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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2016. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (the FRSSE) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Roar - Connections for Life aims to connect lives and build connections to promote health and wellbeing. We will achieve this through our charitable objectives:

- Developing a flexible range of low level preventative services, including befriending, designed to address the potential impact of social isolation on older adults.
- Providing companionship to isolated and excluded older adults with a view to reducing feelings of loneliness.
- Creating opportunities for older adults in Renfrewshire to enhance their quality of life, maintain existing skills and promote engagement with their community through increased social networks.

Roar - Connections for Life is a low level (we are not registered to provide care or support as defined under the Regulation of Care Act (Scotland) 2001) service provider of preventative wellbeing enhancing services. Our services are coordinated by a small staff team and delivered by volunteers.

Significant activities

Roar - Connections for Life provides a range of services funded through a SLA with Renfrewshire Health and Social Care Partnership which includes:

- A network of health and wellbeing clubs
- 1:1 befriending support either at home, in the local community or by phone
- Health and Wellbeing Activity Opportunities
- Information and Signposting
- Transport provision and escorts
- Volunteer Recruitment, training and development

Roar has also successfully attracted funding from external sources to deliver additional services aimed at alleviating the isolation of older men, Frailty Prevention Programmes and West End projects around film and cooking. We have also embarked on developing a social enterprise delivering Foot Care.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

This is Roar - Connections for Life's fourth full year as a registered charity and limited company. Key achievements in 2015-2016 include:

- Development and implementation of ground-breaking new approaches to Community Falls Prevention for Pre - Fallers including home assessment and personalised advice.
- Staff qualifying as OTAGO instructors enabling falls prevention exercises to be offered to groups and clubs in 8 venues.
- Creating the One Legged Wobble Challenge to help raise awareness of the importance of good balance. The initiative was endorsed by Professor Dawn Skelton, supported by actress Phyllis Logan, winning feature in Paisley Grammar YPI prize and featured on BBC TV Reporting Scotland.
- Success in being selected as the partnership organisation for the development of low level foot care service with NHS Podiatry and the successful development and implementation of this service as a social enterprise.
- Success in securing funded internships form Glasgow University Settlement Trust to work on a project to 'Reach the Harder to Reach'. The recommendations have helped to support subsequent success in funding applications.
- Success in securing 'Stalled Spaces' grant to develop the area of ground around the West End Community Centre in partnership with other local groups.
- Success in Partnership bid led by Linstone Housing to bring Craft Café to Renfrewshire. The West End Craft Café has been hugely.
- New partnership with Paisley Callants Rotary Club to provide weekly supported Friendship Outings.
- Success in securing a Big Lottery Grant of £266,087 for 3 years to double our Befriending Services.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

For an additional consecutive year Roar has successfully secured and raised additional funding and income to support the work of the organisation. This continual increase enables us to add value and service capacity but is only possible with the continued core income. New projects and services are created on cost models that can be sustained longer term with minimal subsidy once the equipment and infrastructure are established. This is particularly true of the Reels and Spiels project and Come Dine With Me. Core Funded Roar Services however are delivered on a heavily subsidised model and these services are now mostly oversubscribed with no scope to grow in terms of 'lunch' club network, however the success in the Big Lottery Grant will allow growth in Befriending over the next 3 years. During this time work will need to be undertaken to identify how these service volumes can be maintained.

Our Financial priority in 2016-17 is to secure a negotiated contract and funding commitment from Renfrewshire HSCP.

During the year the charity has made a surplus of £33,353 (2015 - £53,686. Restricted funds carried forward were £14,151 (2015 - £115,644).

Reserves Policy

The trustees have established a policy whereby the unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets ("the free reserves") held by the charity should be 3 to 6 months of the resources expended. At this level, the trustees feel that they would be able to continue the current activities of the charity in the event of a significant drop in funding. It would be necessary to consider how the funding would be replaced or activities changed. At present the free reserves amount to £135,176. The trustees would like to build the reserves of the charity over the next few years to reach the appropriate level.

Governing document

Reaching Older Adults in Renfrewshire (ROAR) is a charity registered in Scotland and governed by its Articles of Association and Memorandum of Association.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Recruitment of Trustees to the board is a key priority and ROAR continues to pursue avenues to strengthen the current skill set and gender balance. We seek to attract additional Trustees through events, advertising and recommendation.

ROAR has implemented a standardised application process including a pack of enquiry documents and application forms. Applications are assessed against a standardised Shortlisting and Scoring matrix which is based on experience relevant to the board, essential core skills, personal qualities and motivation. The decision to appoint is based on the score and decision to appoint is recorded in the board minutes subject to satisfactory references and PVG application.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees (continued)

Roar - Connections for Life has successfully met the strategic objective of diversifying the gender and skill mix of the board of Trustees but will continue to seek to recruit additional trustees who can complement the current skill mix particularly in the areas of law, retail and marketing.

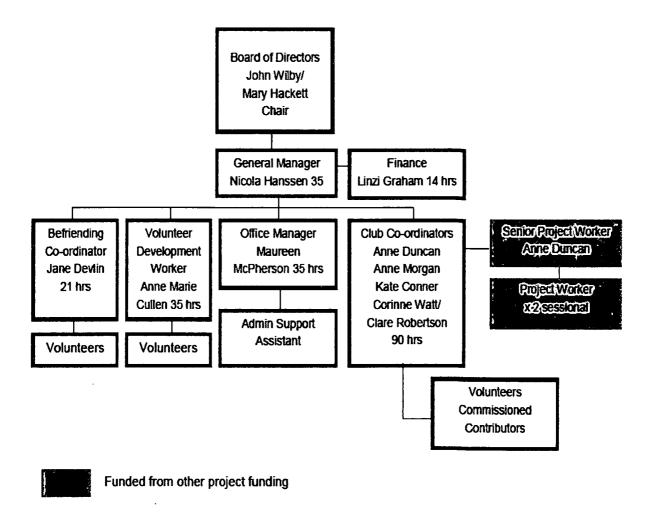
STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Structure

During 2015 - 2016 the incumbent chair John Wilby reached the end of his 5 year tenure and a new chair was elected from the board of trustees. Mary Hackett took up office following a handover period. The board subsequently invited the retired chair to retain a connection with the organisation in an ex - officio voluntary consultancy basis as it was recognised that the loss of his expertise would be unfortunate for the organisation.

