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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MAY 2018

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 May 2018. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The charity's objectives are:

- (1) To provide, in the interests of social welfare, facilities for recreation and other leisure time activities available to the public at large with a view to improving their conditions of life;
- (2) To promote community participation in healthy recreation, in particular by the provision of facilities for the playing of football and other sports;
- (3) To promote and protect the wellbeing and physical health of people living in the vicinity of the facilities operated by the company, and to assist in the relief of ill health and the provision of health education for such people;
- (4) To promote public safety in the interests of the general public, and in particular by promoting initiatives and programmes which are directed towards reducing the incidence of vandalism and other anti-social behaviour by encouraging participation in sports;
- (5) To help young people to develop their physical, mental and spiritual capacities, such that they may grow to full maturity as individuals and as members of society;
- (6) To promote training, particularly in such skills as will assist the participants in obtaining paid employment;
- (7) To promote, establish, operate and/or support other projects and initiatives of a charitable nature.

MAIN OBJECTIVES FOR THE YEAR

The charity's main objective is to pursue fulfilment of its mission statement to promote lifelong learning, health and wellbeing, primarily in South Ayrshire, through football. To this end it continued to build a partnership approach with key stakeholders and to expand its Community activities.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MAY 2018

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

The Academy has two main activities.

- "We encourage participation in sport for people of all ages, regardless of background or ability.
- "We pursue a model of sporting excellence to allow talented boys and girls a platform from which to reach their individual goals and play the sport at the highest level.

The Academy has continued to make significant progress since the publication of the last Annual Report, as illustrated below.

Providing for Football in the Community -

The Academy's Community Projects Group meets regularly to create programmes and find funding for new activities for more disadvantaged groups, young and old, in our local communities.

In summary:

Attendance levels were up by 14,720 participant attendances, growing from just over 140,438 to 155,158. The activity continues to be aimed at promoting healthy activity in general, focusing on:

- " A wide range of physical activity programmes for all skill levels;
- " Targeting children and school aged populations;
- "Broader education programmes linked to the coaching (such as climate change awareness);
- " An overall health promotion ethos.

The Football for Life programme continued to oversee activities aimed at the over 50's age brackets. Supervising the growing numbers taking part in the Walking Football and Football Memories programmes. The Football for Life activities constitute an area of significant growth and focus. More of this below.

As noted above, the Academy has expanded its range of activities experienced during the last reporting year. Total participation in Academy activities over the year amounted to 155,158 (participant attendances). Allowing for repeat participation we estimate that we are working with around 11,400 individuals. We continue to widen the scope of our programmes in the community, with more attention being turned towards supporting adults, and specifically older adults, and promoting the Women's and Girls' game.

Making Football Accessible

We strive to make football accessible to young people and adults in all areas of the local community, as well as using the sport as a means to encourage a healthy lifestyle and promote education. AUFA's programmes work in partnership with many organisations and include: -

Football development and participation programmes

The Academy works closely with the Scottish FA and South Ayrshire Council to promote and deliver football activity in the schools and community centres around South Ayrshire.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Scottish FA - Club Development

The Scottish FA has a focus on participation, coach education and development of the local boys' and girls' clubs and teams, all of which AUFA supports in the form of programmes such as Quality Mark, and Coach Education. SFA coach education courses are delivered by the Academy's SFA qualified Tutor, helping to enhance the quality of activity offered by the local boys' and girls' football clubs.

Scottish FA - School of Football.

The School of Football initiative is well established now and AUFA takes responsibility for its delivery at Prestwick Academy and Ayr Academy. Identified Secondary 1, Secondary 2 and Secondary 3 pupils take part in one football session per day at school and gain a qualification through their involvement with the school of football. The delivery of the programme is in partnership with the Scottish FA, with around 16,000 (an increase of 4,800) attendances taking place during the school year.

South Ayrshire Council - Curricular and Extra Curricular activity

South Ayrshire Council part funds the Term Time programme of after school classes for children aged between 2 to 12 yrs of age, along with Summer, October and Easter holiday Soccer Camps. Aimed at boys and girls aged between 2 to 15 years of age, these are delivered by the Academy's SFA qualified coaches and Ayr United First Team players. Each day is different with activities ranging from themed sessions, skill development, fun games, tournaments and challenges. It makes the delivery of football for the local area an all year round offer.

