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# TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTOR'S REPORT)

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2023

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2023.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the company's governing document, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019).

Since the company qualifies as small under section 382 of the Companies Act 2006, the Strategic Report required of medium and large companies under the Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Directors' Report) Regulations 2013 has been omitted

The company also operates under the name DIAS Limited.

#### Objectives and activities

The organisation received funds for the provision of a range of commissioned services within the scope of an annual service level agreement with Dundee City Council. A structural gap has emerged in recent years between the funding allocated by the Commissioners to specific service strands and the attributable costs of each service. This has given rise to a degree of internal cross-subsidy which is reflected in transfers made during the year from general service level agreement funding to Mental Health (Care & Treatment) Act and Older People's restricted fund activities set out above.

The Collective Advocacy carried out in Strathmartine Hospital is funded in relation to advocacy services which are aimed at increasing beneficiaries' self-confidence and ability to articulate views, wishes and concerns.

Older People's Services represent independent advocacy activities delivered to older people in Dundee under a service agreement with Dundee City Council.

The Peer Advocacy Fund is established for income received and expended in relation to an innovative approach to advocacy developed by DIAS through which beneficiaries are partnered with individuals who themselves have been recipients of advocacy services.

The Mental Health Care & Treatment Act requires that local authorities provide specific funding for the care and treatment of individuals referred from within their jurisdiction who have been diagnosed with mental illness. DIAS provides advocacy services to such people in return for grant income received under the terms of an annual contract and service level agreement with Dundee City Council.

The monies received from the Corra Foundation provides funding for one part-time and one full time support post providing 1-1 advocacy for people and their families who have substance use challenges. These posts support the Dundee Alcohol and Drug Partnership implementation of the MAT (Medically Assisted Treatments) Standards.

#### Achievements and performance

The period from March 2022 to April 2023 saw continued, and in some areas, increased demand for Independent Advocacy Support. To meet those demands we delivered more internal training to staff than we have ever done, in particular around Mental Health Tribunals and Adult Support and Protection. This ensured we were able to cover all related meetings and support required by our partners. We also delivered a series of training for Tribunals to Advocating Together, giving even wider cover and options for support.

Our move to the Technology Park in March 2022 went well and we integrated with other business already established there. We have monthly staff meetings in the board room at Prospect House, which gives the chance for staff who work from home to have face to face contact with their colleagues. Having access to free parking is a bonus for any staff working in the office.

In March 2023 we had a Tayside wide Independent Advocacy knowledge sharing event, which DIAS organised with over 35 staff from 5 different Independent Advocacy organisations come together. The topic was Trauma Informed Practice, which is very relevant to the support we all offer, both in terms of support for our partners but also for our staff. Over the past 2 years some referrals we receive have many additional layers of complexity, with a large percentage having historical trauma, that for many reasons has never been addressed. Once a level of trust is established often partners will open up and ask for our support to seek the appropriate channels around their trauma. So it is important that staff have the knowledge, support and tools to build resilience and ensure they adopt self-care approach. In addition to the learning, it was a great opportunity for networking, with a gap of around 7/8 years since we shared an event like this, with lots of new staff and management, a chance to make new connections and share best practice. It was such a success all 5IA organisations have agreed to make it a yearly event.

Change is something that DIAS has adapted to well over the years, and something no organisation can avoid. Some changes impact more than others and in October 2022 Brian Rapley, a long standing board member & previous employee resigned from his post on the board. Brian brought a wealth of Independent Advocacy to the board both from his practice of being an IA worker, along with previous employment. Susan Ross, DIAS chairperson announced that she would be retiring from her post at the next AGM in 2023, having helped steer DIAS through some challenging and difficult times, bringing to DIAS a richness of knowledge and experience. Due to ill health Susan had to bring her retirement earlier and at the end of March 2023 advised the board that the April 23 board meeting would be her final one. DIAS will be forever grateful to both Susan and Brian for their commitment and passion.

Whilst we ensured that our core services continued to provide a high standard of support, we developed and expanded our support in the substance use arena. In August 2022 we were granted 2 years funding from Corra, Local Support Fund to continue work we had started with supporting people who were experiencing drug challenges to know their rights around the Medically Assisted Treatments introduced by Scottish Government. This involved specialised training for the 2 Substance Use Independent Advocacy works, along with completing Human Rights accredited course delivered by Reach Advocacy. We delivered a series of IA sessions to Dundee Drug and Alcohol Nurses and Social worker, which helped us build a positive partnership working relationship with them.

In June 2022 we started our first peer worker to provide support to the Families at Risk work we offer. This post was funded for a year and brought someone with lived experience of our support in this area. Whilst it was a new role for DIAS, bringing some new challenges it also brought a new dynamic welcomed aby both the parents / carers we support but also by our advocacy workers.

#### Financial review

After making appropriate enquiries, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the accounting policies.

The trustees aim to carry a minimum balance on free reserves broadly equivalent to 3 months' operating expenditure.