The staff team remained relatively unchanged for the majority of the financial year however 1 member of staff resigned following a prolonged absence and there was some flux in project resources and outsourced admin support.

The structure in 2015/16 is as follows:



Risk management

Roar - Connections for life continues to progress towards reducing previously identified risks arising from the newness of the organisation and historical, political and financial challenges. The majority of risks are now low. The risk relating to the tenure of the building has been moderately reduced by written clarification relating to our relationship with Renfrewshire Council and neighbouring tenancies however a decision on the type, level and duration of maintenance support has not been taken because of delay in negotiated contact agreement to secure funding.

The second moderate risk is the age and specification of the current IT Server and related IT infrastructure and back-up arrangements. An external assessment and option appraisal has been commissioned and the recommendations will form the basis of a tender to upgrade the systems.

Funding security is an evolving picture and is subject to continual assessment and is being managed by increasing the quality and reputation of Roar plus the diversification of income.

Policies and Procedures

Roar's strategic and operational activities are underpinned by the core values of the organisation and the law which are enshrined in our policies and procedures. These form a key element of external accreditation audits and our success in achieving Investing in Volunteering and Quality in Befriending are testament to the robustness of these systems and approaches.

Business Planing and Budgeting

Roar - Connections for Life has developed a 3 year Strategic Plan with a 1 year business plan that has been agreed by key stakeholders and ratified by the board. Progress towards meeting these objectives are monitored bi monthly by the Board of Directors.

External Audit

External audit provides feedback to the Board on the operation of those aspects of the internal control system reviewed as part of the annual audit. It also provides comment on ROAR's general governance arrangements.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRSSE) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (the FRSSE) (effective 1 January 2015)', the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015) and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Support costs which include the central functions are allocated to activities on the basis of their use.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Equipment - 15% on reducing balance Fixtures and fittings - 15% on reducing balance

Computer equipment - 33% on cost

Tangible assets are capitalised at cost.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities. Irrecoverable VAT is written off when the expenditure to which it relates is incurred and is recorded as part of that expenditure.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees. These include funds designated by the trustees for a particular purpose.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Frailty Prevention.

This funding has enabled the development of learning from the work with Glasgow Caledonia University into strengthening and balancing exercises, advice on diet, eyesight checks and mental alertness. The charity has been able to train staff in OT AGO so that the programmes of support can be rolled out across the organisation and it has enabled the charity to be early implementors of initiatives related to community falls prevention.

Breath of Fresh Air project

Following on from outreach work into how best to Reach Older Men we identified that men like to socialise in a different way from women and particularly like a practical and learning focus. Funds received during the year have enabled the charity to develop a project in partnership with Clyde Muirshiel Country Park to deliver a programme of indoor and outdoor nature based activities. This learning has now attracted more funding that will be used to benefit other groups of older men.

West End Lifeline Project (Cinema)

The funding for this project is to help revitalise the community and provide opportunities for people in the West End of Paisley through access to activities that didn't already operate. This has been designed by/or with local people. It was from the community groups that the Reils and Speels project and the Come Dine With Me project ideas originated. These projects are both running but some of the original steering group members have become unwell or died so the projects now need to be further developed to meet the needs of the current and future members.

Evergreen Centre - Johnstone's club donation

Evergreen was a small charity which had raised money in the Johnstone & Elderslie area but had ceased. As per OSCR advice this charity was required to dispose of the balance of their charitable funds to another registered charity with similar objects. This meant the Johnstone club committee were unable to receive the funds directly into their account. Roar agreed to accept the funds to use within the Johnstone area but only where this was used to further Roar's charitable aims. To achieve this Roar has worked together with local people and the Johnstone committee.

Roar Do Feet

Basic toe nail cutting and filing service delivered by Roar staff and volunteers who have been 'educated' by NHS podiatrists. Referral is open but is dependent on health questionnaire responses and assessment at first visit before a regular service can commence. There is a one -off cost of £12 for the pack and clippers that the customer keeps and re-uses at each appointment. Each 30 min appointment costs £12. Clinics operate in various venues.

Craft Café

This project is delivered by Impact Arts funded by People and Communities funding and contributions from a consortium of organisations. Within Roar this is delivered as a 2 hour supported session where people can express themselves through arts and crafts. This project is open to people aged 60+ with the aim of reducing social isolation and loneliness by offering members a safe, social and creative environment.

Stalled Spaces

Roar operates from the West End Community Centre which has a plot of ground that was unkempt and unattractive. As part of our commitment to improving the West End we applied and were granted money from a national initiative aiming to make small, unused pieces of ground into more attractive areas within communities. This project has been a collaboration between Roar's Mens Group, Clyde Muirshiel Rangers, West End Community Council and Tenants and Residents with support from Pacific Building and Ross and Liddell.

Transfer of funds

Transfers between funds represent the reapportioning of staff costs to individual projects.

16. PENSION COMMITMENTS

During the year, the charity contributed to a defined contribution pension scheme for its employees. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the company in an independently administered fund. The pension cost charge represents contributions payable by the company to the fund and amounted to £6,368 (2015: £5,228). There were no contributions payable to the fund at the year end.
