

It is a pleasure for me to present our Annual Impact Report to you.

The past year at Kingsway Community Connections can be summed up, for me, by using 3 words: optimism, concern, and response.

I was optimistic that the very worst of the global pandemic was behind us. I was very much looking forward to seeing the Centre being able to deliver its services and activities uninterrupted for the first time since March 2020. I am delighted to say my optimism came to fruition and we did just that,

However, we were about to embark on an unprecedented response to a cruel cost of greed crisis which would disproportionately affect those on the lowest incomes.

Concern was rising during July and August about the impending energy price increase. It was clear a great many people were going to find winter 2022/23 very difficult indeed. KCC staff focused on finding a response that would reduce harm, if even a little. It's been quite extraordinary to witness us double the time our community spaces were open from 30 to 60 hours per week, provide a hot meal every day and give residents the opportunity to meet up in a warm, welcome place.

In the face of adversity, we found innovative ways to support our community and there were many incredible achievements, lots of fun, learning and laughter along the way.

I would like to express my gratitude to our sessional staff, volunteers, and Directors for all their hard work and support. Also, the staff team, Beth, Stephanie and Yahong whose passion, dedication, and commitment to tackling inequalities have been the driving force behind our successes.

I do hope you enjoy reading this year's Annual Impact Report, for me, it represents the fantastic work undertaken to support our residents' Personal Growth during 2022/23.

Staff

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Our community spaces continued to benefit from a variety of groups delivering their sessions, creating opportunities for learning, connections, and support. During 2022/23 650 individuals accessed services and/or groups/activities in the Centre 10,622 times, demonstrating the necessity for community hubs like KCC who are embedded in the heart of their communities.

Kingsway Women's Group

Kingsway Women's Group is a volunteer-led group who meet weekly. They organise and participate in activities about women's experiences, history, and local issues. The heart of the group is social and firm friendships have been made over the years of the group's existence.

With funding from The National Lottery Community Fund Awards for All programme, a community brunch was organised to promote the group and the Kingsway Women's Group have continued to grow its membership.

During 2022/23 20 women attended 45 sessions 174 times. A variety of trips and activities took place, highlights include:

A trip to Edinburgh with the Kurdish Women's Group where the women received a guided tour of the Parliament. They also took a wander along the Royal Mile, visited to the Castle, and toured The Peoples Story Museum. This trip was an excellent way for the two groups to integrate. They shared opinions on social and political issues and took in the beautiful sights of the Capital, a first for some of the attendees.

"I like being able to go to the Parliament as the Parliament in my home country is not open to the people" Kurdish WG participant.

Health Issues in the Community. As part of Beth's accreditation to become a Health Issues in the Community

Titles the Wemps's Crown participated in four tester access.

Tutor, the Women's Group participated in four taster sessions. They discussed a wide range of health issues; from how to treat illness to how housing can affect our health.

- Health Walk with Cindy. Attendees enjoyed the health walk so much that they became a weekly feature in our Activity for All timetable.
- Arts & crafts. The group love getting crafty and have done various art activities throughout the year, including painting plant pots.
- Panto. To get in the Christmas spirit, 12 members of our Women's Group went along to Knightswood Congregational Church's production of Dick Whittington.
- Wellness with Mary. In October 2022, the group met with Mary McConnell, Wellness Therapist to plan a
 four-week block of wellness sessions. In February and March 2023, the group attended sessions with Mary
 focussing on self-soothing, relaxation techniques like finger breathing and vision boarding.
- One attendee who was new to the group thoroughly enjoyed the first two sessions, telling us it was the first time she'd felt relaxed and able to talk about the stresses in her life.

"You took us to another planet and that planet is called Relax" WG Participant.

- International Women's Day. To mark IWD, our women's group spent the afternoon in Community Room 2 brushing up on their suffragette trivia and learning more about the women's liberation movement.
- Kelvingrove Art Museum. Six members of the group and Beth had a lovely afternoon at the museum and art gallery, exploring the Glasgow exhibits and having some tea and cake afterwards. Two members of the group who have studied art displayed two indicators of wellness (occupation and outgoing) by acting as unofficial tour guides for the group and educating them on techniques, for examples creating texture with varying brush strokes.

Community Garden

Our garden has 18 community beds which have been tended to by **20** keen gardeners over 2022/23. Our Community Development Gardener, Eric, provided **300** hours to supporting our **12** community beds. Eric regularly uses these beds to teach gardeners and members of the community how to plant and grow.

