2018 from the Dumbarton Road Corridor Environment Trust in order to reflect the increase in the area in which the Trust operates.

The company's objects are:

- (1) The advancement of education through volunteering and training opportunities and promoting and delivering a range of activities and services related to supporting environmentally sustainable living and helping to assist participants in obtaining paid employment.
- (2) The advancement of citizenship or community development by providing information about community projects and events and by encouraging volunteering, community engagement and regeneration through physical, social and economic infrastructure improvements and by encouraging the formation and development of local groups which harness the skills and energy of the local community and promote community cohesion.
- (3) The provision of recreational facilities or the organisation of recreational activities, with the object of improving the conditions of life for the persons for whom the facilities or activities are primarily intended.
- (4) The advancement of environmental protection or improvement through providing volunteering opportunities for clean ups and community space development and through encouraging environmentally friendly modes of travel and environmentally sustainable living.
- (5) The relief of those in need by reason of age, ill health, disability, financial hardship or other disadvantage by promoting environmentally, economically and socially sustainable practices which assist people of limited means to reduce expenditure and by those suffering social isolation to engage in environmental improvement projects and other appropriate activities.
- (6) To promote, operate and /or support other charitable projects and initiatives for the benefit of the community within the Operating Area and to do so in a manner which respects the priorities set from time to time by the community within the operating area.

OUR OPERATIONAL AREA

Glasgow Eco Trust is based in west Glasgow. Our primary area of focus is the Ward 13 Garscadden/Scotstounhill (Yoker, Scotstoun, Knightswood neighbourhoods) and Ward 12 Victoria Park (Whiteinch, Thornwood, Broomhill and Jordanhill). This area covers G14, G13 and part of G11 postcode areas.

Review of activities

The Trust continues to work hard to achieve our vision and mission. A key feature of our work is partnership working. Glasgow Eco Trust is also an active member of several local and city wide networks.

Our activities have been delivered under the following key work areas. All activities were carried out in line with COVID guidance from UK and Scottish Government and relevant representative bodies such as Scottish Cycling, which changed throughout the year.

1) Information and Advocacy

Information and awareness raising on a range of environmental issues including: Monthly eNews letter - regularly sent to nearly 1,000 subscribers per month and all issues are available on our website. Active Social media presence.

Local network - we continued to facilitate the DRC Local Network however this was moved online and expanded to include more community partners including housing associations, primary schools and larger third sector organisations.

Consultations and campaigns - responding to various consultations and coordinating and participating local campaign activity such as the successful campaign against the WH Malcolm gasification plant and the establishment of the Victoria Park Community Trust and representation in the Ward 13 Area Partnership.

2) Community Spaces

Maintenance, improvement and development of community spaces including Applefield Garden at Gartnavel Royal Hospital, school gardens and growing spaces at Corpus Christi Primary and Clyde Campus.

Working in partnership with Heart of Scotstoun Community Garden and Kingsway Court Community Garden.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Acting as a community hub for Glasgow City Council's Neighbourhood Improvement Volunteers programme and litter picking activities.

3) De'ils On Wheels community bike workshop

Refurbishment of unwanted bikes and bike repairs. Received 325 bike donations; refurbished and sold over 130 bikes, which was almost double on the previous year, and we repaired more than 220 bikes, many through the Scotland Cycle Repair Scheme. We also sent over 2.5 tonnes of metal for recycling and started to recycle old tyres and inner tubes through industry manufacturer schemes.

4) Active Travel

Our adult led cycle rides continued and we held 100 rides, with nearly 600 participants and people cycling over 1,200 miles.

Our learn to cycle sessions returned and we held 16 sessions with 70 people participating.

We launched our health walks programme in July and held 66 walks with over 430 participants, walking more than 220 miles.

We continued to play an active role in the Glasgow Community Cycling Network (GCCN) in partnership with Bike For Good, St Paul's Youth Forum On Bikes, Free Wheel North, South West Community Cycles and Play Together on Pedals.

Bikeability in Primary Schools returned and we worked with 5 local schools and helped over 50 pupils complete their Bikeability Level 2 award.

