Report of the Trustees for the year ended 30 June 2023

The Trustees who are also Directors of the Charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, are pleased to present their report together with the financial statements of the company for the year ended 30 June 2023.

Status of Charity and Governing Document

Solas (Centre for Public Christianity) is a company limited by guarantee (Number SC380516) and is a registered Scottish charity (Number SC041613), governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Objectives & Activities

The objective of the company is to advance the Christian Faith for the public good, as expressed by the Apostles' Creed, in the United Kingdom and elsewhere as the Trustees think fit. To this end Solas carries out evangelistic activities by conferences and speaking engagements, as well as by publishing books and digital media. Solas also trains and equip individuals and churches to proclaim the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ for the spiritual health and the good of people, society and their environment.

Appointment of Directors

New directors are appointed at the discretion of the Board. At each annual general meeting, one third of the directors shall retire from office in rotation but shall be eligible for re-election. The Trust assists new directors to familiarise themselves with the charity's values, aims and objectives together with its day-to-day operations, their statutory responsibilities as directors of a company limited by guarantee and of Directors of a charity.

Achievements and performance

Solas exists to persuasively and winsomely communicate the good news of who Jesus is and what he has done—and to equip other Christians to do the same. We partner with churches, university Christian Unions, and others, to help them take the gospel out of the four walls of the Church and into places where non-Christians spend their time: universities, workplaces, cafes, schools, pubs, and online.

These twelve months have seen a continued growth of and opportunities for Solas's work. It has also seen Solas continue to grow geographically, expanding its reach further into England, with one of speaking team now based there as well as into Northern Ireland (we held several events there this year). At the same time, Solas's impact in Scotland continues to grow, not least with our appointment of a second full-time speaker based in Perth.

Achievements and performance (continued)

Some of the many highlights of the last year include:

Evangelism and Training

- The Solas team were involved in CU missions on a number of campuses, including Glasgow University, where Andy Bannister was joined by Steve Osmond, our new speaker, for a week of outreach. Solas also trained UCCF staff and volunteers at training events in St. Andrew's and London.
- Evangelism events for churches across the country have happened in venues ranging from pubs to
 cafes, restaurants to church halls. One highlight was an outreach in Aberdeen to which over 80
 people came (almost double the expected number) including many non-Christian guests and
 attendees.
- Solas *Confident Christianity* events (whether evenings or conferences) have taken place across the country, from as far south as Jersey to as far north as the Highlands. This year has seen 18 events take place, with thousands of Christians equipped to share their faith with their friends.
- Solas partnered with the Word Alive festival for the first-time to deliver six hours of evangelism training to 600 delegates in a morning track at their Easter event. Many attendees were CU students, as a result of which we've seen a big jump in the number of missions Solas has been asked to take part in next year.
- Two significant weeks of schools based ministry happened this year, with Andy invited into high schools to reach Religious Studies classes, hold seminars, and Q&As with students to help them think about a Christian perspective on life's big questions. As a result of these weeks, more Christian teachers and youth workers are beginning to ask Solas to help with schools' ministry.

Digital Activities

- The website has continued to draw thousands of visitors to engage with, use, and share our evangelistic content. One highlight this year was the new *Undercurrents* series, showing how to explore the gospel through themes in movies, TV, and novels. One of Solas's continued strengths is our ability to draw on a wide range of writers, not just the core Solas team.
- The PEPTALK podcast has featured a diverse and exciting range of guests, as Andy and co-host Kristi Mair have interviewed people from a wide range of backgrounds and evangelistic approaches. We're encouraged that wherever we go across the country, we meet people who have been impacted by the show. One lovely story was an email we received from Ros Loaker of Transforming Work UK. After her appearance on PEPTALK, she had emails from several people wanting to start new workplace Christian groups—which means a deeper Christian witness in more businesses and organisations!
- Our Short Answers video series continues to be very popular and the addition of a new speaker, Steve Osmond, has helped us diversify the series slightly. One highlight this year was hearing the testimony of a man who came to faith in Christ after sitting down and watching his way through every video (about 180 episodes!)

Ministry and Media

- The launch of Andy Bannister's highly anticipated book, *How to Talk About Jesus Without Looking Like an Idiot* has seen Solas extend its reach (and grow our donor base, as the book is a popular gift chosen by new monthly donors).
- This year has seen Solas continue to work with organisations we already know (including UCCF, Scripture Union, and many church networks) as well as develop new relationships with other ministries (including Word Alive, the Christian Police Association, and 10ofThose. In the case of the latter, that has led to a new book, *Have You Ever Wondered?*, being commissioned which will be published next year).

Achievements and performance (continued)

Prospects

Solas enters 2024 in a strong position, both in terms of the team (with a new speaker) and financially to continue to grow the number of evangelism and training events across the country we can deliver. With the launch of the new Have You Ever Wondered? book next year, too, we expect the invitations to grow and Solas to continue, by God's grace, to make an incredible impact for an organisation of its size.

Financial review

Results for the year

The financial statements for the year are set out on pages 6 to 15. The Statement of Financial Activities on page 6 reflects net income of £74,112 (2022: £17,789).

Reserves Policy

It is the Charity's policy to maintain unrestricted funds at a level that equates to two to three months unrestricted expenditure. This allows sufficient funds to enable the ongoing work of the charity to be maintained. The General Fund on page 6 at 30 June 2023 amounted to £150,295 (2022: £55,942). This level of funding meets with the reserves policy. Total reserves, including the net book value of fixed assets and balances on restricted funds amounted to £262,127 (2022: £188,015).

Statement on Risk

The Directors assess the major risks to which the company is exposed on an ongoing basis, and as a result of this process, establish procedures to mitigate those risks that are identified.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 30 June 2023

1. Accounting policies

Basis of Preparation and Assessment of Going Concern

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued in October 2019, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Companies Act 2006 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant notes to these financial statements.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below.

Basis of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis.

Income and debtors

All income and bank interest is accounted for when receivable. Debtors are valued at cost at the year end and adjusted for any amounts considered to be unrecoverable.

Expenditure and creditors

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. Creditors are valued at cost at the year end and split between amounts due in less than one year and amounts due in more than one year.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are included in the balance sheet at cost. Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life:

Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow-moving items.

Statement of Financial Activities

For the purpose of the Statement of Financial Activities as shown on page 5, funds are defined as follows:

Unrestricted funds comprise income received for the objects of the company without further specified purpose and are available as general funds or are placed with designated funds which can be used for purposes in agreement with its charitable objectives.

Designated funds represent unrestricted funds which have been earmarked by the Trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds comprise income which has been received for the objects of the company and specified for a restricted purpose within these objects by the donor.

Explanation of funds

The Digital Media Projects fund represents income for all online, print and audiovisual resources and publications produced by Solas including books, newsletters, papers, recordings and other online multimedia resources.

The Publications fund was formerly the Magazine fund, which represented income and expenditure relating to the production, promotion and distribution of the Solas magazine. As the magazine was discontinued after the year end it was agreed with any relevant donors that these funds will be used to generate alternative publications and the fund has been renamed the Publications fund.

The New Speaker fund represents funds received for the funding of a second full-time speaker.

The Future Speakers Fund represents funds received to employ more full-time speakers across the UK."

The Director's fund represents funding received to pay the salary of the Director.

The Evangelism E-Learning fund represents funds to be used for the production of an e-learning evangelism course.

The Northern Ireland fund represents monies recevied for ministry conducted in the geographical region of Northern Ireland.