In partnership with Glasgow Community Food Network there were **three** tours around our garden in June. This was part of a series by GCFN to highlight local community gardens, learn about what growing is, how it works and how to get involved.

The garden is now the proud home of a polytunnel, meaning gardeners can grow cucumbers, tomatoes, chillies and Mediterranean herbs like basil. They can also raise plants in the tunnel and plant them once they are strong enough to survive outdoors.

As always, our youth group were keen to get back into the garden when The Club was on. Participants were especially interested in the pond during the Spring holidays as they could see tadpoles turning into frogs.



Walking Group

30 walks were planned over eleven months with 26 taking place from May 2022 to March 2023.

To accommodate a range of abilities and to encourage opportunity to participate and progress, walks were scheduled on different days and grades of difficulty. Walks took place across 7 Tuesday afternoons, 3 Wednesday evenings, 7 Thursday afternoons, 8 Friday afternoons, and 5 Saturdays. 11 walks were graded easy, 15 as moderate and 4 as hard.

A total of 47 people registered for the walking programme. 8 of whom did not attend any walks and 39 attended at least 1 walk.

Summer of 2022 saw the walking programme returned to a full schedule again post-covid. Over the years walking has proved to be a staple in the Centre's diet of activities to create connections for people, and build strength, fitness, and resilience, to both their physical and mental wellbeing.

The Centre hires local community transport and provides an experienced walk leader who plans the programme, drives the bus, and leads the walks on a voluntary basis.

The walks take people beyond their community and day to day experiences, whether that be gentler walks around country parks or a bit more challenging walks in the Scottish hills or the central lowlands. They offer opportunities to connect with others, connect with nature, absorb spectacular scenery, take time to reflect and feel good about themselves.

This guote from an enthusiastic walker sums up the programme very well:

"A great walk, great fun and magnificent views, so passionately love Scotland for its fantastic views, fantastic diversity - mountains, hills, and beautiful landscape - the rocks, the lochs, the hills, so wonderful and so worth climbing. Youth Group Summer & October 2022

Our youth work is delivered during school holidays (spring, summer, and October). We were delighted to be funded again by the **Scottish Government**. The fund was managed by **Inspiring Scotland's** Thrive Outdoors team. The fund themes align with KCC's approach to youth work:

- Development of better and more opportunities to play outside, leading to improved physical health, mental health and wellbeing.
- Families and communities gain a deeper awareness of the benefits of outdoor play connecting people and place.
- Increased perceived value and support of play opportunities for children and young people.

We had daily sessions for two weeks of The Club during the Spring holidays in April 2022. Every session was attended by **30** primary-school aged children.

We delivered 38 sessions to 79 children and 4 parents over the Summer and October Club.

We ate lots of healthy snacks, went on local walks, and enjoyed our local greenspaces. We are very fortunate to have access to the park on the Kingsway Estate, The Homie and the Danes Drive Park for our daily, play activities.

Being outdoors all the time has encouraged positive visibility for the young people in our area, with many community members' commenting throughout the holidays of how lovely it is to see kids playing outdoors. Young people also displayed their responsibility by asking to do community litter picks.

In total, we delivered 49 outdoor play sessions where 79 young people attended 1225 times.

In partnership with Glasgow Community Food Network, 4 parents attended 4 sessions where parents cooked lunch for the young people in The Club.

Groups We Support

Kurdish Women's Group

The group continues to be hugely popular and now has **150** women, children and young people registered. The main purpose of the group is to reduce isolation and to promote integration of asylum-seeking/refugee women. In particular, women from Iraq, Syria, Turkey and Iran. The group is peer led and held **61** sessions during 2023/23 with **3660** attendances. Activities include:

For children and young people:

- First Aid and Coping with Challenges workshops from British Red Cross.
- · Self-defence session from Glasgow United Krav Maga.
- · Session from Community Police Scotland.
- Visit to National Park arranged by Educational and Inclusion Adviser at Loch Lomond and the Trossachs National Park.
- Handmade sessions for children aged 10 and above, for example designing a bag and making jewellery.
- How To Be Safe online session by our volunteer.
- Session for our youth group arranged by DRC Generations.
- Several trips for all school aged children to Glasgow Science Centre.
- Cash for Kids fund for 2022 summer programme.
 - Cash for Kids fund to visit Flip out for the children.
 - Cash for Kids fund to visit Laser Station and Mini Golf.
- Visit to Movement Park.
- ASH project fund for our children to Visit M&D's to celebrate 2023 children's day.
- Amina Muslin Women's Resource Centre provided Eid toys.

