PART 1 - GENERAL DESCRIPTION OF THE COMPANY'S ACTIVITIES AND IMPACT

Our fourth year trading as a social enterprise focused heavily on rebuilding and recovering from the effects of coronavirus lockdowns – both as a company, and in terms of supporting our wider community.

Brace Black

Our youth project Brass Blast returned to in-person sessions in April 2021, after another period of online lockdown working from Jan-March. We delivered a 10-week summer term outdoors (Beginner sessions in Portobello Community Orchard and Improvers in a local park) and put on 3 summer busking events on Portobello Promenade, with enhanced safety measures in place. In September we finally returned to our Edinburgh College venue after 18 months. We ran a 14-week term up to Christmas that included performing at Porty's Christmas Lights and filming on the beach to be part of a UK-wide youth music video created for COP26 (hosted in Glasgow 1-12 November) https://youtu.be/t01q-qfVJbk

In November we were finally able to return to Brunstane Primary after a 20-month hiatus. This is where Brass Blast recruitment is focused, so we were delighted to start up a new Beginners group again - bringing 25 new players into the project from local primary schools. Finally numbers at Brass Blast were up at 45+ young people again! After a rocky start beset by COVID cancellations in the run up to Christmas, the Beginners group began making real progress during our 10-week Spring term – finishing with a fantastic show at Edinburgh College on 29 March that featured all 45+ players.

Organisational Development

We were delighted that Oi Musica was awarded third sector recovery funding form the Adapt & Thrive stream in March 2021. The investment aimed to support social enterprises to adapt to new post-pandemic conditions and build new income streams. We used the funds to set up two new street bands, focus on business development and support core costs.

We set up *The Tubes* as a feel-good 6-piece band to play gigs through Summer '21. We put a set of songs together, recorded a 4-track demo and made a short promo film. We played several informal gigs on Porty Promenade as well as 2 shows as part of Edinburgh International Festival's community programme (during a year when the festival did not go ahead anywhere near its usual scale) for SAMH and Goodtrees Neighbourhood Centre https://vimeo.com/702321414

We also supported one of our emerging young musicians to set up a percussion+brass, Brazil-inspired 8-piece band called *Bloco Echo* – 5 drummers and 3 brass. The group created material during a creative residential weekend in June '21, before performing at Fringe by the Sea, Craigmillar festival and the Royal Edinburgh hospital.

In Spring '22 Oi Musica's Co-Directors spent 3 days working with an experienced arts Producer/Consultant, revisiting Oi Musica's Vision, Missions & Aims and starting an ongoing piece of work focused on writing a new business plan, creating a new website and exploring sustainable ways to grow Oi Musica as we continue to emerge out of the pandemic period.

Let it Grow

In June '21 we were awarded Creative Scotland funding *Let it Grow*, which built on the release of our climate-focused music video *Enough is Enough*. Let it Grow was a participative song project inviting community-based musicians and groups of all kinds to build a tidal wave of music in the lead up to Scotland hosting COP26 in November 2021 https://letitgrow.scot/

This was a huge piece of work for Oi Musica, and a departure from our core work of using street band music to bring people & communities together. The project involved:

- Building a website, creating socials channels and running a campaign inviting musicians and groups to get involved.
- Commissioning 5 new pieces of music inspired by Enough is Enough, released as music videos.
- Creating a Schools pack inviting Glasgow's school children to get involved in Let it Grow.
- Taking a small group of musicians to perform at the Lost Woods tree planning sessions over 4 days in October, working with 1,600 school children https://www.thelostwoods.earth/childrenswoodland
- Staging two ambitious, large-scale performances of Enough is Enough with Karine Polwart, the Soundhouse Choir
 and core of professional street band musicians. The first was on 6 Nov, a Global Day of Climate Action, at Dynamic
 Earth in Edinburgh. The second was on 10 Nov in Govan, Glasgow across the river from where the COP26
 negotiations were taking place. This second performance also included 2 Glasgow street bands, children from
 Riverside Primary School joining the Soundhouse Choir, a professional dancer and a flash mob of singers in the
 audience https://youtu.be/Mt33Z85vS60
- The project was featured as a case study in Creative Carbon Scotland's 2022 report 'Arts and Culture at COP26' https://www.creativecarbonscotland.com/arts-and-culture-at-cop26-report-released/

This was an extremely busy and successful year for Oi Musica, with emotional returns to playing live music again and lots of looking ahead to sustainable growth through 2022-23.

The company's stakeholders include anybody who wishes to take part in music making activities, to learn to play an instrument, or to develop their music making skills. Specifically, those who face barriers to participation. Barriers might include cost, lack of opportunities, lack of confidence, perceptions of who music is (or isn't) for, social exclusion or challenging personal circumstances. In 2021-22, those barriers also included restrictions, policies and anxieties associated with the Covid-19 pandemic.

Our stakeholders are members of our local community, and the communities where we work; fellow street band practitioners, music educators and community music specialists. They also include other street bands, community bands and groups; fellow musicians and artists whose work addresses social issues, and third sector organisations interested in using music and the arts for social benefit or community development.

Brass Blast: our return to in-person working and subsequent growth of the project (to pre-pandemic numbers) took place in direct consultation with our players, their families and the project partners. We continued to be responsive and open to the needs and views of our Brass Blast community, returning carefully and safely to in-person working and including the creative ideas of our players in our weekly music sessions.

'Let it Grow' was a project that grew directly out of the interest generated by our music video Enough is Enough, and the subsequent demand to be involved in a follow-up project. Essentially it involved creating a strong framework that could then invite organic growth, participation and interaction with the idea. Despite taking place during a difficult time for community-based groups (many venues weren't yet open again for rehearsals or events post pandemic), Let it Grow generated 40+ new pieces of music by grassroots music makers that reached online audiences and added to calls at COP26 for radical action on climate change.

This anonymous piece of feedback was striking in terms of the aims and objectives of Let it Grow:

"I wanted to feedback that arts and culture are so important to bring light to issues universally and cross boundaries/ barriers/ social classes and more. But what the event did for me personally was that it replenished me. I was feeling down about Cop26, and working for a Disabled Person's Organisation every day I was hearing how the voices of disabled people were not being listened to, and how little access there was across the board. I felt like my stores were being stripped and being part of Enough is Enough gave me some back, and inspired me to do more and hold myself more accountable. Because I am surrounded by people who feel the same. So happy to have been part of this."

We continue to proactively grow our professional networks, linking with and learning from other organisations. This has helped us to ensure that projects such as Brass Blast become more responsive and reflective of the needs and opinions of those who take part.