Total annual attendances at these football development programmes is in the region of 13,500

Climate Challenge Fund

The Green Community Superhero's project funded by The Climate Challenge Fund had 4 main strands. The first was educational where AUFA coaches visited schools and delivered football sessions to Primary 3 and 4 pupils, focusing on the theme of climate change. The sessions were accompanied with a logbook which the pupils were required to complete. The second strand of the project involved 1,515 nursery school children participating in our green themed football sessions which raised early awareness of climate change. The third strand of the project was to recycle sports equipment and divert it from landfill. A total of 1.54 tonnes of CO2e was diverted away from landfill. The final strand of the project was to recycle school uniforms and a total of 14.68 tonnes of CO2e was diverted away from landfill.

Health and Social Inclusion Programmes - Football for Life

These programmes are aimed mainly at the over 50's section of the local community. They fall within the Academy's Football for Life group activities and are designed to encourage older age groups to take part in healthy activity and to meet socially.

Football Fans in Training

Football Fans in training is a weight management programme, sponsored by the SPFL, aimed at supporters of Ayr United. AUFA deliver the programme in partnership with the Scottish Professional Football League Trust. The programme is aimed at people aged 35 and over, with weight issues. Each programme has an intensive twelve-week block of activity and workshops designed to help participants target and achieve weight loss and a healthier lifestyle.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Weigh to Go

Weigh to Go Ayr United is a lifestyle programme funded fully by Alliance Scotland. AUFA delivers the programme in partnership with NHS Ayrshire and Arran. The programme is for males aged 16+, who are overweight or suffer long term health issues. Each Programme has an intense twelve-week block of activity and educational lifestyle workshops which lead in to one year of monitoring and evaluating each participant. The programme runs all year round, with 30 participants taking part last year.

Football for Life

Three main programmes make up the Football for Life programme, including the Walking, Talking & Drawing project which is funded by the Integrated Care Fund. They are:

Football Memories

Targeted at the increasing population of over 50's, Football Memories sessions enable people to get together and reminisce about football, as well as other sports. We encourage people to talk about day to day memories of their past whilst enjoying the anecdotes of others. The target group includes people with Alzheimer's/Dementia and those experiencing social isolation and loneliness. There are around 22 sessions a year and they take place at Somerset Park (Ayr), Girvan and Maybole.

Walking Football

This is one of the Academy's fastest growing activities allowing men or women in the over 50 age group to take part in fun and competitive football sessions on a weekly basis. Currently there are five centres across South Ayrshire with sessions taking place at Maybole, Ayr, Girvan, Troon and Prestwick. Annual attendance numbers have increased from 2,600 last year to 3,400 this, with an average of over 70 participants per week. There are plans to increase the number of centres and to introduce a Women's section.

Drawing

The drawing aspect of the programme is delivered by Little Art School and is for older people who are affected by dementia, and their carers. Participants attend monthly sessions in Ayr, Troon and Girvan and are taught how to draw, by tasking them with various themes to draw.

AUFA Girls' and Women's Football Development

The AUFA Girls' and Women's section's objective is to grow female participation in football. In the girls' and women's section we have eighty girls participating weekly. Whilst this is a significantly larger number than previously, we aim to develop this to over one hundred and forty over a three-year period. The Women's and Girls' Football Development Coordinator is part funded by Sportscotland. His role included AUFA offering a community class that can feed in to a pathway for girls to join a team. The Womens' and Girls teams train twice a week and play a game at the weekends. Around 135 girls and women took part in the teams last year.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Disability Football Programme

Children in Need - Honest Kids/Everybody Active

Continued funding from Children in Need plus additional funding from South Ayrshire Charitable Trust, has seen AUFA's disability programme continue and improve. The programme has continued in South Ayrshire's 2 Additional Support Needs schools with Southcraig sessions being revamped and seeing increased participation. The sessions have also continued at Queen Margaret Academy's Supported Learning Centre, with a number of current and former pupils from there volunteering at The Honest Kids Club. The Honest Kids club continues to offer afterschool football for any young people in South Ayrshire with additional support needs and behavioural issues. In total there were around 5,860 participant attendances during the year, compared to 3,561 last year.

Social Diversity Programmes

Night Leagues

Night leagues, funded by SAC Proceeds of Crime and Scottish FA funding, run from September to April each year and they are aimed at young people who are at a loose end on weekends. Young people are encouraged through our community partnerships to turn up at an organised venue and compete in nightly tournaments and physical activity rather than engaging in anti-social behaviour. 30 participants and 720 attendances were recorded over 24 sessions

Talented Young Footballers Development Programme -

One of the Academy's headline activities has been that of supporting the development of talented young footballers. Robbie Crawford, Alan Forrest and Craig McGuffie have established themselves as Ayr United Football Club first team regulars, with over 400 first team appearances among them. Other Academy graduates, such as Jackson Longridge, David Mitchell and Aaron Muirhead, compete for other SPFL teams.