For Women:

- Ongoing basic and informal English lessons conversation club.
- Ongoing online partnership working alongside Nergiz Kurdish Women's Group based in Nottingham which began during the pandemic.
- Partnership working with Amina Muslim Women's Resource Centre; delivered several educational sessions for our Women's group.
- Partnership working with Kingsway Women's Group including visiting Scottish Parliament.
- Tackling Loneliness session for women provided by British Red Cross team.
- Culture sharing session with Kingsway Women's Group.

Group Celebrations

- Eid celebrations for women and children.
- Partnership working with Historical Environmental Scotland and provides trip to Stirling Castle to celebrate Nawroz (Kurdish New Year).
- Kurdish flag day celebration.
- Children day celebration in Victoria Park 2022.

Our Lunch club (Bite, Brew and a Blether) and Coffee morning groups are peer led aimed at reducing isolation and loneliness in the community. Coffee morning takes place on a Tuesday, BBB is on Thursdays. During 2022/23 10 people were registered, attending 39 sessions, 202 times.

We were delighted to continue hosting **Active Seniors**. Throughout 2022/23 11 committee members held 13 meetings at the Centre and we provided access to office space and ongoing support as required.

In partnership with Glasgow Clyde College, we provided another term of English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL). 25 people attended 136 sessions delivered in the Centre's Community Room 1.

Activity for All

For the second year in a row, **Yoga** has proved to be our most popular activity with **20** registered members attending **78** times in the **11** sessions provided.

Mind & Draw returned, this time to an evening slot as requested by participants. There is a lovely feel to this group, 12 people have attended 16 sessions. People have formed strong connections with each other, one participant even joins the group during her break from work in the local Tesco.

Residents told us that keeping active was important to them, we scheduled 18 Tai Chi sessions led by Gary from Chi in the Park. 13 people attended, and some have continued practicing what they learned at home.

We partnered with our friends at Glasgow Eco Trust once again to offer Health Walks led by Cindy. The walks give participants the opportunity to explore the local area with others while increasing fitness. There were 45 attendances recorded on the 15 walks delivered.

Branching Out. 6 men attended a 4-session course around survival skills, each session focussed on a different skill. The purpose was to bring men together with the aim of developing a men's group, this work is on-going.

Extended Opening

In October 2022, Glasgow City Council recognised that due to the crisis around food and fuel costs, the coming winter was likely to be extremely challenging for many people. Through Glasgow Council for Voluntary Services, they asked community organisations if they were able to offer support by opening their spaces for longer. We were already developing our response to supporting residents and with funding from GCC, we became the dedicated "welcome space" for Scotstoun, resulting in the Centre opening its doors for 60 hours a week. During these 6 months, 112 people attended 3105 times to enjoy either a breakfast, hot meal or to simply have a bit of company.

Our support consisted of:

- Hot food (from Heart of Scotstoun) all day
- Breakfast club
- Internet access
- · Charging points for electronics
- Microwave
- Offering a warm, safe space to meet others.

We asked people what the Centre meant to them:

- Having time to see and chat with Janice.
- A fun place for kids to play.
- This place is amazing!
- · Super fun and lots of children to play with.
- I love the food.
- Making new friends.
- Llove the breakfast club!
- A place to be happy.
- A place to do your homework or studying.
- Sometimes quiet, sometimes loud.
- · Open and welcome to everyone, friendly, happy.
- Promotes fitness, friendship and fun.
- A place to relax and to get support.

During this time, staff informed people of other services and activities available in the Centre, many people have since joined groups, accessed yoga, tai chi, walks, and other activities adding further evidence to the power of connections.


Services

Our Welfare Advice & Support Worker, Yahong, supported **108** residents **341** times. Clients came from a variety of ethnic backgrounds, and their enquiries covered a wide range of topics but mainly concentrated in the areas of benefits, energy, and housing.

The composition of clients reflects the diversity in our community. The high percentage of non-indigenous people requesting welfare advice could suggest the additional barriers they face understanding and accessing benefits, housing etc.

In addition to appointment based one to one support, we provided people with referrals or access to emergency food. We referred 22 people to Glasgow North West Foodbank at Blawarthill Parish Church, 22 people were given vouchers to be redeemed at the North West Pantry and 1 person received 2 fuel vouchers from us. A further 5 people visited 11 times to access the telephone or photocopier.