We held a led cycle ride as part of the Global Day of Action for COP26 with over 50 people participating.

We were also successful in securing support from PAS (Planning Aid Scotland) Sustaining Choices project to develop an Active Travel and Sustainable Transport plan for Whiteinch and Scotstoun and surrounding areas.

5) Community Food

We were delighted to be part of the Glasgow Community Food Network Food and Climate Action Project. We were one of five host organisations across the city including St Paul's Youth Forum, Urban Roots, The Space and Central and West Integration Network. The project delivered work relating to food education, urban agriculture and work around COP26. We developed a walking programme

6) Community Green Team

Our volunteer programme began to get back to normal during 2021-2022 across all programmes. We had 26 (17) regular volunteers and 27 (0) occasional volunteers contribute a total of 1220 hours (280 hours) volunteer time. At a Living Wage of £9.50 per hour (£9.30) this equates to £11,590 (£2,604).

7) Partnership Working

This is a key feature of our work including DRC local voluntary sector network; Glasgow Community Cycling Network; Victoria Park Community Trust, an active member of several local and city wide networks.

8) Striving to be an excellent organisation

Governance - continue to strengthen and develop the board; Quality management - achieved the Revolve Reuse Quality Standard and the Volunteer Friendly award; Also a Living Wage employer.

Strategic Development - completed work on stakeholder engagement and community engagement; Impact measuring and reporting on our impact.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Heart of Scotstoun Community Centre

The Trust secured the funding for and oversaw the construction of the Heart of Scotstoun Community Centre back in 2010. A significant milestone was reached this year when the ownership of the Community Centre was finally transferred to Heart of Scotstoun Ltd, who have operated the Centre since it opened in 2011.

Impact of the COVID-19 Pandemic

The COVID-19 pandemic has had a significant impact on our society, communities and the economy and, unfortunately, many people have lost their lives. We now have some sense of hope with the emergence of a vaccine to treat the virus. And the response from our communities has been both humbling and inspiring.

Following a year where the office was mainly closed and lots of our activities had to stop from April 2021 we started to return to the office and re-start more services including the Community Green Team volunteering programme.

In terms of staffing, for those staff whose positions were funded they have been working from home since March 2020 and returned to being office based in August 2021. For other staff we were able to use the UK Government's Job Retention Scheme and place those staff on furlough, although one was just for the three weeks. The other moved to flexible furlough from August 2020 up until the end of the furlough scheme in September 2021. The Team met weekly using online technology and when appropriate moved back to face-to-face meetings where possible outdoors.

Similarly, the Board of trustees have continued to adapt and meet regularly, whether online, in person or hybrid. Our volunteer programme has re-started along with more of our activities and we have been able to provide opportunities for people to connect and re-connect, such as providing a free lunch after the led rides and health walks and celebration events. This has been very well received by the participants in terms of social interaction and helping both their physical and mental health and wellbeing.

We made numerous changes to ensure that we were COVID compliant and that our staff were able to work safely. These changes included moving to an online booking and payment system. As a Revolve accredited venue we were able to access support via the Revolve programme which was of great benefit. We were also able to continue to access support from Cycling UK Scotland Cycle Repair Scheme.

We have worked closely with our community partners to support each other to respond to the needs of our communities. And we have also developed some new partnerships during this period including as part of the Glasgow Community Food Network.

Funding and finance has continued to be challenging however we have secured a range of funding to continue to deliver our services and we feel we have managed to navigate our way through the pandemic reasonably well whilst ensuring we continued to deliver services and we are in a position to contribute to the community led recovery as we build back better.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

The charity generated an operating surplus of £20,431 for the year ended 31 March 2022 (2021: £11,595). During the year the charity transferred ownership of the property on Balmoral Street. The building was previously carried in the accounts with a value of £1,405,017 and was transferred to the Heart of Scotstoun Limited for consideration of £1. This resulted in an overall deficit of -£1,384,586 for the year.

At balance date, reserves stood at £90,844 (2021: £1,475,430) with £43,805 of these being unrestricted (2021: £49,159).

Principal funding sources

The principal source of funding is a grant from Glasgow City Council Glasgow Communities Fund (GCF).