At 31 March 2023, free reserves (represented by unrestricted net current assets - that is, excluding tangible fixed assets) stood at £69,909 (2022 - £82,753). This equates to around 6 months operating expenditure across all unrestricted activities. The trustees consider this level of reserves to be reasonable in view of the close control that is maintained over expenditure budgets throughout the year.

The organisation receives funds for the provision of a range of commissioned services within the scope of an annual service level agreement with Dundee City Council. A structural gap has emerged in recent years between the funding allocated by the Commissioners to specific service strands and the attributable costs of each service. This has given rise to a degree of internal cross-subsidy which is reflected in transfers made during the year from general service level agreement funding to Mental Health (Care & Treatment) Act, Peer Advocacy and Older People's restricted fund activities set out in Note 14 in the accounts.

#### Structure, governance and management

Dundee Independent Advocacy Support is registered as a charitable company limited by guarantee and was set up by a Memorandum of Association.

The company, which is a recognised charity in Scotland, is constituted under a Memorandum of Association and is a registered charity number SC027180.

In March 2021 DIAS was awarded the Introduction to Good Governance Programme which mainly focuses on the governance surrounding the Board and its directors. The Good Governance Award is the Quality Standard for Scottish charities, recommended by OSCR. The Award provides a clear, structured approach to assessing and improving a charity's policies and procedures. Once completed, it provides proof that an organisation is actively engaging in excellent governance through the Award Certification.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2023

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### Charity information

Dundee Independent Advocacy Support is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in Scotland. The registered office is Suite E, Software Centre, Gemini Crescent, Dundee Technology Park, Dundee, DD2 1TY.

#### 1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the company's governing document, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" ("FRS 102") and the Charities SORP "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (effective 1 January 2019). The company is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The company has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the company. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest £.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

#### 1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

#### 1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors or grantors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Investment income, gains and losses are allocated to the appropriate fund.

#### 1.4 Income

Income is recognised when the company is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations or grants are recognised once the company has been notified of the donation or grant, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED)

#### 1 Accounting policies

#### 1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges are allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Expenditure on charitable activities is incurred on directly undertaking the activities which further the company's objectives, as well as any associated support costs.

All expenditure is inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

#### 1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Office equipment 25% Straight line Computers 33.33% Straight line

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in the statement of financial activities.

#### 1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the company reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

#### 1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

#### 1.9 Financial instruments

The company has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the company's balance sheet when the company becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

#### 1.10 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the company is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

#### 1.11 Retirement benefits

The charity is a member of a multi-employer plan. Where it is not possible for the charity to obtain sufficient information to enable it to account for the plan as a defined benefit plan, it accounts for the plan as a defined contribution plan. The amount charged to the Statement of Financial Activities incorporating Income and Expenditure Account represents contributions payable to the scheme in respect of the accounting period.

#### 2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the company's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

#### Critical judgements

#### Depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are depreciated over a period to reflect their estimated useful lives. The applicability of the assumed lives is reviewed annually, taking into account factors such as physical condition, maintenance and obsolescence.

Fixed assets are also assessed as to whether there are indictors of impairment. This assessment involves consideration of the economic viability of the purpose for which the asset is used.

#### Allocation of overheads

Staff wages and other overhead costs are apportioned over the projects on a percentage basis based on staff time.

#### Purposes of Restricted Funds:

The organisation received funds for the provision of a range of commissioned services within the scope of an annual service level agreement with Dundee City Council, this funding includes core costs.

Older People's Services represent independent advocacy activities delivered to older people in Dundee under a service agreement with Dundee City Council.

The Mental Health Care & Treatment Act requires that local authorities provide specific funding for the care and treatment of individuals referred from within their jurisdiction who have been diagnosed with mental illness. DIAS provides advocacy services to such people in return for grant income received under the terms of an annual contract and service level agreement with Dundee City Council.

DCC - Drugs Task Force - Fixed funding for 2 years to provide wages cost towards support workers for advocacy for those affected by substance abuse.

The Corra Foundation- Monies towards two part-time advocacy workers

Thorntons - Monies to contribute to the salary of two advocacy workers

#### 18 Contingent liabilities

DIAS participates, as an employer, in the Pension Trust's Growth Plan ("the Plan"). The Plan is funded and is not contracted-out of the State Scheme. The Plan is a multi-employer pension plan. Following a change in legislation in September 2005 there is a potential debt to DIAS, along with other participating employers with pre-2001 liabilities in the Plan, that could be levied by the Trustee of the Plan. The debt is due in the event of the employer ceasing to participate in the Plan or the Plan winding-up.

DIAS has been notified by the Pensions Trust of the estimated employer debt on withdrawal from the Plan based on the financial position of the Plan at 30 September 2020. As at this date the estimated employer debt for DIAS was £23,715. This is the most recent valuation with valuations being triennial.

DIAS had one active members in the scheme as at 31 March 2023 and is not committed to withdrawing from the Plan as at the date of approval of these financial statements. Accordingly, no provision has been made in the these accounts for the potential debt due on withdrawal from the plan.