Further Highlights

In December, Santa popped by, and gave out over 150 gifts to young people in the area. Huge thanks to the Garscadden/Scotstounhill Area Partnership for once again funding this.

We were delighted to be able to hold our **annual fundraiser** in person for the first time since 2019. We had a fabulous evening in Scotstounhill Bowling Club and we were thrilled to have raised £1260!

We delivered an awareness session to asylum seekers and refugees on their housing rights in partnership with Community Infosource.

Beth and Yahong were featured on STV News to discuss the impact of the cost-of-living crisis has had on third sector organisation responding as warm spaces.

Lainy was elected as the Third Sector Interface representative on the Garscadden/Scotstounhill Area Partnership. We produced and delivered **500** newsletters to the community to keep them informed of the Centre's activities.

Reserves policy

The Trustees have examined the charity's requirements for reserves in light of the main risks to the organisation. They have established a policy whereby the unrestricted funds should be approximately three months of normal operating expenditure. The expenditure for 2022/23 was £220,126 and therefore the target reserves figure is £55,032 in general unrestricted funds.

The Trustees are confident that at this level they would be able to continue the current activities of the charity in the short term in the event of a significant drop in funding. The 2022/23 accounts show that the general reserves were £9,698 (2022: £8,156), significantly short of the above target level. The Trustees have an intention to increase the level of general reserves as far as possible so as to reach this target.

Results

During the year to 31 March 2023, the charity had total income of £240,460 (2022: £174,139), expenditure of £220,126 (2022: £146,869) leaving a net surplus of £20,334 (2022: £27,270). The charity's total reserves at 31 March 2023 were £54,475 (2022: £34,141) and of these, the unrestricted reserves total £13,000 (2022: £11,625).

A LOOK AHEAD

As our funding situation is now relatively stable for the next couple of years, we can plan longer term with some confidence. We intend to continue development of our groups and Activity for All in consultation with the community. Our **Personal Growth** approach to achieving **wellness** will remain our focus.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is ruled under the terms of its memorandum and articles of association (known informally as 'the constitution') and was formed in November 2010. It is recognised as a Scottish Charity by the Scottish Charity Regulator (OSCR).

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The trustees are appointed at the annual general meeting of the charity. They are selected on the basis of their interest and energy in enhancing the Kingsway Court high rise flats and the area immediately around the flats.

The Constitution states that trustees must be local residents.

Organisational structure

Day-to-day operational responsibility is delegated to the Managing Director, Lainy Bedingfield. Staff members report directly to the Managing Director, who in turn is responsible to the Board.

Board meetings are held approximately every month and the Managing Director circulates a report to the board approximately one week before the meeting.

Key management remuneration

In the opinion of the trustees there is only one key management personnel - the Managing Director. The total employer cost of this post (including salary, employer national insurance and employer pension contributions) is £42,093 (2022; £38,342).

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

The aims of the charity's risk management policy are to:

- Promote client (resident), employee and public safety
- Protect personnel and assets
- Minimise loss and insurance costs
- Improve contingency planning for dealing with risks and their impact

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Kingsway Community Connections ("the charity") is a charitable company, limited by guarantee. The charity is ruled under the terms of its memorandum and articles of association (known informally as 'the constitution') and was formed in November 2010. It is recognised as a Scottish Charity by the Scottish Charity Regulator (OSCR) with registered number SC037466.lts registered address is 50 Kingsway Court, Glasgow, G14 9SR.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The financial statements are prepared on an accruals basis, and on a going concern basis, in accordance with:

- the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005;
- Regulation 8 (Statement of account Fully accrued accounts) of The Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006;
- the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, published in March 2018 ("FRS 102"), to the extent that it applies to small entities and public benefit entities:
- 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, published in October 2019 (FRS 102)' ("the Charities SORP");
- UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice; and
- the historical cost convention.

The charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value, unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

The financial statements are presented in UK sterling, which is the charity's functional currency, and rounded to the nearest pound.

There have been no changes to the basis of preparation this financial year or to the previous financial year's financial statements.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued ...

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Tangible fixed assets

All assets over £500 will be captalised and depreciation is provided at the following annual rate in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Computer Equipment -25% straight line method

Taxation

Kingsway Community Connections is a charity within the meaning of Section 467 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 of Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 and section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that such income or gains are applied for charitable purposes only.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Going concern

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.