Unrestricted funds are the funds generated by the Trust through undertaking environmental work and bike recycling activity. These funds are available to be used by the Trustees in furtherance of the Charity's objectives.

Restricted Funds comprise grants and donations received by the Charity which are applied in accordance with the funders requirements.

The funding of the Trust operations is heavily dependent on Glasgow City Council GCF which was awarded from 1 October 2020 for two and half years up to 31 Mar 2023.

During the past year the Trust has taken further steps to diversify its funding and income streams as well as increase the amount of income generated through the sale of goods and services to others. The levels of generated income will be further developed in the future.

Reserves policy

The Trust is a charitable company limited by guarantee and does not have share capital. The unrestricted reserves as at 31 March 2022 were £43,805 (2021: £49,159). Restricted reserves amount to £47,039 (2021: £1,426,271).

The Trust has a policy of having three months of operational funds in the unrestricted reserves, for the year ended 31 March 2022 this equalled approximately £31,668. At 31 March 2022 unrestricted reserves stood at £43,805 (2021: £49,159), the trustees are therefore satisfied that this reserves policy is being met. Funds held in excess of this will be reinvested in the development of the charity.

FUTURE PLANS

Moving forward the Trust will continue to deliver services that meet the needs of the community whilst diversifying its funding and income streams in order to secure the resources required to achieve its Vision and Mission and addressing the various emergencies facing communities including the energy crisis, the cost of living crisis and the climate emergency.

Key management remuneration

In the opinion of the trustees there is one member of key management staff, the Project Manager, who is involved in managing the charity and advancing its vision. The total employer cost for this post in 2021-22 was £37,162.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

There was no depreciation charged for the year as the only fixed asset was a property at 64 Balmoral Street. The property was disposed of during the year and therefore no depreciation has been charged.

Taxation

Glasgow Eco Trust is a charity within the meaning of Section 467 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 of Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that such income or gains are applied for charitable purposes only.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

The charity has effectively gifted property with a carrying value of £1,407,017 to the Heart of Scotstoun (charity number SC042792). The consideration payable was £1 meaning the charity has incurred a net outflow of assets of £1,407,016. This gift arrangement is part of the long term plan and strategic partnership between the two organisations. 16. RELATED PARTY DISCLOSURES

The Trust's related party transactions during the year as such are required to be disclosed under the Charities SORP (FRS102) January 2019 are summarised as follows:

Yoker Resource Centre is a related party through A Busby's position as Director of Glasgow Eco Trust and Senior Officer of the Yoker Resource Centre. During the year £3,093 was paid to Yoker Resource Centre in respect of bookkeeping, accounting, payroll and management services including human resources.

17. PURPOSE OF FUNDS

Unrestricted funds comprise funds generated through activities carried out by the Trust either through work undertaken by the Trust to aid the environment or through De'ils on Wheels which recycles old bikes and repairs and maintains bikes. Unrestricted funds are available to the Directors to be used in the furtherance of the charity's objectives.

Restricted Funds are created when donations, grants, etc. are made for a particular area or purpose, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.

These funds comprise:

Glasgow City Council - Glasgow City Council Area Partnership Fund, Glasgow City Council Communities Fund and N&S Fund are used to support the core project.

SEDA Pedal Power, Cycling Scotland Bikeability, Together for Our Planet, Cycling UK, Climate Action Corpus, Climate Action Clyde and Smarter Choices Smarter Places Glasgow Community Cycling Network fund all project delivery including the De'ils on Wheels, Community Spaces and Active Travel.

The designated fixed asset fund represents the funds acquired to pay for the construction of the Heart of Scotland Scotstoun Centre.

HMRC Job Retention Scheme used to pay costs for staff furloughed during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Hugh Fraser Foundation used to support De'ils on Wheels bike workshop.

The Corra Foundation Third Sector Resilience Fund used to support core costs during COVID-19 pandemic.

Glasgow Community Food Network used to support work on local food systems and food education.

GCVS Comminity Mental Health and Wellbeing Fund used to bring people together to be active, make connections, share and learn new skills and contribute to their community and improve their physical and mental wellbeing.
