Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2023

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2023. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The principal activity of the Trust is to deliver a wide range of environmental projects and services across the west of Glasgow.

Glasgow Eco Trust is a company limited by guarantee and governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. Company registration number SC273114. It is recognised as a charity for tax purposes by HMRC and by the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator [OSCR] (Charity Number SC035954).

The Trust changed its name on the 1st November 2018 from the Dumbarton Road Corridor Environment Trust in order to reflect the increase in the area in which the Trust operates.

The company's objects are:

- (1) The advancement of education through volunteering and training opportunities and promoting and delivering a range of activities and services related to supporting environmentally sustainable living and helping to assist participants in obtaining paid employment.
- (2) The advancement of citizenship or community development by providing information about community projects and events and by encouraging volunteering, community engagement and regeneration through physical, social and economic infrastructure improvements and by encouraging the formation and development of local groups which harness the skills and energy of the local community and promote community cohesion.
- (3) The provision of recreational facilities or the organisation of recreational activities, with the object of improving the conditions of life for the persons for whom the facilities or activities are primarily intended.
- (4) The advancement of environmental protection or improvement through providing volunteering opportunities for clean ups and community space development and through encouraging environmentally friendly modes of travel and environmentally sustainable living.
- (5) The relief of those in need by reason of age, ill health, disability, financial hardship or other disadvantage by promoting environmentally, economically and socially sustainable practices which assist people of limited means to reduce expenditure and by those suffering social isolation to engage in environmental improvement projects and other appropriate activities.
- (6) To promote, operate and /or support other charitable projects and initiatives for the benefit of the community within the Operating Area and to do so in a manner which respects the priorities set from time to time by the community within the operating area.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE OUR OPERATIONAL AREA

Glasgow Eco Trust is based in west Glasgow. Our primary area of focus is the Ward 13 Garscadden/Scotstounhill (Yoker, Scotstoun, Knightswood neighbourhoods) and Ward 12 Victoria Park (Whiteinch, Thornwood, Broomhill and Jordanhill). This area covers G14, G13 and part of G11 postcode areas.

Review of activities

The Trust continues to work hard to achieve our vision and mission. A key feature of our work is partnership working. Glasgow Eco Trust is also an active member of several local and city wide networks.

Our activities have been delivered under the following key work areas:

1) Information and Advocacy

Information and awareness raising on a range of environmental issues including: Monthly eNews letter - regularly sent to nearly 1,100 subscribers per month and all issues are available on our website. Active social media presence.

Local network - we continued to facilitate the Dumbartonshire Road Corridor Local Network however this was moved online and expanded to include more community partners including housing associations, primary schools and larger third sector organisations.

Consultations and campaigns - responding to various consultations and coordinating and participating local campaign activity.

2) Community Spaces

Maintenance, improvement and development of community spaces including school gardens and growing spaces at Corpus Christi Primary and Clyde Campus.

Working in partnership with Heart of Scotstoun Community Garden and Kingsway Court Community Garden.

We worked with Knightswood Community Centre to undertake a community engagement exercise around the development of a community garden and greenspace at the Centre.

Acting as a community hub for Glasgow City Council's Neighbourhood Improvement Volunteers programme and litter picking activities.

3) De'ils On Wheels community bike workshop

Refurbishment of unwanted bikes and bike repairs. Received 349 bike donations; refurbished and sold 124 bikes and transferred over 50 bikes to other organisations. We repaired 267 bikes, many through the Scotland Cycle Repair Scheme. We also sent 3 tonnes of metal for recycling and started to recycle over 300 used tyres and over 500 used inner tubes through industry manufacturer schemes.

4) Active Travel

Our adult led cycle rides continued and we held 89 rides, with nearly 600 participants and people collectively cycling over 11,200 miles.

Our learn to cycle sessions returned and we held 21 sessions with 122 people participating.

We continued our health walks programme and held 111 walks with 836 participants collectively walking more than 3700 miles.

We continued to play an active role in the Glasgow Community Cycling Network (GCCN) in partnership with Bike For Good, St Paul's Youth Forum On Bikes, Drumchapel Cycle Hub and Play Together on Pedals.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Bikeability in Primary Schools returned and we worked with 5 local schools and helped over 60 pupils complete their Bikeability Level 2 award.

We held a successful Transport, Climate and Community event with over 25 different organisations represented.

We launched our Active Travel and Sustainable Transport plan for Whiteinch and Scotstoun as part of the PAS (Planning Aid Scotland) Sustaining Choices project.

5) Community Food

We are part of the Glasgow Community Food Network Food and Climate Action Project. We were one of five host organisations across the city including St Paul's Youth Forum, Urban Roots, The Space and Central and West Integration Network. The project delivered work relating to food education, urban agriculture and work around COP26.