AUFA continued to improve the standards around the Talented Young Footballers programme, competing in the Scottish FA's Club Academy Scotland Programme, at Silver Star status and have recently been granted Progressive status, making the Academy the only League 1 academy in the 2017/18 season. As part of the changes we have established two new departments - Football Science and Medicine and Sports Analysis - which will help enormously in the development of our young players. The Boards of the Academy and Ayr United F.C. have also worked together to strengthen AUFA's role in providing a conveyor belt of talent for the first team. Together, we aspire to a position where no less than 50% of Ayr United's first team match day squad have come through the Academy.

Around 210 young players attend coaching sessions delivered by over 55 experienced, Scottish FA qualified Academy Coaches and coaching staff.

Future priorities

Our future priorities will be to continue to concentrate on building and strengthening the two main programme areas, namely, the Football in the Community and Talented Young Footballer's programmes.

We will continue to build the Football in the Community programme in a strategic manner, seeking medium to long term partnerships and funding streams which will allow it to deliver sustainable programmes of activity, to benefit the large range of people in the local community, who are currently excluded or disadvantaged from satisfying their desire to participate in healthy, football based activity.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

In the Talented Young Footballers programme, the Academy has focused on strengthening its coaching staff, improving its facilities and raising its standards in such a way that its young players will be presented with the best opportunity to achieve their ambition to play professional football. The Scottish FA is working its way through a rapid restructuring of its Youth Development Programme and has recently announced significant changes to the programme which will involve all Academies. The Academy has been positioned in the Progressive tier of the games programme, which is designed to allow developing academies a place to put the final building blocks in place before achieving Elite status

We remain strong supporters of The Scottish FA's youth development strategy and will focus on raising our standards in line with the Scottish FA drive, to allow us to continue to compete at the highest level of the Club Academy Programme.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Summary

Both of our core programmes continue to thrive, with overall participant attendances increasing by 11,648 (8%) over last year. The Girls' and Women's section accounts for a large part of the growth. It is also pleasing to report that attendances within our Disability Football programme grew by 65% over the year.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Principal funding sources

The principal funding sources during the accounting period were: the Scottish Football Association who made a significant award for the successful achievement of standards in respect of the Talented Young Footballers' Programme, whilst the Climate Challenge Fund, Children in Need, Integrated Care fund and The William Grant Foundation kindly supplemented our Social Enterprise activities to fund the wide range of community based programmes. Income donated by corporate and public sector sponsors supplemented these contributions to allow the Academy to manage a well rounded range of footballing activities. Outgoing resources exceeded incoming resources for the year by £21,261.

Reserves policy

The Directors hold funds and use the income to pay out all costs, charges and expenses properly incurred in the delivery of the charity's objectives. The aim of the board now is to strive to maintain sufficient reserves in unrestricted funds to a level which would meet a minimum of three months of budgeted charitable expenditure and unexpected costs. This has been achieved. The balance on unrestricted funds at the year end was £41,246 of which those not invested in fixed assets (the free reserves) was £34,369.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Recruitment and appointment of new members

The membership is restricted to anyone aged 16 years or over whose main residence lies within Ayrshire, Ayrshire College, Ayr United Community Initiative, Ayr United Football and Athletic Club Limited, South Ayrshire Health and Social Care Partnership and South Ayrshire Council, or any other corporate body or any individual who has been nominated for membership by any other unincorporated body.

The directors are responsible for considering each application for membership and have the right to refuse to admit any person or body to membership.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Organisational structure

The Board of Directors meets regularly to administer the company's activities. The day-to-day administration is delegated to relevant directors, who in turn manage a team of volunteers and paid staff.

As ever we are grateful for the unstinting efforts of our volunteers, around 80 in number who are involved in service provision and fundraising. Without their support and assistance, we would not be able to make such a significantly valuable contribution to our local communities.

Risk management

The directors have reviewed the major strategic, business and operational risks, which the charity faces and have confirmed that systems have been established to enable regular reports to be produced so that the necessary steps can be taken to lessen these risks.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MAY 2018

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The charity is incorporated in Scotland as a company limited by guarantee not having a share capital. The registered office is shown on page 6.

Going Concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis which assumes that the company will continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. The trustees consider that the going concern assumption is an appropriate basis on which to prepare these financial statements.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery

- 25% on reducing balance and Straight line over 3 years

Motor vehicles

- 20% on reducing balance

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities. The charity is not registered for Value Added Tax and, consequently, any such irrecoverable tax is included in the expenditure concerned.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