6) Community Green Team

Our volunteer programme began to get back to normal during 2022-2023 across all programmes. We had 30 (26) regular volunteers and 69 (27) occasional volunteers contribute a total of 1721 hours (1281 hours) volunteer time. At a Living Wage of £10.45/11.45 per hour * (£9.50) this equates to £18,845 (£12,170). (* Apr to Sep and Oct to Mar).

7) Partnership Working

This is a key feature of our work including DRC local voluntary sector network; Glasgow Community Cycling Network; Glasgow Community Food Network; Victoria Park Community Trust, an active member of several local and city wide networks.

8) Striving to be an excellent organisation

Governance - continue to strengthen and develop the board; Quality management - achieved the Revolve Reuse Quality Standard and the Volunteer Friendly award; Also a Living Wage employer.

Strategic Development - completed work on stakeholder engagement and community engagement; Impact measuring and reporting on our impact.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

The charity generated an operating surplus of £11,516 for the year ended 31 March 2023 (2022: £20,431).

During the prior financial year the charity transferred ownership of the property on Balmoral Street. The building was previously carried in the accounts with a value of £1,405,017 and was transferred to the Heart of Scotstoun Limited for consideration of £1.

On 31 March 2023, reserves stood at £102,360 (2022: £90,844) with £49,187 of these being unrestricted (2022: £43,805).

Reserves policy

The Trust is a charitable company limited by guarantee and does not have share capital. The unrestricted reserves as at 31 March 2023 were £53,173 (2022: £43,805). Restricted reserves amount to £49,187 (2022: £47,039).

The Trust has a policy of having three months of operational funds in the unrestricted reserves, for the year ended 31 March 2023 this equalled approximately £36,728 (2022: £31,668). At 31 March 2023 unrestricted reserves stood at £53,173 (2022: £43,805), the trustees are therefore satisfied that this reserves policy is being met. Funds held in excess of this will be reinvested in the development of the charity.

FUTURE PLANS

Moving forward the Trust will continue to deliver services that meet the needs of the community whilst diversifying its funding and income streams in order to secure the resources required to achieve its Vision and Mission and addressing the various emergencies facing communities including the energy crisis, the cost of living crisis and the climate emergency.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2023

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Glasgow Eco Trust ("the charity") is a Scottish charitable company governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 9 September 2004. It was registered as a charity in Scotland (registered number SC035954) on 9 September 2004. Its registered address is 64 Balmoral Street, Glasgow, G14 0BL.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements are prepared on an accruals basis, and on a going concern basis, in accordance with:

- the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005;
- Regulation 8 (Statement of account Fully accrued accounts) of The Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006;
- the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, published in March 2018 ("FRS 102"), to the extent that it applies to small entities and public benefit entities;
- 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, published in October 2019 (FRS 102)' ("the Charities SORP");
- UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and
- the historical cost convention.

The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value, unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

The financial statements are presented in UK sterling, which is the charity's functional currency, and rounded to the nearest pound.

There have been no changes to the basis of preparation this financial year or to the previous financial year's financial statements.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

The charity does not currently hold any fixed assets but it is the policy of the trustees to capitalise any tangible fixed assets purchased where the cost exceeds £1,000.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Taxation

Glasgow Eco Trust is a charity within the meaning of Section 467 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 of Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that such income or gains are applied for charitable purposes only.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

18. PURPOSE OF FUNDS

Unrestricted funds comprise funds generated through activities carried out by the Trust either through work undertaken by the Trust to aid the environment or through De'ils on Wheels which recycles old bikes and repairs and maintains bikes. Unrestricted funds are available to the Directors to be used in the furtherance of the charity's objectives.

Restricted Funds are created when donations, grants, etc. are made for a particular area or purpose, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.

These funds comprise:

Glasgow City Council - Glasgow City Council Area Partnership Fund, Glasgow City Council Communities Fund and N&S Fund are used to support the core project.

SEDA Pedal Power, Cycling Scotland Bikeability, National Lottery Community Fund, Cycling UK, Climate Action Corpus, Climate Action Clyde Smarter Choices Smarter Places Glasgow, Culture and Sport Glasgow, Kingsway Community Connections and Glasgow Community Cycling Network fund all project delivery including the De'ils on Wheels, Community Spaces and Active Travel.

The designated fixed asset fund represents the funds acquired to pay for the construction of the Heart of Scotland Scotstoun Centre.

HMRC Job Retention Scheme used to pay costs for staff furloughed during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Glasgow Community Food Network used to support work on local food systems and food education.

GCVS Glasgow Wellbeing Fund used to bring people together to be active, make connections, share and learn new skills and contribute to their community and improve their physical and mental wellbeing.
